DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS

INTRODUCTION

The State of Florida Department of Military Affairs, is a State agency, created by Chapter 250, Florida Statutes and composed of the military force provided for in the laws of the State of Florida. The Florida National Guard is provided for by Section 2, Article X of the Constitution and Chapter 250.08 of the Florida Statutes. The National Guard of the United States is provided for by Title 32, U.S. Code.

The Governor is Commander in Chief of the Florida National Guard. The Adjutant General is Chief of the Department of Military Affairs and Commanding General of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. There is an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Adjutant General for Air, and a directorate staff organization in the Headquarters, (Appendix I, Organizational Chart).

The troop structure of the Florida National Guard is composed of the Florida Army National Guard and Florida Air National Guard. The Army National Guard consists of the State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment with its attached support type units; an Infantry Brigade (Separate); and nondivisional units grouped under an Alternate Command Headquarters, FARNG, and a Command and Control Headquarters, (Appendix III, Organization - Florida Army National Guard). The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters Florida Air National Guard; the 125th Fighter Group, (Appendix IV, Organization - Florida Air National Guard).

MISSION

As provided for under the provisions of the National Defense Act, units of the Florida National Guard, both Army and Air, have a dual mission.

- (1) A State mission, to provide military organizations trained and equipped to function when necessary in the protection of life and property, and in the preservation of peace, order and the public safety, as directed by competent State Authority; and,
- (2) A Federal mission, as Reserve Components of the Army and Air Force of the United States, to provide trained and qualified individuals available for Federal service in time of war or national emergency, or at such other times as the national security may require augmentation of the United States Armed Forces.

The Florida Air National Guard, in addition to their State and Federal mission, has an air sovereignty mission for the eastern seaboard of the United States. Mission involves the maintenance of F-106 fighters and crew on a twenty-four hour alert status, armed and ready for immediate commitment to intercept unidentified aircraft in or approaching the airspace of the United States.

The State Adjutant General and his Headquarters has an additional Federal mission to direct and coordinate the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force) made available within the State, to support civil authorities engaged in providing for survival of people and continuity of government in a nuclear environment.

SUMMARY

The Florida Army National Guard experienced three major reorganizational changes during the period covered by this report. One unit was inactivated, two units were organized. Reorganizations under the Department of the Army Vertical Army Authorization Document System have remained in force throughout the period which created some minor adjustments in Military Occupational Specialties, strengths and changes in unit Tables of Organization and Equipment. All prescribed training level objectives imposed by Department of the Army have been attained and maintained and the Standards of Proficiency and

Readiness of units remained at a high level with all administered Army Training Evaluation Programs (ARTEPs) being successfully accomplished, all units being rated satisfactory during their Annual Training exercises. Officer Educational Requirements and Enlisted Military Occupational Specialties Training have been maintained at a high level through attendance of personnel at Army Service Schools, Army Area Schools and the many available Specialized Courses of Instruction.

The Equal Opportunity Program for the Florida Army National Guard, Equal Employment Opportunity Program for Federal technicians and State employees, and the Social Actions Program for the Florida Air National Guard received continued emphasis during the year. Gains were recorded in the numbers of minorities and women assigned to the Army National Guard. Minorities declined in the Air National Guard. The total number of women and minorities employed as technicians in the Army and Air National Guard declined since last report. A loss was recorded for minorities as State employees, while the total number of employees increased slightly. Emphasis in the military programs is on upward mobility for enlisted personnel and increasing the number of minority officers in both the Army and Air National Guard. EEO program emphasis continues to be in the area of recruitment of minorities for full-time positions, either as technicians or as full-time military members.

During fiscal year 1980, the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 190 personnel. As of 30 June 1980, Florida's strength of 9,306 assigned personnel reflects a fill of 101.8%, ranking Florida number 4 of all states and territories in percentage of assigned strength as compared to authorized strength. During the coming year additional incentives are needed to retain and attract personnel for membership in the Florida Army National Guard.

The 125th Fighter Group continues to maintain the highest levels of combat readiness. This statement is documented in a recent overall excellent rating assigned by a USAF Management Effectiveness Inspection Team. The Group is maintaining a personnel strength level of 104%.

ORGANIZATION

The Florida Army National Guard realized two major changes to its force structure. One detachment size unit was organized as a result of the TOW/DRAGON weapons system being introduced. That unit was the 353d Ordnance Detachment, Tampa. As a result of the inactivation of the 255th Engineer Company, the 156th Medical Company (ACR) was activated in St. Augustine. At the request of the 53d Infantry Brigade, Company C, 2d Battalion, 124th Infantry, Lake Wales, was reorganized minus a detachment which was located to Orlando and designated Detachment 1, Company C, 2d Battalion, 124th Infantry. Other Army National Guard units were reorganized under the Department of the Army Vertical Army Authorization Document System which resulted in minor changes to the unit's Modified Table of Organization and Equipment.

Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard experienced minor personnel changes during the reporting period. Command and control, staff assistance visits and exercise evaluations continue as primary activities. The State Air Headquarters is functioning very effectively.

EMPLOYEES

There are 1,082 individuals, civilian and military, employed by or assigned to the Department of Military Affairs. These employees work either directly with the Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs or with National Guard units in the field, supporting approximately 10,000 Florida National Guard personnel. (Appendix II, Employee Allocation, Department of Military Affairs.) There are 135 Career Service personnel of the State of Florida, employed under the State Personnel rules and regulations, 933 Federal technicians, authorized for employment under the rules and regulations of the U.S. Civil Service Commission by Public Law 90-486, and 14 active duty personnel assigned as Army and Air Force Advisors to the Florida National Guard. These employees are specialists in the field of administration, finance, accounting, supply and maintenance. With the exception of a limited number of employees,

personnel are required to be military members of the various organizations and units to which assigned. (Fiscal Data, Appendices VII and VIII.)

ARMORY BOARD, STATE OF FLORIDA

The Armory Board, State of Florida, established as provided by Section 250.40, Florida Statutes, and comprised of the Governor, the Adjutant General, the State Quartermaster, the General Officers of the Line, Group Commanders, and the Senior Air Commander of the active Florida National Guard, provides general supervision and control of real properties utilized by the Florida National Guard. The Armory Board is responsible for and controls forest management, mineral removal, game and fish propagation programs and the maintenance and improvement of the former Federal lands at Camp Blanding, with the approval of the U.S. Government. (A detail of the organization of the Armory Board is shown in Appendix V.)

The National Guard, as a joint effort of Federal, State and local Governments, has taken its place as a major component in the defense of our National, State and local communities through this mutual support. The Armory Board reemphasized its policy, during the year, that National Guard armories be utilized by the citizenry of the community, to the fullest extent possible, where such use is not to the detriment of public interest and does not interfere with the primary use of armories for the housing and training of military units stationed therein. The Armory Board cooperated with other armed services, State agencies and organizations by providing facilities at Camp Blanding for use in training, rifle marksmanship, and instruction.

FACILITIES

State Arsenal


The State Arsenal is one of the older and more historic buildings in St. Augustine. It houses Headquarters for the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard. This four hundred year old facility was formerly the site of a Franciscan Monastery constructed in 1588. It was converted to a military barracks by the British in 1763; from 1783 to 1821 it was a Spanish garrison; and from 1821 to 1900, it served as a U.S. Army Post. In 1907 the Headquarters of the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard was established here. Normal repairs and maintenance are performed in such a manner as to preserve the historic features of the facilities, insofar as is feasible.



Armories/Construction

There are fifty National Guard armories, strategically located throughout the State, from Pensacola on the west, to Jacksonville on the northeast, to Fort Myers and Homestead on the south. (Locations and valuations are reflected in Appendix VI).

600-Person Armory and 6-Bay Organizational Maintenance Shop - Miami: The construction of the new Armory and Organizational Maintenance Shop in Miami is near final completion. Because we constructed on the existing site, this project is being constructed in phases. The Organizational Maintenance Shop has been completed and has been occupied for approximately 1 year. The Armory is substantially complete and the 4 Miami units moved into their new home in June. The final phase, which is the POV Parking, has just been completed. This attractive, new facility cost \$2,245,515 (\$1,554,419 Federal funds and \$691,096 State funds). The armory, which is two-story, contains 47,393 SF and the Organizational Maintenance Shop contains 7,196 SF.

Maintenance Shop - West Palm Beach: Bids will be opened on 28 August 1980 for this new facility, which will house the two West Palm Beach Guard units, along with a USAR garrison unit and small detachment. This two-story facility will contain 60,000 SF and the OMS/CSMS will contain 5,700 SF. The total project is estimated to cost \$3,000,000. Construction will take 18 months.

200-Person Armory and Post Headquarters Building - Camp Blanding: Design of this new facility has now been completed. This facility will house 8 units and detachments, along with the Post Headquarters operation, will include approximately 38,300 SF and is estimated to cost \$2,100,000. It is planned that this armory will provide an excellent facility for AT conferences, AT Officer's call, AT theatre and related functions during the year. This project is currently planned for fiscal year 1982.

Non-Armory Construction

Army Aviation Support Facility Expansion - Jacksonville: Authorization has been received to expand and update the Aviation Facility at Craig Field in Jacksonville. Design on this project, which will cost approximately \$1,700,000 in Federal funding, will start in the near future and construction is

programmed in fiscal year 1983.


United States Property and Fiscal Office - St. Augustine: Authorization has also been received for a new United States Property and Fiscal Office building to be located near the Arsenal complex in St. Augustine. Design on this project, which will contain 12,200 SF and cost approximately \$800,000 in Federal funding will start in the near future and construction is programmed for fiscal year 1983.

In addition to the above major projects, fencing, paving, repair and renovation projects were accomplished at numerous armories throughout the State.

Air National Guard Base

The Florida Air National Guard Base, located at the Jacksonville International Airport, is the home of the Florida Air National Guard. The 158-acre complex consists of 25 buildings containing 316,235 square feet of floor space and over 130,876 square yards of pavements for a gross asset value of more than 6 million dollars. This past year State Funds amounting to approximately \$105,500 and Federal Funds amounting to \$842,250 were expended for the operation, maintenance, repairs and new construction at this installation. The major portions of these funds were used for escalating utilities costs and a (Water Cooled) 32A-17A Noise Suppressor.

This complex consists of buildings which can be easily expanded should the need arise, and includes an independent emergency water supply, underground electrical distribution system, a central heating and air conditioning plant with underground lines, vehicle parking areas, a 78,201 square foot aircraft maintenance hanger, a base operations building, consolidated maintenance facility, a 260-person dining hall and a medical clinic. The facilities were designed to incorporate functional management for nearly any mission assignment.

Ranges

National Guard Firing Ranges at Camp Blanding and Avon Park were continued in use during the year. These ranges were used, not only by the Florida National Guard, but also by the regular and reserve forces. Considerable improvements were accomplished on the ranges at Camp Blanding.

CAMP BLANDING

General

The Armory Board maintains the Florida National Guard's 72,000 acre campsite located in Clay County. Included in this area are 40,000 acres, representing former Federal lands, deeded to the Armory Board by the Federal Government through Public Law 493, with stipulations that all the lands be maintained as a military reservation and that a Forest Management Program be conducted. The Armory Board realizes revenue from the forestry program and, also, from mineral removal occurring on these former Federal lands, all of which is utilized to defray operating expenses.

Utilization

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is utilized extensively by units of the Florida National Guard in all phases of training, to include weekend Multiple Unit Training Assemblies (MUTA) and Annual Training (AT). During the fiscal year, the facilities were utilized some 34,474 man-days for Army National Guard MUTA's with an additional 12,832 being devoted to conduct of small arms competitive matches, sponsored by the National Guard and by Camp Blanding Rifle and Pistol Clubs. Man-days totaling 121,768 were devoted to AT exercises for elements of the Army National Guard of Florida, with an additional 53,535 man-days devoted to AT by elements of other states' National Guard. Another 1,517 man-days were devoted to Federal Government organizations, while 12,673 man-days were devoted to State and local agencies.

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is noted for its fine facilities and training areas conducive to the conduct of command post exercises, logistical exercises, specialized training and training conferences, as well as for its recently renovated and modernized firing ranges, which include 7.62MM, .30 and .45 Caliber small arms ranges, machine gun, rocket launcher, recoilless rifle, 81MM and 4.2" mortar ranges, subcaliber tank ranges, a Tow/Dragon tracking range, an aviation air assault range, a demolitions and explosives range, and an antiaircraft artillery range. Camp Blanding is the home of the Florida National Guard Military Academy, consisting of the Officer Candidate School, the basic source of newly commissioned second lieutenants required for filling junior officer vacancies and the Non-commissioned Officer Academy which provides advanced leadership training for non-commissioned officers of the Florida Army National Guard. The camp is the home training site of the Special Forces elements of the Florida Army National Guard, with its fine jungle type training areas, drop zone and rappelling tower facility. Of utmost importance, is the Camp Blanding Army Airfield and its excellent service facilities, which are used extensively by Army Aviation units throughout the training year.

Warehouse storage facilities continue to be occupied by the Directorate of Supply and Services (USPFO) for receipt, storage and issue of Federal property and supplies, which are utilized by the units of the Florida Army National Guard. The Florida National Guard Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS) continues to perform its important mission of maintenance of Federal equipment in support of units throughout the State. The Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES) facility, adjacent to the CSMS, maintains vehicles and weapons used by units in training at Camp Blanding. Equipment consists of self-propelled, tracked, twin 40MM guns, various types of engineer heavy equipment, infantry recoilless rifles, mortars and wheeled vehicles.

The regular establishment, Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps, as well as elements of their respective reserve forces, continue to utilize training areas and small arms ranges at Camp Blanding as part of their yearly programs. A total of 47,576 man-days were spent in training exercises by such elements

during the last year.

The U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Fleet Air, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville continues to maintain its leased portion of the Reservation which they and the Air Force utilize for the training of pilots, to include carrier based personnel, in air-to-ground bombing and strafing and for the operation of their Radar Scoring Station.

Fiscal year usage of this outstanding training facility totaled 270,185 man-days.

Game Management

The agreement between the Armory Board and the Department of Natural Resources, whereby portions of Camp Blanding are opened to controlled public hunting and fishing, remains in effect. Controlled burning and grain planting has been most favorable in the production of game. Lake samplings indicated that fish stocked in certain lakes have done well in most instances.

Forest Management

The Armory Board continues to conduct a Forest Management Program at Camp Blanding. During the year, normal road maintenance throughout the Reservation was accomplished and additionally, new roads, with drainage structures, were constructed. Harvesting and replanting of timber continues in a balanced program under the supervision of a professional forester.

Mining Operations


E. I. duPont deNemours and Company continues to mine in a restricted area on the western edge of Camp Blanding, ilmenite being the principle mineral removed from the soil. DuPont, at their own expense, as an ecological project, has instituted a procedure whereby the top six inches of soil is stripped and stockpiled, prior to the mining operation. After mining, this top soil is redistributed, on the subsequent spoil area, thereby successfully stabilizing the spoil and improving the return of vegetation. Pine trees are now flourishing on this area.

Construction

Rehabilitation of Mess Halls: The design for the rehabilitation of 5 mess halls in the cantonment area has been completed. Hopefully, the National Guard Bureau will fund this project in fiscal year 1981. The improvements include new roofs, service counter, kitchen hoods, ceilings, ventilation, improved lighting and removal of the wood window flaps and replacement with windows and screens.

Telephone Exchange Building - Camp Blanding: Design has been completed for the Telephone Exchange Building to be located on Ft. Lauderdale Street near the Sports Complex. This facility will house the commercial and military switchboards now in operation at Camp Blanding. During the past two years, a unit from the Georgia ANG, assisted by the 146th Signal Battalion, has been busy installing a new underground telephone wiring system during IDT's and AT's. The proposed Telephone Exchange Building is the final leg in this project which should provide for improvements in the Camp Blanding Telephone system. This facility will include approximately 1,600 SF and is estimated to cost \$70,000. We hope to have the building constructed and the system in operation prior to AT 81.

Service Club - Camp Blanding: The construction of the new Service Club at Camp Blanding has been completed and is currently being operated by the Army/Air Force Exchange Service on a trial basis. This fine, new facility contains approximately 8,000 SF and cost \$248,091 and includes a 10' x 100' covered porch along the lakeside of the building. We currently have kitchen equipment totaling \$40,000 on order, most of which has been received. This new club occupies the original site of the old EM Club, which burned in December 1978.

STATE FUNDS

Appropriated Funds

Disbursement of General Revenue Funds are based on appropriations made by the Florida State Legislature and are reflected in Appendix VII.

Armory Board Trust Fund

This fund is utilized primarily as a revolving fund from which expenditures related to Intrusion Detection Systems supervision and inspections are reimbursed with Federal funds by the Army Service Contract.

Camp Blanding Management Trust Fund

This fund consists of revenues realized at Camp Blanding, principally from the sale of timber products and royalties received from the mining operation, and, by law, is expended exclusively for the operation and maintenance of Camp Blanding.

Community Funds

Florida law provides that counties and municipalities may provide financial or material support to the National Guard. A portion of the Military Code dealing with this subject is quoted below and Appendix X details that support received during fiscal year 1979-1980.

250.40 Armory Board; Armories, How obtained -

(6) In order to provide for the cooperative support of the National Guard, and that armories may be provided which will furnish suitable training facilities and adequate storage accommodations for all arms, equipment and other military property, the armory board shall have authority to receive from counties,

municipalities and other sources, donations of land and contributions of money to aid in providing, improving and maintaining an arsenal, armories, camp site, target ranges, and other facilities, throughout the state, and any property so donated, shall be held as other property for the use of the state and such counties and municipalities are hereby authorized and empowered to make such donations of lands by deed or long term leases and contributions of moneys for the purposes herein set forth, and to issue bonds or certificates of indebtedness to provide funds for such purposes; ***

Service Contracts

The Federal Government and the Armory Board have cost-sharing contracts for the maintenance and operation of the physical plant of certain facilities of the Florida National Guard. The Army Service Contract, which supports the Arsenal Annex, portions of Camp Blanding, the Army Aviation Maintenance Shop and fifteen Organizational Maintenance Shops, provides for a Federal share of 75% and Armory Board share of 25%. The Air Service Contract, which supports the Air National Guard Base at Jacksonville, provides for a Federal share of 80% and Armory Board share of 20%. Annual training and weekend training activities of the Florida National Guard are 100% Federally funded.

Budgets

A recapitulation of budgeted State funds for the previous, current and next fiscal years is displayed at Appendix VII.

DATA PROCESSING

The Department of Military Affairs, like many other agencies, utilizes electronic data processing to aid in the accomplishment of its mission. The HRS Data Center serves State oriented requirements of this Department through a data center sub-unit located in the State Arsenal. The 1979 Legislature authorized the replacement of outdated unit record equipment by a small computer during fiscal year 1979-1980.

The Data Processing Center Activity of the United States Property and Fiscal Officer for Florida is the servicing facility for all Federal programs required by the Florida Army National Guard. These programs consist of accounting functions for Federal activities of logistics, financial accounting, military pay (JUMPS), and civilian technician payrolls. This Center also maintains data and prepares reports for Military Personnel Directorate; Plans, Operations and Training Directorate; Technician Personnel Office; Recruiting and Retention Office; Equal Employment Officer and the Maintenance Directorate.

The present computer tape system is being considered for replacement by new mini-computers. This conversion would bring the National Guard up-to-date in computer hardware. This system would be disk oriented and enable this Center to service activities of the Florida Army National Guard with programs that are more responsive to their need and provide Commanders with timely and concise information for improved control and utilization of Federal funds and equipment.

ADMINISTRATION

Administrative and staff services were provided to the Headquarters and the units of the Florida National Guard. These services included public affairs, records administration, mail management, distribution of Department of the Army publications, reproductions, awards and trophies, communications and security files.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

The Department's Archives and Records Administration Program insures uniform procedures governing maintenance and disposition of records and the preserving of historical documents. Permanent records are microfilmed to reduce storage space.

COMMUNICATIONS


This Headquarters maintains a reliable communication system using the following means:

SUNCOM. A dedicated State of Florida long distance telephone network for governmental agencies which provides a nationwide direct dialing capability.

Commercial Telephone. The solid state, highly versatile touch tone telephone system installed throughout the State Arsenal complex by Western Electric and Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company with its many automatic features has materially improved communications efficiency within the Headquarters. This system also has a radio telephone patch capability that expands this versatility Statewide. The equipment and installation costs were supported jointly by Federal and State funds and will result in a 30% savings on monthly recurring costs.

Defense Communications Automatic Voice Switching Network (AUTOVON). A military worldwide general purpose dialing system providing the capability of immediate communication with other military installations.

Interim Remote Terminal (IRT) Telecommunications Link. A telecommunications center linked directly to an Automated Multi-Media Exchange (AMME). The AMME connects into the Automatic Digital Network (AUTODIN) which provides the Department of Military Affairs with the capability to transmit and receive narrative and card traffic from worldwide subscribers.

Landline Teletype. A teletype network providing the capability to transmit and receive written messages.

National Weather Service Teletype. A teletype network providing the capability to receive written messages on all weather conditions (Severe, Hurricane Advisories) and local weather conditions throughout the State of Florida.

National Warning System (NAWAS). A voice circuit emanating from North American Air Defense Command (NORAD), Colorado Springs, Colorado, the objective of which is to establish, operate and maintain an effective nationwide warning system to alert governments and the public to the threat of extraordinary dangers. This system can also be used within the State for emergency operations and consists of over one hundred (100) extensions including the Governor's Office, Division of Disaster Preparedness, local civil preparedness agencies, police, sheriffs, and weather stations.

Command State Emergency Radio Net (COMSERN). A Florida National Guard radio net providing radio communication with Florida National Guard Task Force Headquarters strategically located throughout the State.

Commercial FM. A commercial FM (line-of-sight) system consisting of two (2) base stations and ten (10) handi-talkie radios. This system is used during emergencies for direct communications between the Adjutant General and key staff officers assigned as liaison to civil authorities and/or coordinating National Guard assistance throughout the emergency area.

Mobile Communication Center. The Headquarters has tailored a military expansible van into a mobile communication center to provide communications into disaster stricken and remote areas. Power for operation is supplied by two (2) gasoline generators mounted on a trailer. The center is equipped to operate on:

Single Sideband (SSB) – 2 to 15 MHz Amplitude Modulation (AM) – 2 to 15 MHz Frequency Modulation (FM) – 30 to 75.95 MHz Air to Ground (AM) – 220 to 399.9 MHz Florida Highway Patrol Net

Florida Highway Patrol Radio Network. The Department also has the capability of entering the Florida Highway Patrol Radio Net with a base station located in St. Augustine.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The "Florida Guardsman" magazine, a four-page monthly insert in "The National Guardsman," is utilized to maintain a high level of morale and to promote esprit de corps. This magazine is subscribed to by Florida National Guardsmen.

An illustrated narrative briefing of the Florida National Guard continues to be an excellent method of furthering the understanding of civil authorities, civic organizations and other groups throughout the State, of the organization, responsibilities and mission of the Department of Military Affairs.

The history of the State Arsenal and the Military Reservation dates back to the 16th century when it was the site of a Franciscan Monastery. In order to preserve and record this unique history a museum and archives is maintained. The museum is aptly located in the former monastery cells and endeavors to tell the story of the Florida National Guard and the militia from territorial days to the present. Historical documents and artifact contributed by Guardsmen, former Guardsmen and citizens have resulted in a collection of many historical items that would have otherwise become lost to posterity.


COMMUNITY SERVICES

The role the National Guard plays to the State and Nation during times of disaster and emergencies, both natural and man made and the service rendered by the Guardsmen to the citizens during these devasting occurrences are well known, little, however is said of community orientated activities of a non-military nature performed by the Guard. The armory facilities of the Florida National Guard are available for community functions and are extensively utilized by other governmental agencies; State, County and City. It is through this type of governmental cooperation that full utilization of facilities is accomplished. The armories' facilities; classrooms, drill hall, indoor rifle ranges and parking area, etc., provide excellent accommodations for conducting various activities. The armories are also available to civic and fraternal organizations for their activities. In addition a ninety-acre (90) tract at Camp Blanding, "Camp Neyati", has been made available to the Gateway Girl Scout Council, Incorporated, for camping and other activities of youth groups.



The Florida Service Medal was established by General Orders No. 10, 1929 and is awarded to members of the Florida National Guard who have served the Florida National Guard honorably, loyally and faithfully for a period of twenty or more years in an active status. The medal will normally be awarded upon retirement as a token of gratitude and as an expression of appreciation for faithful and self-sacrificing service to the Florida National Guard, State and Nation.

Armed Forces Reserve Medal, authorized by Department of the Army, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who honorably and satisfactorily complete ten years service as a member of one or more of the Reserve Components of the Armed Forces of the United States. A ten-year device is authorized for each additional ten-year period.

Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, established by Department of the Army General Orders No. 30, 29 June 1971. This medal is awarded for four years of honest and faithful service in a troop program unit of the Army National Guard.

Air Reserve Forces Meritorious Service Ribbon, authorized by Department of the Air Force, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to enlisted personnel of the Florida Air National Guard under the provisions of AFM 900-3. This medal is awarded for four years of exemplary behavior, efficiency and fidelity.

AWARDS

The Active State Service Ribbon—Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard who participate in a major tour of active state service in the aid of civil authorities.

UNIT CITATION

The Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation—The Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation was established by Permanent Orders 53-1, 1977, and will be awarded by the Adjutant General to all officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel that are members of the unit adjudged the winner of the Governor's Trophy. Once awarded the unit citation, it may be worn by individuals upon reassignment to other units of the Florida National Guard. The Governor's Trophy-Awarded annually through the Adjutant General, State of Florida, to the most outstanding organization of the Florida Army National Guard. The following designated Florida Army National Guard unit was presented the Governor's Trophy for Calendar Year 1979.

144th Transportation Company

The Adjutant General's Trophy—Awarded annually to the most outstanding federally recognized organization in the Florida Army National Guard for efficiency in administration, supply and maintenance. The following designated Florida Army National Guard unit was presented the Adjutant General's Trophy for Calendar Year 1979.

Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 146th Signal Battalion

The Remington Trophy—Presented to the Florida National Guard by the citizens of Ilion, New York, commemorating the making of the first Remington rifle. Awarded annually to the organization of the Florida National Guard whose team obtains the highest figure of merit during the National Rifle Association Indoor Rifle Tournament. The following designated Florida Army National Guard unit was presented the Remington Trophy for Calendar Year 1979.

The Lowry Award—Presented to the Florida National Guard by Lieutenant General Sumter L. Lowry to be awarded annually to a junior officer of the Florida National Guard, who, as a citizen soldier, best exemplifies the qualities of Patriotism, Americanism and Leadership. The E. J. McMullen Trophy—Presented to the Florida National Guard by Major General Edmund J. RIFLE AND PISTOL MARKSMANSHIP MATCHES

All National Guard Team

A limited number of National Guard rifle and pistol competitors representing the best shooters from all states are annually selected by National Guard Marksmanship Training Unit to compete in matches not normally supported at the State Team level. Selection for participation on this U. S. National Guard Shooting Team is an honor comparable to attaining All-American status in other sports.

The All Guard Team represents the National Guard at such competition as National Championship Matches, International Olympic Tryouts, and Interservice Matches, as well as numerous other matches at regional level.

The Florida National Guard was afforded the honor of having SFC Sidney M. Mills, HHD, FLARNG and SP4 Barbara C. Keller, HHC, 50th S&S Bn, selected as members of the All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Team for 1980 which participated in these matches.

All Army and All Air Force and Regional Matches

All Army and All Air Force Regional Rifle (7.62mm and 5.56mm) and Pistol Matches (Cal .22, Cal .38 and Cal .45) are conducted by the Departments of the Army and Air Force, and fiscal support of State National Guard Teams is not provided. Regional and All National Guard Teams are selected from the states and territories, however, based on marksmanship ability achieved in Army Area and State level

matches which are supported for competition at this level by the National Guard Bureau.

The Florida National Guard was afforded the distinct honor during 1980 of having five individual marksmen selected for participation at this level of competition. They were MSGT Stanley F. Ferreira, 125th Resource Management Squadron, FlaANG, an Air Force pistol competitor; SFC Sidney M. Mills, HHD, FLARNG, St. Augustine, an Army rifle competitor; SSG Wallace A. Christie, 153rd Engineer Co, Lake City, an Army rifle competitor; SSG Johnnie S. Croft, 153d Engineer Co, Lake City, an Army rifle competitor, and SP4 Barbara C. Keller, HHC, 50th S&S Bn, N. Miami, a smallbore rifle competitor. The National Guard teams participating at this level of competition were awarded a major portion of all individual and team awards in competition.

All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Matches

All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Matches are conducted annually by the National Guard Bureau to promote marksmanship and provide a significant year-end goal of high level competition among the states. The first such match was conducted at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas in September, 1973, and are held in honor of Major General Winston P. Wilson who accomplished so much for the marksmanship program of the National Guard during his tenure as Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

Florida National Guard Rifle, Pistol, and Light Machine Gun Teams participated in these matches in 1979. SFC James A. Livingston, Support Co, 2/124th Inf, Eustis, distinguished himself and the Florida National Guard Team by placing third, Expert Class, in the Center Fire Pistol Championship Match. SFC Sidney M. Mills, HHD, FLARNG, St. Augustine, in addition to being designated among the "Chief's Fifty" (top 50 NG rifle and pistol competitors nationwide), won first place, Master Class in both the 200 yard offhand and 600 yard prone rifle matches. TSGT Henson and SSGT Holmes, 125th FIGp, FlaANG, Jacksonville, distinguished themselves and the Florida National Guard by being awarded the Excellent in Competition (LEG) Medal toward a Distinguished Pistolman's Badge in the pistol competition. Our Composite Pistol Team placed twelfth in the nation. The Composite Rifle Team, twentieth in the nation, the Combat Pistol Team, thirty-fourth in the nation, and the Light Machine Gun Team, twentieth overall nationwide.

Army Area (FORSCOM Commanders) Matches

First U.S. Army Rifle (7.62mm and 5.56mm) and Pistol Cal .32, Cal .38 and Cal .45) Championship Matches conducted by Commanding General, First U.S. Army, were held at Fort Meade, Maryland in April 1980. Participation in this competition is limited to those teams placing in the upper fifty percent nationally during competition during that marksmanship year.

The Florida National Guard was represented in the composite phase of both the rifle and pistol competition at these matches in 1980. MSGT Stanley F. Ferreira, Resource Management Squadron, FlaANG, Jacksonville, distinguished himself and the Florida National Guard during pistol competition by placing second in the Grand Aggregate Overall Match; first overall in the .45 caliber Service Pistol Aggregate Matches; first, open class in the Center Fire Aggregate Matches; and third, open class in the .22 caliber Aggregate Matches. Rifle competitors distinguishing themselves and the Florida National Guard were: SFC Sidney M. Mills, HHD, FLARNG, St. Augustine, who placed second, open class in the Grand Aggregate Matches; second, open class in the Slow Fire Aggregate Matches, and third, open class in the 200 yard Slow Fire Aggregate Matches. SSG Johnnie S. Croft, 153d Engineer Company, Lake City, placed second, open class in the 300 yard Rapid Fire Aggregate Matches and second, open class in the Rapid Fire Aggregate Matches.

State Marksmanship Matches

The Taliaferro Trophy Match (5.56mm, M-16) is conducted each year at Camp Blanding, Florida, under authority of the Adjutant General. The Taliaferro Trophy was presented to the Militia of Florida in 1903 by the Honorable James B. Taliaferro, then United States Senator from Florida. It is awarded

annually for unit rifle marksmanship competition. Winners of competition for 1979 were:

The Individual Rifle Championship Trophy (5.56mm, M-16) is fired concurrently with the Taliaferro Trophy Match. White, then Assistant Adjutant General in 1959, is awarded to the individual achieving the highest record score during the Individual Rifle Championship Match. Winners for 1979 were:

Thord-Gray Trophy was presented to the Florida National Guard in 1930 by Major General I. Thord-Gray, retired British Army Officer, and was awarded for unit team marksmanship (carbine) competition until 1965. The trophy has been placed in pistol team competition as a result of the removal of the carbine from military inventory in 1966. Winners for 1979 are as follows:

Lance, is presented annually to the individual achieving the highest record score in pistol match competition. Winners for 1979 are as follows:

National Rifle Association Indoor Rifle Tournament

The National Rifle Association Indoor Rifle Tournament is conducted annually under sponsorship of the Adjutant General per authority of Chief, National Guard Bureau. The tournament is conducted in two phases. Phase I is Postal/Shoulder Matches between teams of each of the three leagues. League winners fire a Shoulder Match to determine the State Champion. The composition of a unit team consists of two unit Guardspersons and two junior members under 18 years of age. Guard membership is not a requirement for a junior member. Results for fiscal year 1980 are as follows:

SERVICE RECORDS

The Department has custody of available records of the soldiers of Florida. These records include Muster Rolls of the Indian Wars of 1835, Muster Rolls of the Florida Militia and Florida National Guard since 1835, and Rolls of the Florida troops mustered into the Confederate Forces and Union Forces in the War Between the States (Civil War), the Spanish American War, the Mexican Border Incident, World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, and the Berlin Crises. A card record is maintained for each individual who entered World War I from the State of Florida, whether by enlistment, induction through Selective Service, or induction with the Florida National Guard. In addition, an individual file folder, containing copies of all pertinent orders and personnel documents, has been retained for each individual who has been a member of the Florida National Guard (Army and Air). The individual folders for current members are separated from the folders of former members and are maintained current at all times.

A project to convert all files on former members to microfiche was begun in August of 1979. The project will be accomplished by a civilian contractor in 4 phases. Phases I and II were completed in March of 1980. It is anticipated that phases III and IV will be completed not later than mid fiscal year 1982. This project, when completed, will have eliminated a critical records storage problem in the vault storage area and will also insure positive record security in as much as a duplicate roll of film has been forwarded for storage in the State Archives in Tallahassee, FL.

Request for Statements of Service and information generally fall into two broad categories. The majority of requests in the first category are for documentary evidence to establish eligibility for some type of benefit such as Federal or State military retirement benefits; birth date and/or active Federal service for Social Security benefits; increased military longevity pay for former service; burial in a National Cemetery or government furnished grave marker; or hospitalization or other financial benefits through the Veterans Administration. The second category pertains to requests in the interest of genealogy or history and, for the most part, are applicable to records prior to 1900. The number of Statements of Service furnished during the period of this report was 347 of which 70 were for advanced certification of completion of 20 years of active service which would entitle the individual to Federal retired pay for military service upon attaining age 60. This requirement was instituted to eliminate errors and misinformation which previously would not appear until individual reached age 60 at which time he would discover that some of his service did not meet this criteria and it was too late to perform additional service to meet the requirements for Federal retired pay.

MILITARY SUPPORT TO CIVIL AUTHORITY

General

The Adjutant General has both State and Federal responsibilities in providing support to civil authorities. The State responsibility involves providing troops (National Guard) to assist civil authorities

in major emergencies when authorized by the Governor. On the Federal side the Adjutant General is responsible for the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force and their reserve components) to support civil defense (civil authority) within the State of Florida in event of a nuclear attack against this nation.

Planning and Coordination

The responsibility for planning, coordination and conduct of operations in support of civil authorities is centered in the Directorate of Plans, Operations and Training. Liaison is maintained with law enforcement agencies and the Bureau of Disaster Preparedness within the State and with Federal agencies and military commands as appropriate. National Guard troop units are organized into task forces to provide a rapid response to locations within a specific area in proximity to the units' home stations. Liaison is maintained with civil authorities in their area of responsibility by these task forces.

Operations

The Department of Military Affairs goes into an increased readiness status immediately upon threat of civil disturbance, natural disaster, or similar emergency that may require use of National Guard troops. Measures taken include a telephone alert of key personnel, contact with local authorities and appropriate State agencies, and review of capabilities of troop units in the emergency area. As the situation develops to a more serious threat additional actions are taken to man the EOC (Emergency Operations Center), dispatch liaison officers to area, alert troop units and send additional equipment and communications as deemed necessary.

Active State Duty

Under the provisions of Chapter 250, Florida Statutes, troops of the Florida National Guard were called to Active State Duty to assist civil authorities during fiscal year 1980 as follows:

22 - 27 August 1979 - Search Mission - Jasper, FL

The Sheriff of Hamilton County - Jasper requested assistance from the Florida National Guard in locating a weapon used by an individual while committing rape. Four (4) enlisted personnel were on duty for two (2) days to assist local authorities in the search.

1 - 4 September 1979 - Hurricane David - East Coast

The entire eastern coast of Florida from the Florida Keys on the south to Jacksonville on the north was whipped by a hurricane of major proportion with winds reaching 100 MPH at several points. Three hundred nine (309) officers and enlisted personnel were on duty for four (4) days to assist civil authorities in the preservation of life and property of Florida's citizens.

12 - 21 September 1979 - Hurricane Frederic - West Florida

The panhandle area of Florida from Apalachicola to the Florida-Alabama line was thrashed by Hurricane Frederic. Two hundred eleven (211) officers and enlisted personnel assisted civil authorities in the preservation of life and property.

25 - 27 September 1979 - Flooding - St. Johns County

Heavy rains in and around St. Johns County - St. Augustine caused contamination of the local water supply. Five (5) enlisted personnel assisted local authorities in restoring water retaining bulkheads around the reservoir.

27 September - 1 October 1979 - Flooding - Hillsborough County

Heavy rains caused severe flooding throughout Hillsborough County. Thirty-one (31) officers and enlisted personnel assisted local authorities in evacuating residents from low areas and along river's edge.

4 - 8 October 1979 - Water Supply Emergency - Pasco and Hernando Counties

The Withlacoochee River exceeded its flood stage in Hernando County and heavy rains drenched Pasco County causing local water supplies to become contaminated. Seven (7) officers and enlisted personnel assisted civil authorities in evacuating residents and by providing potable water to the stricken area.

13 - 23 April 1980 - Haitian Refugee Support - Homestead, FL

The arrival of several boatloads of Haitian refugees in the south Florida area created a situation that required using the National Guard Armory to temporarily house and process the refugees. Twenty-four (24) officers and enlisted personnel assisted the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization by providing the facility and personnel to feed, transport and process these individuals.

27 April - 12 May 1980 - Cuban Refugee Support - South Florida


A flotilla of thousands upon thousands of Cuban Nationalists, fleeing Castro oppression in Cuba, arrived in Key West causing mass confusion and overtaxed the capabilities of local authorities. One thousand four hundred fourteen (1,414) officers and enlisted personnel assisted civil authorities in providing traffic control, transportation of refugees, assistance in processing and feeding.

17 - 27 May 1980 - Civil Disturbance - Miami, FL

Civil unrest erupted in the Liberty City area of Miami. Sniping, firebombing and looting were widespread. Nineteen (19) individuals were killed. Three thousand nine hundred seventy-nine (3,979) officers and enlisted personnel assisted civil authorities to reestablish law and order in the troubled area.

NOTE: As a point of interest, the Florida National Guard has during the period 1 January through 30 June 1980 performed 43,336 mandays of Active State Duty. This is the highest number of mandays of duty ever performed by any State during a six-month period.

Other

Several times during the year assistance was provided in a non-pay status to assist small communities and institutions. These consisted primarily of loaning and moving equipment such as water trailers to needed locations until normal services could be restored.

FLORIDA NATIONAL GUARD MILITARY ACADEMY (FNGMA)

On 1 September 1975 the Florida National Guard Officer Candidate School was reorganized and redesignated as Florida National Guard Military Academy and assigned the mission of conducting both an Officer Candidate School and Noncommissioned Officer School.

The Academy is operated by a twenty-five person section consisting of nine officers and sixteen enlisted personnel. During the Annual Training period, the section is augmented with additional instructor and support personnel, to a desired strength of forty officers/warrant officers and one hundred twenty enlisted personnel. The Academy is accredited by the Department of the Army and is evaluated yearly by representatives of the Commanding General, First United States Army, to determine manner of performance. The Academy has received very high ratings on each evaluation and is considered one of the best in the nation.

Officer Candidate School


The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School was originally established in March 1961 by the Adjutant General of Florida. The mission of the school is to provide effective instruction for Officer Candidates that will qualify them in the military educational requirements for appointment as second lieutenants, and to develop maximum leadership and command ability in the candidates.

Class No. 19 completed their twelve months of training and were graduated and commissioned 10 May 1980.

Class No. 20 will begin their training on 13 July 1980 in a Phase I fifteen (15) day Annual Training period. They will continue into twelve (12) weekend training assemblies during the fall, winter and spring (Phase II), an additional fifteen (15) day Annual Training period in July 1981 (Phase III) and a minimum four-week branch resident qualification course (Phase IV). Class No. 20 will graduate and be commissioned at completion of Phase III and attend Phase IV in an officer status within twelve months of commissioning. The program consists of a minimum of 576 hours.

The Programs of Instruction taught are developed and monitored by the United States Army Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, in coordination with Chief, National Guard Bureau, and closely parallels the resident Infantry Officer Candidate School. All examinations are graded by the Infantry School. Methods of leadership development include rigid discipline, high standards of deportment and conduct, and exacting manner of performance, frequent and effective counseling, and continuous observation, correction and evaluation. The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School is the primary source of junior officer procurement for the Florida Army National Guard. At present 50% of all company grade officers in the Florida Army National Guard are graduates of the school. In recent years personnel of the United States Army Reserve have been admitted to the school, and upon graduation, are appointed second lieutenants in that component. Numbers of candidates attending the Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School, and graduates by year, are as shown below:

Noncommissioned Officer School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Noncommissioned Officer School was established 1 September 1975. The mission of the school is to develop leadership and professional military skills in selected personnel in grades E-4 through E-9 to qualify them as noncommissioned officers.

Three programs of instruction for noncommissioned officers are conducted - Basic Course for grades E-4 and E-5, consisting of 113 hours; Advanced Course for grades E-6 and E-7, consisting of 66 hours; and a Senior Course for grades E-8 and E-9, consisting of 56 hours. Through 30 June 1980, six classes had been conducted with graduates as shown below:

Conversion to full-time manning is a new program. Individuals are placed on two-year tours of full-time training duty to perform duties in technician position descriptions. This program is being evaluated to determine if it should replace the technician program.

The losses of two minority technicians and three female technicians are reflected during the fiscal year in the ARNG. In the ANG, the number of minority technicians declined by four, and a loss of two female technicians was recorded. Overall, the total number of technicians declined by thirty in the ARNG and by twenty-nine in the ANG.

A loss of two minority employees and a gain of three women was recorded during the period. Total employees increased by seven over the preceding period.

Minorities and women in the military, technician, and state employee programs are for the most part in lower level positions. Emphasis in the military programs is on upward mobility for qualified personnel and increasing the number of minority officers in both the Army and Air National Guard. Some improvement has been made in the number of minority officers in the Army and Air National Guard. EEO program emphasis continues to be in the area of recruitment of minorities for full-time positions, whether as technicians or as full-time military members.

Ten of the twenty-two personnel occupying EO or SL duty positions have received formal training in their assigned duties. No changes were made to ARNG EO sections as authorized by MTOE/MTDA. A total of five EO sections are authorized throughout the state. The ANG is authorized one Social Actions section.

Twenty-three EEO Counselors are appointed and trained. All but one counselor has received training in advanced counseling techniques. Counseling activity was nil during the period, and no EEO complaints were received.

ARMY NATIONAL GUARD

The Florida Army National Guard entered fiscal year 1980 with an authorized strength of 9,015 personnel. During the fiscal year the authorized strength has increased to a current authorization of 9,134 personnel as a result of several minor reorganizations.

The strength at the beginning of fiscal year 1980 was 9,116 and Florida was at 101.1% of authorized strength. As of 30 June 1980, Florida's strength was at 9,306 for 101.8% of fill, ranking nationally number 4 of all states in percentage of assigned strength compared to authorized strength.

Source of officer procurement consisted of one third furnished through the State OCS program and the remaining two thirds from officers returning from active duty, transfers from out of state National Guard, reserve units and ROTC graduates.

RESERVE OFFICER PERSONNEL ACT (ROPA) 1954

The Reserve Officer Personnel Act (ROPA) continues to prescribe policy, guidance, and procedures for consideration, selection, and promotion of Army National Guard commissioned officers not otherwise selected for unit vacancy promotion within their respective state.

During the fiscal year 1980 period, 83 officers were considered for mandatory promotion by the respective Department of Army Selection Board with 52 being selected. This represents an overall selection rate of 65%. The statistical analysis of selection by grade is as follows:

A majority of the officers selected by the board for mandatory promotion elect to decline their promotion for the authorized period as sufficient position vacancies are not available for immediate promotion. Further, some officers must accept discharge from the Florida National Guard with concurrent transfer to the non-unit USAR for mandatory promotion for the same reason.

FLORIDA ARMY NATIONAL GUARD OFFICER SELECTION BOARDS

State Selection Boards were established in Florida in 1963 as a positive method of implementing a career development program for officer personnel. The Boards convene as necessary to fill Major, Lieutenant Colonel, Colonel, and certain General Officer position vacancies. It is also charged with the responsibility of recommending to the Adjutant General, reassignments of battalion commanders, changes in field grade staff assignments, and acceptance of declination of ROPA promotions to Colonels.

The Senior Officer Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General and the two General Officer Commanders, met two times during fiscal year 1980 recommending promotion of 1 Colonel to Brigadier, 5 Lieutenant Colonels to Colonel, reassignment of 3 Colonels, reassignment of 11 Lieutenant Colonels and acceptance of 4 declinations of promotion to Colonel under ROPA provisions.

The Field Grade Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General, General Officer Commanders, and Group Commanders met three times during this period, recommending to the Adjutant General promotion of 11 Majors to Lieutenant Colonel, 10 Captains to Major, and reassignment of 39 Field Grade officers.

SELECTIVE RETENTION

A Selective Retention Program was implemented by the National Guard on 1 July 1969. NGR 635-102 prescribes the procedures and policies for conduct of the Selective Retention Board. The Selective Retention Board, conducted during the first half of each calendar year considers officers and warrant officers with 20 or more qualifying years of service for retired pay. Originally, the Regulation required individuals to be considered every year following completion of the 20 qualifying years of service. However, beginning with the Board in 1974, the Regulation was changed to provide that the Board would be convened annually but individuals would be considered every other year instead of every year unless the Board recommended annual consideration for a specific officer. This substantially reduced the number of individuals reviewed by the Board each year. Factors considered by the Board include demonstrated performance, physical fitness, civilian and military education, previous assignments, and potential for future staff and command assignments.

Since inception of the Selective Retention Board in July 1969, eleven Boards have been held. Results of these boards since 1974 are as follows:

ENLISTED QUALITATIVE RETENTION BOARD

The Enlisted Qualitative Retention Board as implemented by AR 135-205 convenes during the period October-December each year. The records of all enlisted personnel who have 20 qualifying years of service, without regard to Expiration of Term of Service or grade are reviewed every two years, except when the convening authority determines that an annual review is necessary.

The Board, composed of 3 Field Grade Officers and 2 Command Sergeant Majors, recommend to the Adjutant General, those individuals who have future potential benefits to the Army National Guard based on demonstrated performance as attested to by Efficiency Reports, a review of all Military Personnel Records, Medical Records, and physical fitness.

Since inception of the Qualitative Retention Board in June of 1974, six Boards have been held with the following results:

An Appeal procedure was provided for by the Regulation beginning with the 1976 Board. Of the 25 not recommended for retention by the 1979 Board, 21 appealed with 17 being sustained by the Adjutant General and 4 denied by the National Guard Bureau.

ARMY NATIONAL GUARD TRAINING

Training of the Florida Army National Guard is based on criteria prescribed by the Department of the Army, in coordination with the National Guard Bureau. The Commanding General, First United States Army is charged with the responsibility of coordination, support and supervision of prescribed training. Standards for training are established by Department of the Army and unit performance is evaluated on a continual basis by active Army personnel. There are three phases of training:

Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training for development of basic skills and


techniques, culminating in the assignment of Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) to individuals commensurate with the type of training received and which denotes qualification to perform the duties of a particular job assignment.



4.2 Mortar firing is Conducted at Camp Blanding, Florida, During Annual and Weekend Training Periods.

Unit Training is conducted by units of the Florida Army National Guard. This training is designed to produce units qualified to perform assigned missions prescribed in applicable organizational authorization documents and to maintain the level of readiness required to support operational or contingency missions. Unit training consists of the following: Formal unit training which prepares a unit to perform its mission as stated in applicable organizational authorization documents. Various levels of formal unit training are culminated by the administration of an Army Training Evaluation as soon after completion of the levels as possible. Formal unit training consists of training of skilled individuals designed to develop squads, crews, sections, detachments, platoons, or companies capable of successfully accomplishing the unit mission, conducted in a progressive manner, culminating at the level prescribed by the appropriate unit Army Training and Evaluation Program (ARTEP). Upon completion of the various levels of training, proficiency tests are administered to evaluate individual and unit performance. Upon successful completion of all levels of training, the unit should have demonstrated satisfactory standards of performance and be fully capable of undertaking combat operations.

Field exercises are conducted in the field under simulated combat conditions (in which personnel and equipment of one force are actually present, while those of the opposing force may be real or imaginary). Field exercises are training vehicles that may be squad through brigade in size. They are mission oriented and designed to prepare participating units for identifiable missions. Field exercises are conducted, as appropriate, during all levels of unit training.

The objective of Army National Guard training is to attain the highest levels of individual and unit proficiency that are achievable in a premobilization status. Individuals in the National Guard receive the training necessary to teach them basic military skills and the special skills required to perform effectively the duties of their assigned positions. Operational readiness is the primary requirement of the individual and units of the National Guard. Units and individuals must be ready to mobilize and undertake accomplishment of the mission specified by the TOE/TDA. The minimum standard for Army National Guard units is the attainment and maintenance of company or comparable level proficiency. This is defined as completion of the appropriate unit training program and proficiency verified by successful completion of an applicable Army Training Evaluation, with 85 percent or more of unit members participating. During Training Year 79-80 all units having assigned Army Training Evaluations accomplished same in a most satisfactory manner; resulting in Active Army Evaluators evaluating the units as being in a training readiness condition equal to most Active Army Units.

INITIAL ACTIVE DUTY FOR TRAINING PROGRAM

The Reserve Enlisted Program of 1963 (REP-63) (Requirement for Initial Active Duty Training for non-prior service personnel) continued during the period of the report.

The Split Training Option, which was initiated in June 1978, on a pilot program basis, and has continued through the period of this report. As of 30 June 1980, one hundred four enlisted members are undergoing phase 2 of the program. An additional one hundred thirty-five were enlisted for and are participating in phase 1 of the program. This is a total of 239 individuals as of 30 June 1980.

The nationwide time-sharing computer service, using a national telecommunications network with

remote terminals capable of simultaneously accessing a common data bank containing the annual training base continues to be utilized in securing a training space for non-prior service individuals.

Sufficient quotas have been obtained from Department of the Army to preclude any backlog from occurring during the year. Except for unusual circumstances, non-prior service enlistees enter their initial active duty for training within 30 to 180 days after enlistment.

A total of 1,212 trainees entered initial active duty for training during this period with 931 completing their training and returning to their National Guard unit.

SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Army National Guard Schools Program provides the main vehicle for the branch and technical training of Officer and Enlisted Personnel of the Florida Army National Guard, whereby they are afforded the opportunity to qualify themselves to fill their unit MTOE/MTDA assignments and receive advanced training in critical Military Occupational Specialties. It is through the media of the Schools Program, which is supported by Federal funds, that Officer and Enlisted Personnel complete their training in their chosen fields and are able to maintain proficiency in the areas of Combat Arms, Technical and Administrative fields.

During the fiscal year, Officers and Enlisted Personnel participated in the Schools Program as outlined below:

ENLISTED EVALUATION SYSTEM

The state of the s

During the period of this report, the Skill Qualification Testing (SQT) was implemented. No units have taken the test for record as of this date and presently, none are scheduled until December of 1980.

The Senior Enlisted Evaluation Report (SEER) continues to be utilized in lieu of current test scores for reassignment, transfer, and promotion of enlisted personnel in grades E5 and above.

RETENTION AND RECRUITING

During fiscal year 1980 the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 190 personnel. During the period 2,590 new enlistments were produced, of which 48% were non-prior service and 52% were prior service personnel.

Florida's retention rate was 70% for this period which is above the national average, however, the losses for other reasons than ETS was responsible for 75% of Florida's total losses. Improvement in this area will receive priority in the coming year.

Florida made a small gain in strength of black personnel and women. At the end of fiscal year 1980 there were 2,417 black personnel on board, which is 26% of the total assigned strength. Women on board was at 435, 30 June 1980.

As of 30 June 1980, Florida reflects a strength of 9,306 assigned personnel for a 101.8% fill rate and ranks number 4 of all states nationally in percentage of assigned strength compared with authorized strength.

Florida's Full Time Recruiter Force was responsible for 80% of the 2,590 new enlistments during the year. This recruiting force continues to grow numerically and in total production.

Retention and Recruiting must be given command emphasis at every level in the coming year in order for Florida to maintain 100% fill.

FEDERAL FUNDS AND EQUIPMENT

The United States Property and Fiscal Officer (USPFO) for Florida is charged with the responsibility as pertains to comptroller matters, purchasing and contracting, transportation, supply and logistics, and maintenance of Federal property. He is assisted by a technician work force to maintain these accountable records. The USPFO mission is to assist, with the necessary administrative and logistical support, those units of the Florida Army and Air National Guard when they are mobilized for Federal active duty.

The Florida Army National Guard continues to be better equipped than in previous years. This is due primarily to the receipt of more modern equipment and the additional funding being made available to the State of Florida by the Federal Government.

The National Guard now fills a major role in future national crises. This policy by the Secretary of Defense insures that additional equipment, more modernized equipment and additional funds will be made available to the National Guard for the support of this increased national defense role. In keeping with this policy the Federal Government has furnished the following new items of major equipment during the period 1 July 1979 through 30 June 1980.

There were 504 full-time Federal employees paid from Federal funds as of 30 June 1980. Federal funds, during the period 1 July 1979 through 30 June 1980, expended in direct support of the Florida Army National Guard, totaled \$32,410,804.71. At the close of 30 June 1980, the value of Army equipment on hand in the State totaled \$119,342,914.95. This is an increase of 22 million dollars from 1979 (Appendix VIII, breakout of expenditures of Federal funds).

INTER-SERVICE AGREEMENT

All Active and Reserve Forces, which include the National Guard, currently operate under a policy whereby one service may support another on a reimbursable basis. This policy reduces duplication of effort, gives a faster response to requirements and effects an overall savings to the Federal Government and ultimately to the taxpayer. The Florida National Guard receives supplies and services from the active installations throughout the State of Florida, and we are thereby able to support our troops in a better

manner at a cost savings to the Government. Conversely, the Florida National Guard supports the active and other reserve forces by furnishing supplies and services on a reimbursable basis.

MAINTENANCE OF FEDERAL PROPERTY (SURFACE)

The program providing technical guidance and expected quality standards for maintenance of Federal Property (Surface), assigned to Florida Army National Guard units, is published in Florida National Guard Circular 750-1, Maintenance of Supplies and Equipment - Maintenance Support Plan. The program is administered under the supervision of the State Maintenance Officer through fourteen Organizational Maintenance Shops (OMS), one Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS), and one Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES).

Responsibility for maintenance is assigned at the lowest echelon possible. Unit organizational maintenance capabilities are utilized to the maximum and are augmented by the fourteen Organizational Maintenance Shops. Support maintenance, that echelon of maintenance requiring a higher level of expertise, tools and test equipment than found at organizational maintenance, is accomplished by two Direct Support Maintenance Companies during Inactive Duty and Annual Training. These companies are augmented by the Combined Support Maintenance Shop and the Mobilization and Training Equipment Site. The fourteen Organizational Maintenance Shops, Combined Support Maintenance Shop and Mobilization and Training Equipment Site are staffed with 181 highly skilled National Guard Technicians who comprise the full time maintenance staff.

During the past year, selected organizational and support maintenance technicians have received specialized training in the repair of TOW and DRAGON Missile Systems. Other personnel have received highly technical training in the field of COMSEC (Communications Security) repair. The Combined Support Maintenance Shop now has a complete COMSEC repair facility, one of the first in the Army National Guard.


Over 26,000 separate pieces of Federal equipment are maintained by the Florida Army National Guard Maintenance Division. The primary goal of the Maintenance Division is to provide quality repair of Federal equipment to ensure all units have required equipment to accomplish their assigned mission, both State and Federal.

ARMY AVIATION

Mission: Federal or State. To provide units organized, equipped, and trained to function efficiently at existing strength in the protection of life and property and the preservation of peace, order, and public safety under competent orders of Federal or State authorities. Federal: To provide trained units and qualified individuals available for active duty in time of war or national emergency in support of the Army's war plans and at such other times as the national security may require augmentation of the Active Forces.

The Army Aviation Support Facility Command (AASFC) located at Craig Airport, Jacksonville, Florida, is responsible to the Adjutant General for the supervision of assigned aviation units training, individual aviator/crewmember training, administration and logistics. In order to accomplish the desired level of training and proficiency, the AASFC employs 65 technicians in various positions within the command structure. Three of these individuals are employed under the Conversion to Full Time Manning (CFTM) program.

Florida elements were reorganized in September 1978 and continue under the initial reorganization with three major aviation elements and the addition of an Air Traffic Control Platoon in March 1979. Presently assigned aviation units: Aviation Section, 53d Infantry Brigade (SEP); Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion (Combat Support); Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion (Attack Helicopter); and the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon (Forward).

Aviation assets presently assigned the Army Aviation Support Facility, Craig Field, Jacksonville are: 29 UH-1H's, 16 UH-1M's, 20 OH-58's, 1 TH-1G, and 1 U-8F. Florida expects to receive the latest in attack helicopters, the AH-1S, to replace the 15 non-deployable UH-1M's in the very near future.

Operations and Training


The operations and training section of the AASFC is presently staffed by six Flight Instructors, two

Flight Engineers, and two Flight Operations Specialists. One Flight Instructor also serves as an Aviation Safety Officer. They are responsible for scheduling and conducting all phases of aviator individual training and for coordinating and scheduling all aviation mission support required by ground elements throughout the state.

With the implementation of the Aircrew Training Manuals in October 1978, all reserve component aviators are required to meet the same training requirements and performance standards as Active Army personnel. These requirements are accomplished during the year at weekend Multiple Unit Training Assemblies (MUTA's), Additional Flight Training Periods (AFTP's), Annual Training (AT), and during the training year in the 2B24 Synthetic Flight Training Simulator (SFTS) located at Hunter Army Airfield, Savannah, Georgia.

Formal courses of instruction (National Guard Bureau approved Unit Schools) are conducted during the fiscal year at the AASFC which provide for aircraft refresher/qualification training, instrument flight qualification, and Nap-of-the-Earth (NOE) qualification for assigned aviators. During the training year 13 aviators received refresher/qualification training, 7 aviators received instrument flight qualification, and 2 aviators were qualified in NOE/Terrain Flight.

In May 1980, Ft. Stewart/Hunter AAF conducted a three-week school on the new equipment being received by units stationed at Hunter AAF. With the assistance of a NETT (New Equipment Training Team) from Ft. Rucker, Alabama, training was conducted for the AH-1S (modernized) Cobra. Coordination was made with the Army units at Hunter AAF allowing members of Co D, 26th Avn Bn, Florida Army National Guard to attend this training. Six maintenance technicians and two aviators received qualification training on this new equipment. The course consisted of the TOW missile system, Doppler navigation, integrated fire control computer, mission systems, heads up display and maintainability. This advance training will be of tremendous value when the AH-1S TOW Cobra's are received.

Annual Training for all aviation units was conducted at Camp Blanding during periods 29 March-12 April 1980 and 26 April - 10 May 1980 under a simulated high threat environment. A high state of unit readiness was achieved, as reflected by ratings received from Active Army Evaluator teams, during these periods. Also, during these two 15-day periods, individual training was conducted and resulted in 8 refresher/qualifications in various aircraft, 3 initial instrument flight qualifications, 29 M-23 door gun qualification (considered a post mobilization objective for Reserve Components), 10 aerial/scout observers qualified, and 18 qualifications in the various attack helicopter gunnery subsystems. Army Aviation also supported three additional Annual Training periods during the year: 227th Field Artillery Brigade conducted at Fort Stewart, GA, Alternate Command Headquarters and 1/265th ADA Bn conducted at Camp Blanding, Florida.

Florida Army National Guard Aviation also supported the State mission during the fiscal year by providing aviation support in the West Palm Beach area in September for Hurricane David, in the Pensacola area in September for Hurricane Frederic, in the Tampa area in October due to flooding, in the West Palm Beach area in November when a dam broke and caused flooding, in the Key West - Miami area in April and May during the Cuban refugee movement and again in the Miami area in May during the riots.

A high state of operational readiness is maintained throughout the Aviation units by skilled crew-members and support personnel. Total combined aviator flying hours is 245,060, averaging 2,402 hours per aviator; total combined combat flying hours is 61,521, averaging 603 hours.

Mission ready aircraft were available and utilized to accomplish the 1980 fiscal year flying hour program as follows: UH-1: 6,659 hours; OH-58: 1,881 hours; U-8: 300 hours; total: 8,840 hours.

Community Relations and Civil Assistance

Army Aviation units regularly participate in community programs, and the AASFC continues to provide an excellent attraction for local school groups on educational field trips. In January this year, Army Aviation started providing Emergency Medical Evacuation capability to local hospitals for the emergency transport of neonatal patients from outlying hospitals to Jacksonville. To date, the AASFC has accomplished 15 medical evacuation missions. These and other humanitarian efforts are published throughout the community and have resulted in improved public relations and awareness of the Florida Army National Guard.

Maintenance

The Army Aviation Maintenance Shop is tasked with providing aviation unit maintenance (AVUM) for the 67 aircraft assigned to aviation units, and aviation intermediate maintenance (AVIM) to the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon, Florida Army National Guard.

Federally funded technicians and two full time training duty personnel are presently employed in direct support of the maintenance program on a daily basis. Through the efforts of these highly skilled individuals, Florida enjoys an average operational readiness rate for aircraft in the 80 percentile range.

Six technicians attended a maintenance course at Hunter AAF, GA, to qualify them to work on the AH-1S Attack Helicopter, the Army's most modern gunship. These individuals will act as trainers to instruct others on the new equipment. One avionics technician attended a course in Colorado on the maintenance of the AH-1 stability control system.

A definite improvement in the aircraft repair parts posture has been achieved by a renovation to a system involving direct support between the USPFO and the AAMS. This improvement in Class IX support has reduced the Not Mission Capable Supply (NMCS) rate well below the national average.

AIR NATIONAL GUARD

The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard, located at the State Arsenal, St. Augustine, Florida, and an Air Defense Group, located at the ANG installation on Jacksonville International Airport, Jacksonville, Florida. The Air National Guard of Florida has a complement of 97 officers and 860 airmen, which is a manning level of 103% and one of the highest levels nationwide. The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group has seven subordinate units: 125th Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, 125th Combat Support Squadron, 125th Resource Management Squadron, 159th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, 125th Civil Engineering Flight, 125th Security Police Flight, and 125th USAF Clinic.

The Group is equipped with F-106A and F-106B Fighter Interceptor aircraft. The F-106A is manned by a single aircrew, the pilot. The F-106B is a two-seat, trainer model. The unit also possesses T-33 aircraft, a two-seat trainer, and a C-131 Transport.

DECORATIONS

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group was awarded the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award, and the Organizational Flag was decorated with the Streamer by the Commander, 20th Air Division during award ceremonies in late 1979.

Six members were awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal.

AWARDS

The 125th Security Police Flight was selected as the outstanding Air National Guard Security Police Unit for fiscal year 1979, and was also runner-up for the outstanding Air Reserve Forces Security Police Unit.

One of our Security Policemen, SMSgt Douglas E. Jolley, was selected as the outstanding Air Reserve Forces Security Police Senior Non-commissioned Officer.

INSPECTIONS AND DEPLOYMENTS


A Nuclear Surety Inspection of the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group was conducted from 31 January through 5 February 1980, by the ADTAC Inspector General. The overall rating for the Group was Excellent.

During the period 5-19 January 1980, elements of the Group deployed to Tyndall Air Force Base, Panama City, Florida, for Combat Pike. Combat Pike is an annual deployment for qualification of aircraft and aircrews with live weapons. During the deployment 63 sorties were flown with no accidents or incidents.

OPERATIONS

The Operations Dispatch Center (ODC) maintains command and control of the federal mission with NORAD and the Tactical Air Command, Air Defense on a 24-hour basis. The ODC implements all imputs from higher headquarters in a timely manner and is also a back-up Command Post for State Headquarters in time of state and national emergencies.

A total of eighteen (18) locally supported Exercises were flown in support of the active forces. These monthly exercises continue to place "Real Time" commitments and expertise to the mission in a very timely and realistic manner. A total of two thousand, six hundred fifty-seven F-106 sorties and four thousand, six hundred ninety-five F-106 flying hours were utilized in 1980. A total of five hundred fifty T-33 flying hours and three hundred fifteen C-131 hours were also completed.

The annual firing deployment to Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, was completed in a safe and task enrichment manner. All F-106 aircraft flown to Tyndall qualified by firing successfully the required armament. All scheduled sorties were flown without any major or minor problems.

Verification of 20th Air Division's radar and radio equipment is completed each week by completion of the weekly PACE flight. A monthly No-notice exercise is scheduled resulting in the scrambling of our two 5-minute Alert aircraft.

Real world scrambles continue to be a part of our Alert Program. The scramble reaction is not part of an exercise or part of a system check. It is an ordered scramble because of an actual unknown intruder and must be properly identified by one of our fighter pilots.

The Operations Section is directly involved in every exercise the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group participates in. This was true during the Nuclear Surety Inspection, the Management Effectiveness Inspection, and the No-notice Alert Force Capability Inspection. In each inspection report, a rating of Excellent was achieved by the Operations Section.

MAINTENANCE

During this fiscal year an average of 186 men and women were employed by the Florida Air National Guard in support of Aircraft Maintenance. Continuing budget limitations, manpower reductions, and higher operating costs have not diminished our ability to provide combat ready aircraft for our Alert commitment and daily training missions. By staggering annual training we are able to augment the Technician Force and allow Guardsmen the one-to-one training which enables them to maintain a state of high proficiency.

The information listed below is for the aircraft possessed by the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group. The allocated sorties and hours are for fiscal year 1980 (October 1979 thru September 1980). Due to submission requirements only the hours and sorties flown from October 1979 thru June 1980 are shown.

We have been in the F-106 business for six years now. During this time we have transformed our aircraft into some of the finest in the inventory. It is not uncommon to receive favorable remarks about our aircraft when they travel to other bases. This is only possible through a vigilant inspection program, dedicated maintenance personnel, and an effective quality control program.

RESOURCES MANAGEMENT

Federal Funds and Equipment

The Assistant USP&FO for Air Property, during this reporting period, continued to provide effective support for all 125th Fighter Interceptor Group units. The average warehouse inventory managed by Base Supply was 10471 line items valued at \$1,715,593.00. Through computer accounting, Supply recorded an average of 19,712 transactions per month. Equipment in use by all organizations of the Group is valued at \$9,112,334.06. With this amount of supplies and equipment, Supply has consistently maintained an inventory accuracy of 98% for the year.

Approximately \$19,025.14 was paid to local transportation companies for the movement of material from Jacksonville to various points in the United States. Service agreements and local contracts with other activities in the Jacksonville area resulted in services to the Florida Air National Guard valued at \$246,877.00. These Federal funds paid to Florida business concerns represent an industry of considerable value to the State of Florida.

DATA PROCESSING

During the past year the Data Processing Section has continued to improve their capability to support the needs of all Functional users. New Terminal Equipment (Cathode Ray Tube) has been provided for use by the Accounting and Finance Section and the Civil Engineering Section, replacing outmoded equipment previously in use. Preliminary work has begun to upgrade the equipment used by the Consolidated Base Personnel Office in the near future.

Improved programs have been provided to account for mandays utilized. These programs provided improved reports on a more timely basis and with a large savings in manhours expended to produce them.

Planning and preliminary work continue toward selection of the Phase IV computer to replace the U1050 and B3500 computer presently in use. Announcement of selection of the final two bidders is expected in the near future.

MEDICAL SERVICES

The 125th USAF Clinic continued to provide services in its two primary areas of operation, physical examinations and limited medical and dental care. In the process of providing these services the following workload was accomplished: Patient visits - 1,284; Lab procedures - 2,232; Physical exams - 478; Dental visits -403; Electrocardiograms - 188; X-Rays - 174; Immunizations - 481; Aircraft Crash/Rescue Alerts - 25.

The unit was deployed to MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, during March, where 8 officers and 17 airmen performed a very successful tour of annual training.

ADMINISTRATION

Management of the administration functions in areas of Documentation Management, Publishing, and Central Base Distribution have continued relatively stable; however, in the area of Publications the recent change of command has generated a complete review of both the losing and gaining command publications and forms. Each office has been tasked to thoroughly review their requirements, reducing those of the losing command and initiating requirements/requisitions for those of the new gaining command. Much activity is expected in this area in the coming year. Metered mail costs for the period has dropped to \$5,797.35, a 21% decrease. Costs continue to be borne by Headquarters, United States Air Force. The decrease is attributed to the initiation of United Parcel Service (UPS), for cartons and bulk mailings. In the area of Documentation, each office of record has been surveyed toward thorough identification and management of all items of record. Central Base Distribution has been updated through modification of the mail facility. This functional area received valuable guidance through a Staff Assistance Visit from the 20th Air Division. Individual training of assigned members continued to receive emphasis.

PERSONNEL

The Florida Air National Guard once again was a national leader in maintaining strength levels. Our Group closing strength for the reporting period was 104%. Our Lead/Production Recruiter, MSgt Sidney L. Blanton, received several national awards for his recruiting efforts, among which was the Air National Guard Meritorious Service Award and the Air National Guard "Gold" Recruiters Badge which was received only by five ANG recruiters throughout the nation.

Reorganizations/Realignments continued throughout the reporting period beginning as early as 1 July 1979, with the activation of the 125th Resource Management Squadron. This action moved all Supply and Comptroller functions from the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group to the newly activated unit. This reorganization was followed by a reorganization of the 125th Civil Engineer Flight and a realignment of the Command and Control function from the 159th Fighter Interceptor Squadron to the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group, both effective 1 January 1980. The reorganization of the 125th Civil Engineer Flight increased the authorized strength from 92 to 115, all increases being in the fire operations area. Through extensive recruiting efforts the fire operations area was 100% manned within 6 months after the increased authorization was effective.

The Air National Guard Enlisted Incentive Program (Enlistment/Reenlistment bonus) implemented in February 1979 was again funded for fiscal year 1980, but limited funding made it an "on again" "off again" program throughout the year.

At the close of the period, the Florida Air National Guard had an authorization of 107 officers and 818 airmen and an assigned strength of 97 officers and 860 airmen.

TRAINING

Florida Air Guardsmen are still taking advantage of the opportunity to attend the various technical, special and professional military education courses offered by the Air Force and National Guard Bureau. However, due to a shortage of funds, spaces were not as plentiful as in previous years. Even with this funding problem, Florida Guardsmen attended the following courses: Flying Training Courses - 6; Technical Courses - 77; Academy of Military Science - 2; Noncommissioned Officers Academy (long course 5½ weeks) - 1; Noncommissioned Officers Academy Course II - 2; Noncommissioned Officers Academy Course II - 4; ANG Leadership Course II - 5; ANG Leadership Course II - 2.

Unit Training during this year has been highly successful. The main emphasis in Unit Training is in the area of On-The-Job Training (OJT). An average of 200 airmen were at some level of OJT throughout the year. One hundred seventy-three trainees were upgraded in their skill level through OJT, which is at the 8% Air National Guard desired standard for training programs.

Annual Training for this fiscal year was conducted on the year-round basis at home station for the majority of the unit's personnel. Exceptions to this program were:

- a. Civil Engineering PRIME BEEF Team deployed to Eglin Air Force Base, Florida.
- b. A number of aircrew and support personnel deployed to Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, for COMBAT PIKE exercise for testing of the weapons system.
- c. Most members of the 125th USAF Clinic performed annual training at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida, while a small number completed theirs at Moody Air Force Base, Georgia.
- d. Members of the Fire Protection Section of the 125th Civil Engineering Flight deployed to Field Training Site, Gulfport, Mississippi.

Participation in the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) has increased dramatically in the past year. This was brought about by the publicity given to the college and also to the fact that CCAF is to be given final accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (COC) during 1980. To date, four Florida Air Guardsmen have completed their Associate in Applied Science degree requirements. Several others are within 3 to 12 semester hours of completing their requirements. A total of sixty-eight enlisted Guardsmen are currently pursuing degrees through CCAF.

VEHICLE OPERATIONS AND MAINTENANCE

The Vehicle Maintenance Section performs both scheduled and unscheduled maintenance on 72 vehicle assets. The vehicle out of commission (VOC) rate of 3.6% is well below the Air Force Standard of 10%. The total registered fleet costs averaged \$8,344.44 per month, with an average extended parts cost per month of \$2,896.11. Vehicle Operations administered 135 vehicle operator tests with a passing rate of 90%. No reportable vehicle accident has occurred during this period. The Vehicle Analysis Section accomplished an input of over 4,000 individual vehicle transactions with a minimum key-punch error rate that was very good. Six individual vehicle status charts are maintained to aid the Vehicle Maintenance Supervisor in effectively managing the assigned vehicle fleet.

AUDIO/VISUAL SERVICES

The Audio/Visual Service's mission is to support base activities through training, documentation, and public relations.

Audio/Visual Services has a total of 112 pieces of equipment assigned. The Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) System is currently equipped with four video tape recorders, five studio monitors, an audio/video switching panel, and a special effects generator that works in conjunction with two studio cameras. A Sony portable mini-camera has helped broaden our capabilities in the field.

One hundred ninety-two programs have been transmitted this year, 25 of which were local studio productions.

Transmission is accomplished via 75 base wide television cable drops.

The Photo Lab processed more than 700 black and white prints, developed over 100 rolls of black and white film, and filled 71 requests for projection equipment and distributed over 80 Air Force Films. All equipment is maintained by assigned personnel.

ADVISORS

ARMY

The mission of the office of the Senior Army Advisor is to provide advice and assistance to the units of the Florida Army National Guard in all aspects of mobilization, training, administration, supply and maintenance in order to assist the National Guard in accomplishing its mission. The Senior Army Advisor, Colonel Richard L. Tripp is the liaison officer between the Adjutant General and the Commander, U.S. Army Readiness and Mobilization Region IV, First U.S. Army.

The office of the Senior Army Advisor is located with Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs, St. Augustine. Four additional advisory detachments are collocated with the following major headquarters: 53rd Infantry Brigade (Separate) in Tampa; 53rd Signal Group in Tallahassee; 227th Field Artillery Brigade in Miami; and the Army Aviation Support Facility Command in Jacksonville. The authorized strength of the office of the Senior Army Advisor, including the advisor detachments, is six officers, five noncommissioned officers and one civilian. Technical assistance and training support are provided by the U.S. Army Readiness Group at Patrick Air Force Base. Readiness Group Patrick supports both Army National Guard and Army Reserve units in Florida and is staffed with 29 officers, one warrant officer, 25 enlisted men and 11 civilians.

AIR

The mission of the Air Force Advisory personnel is to advise and assist the Air National Guard in achieving and maintaining the highest possible state of combat readiness. The advisory staff manning normally consists of one Lieutenant Colonel and one Staff Sergeant. During aircraft conversion the manning is increased for a one or two year period to 26 officers and airmen.

The Senior Air Force Advisor, Lieutenant Colonel John A. Glover, is the liaison officer between the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Commander and the 20th NORAD/ADCOM Region Director of Operations, Ft. Lee Air Force Station, Virginia.

The Aerospace Defense Command is the gaining command of the Florida Air National Guard.

The advisory staff is located at the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Headquarters, Jacksonville International Airport, Jacksonville, Florida.

NATIONAL GUARD OFFICERS ASSOCIATION OF FLORIDA


The National Guard Officers Association of Florida has been in existence since 1902. It consists of all officers and warrant officers of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. The organization is run on a democratic basis, with the officers elected by the membership. Committee meetings are held periodically during the year, and a general conference is convened annually at some location within the State. The annual conferences consist of business sessions during the day with the social functions in the evening.

The purposes of the Association are to promote and improve adequate national security; to provide a medium by which all officers of the Florida National Guard may become better acquainted; to establish a foundation for promoting esprit de corps in the Florida National Guard; to promulgate and support legislation in furtherance of the best interests of the Florida National Guard; and, to maintain an Association complementing and in harmony with the National Guard Association of the United States.

This Association has 100% membership of all active National Guard officers and warrant officers. Even though members attend the annual conferences at their own expense, attendance continues to average in excess of 50% at these conferences. The 78th Annual Conference was held at the Holiday Inn, Tampa International Airport, Cypress Street, Tampa, Florida, on 22-23 August 1980. The 79th Annual Conference will be held at the Holiday Inn, City Center, 315 North Julia Street, Jacksonville, Florida, on 27-28 March 1981.


