#### DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS

#### INTRODUCTION

The State of Florida Department of Military Affairs, is a State Agency, created by Chapter 250, Florida Statutes and composed of the military force provided for in the laws of the State of Florida. The Florida National Guard is provided for by Section 2, Article X of the Constitution and Chapter 250.08 of the Florida Statutes. The National Guard of the United States is provided for by Title 32, U.S. Code.

The Governor is Commander in Chief of the Florida National Guard. The Adjutant General is Chief of the Department of Military Affairs and Commanding General of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. There is an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Adjutant General for Air, and a directorate staff organization in the Headquarters, (Appendix I, Organization Chart).

The troop structure of the Florida National Guard is composed of the Florida Army National Guard and Florida Air National Guard. The Army National Guard consists of the State Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment with its attached support type units; an Infantry Brigade (Separate); and nondivisional units grouped under a Troop Command Headquarters, FLARNG, and an Army Aviation Support Facility, (Appendix III, Organization - Florida Army National Guard). The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters Florida Air National Guard; the 125th Fighter Group, (Appendix IV, Organization - Florida Air National Guard).

#### MISSION

As provided for under the provisions of the National Defense Act, units of the Florida National Guard, both Army and Air, have a dual mission.

- (1) A State mission, to provide military organizations trained and equipped to function when necessary in the protection of life and property, and in the preservation of peace, order and the public safety, as directed by competent State Authority; and,
  - (2) A Federal mission, as Reserve Components of the Army and Air Force of the United States,

to provide trained and qualified individuals available for Federal Service in time of war or national emergency, or at such other times as the national security may require augmentation of the United States Armed Forces.

The Florida Air National Guard, in addition to their State and Federal mission, has an air sovereignty mission for the eastern seaboard of the United States. Mission involves the maintenance of F-106 fighters and crew on a twenty-four hour alert status, armed and ready for immediate commitment to intercept unidentified aircraft in or approaching the airspace of the United States.

The State Adjutant General and his Headquarters has an additional Federal mission to direct and coordinate the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force) made available within the State, to support civil authorities engaged in providing for survival of people and continuity of government in a nuclear environment.

#### **SUMMARY**

A total of thirty-six Army National Guard units were reorganized. Twenty-four units were reorganized as a result of the Department of Army implementing minor changes to equipment and personnel. Twelve units were reorganized as a result of the Total Army Analysis (TAA); review of the

twelve units effected by the TAA, nine were consolidated and redesignated, two were organized and one was relocated. A detailed discussion of these actions may be found in the paragraph titled ORGANIZATION.

Annual Training of Army National Guard units was successfully conducted at Camp Shelby, Mississippi; Forts Gordon and Stewart, Georgia; Fort Drum, New York; Fort Bliss, Texas; Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland; Fort Carson, Colorado; and Fort Lee, Virginia, in addition to Camp Blanding, Florida. All units, evaluated during Annual Training, met the training requirements and standards prescribed by FORSCOM and First U.S. Army.

During fiscal year 1982, the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 505 personnel. As of 30 June 1982, Florida's strength of 10,047 assigned personnel reflects a fill of 96.3%, ranking Florida number 18 of all states in percentage of assigned strength as compared to authorized strength. During the coming year it is expected that Florida will grow both in additional authorized units and assigned personnel.

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group continues to maintain its high level of combat readiness. This statement has been documented several times during the past year by USAF Inspection Teams. The Group is presently maintaining a personnel strength level of 103%.

#### ORGANIZATION

The force structure of the Florida Army National Guard had twelve major changes and twenty-four minor changes.

The major changes included the organization of HHD, 202nd Medical Group, Daytona Beach and the 711 Maintenance Company, Crystal River. The Command and Control Headquarters, St. Augustine was relocated and redesignated the Troop Command Headquarters, Jacksonville. The following were consolidated and redesignated: Co C (-), 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Co C, 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry; Co C (P), 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry to 710th Service Company; Support Company (-), 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Support Company, 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry; Support Company (P), 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Detachment 1, Co B, 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry; Company B (P), 3rd Battalion, 124th Infantry to 708th Maintenance Company; 144th Transportation Company (-) to 144th Transportation Company; 144th Transportation Company B, 111th Signal Battalion; Company C (-), 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Company C, 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry

Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard continued to conduct staff assistance visits and exercise evaluations as primary activities.

#### EMPLOYEES

There are 1,177 individuals, civilian and military, employed by or assigned to the Department of Military Affairs. These employees work either directly with the Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs or with National Guard units in the field, supporting approximately 10,000 Florida National Guard personnel. (Appendix II, Employee Allocation, Department of Military Affairs). There are 158 Career Service personnel of the State of Florida, employed under the State Personnel rules and regulations, 1,019 Federal technicians, authorized for employment under the rules and regulations of the U.S. Civil Service Commission by Public Law 90486, and 11 active duty personnel assigned as Army and Air Force Advisors to the Florida National Guard. These employees are specialists in the field of administration, finance, accounting, supply and maintenance. With the exception of a limited number of employees, personnel are required to be military members of the various organizations and units to which assigned. (Fiscal Data, Appendices VII and VIII).

#### ARMORY BOARD, STATE OF FLORIDA

The Armory Board, State of Florida, established as provided by Section 250.40, Florida Statutes, and comprised of the Governor, the Adjutant General, the State Quartermaster, the General Officers of the Line, Group Commanders, and the Senior Air Commander of the active Florida National Guard, pro-

vides general supervision and control of real properties utilized by the Florida National Guard. The Armory Board is responsible for and controls forest management, mineral removal, game and fish propagation programs and the maintenance and improvement of the former Federal lands at Camp Blanding, with the approval of the U.S. Government. (A detail of the organization of the Armory Board is shown in Appendix V).

The National Guard, as a joint effort of Federal, State and local Governments, has taken its place as a major component in the defense of our National, State and local communities through this mutual support. The Armory Board reemphasized its policy, during the year, that National Guard armories be utilized by the citizenry of the community, to the fullest extent possible, where such use is not to the detriment of public interest and does not interfere with the primary use of armories for the housing and training of military units stationed therein. The Armory Board cooperated with other armed services, State agencies and organizations by providing facilities at Camp Blanding for use in training, rifle marksmanship, and instruction.

#### **FACILITIES**

#### State Arsenal

The State Arsenal is one of the older and more historic buildings in St. Augustine. It houses Headquarters for the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard. This four hundred year old facility was formerly the site of a Franciscan Monastery constructed in 1588. It was converted to a military barracks by the British in 1763; from 1783 to 1821 it was a Spanish garrison; and from 1821 to 1900, it served as a U.S. Army Post. In 1907, the Headquarters of the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard was established here. Normal repairs and maintenance are performed in such a manner as to preserve the historic features of the facilities, insofar as is feasible.

When the main building was gutted by fire in December 1915, the original walls were unharmed and the building lay in dismal ruin until 1921, when Congress passed an act donating St. Francis Barracks, to the State of Florida for military purposes. The State Legislature appropriated funds to restore the building, modeling it after the lines of the former structure. For four centuries, St. Francis Barracks (State Arsenal) has been a religious and military outpost.

#### Armories/Construction

There are fifty-two (52) National Guard armory installations, strategically located throughout the State, from Pensacola on the west, to Jacksonville on the northeast, to Fort Myers and Homestead on the south. (Locations and valuations are reflected in Appendix VI).

600-Person Armed Forces Reserve Center and Organizational Maintenance Shop/Combined Support Maintenance Shop - West Palm Beach: Construction of this facility was completed on 23 June 1982. This facility will house the two West Palm Beach National Guard units, along with two U.S. Army Reserve units. This two story facility contains 60,000 SF and the OMS/CSMS will contain 5,700 SF. Total cost of the project is \$3,098,502.85.

300-Person Armory and Post Headquarters Building - Camp Blanding: Design of this facility has been completed. It is anticipated that construction will begin during Calendar Year 1982. This facility will house seven (7) units and detachments, along with the Post Headquarters operation, will include 35,441 SF and is estimated to cost \$1,320,000. It is planned that this armory will provide an excellent facility for annual training conferences, officer's calls, post theatre and related functions during the year.

150-Person Armory - Ocala: This project is approximately 50% designed. This facility will be designed to house two (2) National Guard units and will consist of approximately 22,000 SF and is estimated to cost approximately \$1,400,000. This facility is scheduled for construction in Fiscal Year 1984 with possible advancement to Fiscal Year 1983.

Citrus County Armory - Crystal River: For the first time in twenty years, a new Armory and unit was organized at Crystal River, Florida. This site consists of three mobile homes with construction to begin in August 1982 on a 2,600 SF concrete masonry unit storage building. These facilities, which will provide

adequate temporary housing until an armory can be programmed for the future, are being constructed by Citrus County.

#### Non-Armory Construction

Army Aviation Support Facility Expansion - Jacksonville: Design of this project is 100% complete with construction anticipated to begin around November 1982. Design of this project included doubling the size of the existing hangar, a new operations building, aircraft fuel storage/dispensing facility, additional runways and aircraft parking aprons. Cost of this project is estimated at \$2,200,000 with 100% Federal funding support.

United States Property and Fiscal Office - St. Augustine: Construction of this facility should begin during September 1982 with anticipated completion around June 1983. This new facility will be located near the Arsenal Complex in St. Augustine. It will consist of approximately 12,406 SF and cost approximately \$584,000 with 95% Federal funding support.

In addition to the above major projects, fencing, paving, repair and renovation projects were accomplished at numerous armories and non-armory facilities throughout the State. These projects included additional vaults at both Panama City and Pensacola Armories; fencing a compound at Avon Park Bombing Range; expanding the fenced in area at Miami Armory; installation of chain link fence at Citrus County Armory Site; resurfacing roads at Camp Blanding; the complete replacement of the Lakeland Armory roof which included renovation of the interior to correct water damage and the installation of a new roof on the Sanford Armory which also included renovation of the interior caused by water damage as the result of a tornado.

The Florida Air National Guard Base, located at the Jacksonville International Airport, is the home of the Florida Air National Guard. The 158-acre complex consists of 27 buildings containing 326,235 square feet of floor space and over 132,000 square yards of pavement for a gross asset value of more than 6 million dollars. This past year State Funds amounting to approximately \$123,000.00 and Federal Funds amounting to approximately \$2,755,500.00 were expended for the operation, maintenance, repair, and new construction at this installation. The major portion of the funds were used for completion of the Hush House, construction of a Spill Prevention Control and Containment Project, and utilities.

This complex consists of buildings which can easily be expanded. A current project, an addition to the Dining Hall, will take advantage of this ease of expansion. An entire 110 foot section of exterior wall will be moved west thirty feet during expansion of the facility.

The base also has an independent emergency water supply, vehicle parking area, a 78,201 square foot aircraft maintenance hangar, a base operations building, consolidated maintenance facility, a 260-person (soon to be expanded) dining hall and medical clinic. The facilities were designed to incorporate functional management for nearly any mission.

#### Ranges

National Guard Firing Ranges at Camp Blanding and Avon Park were continued in use during the year. These ranges were used, not only by the Florida National Guard, but also by the regular and reserve forces. Considerable improvements were accomplished on the ranges at Camp Blanding.

#### **CAMP BLANDING**

#### General

The Armory Board maintains the Florida National Guard's 70,380 acre campsite located in Clay County. Included in this area are 40,000 acres, representing former Federal lands, deeded to the Armory Board by the Federal Government through Public Law 493, with stipulations that all the lands be maintained as a military reservation and that a Forest Management Program be conducted. The Armory Board realizes revenue from the forestry program and, also, from mineral removal occurring on these former Federal lands, all of which is utilized to defray operating expenses.

#### Utilization


The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is utilized extensively by units of the Florida National Guard in all phases of training, to include weekend Multiple Unit Training Assemblies (MUTA) and Annual Training (AT). During the fiscal year, the facilities were utilized some 46,004 man-days for Army National Guard MUTA's with an additional 942 being devoted to conduct of small arms competitive matches, sponsored by the National Guard and by Camp Blanding Rifle and Pistol Clubs. Man-days totaling 40,323 were devoted to AT exercises for elements of the Army National Guard of Florida, with an additional 53,842 man-days devoted to AT by elements of other states' National Guard. Another 426 man-days were devoted to Federal Government organizations, while 2,756 man-days were devoted to State and local agencies.

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is noted for its fine facilities and training areas conducive to the conduct of command post exercises, logistical exercises, specialized training and training conferences, as well as for its recently renovated and modernized firing ranges, which include 7.62MM, .30 and .45 Caliber small arms ranges, machine gun, rocket launcher, recoilless rifle, 81MM and 4.2" mortar ranges, subcaliber tank ranges, a Tow/Dragon tracking range, an aviation air assault range, a demolitions and explosives range, and an antiaircraft artillery range. There are now 12 platoon and company size live fire ranges for infantry training. Artillery ranges with 34 gun positions and 8 observation posts (OPs) are now being constructed with a scheduled completion target date of March 1983. Camp Blanding is the home of the Florida National Guard Military Academy, consisting of the Officer Candidate School, the basic source of newly commissioned second lieutenants required for filling junior officer vacancies and the Non-Commissioned Officer Academy which provides advanced leadership training for non-commissioned officers of the Florida Army National Guard. The camp is the home training site of the Special Forces elements of the Florida Army National Guard, with its fine jungle type training areas, drop zone and rappelling tower facility. Of utmost importance, is the Camp Blanding Army Airfield and its excellent service facilities, which are used extensively by Army Aviation units throughout the training year.

Warehouse storage facilities continue to be occupied by the Directorate of Supply and Services

(USPFO) for receipt, storage and issue of Federal property and supplies, which are utilized by the units of the Florida National Guard. The Florida National Guard Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS) continues to perform its important mission of maintenance of Federal equipment in support of units throughout the State. The Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES) facility, adjacent to the CSMS, maintains vehicles and weapons used by units in training at Camp Blanding. Equipment consists of self-propelled, tracked, twin 40MM guns, various types of engineer heavy equipment, infantry recoilless rifles, mortars and wheeled vehicles.

The regular establishment, Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps, as well as elements of their respective reserve forces, continue to utilize training areas and small arms ranges at Camp Blanding as part of their yearly programs. A total of 69,556 man-days were spent in training exercises by such elements during the year.

The U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Fleet Air, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, continues to maintain its leased portion of the Reservation which they and the Air Force utilize for the training of pilots, to include carrier based personnel, in air-to-ground bombing and strafing and for the operation of their Radar Scoring Station.

Fiscal year usage of this outstanding training facility totaled 216,592 man-days.

#### Game Management

The agreement between the Armory Board and the Department of Natural Resources, whereby portions of Camp Blanding are opened to controlled public hunting and fishing, remains in effect. Controlled burning and grain planting has been most favorable in the production of game. Lake samplings indicated that fish stocked in certain lakes have done well in most instances.

#### Forest Management

The Armory Board continues to conduct a Forest Management Program at Camp Blanding. During the year, normal road maintenance throughout the Reservation was accomplished and additionally, new roads, with drainage structures, were constructed. Harvesting and replanting of timber continues in a balanced program under the supervision of a professional forester.

#### Mining Operations

E. I. duPont deNemours and Company continues to mine in a restricted area on the western edge of Camp Blanding, Ilmenite being the principle mineral removed from the soil. DuPont, at their own expense, as an ecological project, has instituted a procedure whereby the topsoil is stripped and stockpiled, prior to the mining operation. After mining, this topsoil is redistributed, on the subsequent spoil area, thereby successfully stabilizing the spoil and improving the return of vegetation. Pine trees are now flourishing on this area.

#### Construction

Rehabilitation of Mess Halls - Camp Blanding: The rehabilitation of four (4) mess halls at Camp Blanding was completed in time for use during the major Annual Training 82 periods. This project cost approximately \$153,000 and was supported with 100% Federal funds. Improvements included new roofs, service counters, kitchen hoods, ceilings, ventilation, improved lighting, removal of the wood window flaps with installation of windows and screens.

Rehabilitation of Overhead Electrical Distribution System - Camp Blanding: This project was designed and construction completed during this fiscal year. It consisted of upgrading the electrical distribution system at Camp Blanding by increasing the voltage from 2400 volts to 13,200 volts by replacing lines, poles, crossarms, transformers, and other electrical equipment where necessary. This project cost approximately \$328,000 and was supported with 100% Federal funds.

World Wide Military Command and Control System (WWMCCS) Building: Located adjacent to the Post Headquarters Building, this facility, which was designed and constructed under the supervision of the Camp Blanding Post Engineer, is designed to house the WWMCCS System and Post Mobilization Officer. The primary purpose of this facility is to support routine and crisis command and control information processing. The construction of this facility, approximately 288 SF and costing \$10,000, was supported with 100% Federal funds.

#### STATE FUNDS

#### Appropriated Funds

Disbursement of General Revenue Funds are based on appropriations made by the Florida State Legislature and are reflected in Appendix VII.

#### Armory Board Trust Fund

This fund is utilized primarily as a revolving fund from which expenditures related to Intrusion Detection Systems supervision and inspections of Air National Guard Base security costs are reimbursed with Federal funds by the Army and Air Service Contracts.

#### Camp Blanding Management Trust Fund

This fund consists of revenues realized at Camp Blanding, principally from the sale of timber products and royalties received from the mining operation, and, by law, is expended exclusively for the operation and maintenance of Camp Blanding.

#### Community Funds

Florida law provides that counties and municipalities may provide financial or material support to the National Guard. A portion of the Military Code dealing with this subject is quoted below and Appendix X details that support received during fiscal year 1981-82.

250.40 Armory Board; Armories, How obtained -

\* \* \* \* \*

(6) In order to provide for the cooperative support of the National Guard, and that armories may be provided which will furnish suitable training facilities and adequate storage accommodations for all arms,

equipment and other military property, the armory board shall have authority to receive from counties, municipalities and other sources, donations of land and contributions of money to aid in providing, improving and maintaining an arsenal, armories, camp site, target ranges, and other facilities, throughout the State, and any property so donated, shall be held as other property for the use of the State and such counties and municipalities are hereby authorized and empowered to make such donations of lands by deed or long term leases and contributions of moneys for the purposes herein set forth, and to issue bonds or certificates of indebtedness to provide funds for such purposes; \* \* \* \* \*

#### Service Agreements

The Federal Government and the Armory Board have cost-sharing contracts for the maintenance and operation of the physical plant of certain facilities of the Florida National Guard. The Army Service Funding Agreement, which supports the Arsenal Annex, portions of Camp Blanding, the Army Aviation Maintenance Shop and thirteen Organizational Maintenance Shops, provides for a Federal share of 75% and Armory Board share of 25%. The Air Operation and Maintenance Agreement, which supports the Air National Guard Base at Jacksonville, provides for a Federal share of 80% and Armory Board share of 20%. The Air National Guard Security Agreement, annual training and weekend training activities of the Florida National Guard are 100% Federally funded.

#### Budgets

A recapitulation of budgeted State funds for the previous, current and next fiscal years is displayed at Appendix VII.

#### DATA PROCESSING

The Department of Military Affairs, like many other agencies, utilizes electronic data processing to aid in the accomplishment of its mission. During fiscal year 1981-82, the Legislature passed a bill authorizing the Adjutant General to pay Guardspersons called to State Active Duty from a special local account established by the Comptroller, eliminating transmittal of payrolls to Tallahassee for processing. This procedure will allow the Department of Military Affairs to pay individual troops called to State Active Duty promptly. The preparation and processing of SAD payrolls has been programmed on the Departments own System 34 Computer.

The Data Processing Division of the United States Property and Fiscal Officer for Florida is the servicing facility for all Federal programs required by the Florida Army National Guard. These programs consist of accounting functions for Federal activities of logistics, financial accounting, military pay (JUMPS), and civilian technician payrolls. This Division also maintains data and prepares reports for Military Personnel Directorate; Plans, Operations and Training Directorate; Support Personnel Management Office; Recruiting and Retention Office; Equal Employment Officer and the Maintenance Directorate.

The IBM 1401 Computer was replaced by a new Burroughs 1955 Data Processing System in February 1981. This new computer gave the Army National Guard up-to-date hardware with state-of-the-art systems with on-line interactive and batch support to all users. This system is disk oriented and enables this Division to service activities of the Florida Army National Guard with programs that are more responsive to their needs and provides Commanders with timely and concise information for improved control and utilization of Federal funds and equipment.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

Administrative and staff services were provided to the Headquarters and the units of the Florida National Guard. These services included public affairs, records administration, mail management, disbribution of Department of the Army publications, reproductions, awards and trophies, and communications.

#### RECORDS MANAGEMENT

The Department's Archives and Records Administration Program insures uniform procedures governing maintenance and disposition of records and the preserving of historical documents. Permanent

records are microfilmed to reduce storage space.

#### COMMUNICATIONS

This Headquarters maintains a reliable communication system using the following means:

SUNCOM. A dedicated State of Florida long distance telephone network for governmental agencies which provides a nationwide direct dialing capability.

Commercial Telephone. The solid state, highly versatile touch tone telephone system installed throughout the State Arsenal complex by Western Electric and Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company with its many automatic features has materially improved communications efficiency within the Headquarters. This system also has a radio telephone patch capability that expands this versatility Statewide. The equipment and installation costs were supported jointly by Federal and State funds and will result in a 30% savings on monthly recurring costs.

Defense Communications Automatic Voice Switching Network (AUTOVON). A military worldwide general purpose dialing system providing the capability of immediate communication with other military installations.

Interim Remote Terminal (IRT) Telecommunications Link. A telecommunications center linked directly to an Automated Multi-Media Exchange (AMME). The AMME connects into the Automatic Digital Network (AUTODIN) which provides the Department of Military Affairs with the capability to transmit and receive narrative and card traffic from world-wide subscribers.

Facsimile Communications. Facsimile is a telecommunications system for the transmission of fixed images with a view to their reception in recorded form; these images include typewritten and handwritten documents, fingerprint records, maps, charts, operation overlays, sketches, and photographs. Facsimile communications is provided for the Florida Army National Guard by a "Burroughs DEX 4100" located in the Telecommunications Center at the United States Property and Fiscal Office.

National Weather Service Teletype. A teletype network providing the capability to receive written messages on all weather conditions (Severe, Hurricane Advisories) and local weather conditions throughout the State of Florida.

National Warning System (NAWAS). A voice circuit emanating from North American Air Defense Command (NORAD), Colorado Springs, Colorado, the objective of which is to establish, operate and maintain an effective nationwide warning system to alert governments and the public to the threat of extraordinary dangers. This system can also be used within the State for emergency operations and consists of over one hundred (100) extensions including the Governor's Office, Division of Disaster Preparedness, local civil preparedness agencies, police, sheriffs, and weather stations.

Command State Emergency Radio Net (COMSERN). A Florida National Guard radio net providing radio communication with Florida National Guard Task Force Headquarters strategically located throughout the State.

Commercial FM. A commercial FM (line-of-sight) system consisting of two (2) base stations and ten (10) handi-talkie radios. This system is used during emergencies for direct communications between the Adjutant General and key staff officers assigned as liaison to civil authorities and/or coordinating National Guard assistance throughout the emergency area.

Mobile Communication Center. The Headquarters has tailored a military expansible van into a mobile communication center to provide communications into disaster stricken and remote areas. Power for operation is supplied by two (2) gasoline generators mounted on a trailer. The center is equipped to operate on:

Single Sideband (SSB) - 2 to 15 MHz Amplitude Modulation (AM) - 2 to 15 MHz Frequency Modulation (FM) - 30 to 75.95 MHz Air to Ground (AM) - 220 to 399.9 MHz


Florida Highway Patrol Radio Network. The Department also has the capability of entering the Florida Highway Patrol Radio Net with a base station located in St. Augustine.

#### **PUBLIC AFFAIRS**

An illustrated narrative briefing of the Florida National Guard is used throughout the State to further the understanding of civic organizations, civil authorities and other groups, of the organization, responsibilities and mission of the Department of Military Affairs.

Participation in and support of various community events provides an excellent method of displaying the various military equipment the Florida National Guard is equipped with. Participation ranges from "flyovers" by our Air National Guards F-106's to band concerts and parades by our own Florida Army National Guard Band.

The history of the State Arsenal and the Military Reservation dates back to the 16th century when it was the site of a Franciscan Monastery. In order to preserve and record this unique history a museum and archives is maintained. The museum is aptly located in the former monastery cells and endeavors to tell the story of the Florida National Guard and the militia from territorial days to the present. Historical documents and artifact contributed by Guardsmen, former Guardsmen and citizens have resulted in a collection of many historical items that would have otherwise become lost to posterity.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICES

The role the National Guard plays to the State and Nation during times of disaster and emergencies, both natural and man made and the service rendered by the Guardsmen to the citizens during these devasting occurrences are well known, little, however is said of community orientated activities of a non-military nature performed by the Guard. The armory facilities of the Florida National Guard are available for community functions and are extensively utilized by other governmental agencies; State, County and City. It is through this type of governmental cooperation that full utilization of facilities is accomplished. The armories' facilities; classrooms, drill hall, indoor rifle ranges and parking area, etc., provide excellent accommodations for conducting various activities. The armories are also available to civic and fraternal organizations for their activities. In addition a ninety-acre (90) tract at Camp Blanding, "Camp Neyati", has been made available to the Gateway Girl Scout Council, Incorporated, for camping and other activities of youth groups. The Florida National Guard units are receptive to the needs of the local scout troops, assisting with major equipment needs such as water trailers at large camp outs and annually hosting over 3,000 scouts at Camp Blanding at the North Florida Council Encampment.

The Florida Service Medal was established by General Orders No. 10, 1929 and is awarded to members of the Florida National Guard who have served the Florida National Guard honorably, loyally and faithfully for a period of twenty or more years in an active status. The medal will normally be awarded upon retirement as a token of gratitude and as an expression of appreciation for faithful and self-sacrificing service to the Florida National Guard, State and Nation.

Army Achievement Medal, authorized by Department of the Army and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard, under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, except general officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel, who while serving in any capacity in a noncombat area after 1 August 1981, distinguishes himself by meritorious service of achievement of a lesser degree than required for award of the Army Commendation Medal.

Armed Forces Reserve Medal, authorized by Department of the Army, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who honorably and satisfactorily complete ten years service as a member of one or more of the Reserve Components of the Armed Forces of the United States. A ten-year device is authorized for each additional ten-year period.

Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, established by Department of the Army General Orders No. 30, 29 June 1971. This medal is awarded for four years of honest and faithful service in a troop program unit of the Army National Guard.

NCO Professional Development Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. Awarded to all officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel for successful completion of a NCO professional development course.

Army Service Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. This ribbon is awarded to officer personnel upon successful completion of their resident basic/orientation course. Enlisted personnel will be awarded this ribbon upon successful completion of their initial MOS producing course, or upon honorable completion of four months active service, whichever is applicable.

Overseas Service Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. Awarded to active members of the Florida National Guard for successful completion of an overseas tour. The Overseas Service Ribbon will not be awarded for overseas service recognized with another service medal.

Air Reserve Forces Meritorious Service Ribbon, authorized by Department of the Air Force, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to enlisted personnel of the Florida Air National Guard under the provisions of AFM 900-3. This medal is awarded for four years of exemplary behavior, efficiency and fidelity.

#### **AWARDS**

The Active State Service Ribbon—Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard who participate in a major tour of active state service in the aid of civil authorities.

The Florida Service Ribbon-Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who complete five years of service in the Florida National Guard. A bronze cluster is authorized upon completion of each additional five-year period.

The Florida National Guard Recruiting Ribbon—The Florida National Guard Recruiting Ribbon was established by Permanent Orders 53-2, 1977, and may be awarded to officers, warrant officers, and enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard (Army and Air) who excel in the field of recruiting by securing five enlistments or appointments in the Florida National Guard.

The Meritorious Service Ribbon (formerly the Attendance Ribbon) was established by General Orders No. 1, 1973 and may be awarded to any member of the Florida National Guard who shall distinguish himself by meritorious achievement or meritorious service or to individuals not members of the Florida National Guard for meritorious service of benefit to the Florida National Guard.

#### UNIT CITATION

The Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation—The Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation was established by Permanent Orders 53-1, 1977, and will be awarded by the Adjutant General to all officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel that are members of the unit adjudged the winner of the Governor's Trophy. Once awarded the unit citation, it may be worn by individuals upon reassignment to other units of the Florida National Guard. Personnel becoming members of the unit after the date the unit is adjudged the winner of the Governor's Trophy are not authorized to wear the unit citation.

#### RIFLE AND PISTOL MARKSMANSHIP MATCHES

All National Guard Team

A limited number of National Guard rifle and pistol competitors representing the best shooters from all states are selected annually by the National Guard Marksmanship Training Unit to compete in matches not normally supported at the State Team level. Selection for participation on this U.S. National Guard Shooting Team is an honor comparable to attaining All American status in other shooting sports.

The All Guard Team represents the National Guard at such competition as National Championship Matches, International Olympic Tryouts, and Interservice Matches, as well as numerous other matches at regional level.

The Florida National Guard was afforded the honor of having SFC Sidney M. Mills, HHD FLARNG and MSGT Stanley F. Ferreira, 125th Resource Management Squad, selected as members of the All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Team for 1982, who participated in these matches. The National Guard teams participating at this level of competition were awarded a major portion of all individual and team awards in competition.

All Army and All Air Force and Regional Matches

All Army and All Air Force Regional Rifle (7.62mm and 5.56mm) and Pistol Matches (Cal .22, Cal .38 and Cal .45) are conducted by the Department of the Army and Air Force, and fiscal support of State National Guard Teams is not provided. Regional and All National Guard Teams are selected from the states and territories, however, based on marksmanship ability achieved in Army Area and State level matches which are supported for competition at this level by the National Guard Bureau.

The Florida National Guard was afforded the distinct honor during 1982 of having two individual marksman selected for participation at this level of competition. They were: MSGT Stanley F. Ferreira, 125th Resource Management Squadron, FLANG, an Air Force pistol competitor; and SFC Sidney M. Mills, HHD FLARNG, an Army rifle competitor. The National Guard teams participating at this level of competition were awarded a major portion of all individual and team awards in competition.

All National Guard Rifle, Pistol, and Machine Gun Matches

All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Matches are conducted annually by the National Guard Bureau to promote marksmanship and provide a significant year-end goal of high level competition among the states. The first such match was conducted at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas in September 1973. These matches are held in honor of Major General Winston P. Wilson who accomplished so much for the marksmanship program of the National Guard during his tenure as Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

Army Area (FORSCOM Commanders) Matches


First U.S. Army Rifle (7.62mm and 5.56mm), Pistol Cal .22, Cal .38 and Cal .45) and Light Machine Gun Championship Matches conducted by Commanding General, First U.S. Army were held at Fort Meade, Maryland, in April 1982. Participation in this competition is limited to those teams placing in the upper fifty percent nationally during competition during that marksmanship year.

The Florida National Guard was represented in the composite phase of pistol competition and machine gun competition at these matches in 1982.

State Marksmanship Matches

The Taliaferro Trophy Match (5.56mm, M-16) is conducted each year at Camp Blanding, Florida, under the authority of the Adjutant General. The Taliaferro Trophy was presented to the Militia of Florida in 1903 by the Honorable James B. Taliaferro, then United States Senator from Florida. National Rifle Association Indoor Rifle Tournament

The National Rifle Association Indoor Rifle Tournament is conducted annually under sponsorship of the Adjutant General per authority of Chief, National Guard Bureau. The tournament is conducted in two phases. Phase I is Postal/Shoulder Matches between teams of each of the three leagues. League winners fire a Shoulder Match to determine the State Champion. The composition of a unit team consists of two unit Guardspersons and two junior members under 18 years of age. Guard membership is not a requirement for a junior member. Results for fiscal year 1982 are as follows:

#### SERVICE RECORDS

The Department has custody of available records of the soldiers of Florida. These records include Muster Rolls of the Indian Wars of 1835, Muster Rolls of the Florida Militia and Florida National Guard since 1835, and Rolls of the Florida troops mustered into the Confederate Forces and Union Forces in the War Between the States (Civil War), the Spanish American War, the Mexican Border Incident, World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, and the Berlin Crises. A card record is maintained for each individual who entered World War I from the State of Florida, whether by enlistment, induction through Selective Service, or induction with the Florida National Guard. In addition, an individual file folder, containing copies of all pertinent orders and personnel documents, has been retained for each individual who has been a member of the Florida National Guard (Army and Air). The individual folders for current members are separated from the folders of former members and are maintained current at all times.

A project to convert all files of former members to microfiche was begun in August of 1979. The project will be accomplished by a civilian contractor in 4 phases. Phases I and II were completed in March of 1980. Phase III was begun in June of 1982 and it is planned for Phase IV to start immediately upon completion of Phase III. Current estimates are that completion of Phase IV will occur in February or March of 1983 and should finalize the transition of all former members' files to microfiche. This project will have eliminated a critical records storage problem in the vault storage area and will also insure positive record security inasmuch as duplicate rolls of film are forwarded for storage in the State Archives in Tallahassee, Florida. A microfiche camera and film/jacket inserter has been purchased to permit ongoing filming of files on members as they are separated from the Florida National Guard. This procedure eliminates any future build-up of paper files in the vault storage area.

Requests for Statements of Service and information are received continually on a day to day basis throughout the year and generally fall into two broad categories. The majority of requests in the first category are for documentary evidence to establish eligibility for some type of benefit such as Federal or State military retirement benefits; birth date and/or active Federal service for Social Security benefits; increased military longevity pay for former service; burial in a National Cemetery or government furnished grave marker; or hospitalization or other financial benefits through the Veterans Administration. The second category pertains to requests in the interest of genealogy or history and, for the most part, are applicable to records prior to 1900. The number of Statements of Service furnished during the period of this report was 313 of which 69 were for advance certification of completion of 20 years of active service which would entitle the individual to Federal retired pay for military service upon attaining age 60. This requirement was instituted to eliminate errors and misinformation which previously would not appear until individual reached age 60 at which time he would discover that some of his service did not meet this criteria and it was too late to perform additional service to meet the requirements for Federal retired pay.

#### MILITARY SUPPORT TO CIVIL AUTHORITY

General

The Adjutant General has both State and Federal responsibilities in providing support to civil authorities. The State responsibility involves providing troops (National Guard) to assist civil authorities in major emergencies when authorized by the Governor. On the Federal side the Adjutant General is responsible for the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force and their reserve components) to support civil defense (civil authority) within the State of Florida in event of a nuclear attack against this nation.

#### Planning and Coordination

The responsibility for planning, coordination and conduct of operations in support of civil authorities is centered in the Directorate of Plans, Operations and Training. Liaison is maintained with law enforcement agencies and the Bureau of Disaster Preparedness within the State and with Federal agencies and military commands as appropriate. National Guard troop units are organized into task forces to provide a rapid response to locations within a specific area in proximity to the units' home stations. Liaison is maintained with civil authorities in their area of responsibility by these task forces.

#### Operations

The Department of Military Affairs goes into an increased readiness status immediately upon threat of civil disturbance, natural disaster, or similar emergency that may require use of National Guard troops. Measures taken include a telephone alert of key personnel, contact with local authorities and appropriate State agencies, and review of capabilities of troop units in the emergency area. As the situation develops to a more serious threat additional actions are taken to man the EOC (Emergency Operations Center), dispatch liaison officers to area, alert troop units and send additional equipment and communications as deemed necessary.

#### Active State Duty

Under the provisions of Chapter 250, Florida Statutes, troops of the Florida National Guard were called to Active State Duty to assist civil authorities during fiscal year 1982 as follows:

#### 18 - 19 August 1981 - Miami

Torrential rains along the gold coast of Florida brought by tropical storm Dennis resulted in severe flooding in and around the Dade County area. Twenty-seven (27) officers and enlisted personnel assisted the local authorities in the affected area.

#### 25 September - 4 December 1981 - East Everglades

Continuing rains in the south Florida area resulted in additional flooding in the east Everglades area. A total of forty-five (45) officers and enlisted personnel assisted State and local officials in providing transportation/evacuation support. Four hundred and seventy-two (472) mandays were provided.

#### 13 - 14 January 1982 - West Florida

Severe cold weather conditions resulted in the Governor requesting shelters be opened to provide quarters for those residents with substandard heat and housing. A total of three (3) enlisted mandays were used in support of this mission.

#### 24 - 27 June 1982 - Southwest Florida

Due to extreme rains in southwest Florida, the Peace River flooded requiring many residents to evacuate and causing severe property damage. The Florida National Guard provided helicopter support to fly officials from local, county, State and Federal agencies into damaged areas. A total of 6 officers and enlisted personnel provided air support for this operation.

#### FLORIDA NATIONAL GUARD MILITARY ACADEMY (FNGMA)

On 1 September 1975 the Florida National Guard Officer Candidate School was reorganized and redesignated as Florida National Guard Military Academy and assigned the mission of conducting both an

Officer Candidate School and Non-commissioned Officer School.

The Academy is operated by a twenty-eight person section consisting of ten officers and eighteen enlisted personnel. During the Annual Training period, the section is augmented with additional instructor and support personnel, to a desired strength of forty officer/warrant officers and one hundred fifty enlisted personnel. The Academy is accredited by the Department of the Army and is evaluated yearly by representatives of the Commanding General, First United States Army, to determine manner of performance. The Academy has received very high ratings on each evaluation and is considered one of the best in the nation.

#### Officer Candidate School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School was originally established in March 1961 by the Adjutant General of Florida. The mission of the school is to provide effective instruction for Officer Candidates that will qualify them in the military educational requirements for appointment as second lieutenants, and to develop maximum leadership and command ability in the candidates.

Class No. 21, currently in progress, will complete their twelve months of training and will graduate and be commissioned 28 August 1982.

Class No. 22 begin their training on 10 July 1982. They will continue into an Annual Training period, twelve (12) weekend training assemblies during the fall, winter and spring (Phase II), an additional fifteen (15) day Annual Training period in August 1983 (Phase III) and a minimum four-week branch resident qualification course (Phase IV). Class No. 22 will graduate and be commissioned at completion of Phase III and attend Phase IV in an officer status within twelve months of commissioning. The program consists of a minimum of 576 hours.

The Programs of Instruction taught are developed and monitored by the United States Army Infantry School, Fort Benning, Georgia, in coordination with Chief, National Guard Bureau, and closely parallels the resident Infantry Officer Candidate School. All examinations are graded by the Infantry School. Methods of leadership development include rigid discipline, high standards of deportment and conduct, and exacting manner of performance, frequent and effective counseling, and continuous observation, correction and evaluation. The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School is the primary source of junior officer procurement for the Florida Army National Guard. At present 50% of all company grade officers in the Florida Army National Guard are graduates of the school. In recent years personnel of the United States Army Reserve have been admitted to the school and upon graduation, are appointed second lieutenants in that component. Numbers of candidates attending the Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School, and graduates by year are shown below:

Noncommissioned Officer School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Noncommissioned Officer School was established 1 September 1975. The mission of the school is to develop leadership and professional military skills in selected personnel in grades E-4 through E-9 to qualify them as noncommissioned officers.

Three programs of instruction for noncommissioned officers are conducted. Basic Course for grades E-4 and E-5, consisting of 113 hours; Advanced Course for grades E-6 and E-7, consisting of 66 hours; and a Senior Course for grades E-8 and E-9, consisting of 56 hours. Through 30 June 1982, twelve classes had been conducted with graduates as shown below:

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY (EO), EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY (EEO), AND SOCIAL ACTIONS (SL)

The Florida National Guard has several Equal Opportunity Programs: Equal Opportunity Program (EO) for the Florida Army National Guard (ARNG) and Social Actions Program (SL) for Florida Air National Guard (ANG) military members. There is also an Equal Employment Opportunity Program for Federal employees and one for State of Florida Military Department employees. Each of these programs received continued emphasis during the year. Emphasis in the military programs is on upward mobility for enlisted personnel and increasing the number of minority officers in both the Army and Air National Guard. Equal Employment Opportunity Program emphasis continues to be in the areas of recruitment of minorities for fulltime positions and upward mobility to higher graded positions where minorities and women continue to be underrepresented.

Current status in the various programs is as follows:

During this year, percentages increased for minorities and women in both services, while overall strength increased 505 in the ARNG and decreased by 40 in the ANG.

A total of six MTOE/MTDA EO sections is authorized throughout the State in the ARNG. The ANG is authorized one Social Actions section. Nineteen of the 26 personnel occupying EO or SL duty positions have received formal training in their assigned duties. This represents an increase of one section with five individuals assigned and an additional nine persons having received formal training. Forty-one trained Unit Discussion Leaders (UDL) are assigned (additional duty) throughout the State in the ARNG for utilization at unit level. This constitutes an increase of 7 UDLs.

Five (5) EO complaints were received and resolved at the informal level during the fiscal year.

#### Support Personnel EEO Program

Support personnel are employed to provide fulltime support to the Florida National Guard. Representation attained in the various support categories is as follows.

The percentage of minority military technicians in the ARNG increased by 1.0%, while women technicians decreased by 1.6% during the fiscal year. In the ANG, minority technicians increased by 1.2% and women technicians decreased by 3.0%. The total number of military technicians decreased by sixty-one (61) in the ARNG and by forty-six (46) in the ANG.

In this second year of the AGR Program, the percentage of minorities and women increased substantially as did the total number of positions.

Total Department of Military Affairs employees increased by eight (8) over the preceding period. Minority employees remained at 23%, while women employees increased by 1.5%.

Nineteen EEO Counselors are appointed (additional duty) and trained in basic and/or advanced counseling techniques. These counselors work in both the Military Technician and State Employee EEO Programs.

No EEO complaints were received above the counselor level during this reporting period.

#### ARMY NATIONAL GUARD

The Florida Army National Guard entered fiscal year 1982 with an authorized strength of 9,418 personnel. During the fiscal year the authorized strength has increased to a current authorization of 10,430 personnel as a result of several minor reorganizations and addition of several new units.

The strength at the beginning of fiscal year 1982 was 9,542 and Florida was at 101.3% of authorized strength. As of 30 June 1982, Florida's strength was at 10,047 for 96.3% of fill, ranking nationally number 18 of all states in percentage of assigned strength compared to authorized strength.

Source of officer procurement consisted of one third furnished through the State OCS program and two thirds from officers returning from active duty, transfers from out of state Guard, reserve units and ROTC graduates.

#### RESERVE OFFICER PERSONNEL ACT (ROPA) 1954

The Reserve Officer Personnel Act (ROPA) continues to prescribe policy, guidance, and procedures for consideration, selection, and promotion of Army National Guard commissioned officers not otherwise selected for unit vacancy promotion within their respective state.

During the fiscal year 1982 period, 81 officers were considered for mandatory promotion by the respective Department of Army Selection Board with 59 being selected. This represents an overall selection rate of 73%. The statistical analysis of selection by grade is as follows:

A majority of the officers selected by the board for mandatory promotion elect to decline their promotion for the authorized period as sufficient position vacancies are not available for immediate promotion. Further, some officers must be discharged from the Florida National Guard with concurrent transfer to the non-unit USAR for mandatory promotion upon expiration of the authorized declination when no position vacancy exists for their promotion within the Florida Army National Guard.

The Defense Officer Personnel Modernization Act (DOPMA) was passed into law effective 15 September 1981. Although DOPMA primarily affects active component officers, there are certain residual effects relative to creditable service and grade determination upon appointment for National Guard and Army Reserve officers. The Reserve Officer Personnel Modernization Act (ROPMA), which will present the Reserve Component aspects of DOPMA, is currently under study and review. When implemented, ROPMA will replace ROPA (1954).

#### FLORIDA ARMY NATIONAL GUARD OFFICER SELECTION BOARDS

State Selection Boards were established in Florida in 1963 as a positive method of implementing a career development program for officer personnel. The Boards convene as necessary to fill Major, Lieutenant Colonel, Colonel, and certain General Officer position vacancies. It is also charged with the responsibility of recommending to the Adjutant General, reassignments of battalion commanders, changes in field grade staff assignments, and acceptance of declination of ROPA promotions to Colonels.

The Senior Officer Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General and the two General Officer Commanders, met 4 times during fiscal year 1982 recommending promotion of 1 Colonel to Brigadier General, 5 Lieutenant Colonels to Colonel, reassignment of 1 Colonel, and acceptance of 1 declination of promotion to Colonel under ROPA provisions.

The Field Grade Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General, General Officer Commanders, Commander of 227th Artillery Brigade, 50th Area Support Group, 53rd Signal Group and 202nd Medical Group met 4 times during this period, recommending to the Adjutant General promotion

of 4 Majors to Lieutenant Colonel, 14 Captains to Major, and reassignment and transfer of 45 Field Grade Officers.

#### SELECTIVE RETENTION

A Selective Retention Program was implemented by the National Guard on 1 July 1969. NGR 635-102 prescribes the procedures and policies for conduct of the Selective Retention Board. The Selective Retention Board, conducted during the first half of each calendar year considers officers and warrant officers with 20 or more qualifying years of service for retired pay. Originally, the Regulation required individuals to be considered every year following completion of the 20 qualifying years of service. However, beginning with the Board in 1974, the Regulation was changed to provide that the Board would be convened annually but individuals would be considered every other year instead of every year. This substantially reduced the number of individuals reviewed by the Board each year. Factors considered by the Board include demonstrated performance, physical fitness, civilian and military education, previous assignments, and potential for future staff and command assignments.

Since inception of the Selective Retention Board in July 1969, thirteen Boards have been held. Results of boards since 1974 are as follows:

### ENLISTED QUALITATIVE RETENTION BOARD

The Enlisted Qualitative Retention Board, as implemented by AR 135-205, convenes during the period October-December each year. The records of all enlisted personnel who have 20 qualifying years of service without regard to Expiration of Term of Service or grade, are reviewed every two years except when the convening authority determines than an annual review is necessary.

The Board, composed of 3 Field Grade Officers and 2 Command Sergeants Major, recommend to the Adjutant General of Florida those individuals who have future potential benefits to the Army National Guard based on demonstrated performance as attested to by Efficiency Reports, a review of all Military Personnel Records, and physical fitness.

Since inception of the Qualitative Retention Board in June of 1974, eight Boards have been held with the following results:

An appeal procedure was provided for by the regulation beginning with the 1976 Board. Of the 8 not recommended for retention by the 1981 Board, 5 appealed and 4 were sustained by the Adjutant General of Florida. One (1) appeal was denied by the Adjutant General which was forwarded to the Chief of the National Guard Bureau who, in turn, denied the appeal.

### ARMY NATIONAL GUARD TRAINING

Training of the Florida Army National Guard is based on criteria prescribed by the Department of the Army, in coordination with the National Guard Bureau. The Commanding General, First United States Army is charged with the responsibility of evaluation, coordination, support and supervision of prescribed training. Standards for training are established by Department of the Army and unit performance is evaluated on a continual basis by active Army personnel. There are three phases of training:

Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training for development of basic skills and techniques, culminating in the assignment of Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) to individuals

commensurate with the type of training received and which denotes qualification to perform the duties of a particular job assignment.

<u>Unit Training</u> is conducted by units of the Florida Army National Guard. This training is designed to produce units qualified to perform assigned missions prescribed in applicable organizational authorization documents and to maintain the level of readiness required to support operational or contingency missions. Unit Training consists of the following: Formal unit training which prepares a unit to perform its mission as stated in applicable organizational authorization documents. Various levels of formal unit training are culminated by the administration of an Army Training Evaluation as soon after completion of the levels as possible. Formal unit training consists of training of skilled individuals designed to develop squads, crews, sections, detachments, platoons, or companies capable of successfully accomplishing the unit mission, conducted in a progressive manner, culminated at the level prescribed by the appropriate unit Army Training and Evaluation Program (ARTEP). Upon completion of the various levels of training, proficiency tests are administered to evaluate individual and unit performance. Upon successful completion of all levels of training, the unit should have demonstrated satisfactory standards of performance and be fully capable of undertaking combat operations.

Field exercises are conducted in the field under simulated combat conditions (in which personnel and equipment of one force are actually present, while those of the opposing force may be real or imaginary). Field exercises are training vehicles that may be squad through brigade in size. They are mission oriented and designed to prepare participating units for identifiable missions. Field exercises are conducted, as appropriate, during all levels of unit training.

The objective of Army National Guard training is to attain the highest levels of individual and unit proficiency that are achievable in a premobilization status. Individuals in the National Guard receive the training necessary to teach them basic military skills and the special skills required to perform effectively the duties of their assigned positions. Operational readiness is the primary requirement of the individual and units of the National Guard. Units and individuals must be ready to mobilize and undertake accomplishment of the mission specified by the TOE/TDA. The minimum standard for Army National Guard units is the attainment and maintenance of company or comparable level proficiency. This is defined as completion of the appropriate unit training program and proficiency verified by successful completion of an applicable Army Training Evaluation, with 85 percent or more of unit members participating. During Training Year 81-82 all units having assigned Army Training Evaluations accom-

plished same in a most satisfactory manner; resulting in Active Army Evaluators evaluating the units as being in a training readiness condition equal to most Active Army Units.

### ACTIVE/GUARD RESERVE (AGR) FULL TIME MANNING PROGRAM

GENERAL: During FY82 the Full Time Manning Program, providing full time manpower support to units of the Florida National Guard, have been greatly expanded both in number of positions authorized and by categories of programs. The overall designation of the program for all categories is identified as Active/Guard Reserve (AGR).

AGR SUB-PROGRAMS. The various categories contained within the AGR Programs are identified and explained below:

CONVERSION TO FULL TIME MANNING (CFTM). This program permits the conversion of positions previously authorized for fill by military technicians in a civil service status to AGR status. Once a position has been converted, it can only be filled by National Guard members ordered to AGR. These spaces are converted with approval of the Adjutant General of Florida and individuals are ordered to a tour of duty for a period of 1 to 6 years and may be extended at the expiration of the initial tour again, with the State Adjutant General's approval.

ADDITIVE FULL TIME MANNING-ACTIVE COMPONENT (AFTM-AC). This program permits members of the Active Army to be attached to selected National Guard units with the approval of the Adjutant General of Florida to perform specialized duties in the areas of personnel and administration, maintenance, supply, and training. The normal tour of duty is 2 years at which time the individual is relieved from attachment and reassigned within the Active Component structure. In most cases, the Active Army has identified a replacement for the individual being reassigned and the replacement then is attached to the unit for another 2-year tour.

ADDITIVE FULL TIME MANNING-NATIONAL GUARD (AFTM-NG). The AFTM program was developed and implemented as a means of increasing full time support to National Guard units without exceeding the current technician or CFTM manning levels. It permits National Guard individuals to be ordered to AGR status with the approval of the Adjutant General of Florida for periods of 1 to 6 years and the tours may be further extended upon their expiration, again, with the approval of the State

Adjutant General. The areas of support include personnel administration, supply, maintenance and training.

ADDITIVE FULL TIME MANNING-SPECIAL (AFTM-S). This program has been recently developed to permit National Guardsmen to be ordered to AGR status for special purposes, normally in support of a newly organized unit where military technicians or CFTM manning is not currently available within budgetary constraints. Tours under this program are generally limited to 2 years or less and upon receipt of funding in the military technician or CFTM area, the incumbent would be required to be released from the AFTM Special status and be reordered to CFTM or military technician status, as would be appropriate.

DEFENSE AUTOMATED SUPPLY SUPPORT SYSTEM (DAS3). The DAS3 program permits members of the National Guard to be ordered to AGR duty for a period of 1 to 6 years with the approval of the Adjutant General of Florida in support of a newly organized and designed supply system which currently services approximately 50% of the units of the Florida Army National Guard.

STANDARD INSTALLATION DIVISION PERSONNEL SYSTEM (SIDPERS). SIDPERS is an automated personnel system used by the Active Army and, in recent years, separate modified SIDPERS have been under development for the Army National Guard and U.S. Army Reserve, respectively. This system, when implemented in approximately October 1983, will greatly expand the automated personnel system currently in existence and permit capture and storage of many additional elements of information pertinent to individual members and units of the Army National Guard. The SIDPERS System will be manned by National Guard members on AGR status in support of the SIDPERS program. In October of 1981, 4 individuals were ordered to AGR status to begin the development of the SIDPERS System for the Florida Army National Guard. These members were ordered to AGR status for a 2-year period with the approval of the Adjutant General of Florida and may be extended for periods of up to 6 years, as appropriate.

FULL TIME RECRUITING FORCE AND FULL TIME ATTRITION/RETENTION FORCE. This program has been provided the state from National Guard Bureau sources to permit National Guardsmen to be ordered to AGR status primarily to support the commands and units of the Florida Army National Guard to attain and maintain their authorized strengths. Individuals are assigned to additional TDA positions at HHD, FLARNG and are managed by the State Recruiting and Retention Manager. The Forces are organized as follows:

AUTHORITY. All AGR programs, with the exception of AFTM-AC, provide that members be ordered to AGR status under the provisions of Title 32, USC 502(f) as passed by Congress, to provide authority under Federal law for ordering of National Guard members to active duty under the provisions of AGR and to provide for management of these individuals by the various State Adjutants General.

PROGRAM EXPANSION. The AGR program has been determined, at the national level, to be a viable and effective method of providing full time manning and support to Reserve Component units. The CFTM program is expected to continue to expand over the next several years eventually totally replacing the Military Technician Program through attrition. The AFTM program is currently planning to expand on a Federal fiscal year basis through FY86 reaching a total of over 10,000 spaces nationwide and will continue to provide the means for manning additional programs and systems as they are implemented. The chart below is provided to reflect the AGR expansion within the Florida Army National Guard during the period 1 July 1981 through 30 June 1982.

### RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING CORP (ROTC) PROGRAMS

Reserve Forces Duty Program (RFD)

This program was designed to place ROTC RFD graduates in Army National Guard or U.S. Army Reserve units rather than allowing them to become members of the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR).

### ROTC Early Commission Program (ECP)

This program is available to ROTC Cadets who have completed all ROTC requirements but have not completed baccalaureate degree requirements. These cadets may now be commissioned provided they have been accepted for appointment as Second Lieutenants in the Army National Guard. This policy is designed to authorize cadets, who want to join an ARNG Unit upon commissioning, to serve as Second Lieutenants while continuing their education. This program provides dual benefits to the individual and the military. The individual receives valuable training and experience as well as inactive duty and annual training pay (including retirement points) while pursuing the balance of his college education. The ARNG benefits by an increase in assigned officer strength and participation. Both benefit in that the individual continues to practice the skills learned in ROTC training rather than have these skills get "rusty" through no use for two or three years as in the past when individual was just a name on a list until he received his baccalaureate degree.

### ROTC Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP)

Authorizes ROTC cadets enrolled in Military Science (MS) III and Military Science (MS) IV to be active members of both ROTC and Army National Guard/USAR Units. ROTC cadets are now authorized to receive the ROTC monthly pay plus all drill pay and allowances from participation with the Army National Guard.

### ROTC Delayed Entry Program (DEP)

Allows ROTC graduates who have received their baccalaureate degree and commission to become members of the Army National Guard and delay their active duty requirements for up to 36 months while pursuing an advanced degree.

#### ROTC Scholarship Program

The purpose of this program is to identify outstanding students on campus or in the ARNG and offer them the opportunity for a scholarship with service in the ARNG after graduation. This is a two-year scholarship. One scholarship was available for each state in CY 1982. Florida ARNG scholarship nominee

went to ROTC Cadet Johnny M. Brown.

### INITIAL ACTIVE DUTY FOR TRAINING PROGRAM

The Reserve Enlisted Program of 1963 (REP-63) (Requirement for Initial Active Duty Training for Non-prior Service Personnel) continued during the period of the report.

The Split Training Option, which was initiated in June 1978, on a pilot program basis, has continued through the period of this report. As of 30 June 1982, 101 enlisted members are undergoing Phase II of the program. An additional 125 were enlisted for and are participating in Phase I of the program. This is a total of 226 individuals.

The nationwide time-sharing computer service, using a national telecommunications network with remote terminals capable of simultaneously accessing a common data bank containing the annual Basic Training and Advanced Individual Training base, continues to be utilized in securing training spaces for non-prior service individuals.

Sufficient quotas have been obtained from the Department of the Army to preclude any backlog from occurring during the year. Except for unusual circumstances, non-prior enlistees enter their initial active duty for training within 30 to 180 days after enlistment. Bona fided high school seniors can be delayed from training for up to 270 days to provide input quotas following graduation from high school.

A total of 1,271 trainees entered initial active duty for training during this period with 1,108 completing their training and returning to their National Guard unit.

#### SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Army National Guard Schools Program provides the main vehicle for the branch and technical training of Officer and Enlisted Personnel of the Florida Army National Guard, whereby they are afforded the opportunity to qualify themselves to fill their unit MTOE/MTDA assignments and receive advanced training in critical Military Occupational Specialties. It is through the media of the Schools Program, which is supported by Federal funds, that Officer and Enlisted Personnel complete their training in their chosen fields and are able to maintain proficiency in the areas of Combat Arms, Technical and Administrative fields.

During the fiscal year, Officers and Enlisted personnel participated in the Schools Program as outlined below:

### ENLISTED EVALUATION SYSTEM

Skill Qualification Testing (SQT) is now in its second year in the Florida National Guard. As of 30 June 1982, over 2,000 Florida National Guard enlisted personnel have taken the SQT with a pass rate of over 71%. This is considerably higher than the pass rate for the USAR.

The Enlisted Evaluation Report (EER) continues to be utilized in lieu of current test scores for reassignment, transfer, and promotion of enlisted personnel in grades E5 and above.

### RETENTION AND RECRUITING

During fiscal year 1982 the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 505 personnel. During the period 2,679 new enlistments were produced of which 45% were non-prior service and 55% were prior service personnel.

Florida's retention rate was 66% which meets the national average. The non-ETS loss rate improved during the year but remains as the number one problem in retaining personnel.

A small net gain of 198 black personnel and 80 women was reflected. There are 2,657 black personnel and 567 women on board as of 30 June 1982. The black percentage of overall strength is 26% of the total state strength.

Florida reflects a current strength of 10,047 personnel for a 96.3% fill rate and ranks number 18 of all states nationally in percentage of assigned strength compared with authorized strength. However, Florida elected to grow in the number of units and authorized personnel during the year and in the future as opposed to concentrating on a high percentage of fill and remaining at a lower authorized strength.

During the year Florida for the first time exceeded 10,000 personnel both authorized and assigned. Several new units were organized during the fiscal year.

Retention and recruiting will continue to receive command emphasis to ensure a steady future growth for the Florida Army National Guard.

### FEDERAL FUNDS AND EQUIPMENT

The United States Property and Fiscal Officer (USPFO) for Florida is charged with the responsibility as pertains to comptroller matters, purchasing and contracting, transportation, supply and logistics, and maintenance of Federal property. He is assisted by a technician work force to maintain these accountable records. The USPFO mission is to assist, with the necessary administrative and logistical support, those units of the Florida Army and Air National Guard when they are mobilized for Federal active duty.

The Florida Army National Guard continues to be better equipped than in previous years. This is due primarily to the receipt of more modern equipment and the additional funding being made available to the State of Florida by the Federal Government.

Funding to support procurement of secondary items of equipment was increased from 1.5 million to 5.3 million during the past year. Also, many items of primary equipment were received during the year. Primary items received which had a significant impact on our training and mobilization mission are as listed below:

There were 454 full-time Federal employees paid from Federal funds as of 30 June 1982. Federal funds, during the period 1 July 1981 to 30 June 1982, expended in direct support of the Florida Army National Guard, totaled \$45,244,353.

### INTER-SERVICE AGREEMENT

All Active and Reserve Forces, which include the National Guard, currently operate under a policy whereby one service may support another on a reimbursable basis. This policy reduces duplication of effort, gives a faster response to requirements and effects an overall savings to the Federal Government and ultimately to the taxpayer. The Florida National Guard receives supplies and services from the active installations throughout the State of Florida, and we are thereby able to support our troops in a better manner at a cost savings to the Government. Conversely, the Florida National Guard supports the active and other reserve forces by furnishing supplies and services on a reimbursable basis.

### SURFACE MAINTENANCE FOR FEDERAL PROPERTY

The program providing technical guidance and expected quality standards for maintenance of Federal Property (Surface), assigned to Florida Army National Guard units, is published in Florida National Guard Circular 750-l, Maintenance of Supplies and Equipment - Maintenance Support Plan. The program is administered under the supervision of the State Maintenance Officer through 13 Organizational Maintenance Shops (OMS), two Sub-Organizational Maintenance Shops, one Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS), a Satellite Combined Support Maintenance Shop, and a co-located Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES).

Responsibility for maintenance is assigned at the lowest echelon possible. Unit organizational maintenance capabilities are utilized to the maximum and are augmented by the Organizational Maintenance Shops. Support maintenance, that echelon of maintenance requiring a higher level of expertise, tools and test equipment than found at organizational maintenance, is accomplished by four Direct Support Maintenance Companies during Inactive Duty and Annual Training. These companies are augmented by the Combined Support Maintenance Shop and the Mobilization and Training Equipment Site. The thirteen Organizational Maintenance Shops, Combined Support Maintenance Shop and Mobilization and Training Equipment Site are staffed with 167 highly skilled National Guard Technicians.

We have during the past year developed alternative maintenance support measures that will reduce transportation and travel costs, while sustaining our integrated maintenance support concept. Specifically we have established a sub-CSMS Support Activity (Satellite Shop) in West Palm Beach. This activity is co-located with an existing OMS, which is also in close proximity to the Home Station location of a DS Maintenance Company (743rd). This activity will provide a DS level base of operations for OMS Numbers 1, 14 and 15, all located within the geographical area. The Satellite Shop will provide DS level repair and inspection support for automotive equipment, C&E equipment and limited armament materiel. Assigned OMS's and units will realize a substantial savings in transportation requirements, including available manhours for production in lieu of travel time. To enhance organizational capabilities, we have established a Sub-OMS in Pensacola. This activity will provide much needed support to the units that are located in that end of the State. In addition to the above, we propose to authorize certain OMS's to accomplish limited DS maintenance functions on selected items of equipment heretofore evacuated to CSMS. Those OMS's located 100 miles or more from a support shop are prime candidates for receiving the limited DS maintenance authority. Availability of special tools and skilled personnel, as well as overall maintenance workload, are considerations in authorizing the accomplishment of DS repairs on a job by job basis, with directed control by the State Maintenance Officer.

The participation of selected maintenance technicians in Mobilization Exercises has sharpened the maintenance support and deployment capability to improve our position for potential State and Federal emergency requirements.

### ARMY AVIATION

Mission: Federal or State. To provide units organized, equipped, and trained to function efficiently at existing strength in the protection of life and property and the preservation of peace, order, and public

safety under competent orders of Federal or State authorities. Federal: To provide trained units and qualified individuals available for active duty in time of war or national emergency in support of the Army's war plans and at such times as the national security may require augmentation of the Active Forces.

The Army Aviation Support Facility Command (AASFC) is located at Craig Airport, Jacksonville, Florida. In June, 1982 the AASFC augmentation was reorganized under the provision of FNG Circular 10-1 and is now directly responsible to the Adjutant General of Florida for the command, supervision and training of Company C, and Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion and 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon. The 53rd Infantry Brigade Aviation element is attached to Army Aviation Support Facility for supervision of technical aviation training and coordination of administration and logistics with Brigade Commander. In order to accomplish the desired level of training and proficiency, the AASFC employs 75 technicians in various positions within the command structure. Three of these individuals are employed under the Conversion to Full Time Manning (CFTM) program and six are employed under the new Active Guard Reserve (AGR) program.

Florida Army National Guard aviation elements continue to operate under the September 1978 reorganization structure with three major aviation elements and the Air Traffic Control Platoon added in March 1979. These units are: Aviation Section, 53d Infantry Brigade (Sep); Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion (Combat Support); Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion (Attack Helicopter); and the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon (Forward).

Aviation assets assigned and supported by the Army Aviation Support Facility, Craig Field, Jackson-ville are: 29 UH-1H's, 15 UH-1M's, 22 OH-58's, 2 TH-1G's and 1 U-21A. Florida is expecting to receive the AH-1S Cobra to replace some of the non-deployable UH-1M's.

### Operations and Training

The Operations and Training section of the AASFC is staffed by an Operations Officer, Aviation Safety Officer, four Flight Instructors and two Flight Operations Specialists. The operations and training section is responsible for coordinating, scheduling and conducting all phases of individual aviator training until the aviator is considered operational ready to perform all unit mission tasks. The operations and training section is also responsible for coordinating and scheduling all aviation mission support required by ground elements throughout the State.

Unit Schools (formal courses of instruction approved and funded by the National Guard Bureau) are conducted during the fiscal year by the operations and training section. These unit schools provide aircraft refresher training, aircraft qualification training, instrument flight training and qualification and terrain flight qualification for the assigned aviators. In late summer and fall of this year the operations and training section will begin conducting a new phase of training, Night Hawk/Night Vision Goggle qualification. This type flying requires assigned aviators to be trained to fly their aircraft in the terrain flight mode during the hours of darkness utilizing the specially designed night vision goggles and existing ambient light.

Army National Guard aviators are required to meet the same training requirements and performance standards and annual flight hour requirements as the Active Army aviator. These requirements are accomplished during the year at weekend Multiple Unit Training Assemblies (MUTA's), Additional Flight Training Periods (AFTP's) conducted during the weekday evenings by the AASFC, Annual Training (AT) periods, and during the training year in the 2B24 Synthetic Flight Training Simulator (SFTS) located at Hunter Army Airfield, Savannah, Georgia.

Annual Training for Co D, 26th Avn Bn (Atk Hel) was again conducted at Camp Blanding during the period 20 March - 3 April 1982. HHC (P) 53d Inf Bde, 11th Air Traffic Control (Fwd), and Co C, 26th Avn Bn (Cbt Spt) performed their Annual Training at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, during the period 1 - 15 May 1982. A high state of readiness was maintained, as reflected in ratings received from Active Army Evaluator teams, during these periods. Companies C and D, 26th Avn Bn both received external ARTEP evaluations conducted by the Active Army. Both companies received satisfactory evaluations. It should be noted that Co D, 26th Avn Bn is the first reserve attack helicopter unit to take an external ARTEP evaluation.

Army aviation also supported several additional Annual Training periods during the year: MedEvac

Support for Post Headquarters, Camp Blanding, 14 April - 1 May 1982; MedEvac Support for 1/265th ADA Bn, Camp Blanding, 18 - 21 April 1982; Aviation Support for 227th FA Bde, Ft. Stewart, Georgia, 1 - 15 May 1982; MedEvac Support for Post Headquarters, Camp Blanding, 5 - 22 May 1982; Aviation Support for 53d Sig Group, Camp Blanding, 7 - 24 July 1982; and Aviation Support for 3rd Bn, 20th SF Gp, at Fort Carson, Colorado, 19 July - 6 August 1982.

Army aviation also supported in a Federal Status aviation support to NASA during two space shuttle launches. This was in the form of a helicopter and crew for the purpose of providing perimeter security just prior to launch.

Florida Army National Guard aviation elements also supported the State Mission during the fiscal year by providing aviation support to the State Forestry Department 1 - 12 July 1981 in the Deland area assisting in forest fire fighting. Other State missions supported were in September 1981 for flooding in the Hollywood area and for aerial review of Talbot Island for Governor Graham and party and in June 1982 for flooding in the Bradenton/Sarasota area.

A high state of operational readiness is maintained throughout the aviation units by skilled crew-members and support personnel. Aviation flying hour experience averages 2410 hours per aviator.

Mission ready aircraft were available and utilized to accomplish the 1982 fiscal year flying hour program as follows: UH-1: 5702 hours; OH-58: 1884 hours; AH-1: 300 hours; U-21: 283 hours; for a total yearly program of 8169 hours.

The Army Aviation Maintenance Shop is tasked with providing aviation unit maintenance (AVUM) and limited aviation intermediate maintenance (AVIM) for the 68 aircraft assigned to the Florida Army National Guard.

Fifty-six federally funded technicians and two full-time training duty personnel are presently employed in direct support of the maintenance program on a daily basis. They act as a training cadre for instructions on new equipment. During fiscal year 1982 the Army Aviation Maintenance Shop maintained an operational readiness rate in the high 80 percentile range while providing over 600 manhours in aviation maintenance support to active and reserve component units training at Camp Blanding. The Army Aviation Maintenance Shop also assisted our active component counterpart by performing major inspections (150).

hours) on five AH-1S (Cobra) helicopters. The Army Aviation maintenance program of the Florida Army National Guard continues to be recognized as one of the best in the Army National Guard.

Community Relations and Civil Assistance

Army Aviation units regularly participate in community programs and the AASFC continues to provide an excellent attraction for local groups on educational field trips.

In January 1980 the Army Aviation Support Facility started providing Emergency Medical Evacuation capability to local hospitals for the emergency transport of neonatal patients from outlying hospitals to Jacksonville. To date the AASFC has accomplished 49 missions of this nature. These and other humanitarian efforts are published throughout the community and have resulted in improved public relations and awareness of the Florida Army National Guard.

### AIR NATIONAL GUARD

The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard, located at the State Arsenal, St. Augustine, Florida, and an Air Defense Group, located at the ANG installation at Jacksonville International Airport, Jacksonville, Florida. The Air National Guard of Florida has an authorization of 110 officers, with 102 assigned, and 827 airmen, with 855 assigned, which is a manning level of 93% officers and 103% airmen. The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group has seven subordinate units: 125th Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, 125th Combat Support Squadron, 125th Resource Management Squadron, 125th Civil Engineering Flight, 125th Security Police Flight, 125th USAF Clinic and the 159th Fighter Interceptor Squadron.

#### Awards

The 125th USAF Clinic received the Theodore C. Marrs Award as the Outstanding ANG Medical Unit.

### Personnel

Although having a loss of assigned strength is normally considered detrimental to a unit, we are proud of the fact that we began the reporting period with an overall assigned strength of 108% and closed the reporting period with an overall assigned strength of 103%. This reduction in strength is a good indication that we have made efforts to comply with current NGB policy not to exceed 100% of our authorized strength.

As indicated in the last reporting period, NGB restrictions on enlistments have required more emphasis be placed on retention in order to maintain acceptable strength levels. The reenlistment incentive program remained stable during the period and adequate funds were made available. Retention of qualified personnel will become more difficult in the future and will require greater emphasis on manpower development and management procedures at all levels.

The Active Guard/Reserve (AGR) program was expanded and we had a closing figure of 32 personnel on active duty. Although no official word has been received, it is very likely that the program will be expanded to include other functional areas in the very near future.

### Inspections/Evaluations

A combined Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI)/Nuclear Surety Inspection (NSI) of the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group was conducted from 6-11 August 1981, by the ADTAC Inspector General. Overall ratings were Satisfactory for the ORI and Excellent for the NSI.

The North American Air Defense Command (NORAD) conducted a No-notice Alert Force Evaluation (NAFE) on 19 January 1982. Results of the NAFE were Satisfactory.

20th NORAD Region made a Staff Assistance Visit to the Unit from 4-7 June 1982. Only minor discrepancies were noted.

#### Deployments/Exercises

Deployment to Ellsworth AFB, South Dakota, from 1-14 November 1981 was conducted to participate in the Strategic Air Command (SAC) Bomb/Nav Competition. During this period, intercepts were flown against U.S. and NATO bombers on low altitude penetration profiles.

A Combat Pike Deployment was conducted from 6-20 March 1982, in support of ADTAC's Weapon System Evaluation Program at Tyndall AFB, Florida. During this deployment unit aircrews hit and destroyed several drone aircraft, including a PQM-102, with air-to-air armament.

Two simulated deployments were conducted at Jacksonville IAP, Florida, to exercise unit wartime mobility tasking.

At least one Air Defense exercise per month was supported, either with interceptor or target forces.

Participation in Composite Force Training (CFT) exercises increased this year, with unit involvement in Seeker Strike IV, Sentry GB-X11, and Quick Thrust 1-82. All of these exercises simulate wartime scenarios and provide a realistic combat environment for conducting low altitude intercepts against various types of strike aircraft.

### Operations

NORAD Alert continues as the primary unit mission. A total of forty-three scrambles were flown against unidentified aircraft. Of these, several were identified as Russian TU-95 Bear D's on round-robin flights from Cuba. In addition, NORAD also conducted Special Air Defense Evaluations (SPADE's) against the alert force, requiring scramble and identification of faker aircraft.

NORAD Performance Analysis by Continuous Evaluation (PACE) flights are flown at least once a week in support of 20th NORAD Region. Purpose of these flights is to verify the operation of radar and radio equipment within the regions area of responsibility.

The unit has also flown missions in support of the Eastern Missile Test Range at Cape Canaveral, Florida. Normally, these missions are premissile launch weather verification flights; however, several missions involved flying cruise missile profiles during evaluation of shipborne optical trackers.

Aircrew continuation training under Tactical Air Command (TAC) increased significantly with implementation of the Low Altitude Visual Training (LAVT) and Air-to-Air Refueling (AAR) requirements. These programs greatly enhance the unit's ability to meet wartime tasking.

A total of 2986 sorties and 5103 hours of flying time were accumulated in the F-106A/B. T-33 aircraft flew 600.2 hours and the C-131 flew 419 hours. There were no accidents or incidents during this period.

The unit participated in various exercises throughout the year, including our annual Combat Pike deployment to Tyndall AFB, Florida, for aircraft/aircrew weapons qualification. This year Combat Pike ran from March 6-20, with twelve aircraft flying 81 sorties in support of the deployment. Once again the unit returned home with no accidents or major mishaps.

One of the most significant achievements in maintenance was the completion of the N20-80L HUSH House this year. The HUSH House was designed to significantly reduce noise from aircraft engines while they are being checked. This was the first HUSH House of this type to be built for any military installation on the east coast. The main feature of the HUSH House is the ability to put an entire aircraft inside while

running the engine.

Maintenance

During the past fiscal year approximately 185 Air Technicians were employed in maintenance to support the F-106 aircraft. These personnel perform various functions, from minor repairs through major overhaul, up to depot level maintenance on all assigned aircraft and engines.

The past year has been a productive one for the maintenance complex, as evidenced by the following information:

The Florida Air National Guard underwent two major inspections in the past year; an Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) and a Nuclear Surety Inspection (NSI). Both inspections were accomplished from August 6-11 1981.

The ORI measures the unit's ability to accomplish its assigned mission. The rating for maintenance was excellent. This was attributed to determination, a positive attitude, and superior proficiency during all maintenance operations.

An excellent rating was received on the NSI by all areas evaluated in maintenance. Some of the noteworthy items were the loading standardization crew, and the nuclear weapons maintenance function that was observed to be one of the best in the nation.

Resource Management

Federal Funds and Equipment

The Assistant USP&FO for Air (Property), during this reporting period, continued to provide effective support for all 125th Fighter Interceptor Group units. The average warehouse inventory managed by Base Supply was 10,895 line items valued at \$1,909,499. Through computer accounting, Supply recorded an average of 18,291 transactions per month. Equipment in use by all organizations of the Group is valued at \$12,398,577.20. With this amount of supplies and equipment, Supply has consistently maintained an inventory accuracy of 99% for the year.

Approximately \$26,189 was paid to local transportation companies for the movement of material, from Jacksonville to various points in the United States. Service agreements and local contracts with other activities in the Florida Air National Guard was valued at \$573,624. These Federal funds paid to Florida business concerns represents an industry of considerable value to the State of Florida.

Accounting and Finance

During this reporting period, the Assistant USPFO for Air (Fiscal) and his staff continued to manage all funds in a professional manner while providing efficient customer service to all members of the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group. An obligation rate of 100 percent was maintained for all allocated funds. This encompassed 12,000 accounting transactions, 25,000 AFRAS transactions, pay support for civilian personnel and approximately 800 travel vouchers.

Data Processing

During the past year, equipment was up-graded for the Consolidated Base Personnel Officer (CBPO). A TD 832 CRT (Cathode Ray Tube) replaced their TC521. Work is progressing to replace their IBM 026 Keypunch with equipment to provide key to disc and direct disc transmission capability.

Equipment has been installed to provide Maintenance Section with on-line capability to CEMS (Comprehensive Engine Management System). Equipment consists of a Burroughs CRT and a Data South (DS 180) printer.

A DAR (Data Automation Request) has been written to replace the existing Remote Job Entry Terminal Equipment with current state of the art equipment. The request is approximately halfway through its cycle and if approved, delivery should be in approximately 12-18 months.

Work continues on selection of the Phase IV Computer to replace the U1050 and B3500 computers presently in use. Our host computer site at Moody AFB is presently enlarging their computer room to house the new equipment. Delivery is expected in September 1983.

### Vehicle Operations and Maintenance

The Vehicle Maintenance section performed both scheduled and unscheduled maintenance on 168.7 assigned vehicle equivalents. The Vehicle Out-of-Commission (VOC) rate, which is a total of Vehicle Deadlined for Maintenance (VDM) and Vehicle Deadlined for Parts (VDP), rated a mean of under 3%, well below the Air Force standard of 10%. The total registered fleet average cost per unit was \$151.00 per month, with an average administrative fleet cost of 35 cents per mile. Vehicle Operations administered 63 vehicle operator tests with a passing rate of 90%. Vehicle ground fuel consumption was well below the established zero growth standards with a total reduced usage of 7.8%.

### Medical Services

The mission of the 125th USAF Clinic remains unchanged, i.e., physical examinations and limited medical and dental care. The following workload was generated providing these services:

The unit was reassigned from Moody AFB, Georgia, to Tyndall AFB, Florida, for advisory assistance, although Moody AFB remains the medical materiel support base. Six officers and 16 airmen had a productive and rewarding experience while performing annual training at the USAF Hospital Tyndall AFB, Florida.

Personnel from the clinic participated in a combined community project "Health Fair '81" at which approximately 178 citizens took advantage of the free general health screen. Clinic personnel responded to urgent calls for manning assistance from the Air Reserve Personnel Center for a total of 64 mandays and to the NGB/SG for 14 mandays.

One Flight Surgeon was upgraded to Senior Flight Surgeon and one to Chief Flight Surgeon.

The unit was nominated for and received the Theodore J. Marrs Award as the outstanding ANG medical unit for 1981. It should be noted that this is the third consecutive year that either personnel or the unit have received NGB recognition. (1979 - Outstanding Nurse; 1980 - Outstanding Medical Technician)

#### Administration

Administrative management within the group and assigned units has remained stable during this period. Each office of record has been thoroughly surveyed toward proper documentation management procedures. Emphasis has been placed on publications, mail, reproduction, mobility and continued training of assigned personnel. A complete review of the copying and reproduction methods resulted in replacement of equipment into the major functional areas for better economy of operation. The unit underwent an Operational Readiness/Nuclear Surety Inspection by the Tactical Air Command in August 1981, and a Staff Assistance Visit by the 20th Air Division during June 1982. In both instances, administrative programs were found to be effectively managed resulting in no adverse comments. This functional area has continued to provide the support to insure the various operational plans are current and properly prepared.

### Training

Training received at the various Air Force technical and professional schools plays a vital part in the readiness status of the Florida Air National Guard. All non-prior service enlistees are required to attend basic military training and most are then sent on to the resident basic technical course for the career field in which they are assigned. In a small number of cases where no technical training is available in the member's career field, he/she is returned to this unit for a period of on-the-job training (OJT) in order to be initially qualified. Throughout the member's career with the Florida Air National Guard, various professional, advanced, special, lateral and/or refresher type courses are afforded. During the past year, personnel of this unit attended the following courses: Flying Training Courses - 9; Technical, Advanced, Lateral Training Courses, etc. - 56; Academy of Military Science - 2; Noncommissioned Officers Academy (long course 5½ weeks) - 2; Noncommissioned Officers Academy Course II - 3; ANG Leadership Course I - 8; and, ANG Leadership Course II - 2.

The unit's on-the-job training (OJT) program continued to progress at a very satisfactory rate during the past year. There are three specific requirements that an individual must satisfy for skill level upgrading through the OJT program. These requirements are career knowledge, job proficiency and job experience. Career knowledge is gained by the individual enrolling in and completing correspondence courses known as Career Development Courses (CDCs) and/or study references (i.e., regulations, manuals, etc.,). Job proficiency and job experience is satisfied when trainees satisfactorily perform duty in their Air Force specialty for the minimum time required. An average of 202 personnel were on some level of OJT during the period of this report. One hundred and eighty-five personnel were upgraded to the various levels of their specialty. None of these trainees were in excessive training time and only a minimal number entered overtime training status.

Several new pilots were processed into this unit upon separation from the Air Force or transfer from the AFRes or other ANG units. Four individuals were scheduled through the T-33A Interceptor Lead-In Course and also into the F-106 Interceptor Training Course at Tyndall AFB, Florida. Also, two recent UPT graduates were scheduled into the Interceptor training courses. Subsequent to graduation from the interceptor training, the National Guard Bureau authorized sixty days active duty training at home station to ensure these pilots were rated mission ready.

The majority of personnel of the Florida Air National Guard are scheduled for their annual training tour on a year-round basis at home station. Scheduling is handled in a practical and efficient manner with a limited number of Guardsmen on training at any one time. This results in excellent man-day utilization and a nearly one-on-one ratio of supervisor to worker situation for training purposes. Exceptions to those units or sections performing annual training at home station were:

- a. A number of aircrew personnel and support personnel were deployed to Tyndall AFB, Florida, for another COMBAT PIKE exercise for testing of the weapons system.
- b. A portion of the Fuels Section deployed to Nellis AFB, Nevada, to participate in OPERATION RED FLAG.
- c. One group of Firemen from the 125th Civil Engineering Flight deployed to Minot AFB, North Dakota, for annual training and the remainder deployed to Kelly AFB, Texas.
- d. The PRIME BEEF team from the 125th Civil Engineering Flight performed their annual training at Camp Perry, Ohio.
- e. Personnel from the 125th USAF Clinic deployed to Tyndall AFB, Florida, for their annual training.
- f. A number of personnel from the 125th Security Police Flight were sent to the Security Police Academy at Lackland AFB, Texas, for training in tactics and air base ground defense.

An Air University Command and Staff Seminar program was organized at the ANG Base for thirteen (13) unit officers. The Seminar Instructor from Maxwell AFB, Alabama, periodically visits the seminar meetings to ensure the class program is on schedule and to instruct at least one class each quarter. Normally, a seminar program is completed within one year after organization, however, the Air University will allow the reserve unit programs to be extended beyond the one year limitation.

Several years ago, Congress authorized the Air Force to establish the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) for enlisted members. CCAF has been granted full accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. The concept of CCAF is to consolidate all the individual's military technical training, military job experiences, etc., into equivalent college credit. Air National Guard personnel are authorized to participate in this program and may earn an Associate in Applied Science (AAS) degree in their military specialty. Popularity of this program has continued to grow with one hundred twenty-three (123) Florida Air National Guard members currently enrolled in a program. Thirteen members have received their AAS degree to date through this program.

### **ADVISORS**

#### ARMY

The mission of the office of the Senior Army Advisor is to provide advice and assistance to the units of the Florida Army National Guard in all aspects of mobilization, training, administration, supply and maintenance in order to assist the National Guard in accomplishing its mission. The Senior Army Advisor, Colonel Jackie E. Schmidt, is the liaison officer between the Adjutant General and the Commander, U.S. Army Readiness and Mobilization Region IV, First U.S. Army.

The office of the Senior Army Advisor is located with Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs, St. Augustine. Four additional advisory detachments are collocated with the following major headquarters: 53rd Infantry Brigade (Separate) in Tampa; 227th Field Artillery Brigade in Miami; 53rd Signal Group in Tallahassee; and the Army Aviation Support Facility Command in Jacksonville. A change in the Table of Distributions and Allowances (TDA) during the reporting period eliminated the advisor positions at the Army Aviation Support Facility Command. However, the advisor detachment will remain on duty until the assigned personnel are transferred through normal rotation. Moreover, the TDA authorized an advisor detachment for the 50th Area Support Group, Jacksonville. Manning to support this advisor detachment will not occur during this reporting period. Authorized strength of the office of the Senior Army Advisor, including advisor detachments, remains at six officers, five noncommissioned officers and one civilian. Technical assistance and training support are provided by the U.S. Army Readiness Group at Patrick Air Force Base. Readiness Group Patrick supports both Army National Guard and Army Reserve units in Florida and is staffed with 29 officers, one warrant officer, 30 enlisted and 7 civilians.

#### AIR

The mission of the Air Force Advisor is to advise and assist the Air National Guard in achieving and maintaining the highest possible state of combat readiness.

The Senior Air Force Advisor, LTC Richard E. Henderson, is the liaison officer between the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Commander and the 20th NORAD/ADTAC Region Director of Operations at Fort Lee Air Force Station, Virginia.

The Tactical Air Command is the gaining organization of the Florida Air National Guard.

The Air Force Advisor's office is located at the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Headquarters, Jacksonville International Airport, Jacksonville, Florida.

# NATIONAL GUARD OFFICERS ASSOCIATION OF FLORIDA

The National Guard Officers Association of Florida has been in existence since 1902. It consists of all officers and warrant officers of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. The organization is run on a democratic basis, with the officers elected by the membership. Committee meetings are held periodically during the year, and a general conference is convened annually at some location within the State. The annual conferences consist of business sessions during the day with the social functions in the evening.






