FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

This report is submitted to the Administrative Procedure Committee and the Administration Commission in compliance with the reqirement of Section 120.70, F.S., which states:

"Not later than February 1 of each year, the division shall issue a written report to the Administrative Procedure Committee and the Administration Commission, including at least the following information:

- (1) A summary of the extent and effect of agencies' utilization of hearing officers, court reporters, and other personnel in proceedings under this act.
- (2) Recommendations for change or improvement in the Administrative Procedure Act or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto."

During calendar year 1977 the Division of Administrative
Hearings received 2,309 separate requests for hearings. 1977 was
the third full year of operation for Florida's new Administrative
Procedure Act and because of the increasing experience this office
is accumulating most of these cases are handled in a routine fashion.
Many other comments made by the undersigned in the Third Annual Report
of this division submitted last year are equally applicable to this

year's report. To avoid needless repetition all introductory comments made in that report are herein referenced as being accurate for this year.

It is encouraging to note that agencies are becoming more cautious in committing expenditures for the use of live court reporters for administrative hearings.

Chapter 120 requires each agency to record the testimony at all administrative hearings but does not mandate the use of a live court reporter. More agencies are becoming aware of the economy of using mechanical devices to record testimony at administrative hearings. Furthermore, although the practices of many agencies could benefit from more closer review, when transcripts of hearings are ordered agencies have begun to realize they can more economically reproduce a single copy of a transcript than ordering separate copies from a court reporter.

Section 120.65 permits the Division of Administrative Hearings to furnish Hearing Officers on a contract basis to a governmental entity not covered by the act. During 1977 the division furnished Hearing Officers to the City of Tallahassee and the City of Clearwater to conduct administrative hearings. These experiences have been satisfactory to all parties involved and the division has entered a formal contract with the City of Clearwater to supply Hearing Officers on a continuing basis as needed. Also, this division is discussing the possibility with other cities of entering into similar relationships.

SUGGESTIONS FOR AMENDMENTS TO CHAPTER 120

No specific recommendations for legislation are being made in this report. This is partly because of the belief of this division that the administrative processes of the state are running smoothly and also because there appear to be no compelling reasons to change the proceedings which have become standardized and more widely understood.

However, there are some general ideas to which the legislature should give attention. This is the avoidance of unnecessary duplication in the administrative hearing process. There are presently several agencies within the state that exist mostly to conduct administrative hearings. It appears that questions should be raised as to whether greater economy of both time and government expenditures could not be reached if these functions were transferred to this division.
