

DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS

INTRODUCTION

The State of Florida Department of Military Affairs, is a State Agency, created by Chapter 250, Florida Statutes and composed of the military force provided for in the laws of the State of Florida. The Florida National Guard is provided for by Section 2, Article X of the Constitution and Chapter 250.08 of the Florida Statutes. The National Guard of the United States is provided for by Title 32, U.S. Code.

The Governor is Commander in Chief of the Florida National Guard. The Adjutant General is Chief of the Department of Military Affairs and Commanding General of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. There is an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Adjutant General for Air, and a Directorate staff organization in the Headquarters, (Appendix I, Organization Chart).

The troop structure of the Florida National Guard is composed of the Florida Army National Guard and Florida Air National Guard. The Army National Guard consists of the State Headquarters (State Area Command) with its attached support type units; an Infantry Brigade (Separate); and nondivisional units grouped under a Troop Command Headquarters, FLARNG, and an Army Aviation Support Facility, (Appendix III, Organization - Florida Army National Guard). The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters Florida Air National Guard; the 125th Fighter Group, (Appendix IV, Organization - Florida Air National Guard).

MISSION

As provided for under the provisions of the National Defense Act, units of the Florida National Guard, both Army and Air, have a dual mission.

(1) A State mission, to provide military organizations trained and equipped to function when necessary in the protection of life and property, and in the preservation of peace, order and the public safety, as directed by competent State Authority; and,

(2) A Federal mission, as Reserve Components of the Army and Air Force of the United States, to provide trained and qualified individuals available for Federal Service in time of war or national emergency, or at such other times as the national security may require augmentation of the United States Armed Forces.

The Florida Air National Guard, in addition to their State and Federal mission, has an air sovereignty mission for the eastern seaboard of the United States. Mission involves the maintenance of F-106 fighters and crew on a twenty-four hour alert status, armed and ready for immediate commitment to intercept unidentified aircraft in or approaching the airspace of the United States.

The State Adjutant General and his Headquarters has an additional Federal mission to direct and coordinate the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force) made available within the State, to support civil authorities engaged in providing for survival of people and continuity of government in a nuclear environment.

SUMMARY

A total of twenty-four Army National Guard units were reorganized. These units were reorganized as a result of the Department of Army implementing minor changes to equipment and personnel.

In addition to the reorganized units, an Army National Guard unit was organized as a result of the Total Army Analysis (TAA). A detailed discussion of these actions may be found in the paragraph titled ORGANIZATION.

Annual Training of Army National Guard units was directed toward their CAPSTONE (Wartime Gaining Command) missions. In order to accomplish this ambitious, but essential training program, units were required to train at the following locations in order to join senior and subordinate CAPSTONE units from throughout the United States:

Camp Shelby, Mississippi; Forts Stewart and Benning, Georgia; Fort Bliss and Red River Army Depot, Texas; Fort McClellan, Alabama; Fort Bragg, North Carolina; Tobyhanna Army Depot, Pennsylvania; Camp Roberts, California; Forts Pickett and A.P. Hill, Virginia; Key West and Eglin Air Force Base, Florida; Panama; Fort Drum, New York; Gagetown, Canada, in addition to Camp Blanding, Florida.

In addition, Florida sent seven unit cells to Europe and numerous cells to Korea for in-country orientation and planning tours with their CAPSTONE headquarters. All units, evaluated during Annual Training, met the training requirements and standards prescribed by FORSCOM and First U.S. Army.

During fiscal year 1984, the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 35 personnel. As of 30 June 1984, Florida's strength of 9,962 assigned personnel reflects a fill of 94.6%, ranking Florida number 35 of all states in percentage of assigned strength as compared to authorized strength. During the coming year, it is expected that Florida will grow both in additional authorized units and assigned personnel.

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group continues to maintain its high level of combat readiness. This statement has been documented several times during the past year by USAF Inspection Teams. The Group is presently maintaining a personnel strength level of 93%.

ORGANIZATION

The Troop structure of the Florida Army National Guard remained virtually unchanged. However, the organization of the Health Service Liaison Detachment, 213th Medical Brigade, St. Augustine and the relocation of the 107th Public Affairs Detachment from St. Augustine to Camp Blanding were of marked importance. Other units experienced minor changes in equipment, Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) and personnel. These changes were brought about by the Department of Army Vertical Army Authorization Document System.

EMPLOYEES

There are 1,444 individuals, civilian and military, employed by or assigned to the Department of Military Affairs. These employees work either directly with the Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs or with National Guard units in the field, supporting approximately 10,500 Florida National Guard personnel. (Appendix II, Employee Allocation, Department of Military Affairs). There are 182 Career Service personnel of the State of Florida, employed under the State Personnel Rules and Regulations, 1,262 Federal technicians, authorized for employment under the rules and regulations of the U.S. Civil Service Commission by Public Law 90-486, and 12 active duty personnel assigned as Army and Air Force Advisors to the Florida National Guard. These employees specialize in the field of administration, finance, accounting, supply and maintenance. With the exception of a limited number of employees, personnel are required to be military members of the various organizations and units to which assigned. (Fiscal Data, Appendices VII and VIII).

ARMORY BOARD, STATE OF FLORIDA

The Armory Board, State of Florida, established as provided by Section 250.40, Florida Statutes, and comprised of the Governor, the Adjutant General, the State Quartermaster, the General Officers of the Line, Group Commanders, and the Senior Air Commander of the active Florida National Guard, provides general supervision and control of real properties utilized by the Florida National Guard. The Armory Board is responsible for and controls forest management, mineral removal, game and fish propagation programs and the maintenance and improvement of the former Federal lands at Camp Blanding, with the approval of the U.S. Government. (A detail of the organization of the Armory Board is shown in Appendix V).

FACILITIES

State Arsenal

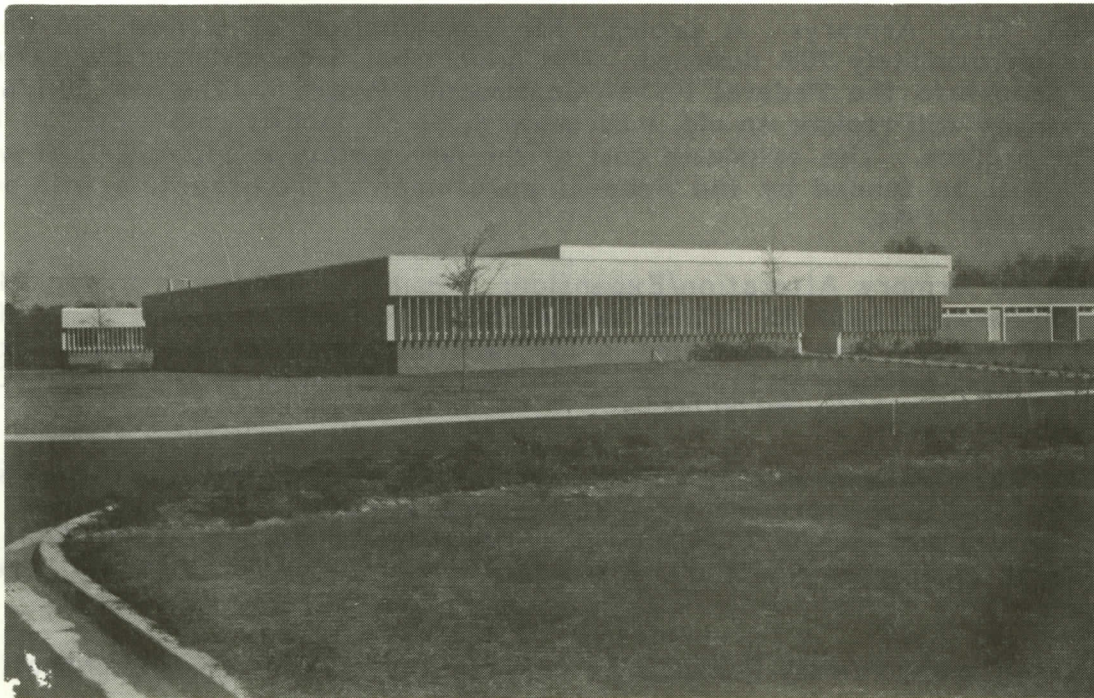
The State Arsenal is one of the oldest and most historic buildings in St. Augustine. It houses Headquarters for the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard. This four hundred year old facility was formerly the site of a Franciscan Monastery constructed in 1588. It was converted to a military barracks by the British in 1763; from 1783 to 1821 it was a Spanish garrison; and from 1821 to 1900, it served as a U.S. Army Post. In 1907, the Headquarters of the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard was established here. Normal repairs and maintenance are performed in such a manner as to preserve the historic features of the facilities; insofar as is feasible.

When the main building was gutted by fire in December 1915, the original walls were unharmed and the building lay in dismal ruin until 1921, when Congress passed an act donating St. Francis Barracks to the State of Florida for military purposes. The State Legislature appropriated funds to restore the building, modeling it after the lines of the former structure. For four centuries, St. Francis Barracks (State Arsenal) has been a religious and military outpost.

Armories/Construction

There are fifty-five (55) National Guard armory installations, strategically located throughout the State, from Pensacola on the west, to Jacksonville on the northeast, to Fort Myers and Homestead on the south. (Locations and valuations are reflected in Appendix VI).

During FY 83-84 the major roof replacement program which started in FY 81-82 was continued with an appropriation of \$1,023,700. Currently, the roofs of twenty-six (26) Florida National Guard armory facilities have been completed or are under design/construction. Fourteen (14) facilities are programmed for roof repairs/replacement in FY 84-85.

300-Person Armory and Post Headquarters Building - Camp Blanding: Construction of this facility, which began in October 1982, is scheduled for completion in July 1984. This facility, which houses seven (7) units/detachments, and the Post Headquarters operation, consists of 35,441 SF at a cost of \$1,747,101. Included in this project was the renovation of the World War II era Post Hospital fountain, still in its original location, which is now the main entrance to this facility. Currently plans are being developed to provide this facility with a modern conference/briefing room, utilizing the most up-to-date audio/visual communications equipment available.

150-Person Armory - Ocala: Construction of this project is approximately 85% complete. This facility is designed to house two (2) National Guard units and will consist of approximately 22,000 SF. The estimated cost is \$1,400,000 with completion scheduled for November 1984.

Armed Forces Reserve Center - Daytona Beach: This facility (formerly a Naval Reserve Training Center), was licensed to the Armory Board, State of Florida, by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers effective 1 January 1983. The facility is shared with the U.S. Army Reserve with the Florida Army National Guard serving as the "host" activity. Operation and financial responsibility is controlled by a "joint use agreement." The Center is a 23,980 SF masonry building situated on four (4) acres of land. A project for modification and expansion is programmed for FY 84/85 and is currently under design.

Ellyson Field Armory - Pensacola: In October 1982, the Armory Board, State of Florida, leased this facility from the Escambia Development Commission for use as a second National Guard Armory in the Pensacola area. The building is a two-story masonry structure of 8,900 SF situated on 3.21 acres of land. It was constructed in 1941 and served as the Operations Building for Ellyson Air Field (Navy) until the base was closed in 1979. A project of minor alterations and repair is underway and the facility is partially occupied and in use by Pensacola National Guard units. The Escambia Development Commission has agreed to make an additional fifteen (15) acres of land available for future National Guard Armory/OMS construction.

Plant City Armory: A project for construction of a new 200-Person Armory is approximately 90% designed. This project has been advanced by National Guard Bureau into the Federal FY 84 Construction Program. The new 30,126 SF, two-unit armory will replace an old, inadequate 6,546 SF facility constructed in 1930 as a WPA project. The estimated cost of the new facility is \$1,872,000, of which \$1,254,000 will be funded by the Federal government. Construction will begin around 1 October 1984.

Orlando Armory Alteration/Expansion: Design is underway to expand the existing 100-Person, 15,337 SF Orlando armory to a 200-Person 30,848 SF facility. The present armory was constructed in 1958 and is suitable for the planned expansion. Initial cost estimate is \$1,050,000 with Federal funding of \$741,000. Construction is anticipated for FY 84/85.

Lake Wales Armory Alteration/Expansion: A project to expand the existing 100-Person Lake Wales armory to a 200-Person armory is 75% designed. The expanded facility will include 25,048 SF at a total cost of approximately \$681,000 with Federal funding of \$460,000. A bid date around 1 October 1984 will be established.

Forest Capital Armory Renovations - Perry: During 1982 the Department of

Military Affairs leased the former Forest Capital Hall from the Taylor County Board of County Commissioners for use as a National Guard armory. The facility is in a good location and with the minor repairs/renovations included in this project will make an ideal National Guard armory. The estimated cost of the renovations is \$50,000. Design is approximately 95% complete.

Non-Armory Construction

Army Aviation Support Facility Expansion - Jacksonville: Construction of this project, which began in November 1982, is approximately 99% complete. This project includes doubling the size of the existing hangar, a new operations building, aircraft fuel storage, fuel dispensing facility, additional runways and aircraft parking aprons. Cost of this project is approximately \$1,900,000 with 99% Federal funding support.

Helicopter Landing Lane - Camp Blanding This project is for construction of a specially designed and remotely located 75' X 2,000' concrete Helicopter Landing Strip at Camp Blanding. The facility will be used for training helicopter pilots and crews in night vision and night auto-rotation landings. Design of this project is approximately 85% complete. Construction is scheduled to begin around 1 October 1984 and is estimated to cost \$700,000

Range Construction - Camp Blanding: Three (3) projects for construction of new firing ranges at Camp Blanding are presently 75% designed. These ranges will be of the most modern design and constructed to meet the latest requirements in weapons qualification of the Army. Radio control of pop-up and moving targets will be a feature of all three (3) new ranges. The new ranges will be: Combat Pistol Range, Record Fire Range for M-16 Rifle, and a Crew Combat Firing Course for Crew Served Vehicular Mounted Weapons. The three (3) ranges will cost approximately \$1,000,000.

Ammunition Storage Area - Camp Blanding: A project for security and safety improvements of the Camp Blanding Ammunition Storage Area has been under development for several years. This project is quite detailed and has progressed slowly because of required coordination between National Guard Bureau, Department of the Army and the Department of Defense Explosive Safety Board. Design and necessary approvals are now approximately 90% complete and it is expected that construction will begin early in 1985. Security lighting, lightning protection, intrusion detection systems, igloo ventilation, earthwork and road repaving will be included in the project.

Potable Water Supply System - Camp Blanding: This system has been in existence since the late 1930s and furnishes a sufficient supply of good quality water, however, the chlorination equipment installed during World War II has been inoperative for many years and is totally obsolete. This Department has been advised by the State of Florida, Department of Environmental Regulation that the water must be chlorinated in order to comply with Federal and State regulations. This project calls for construction of chlorination facilities and repair, renovation and replacement of existing wells, pumps, valves, electrical and emergency engine systems. Design is 90% complete and it is estimated that construction will commence around February 1985.

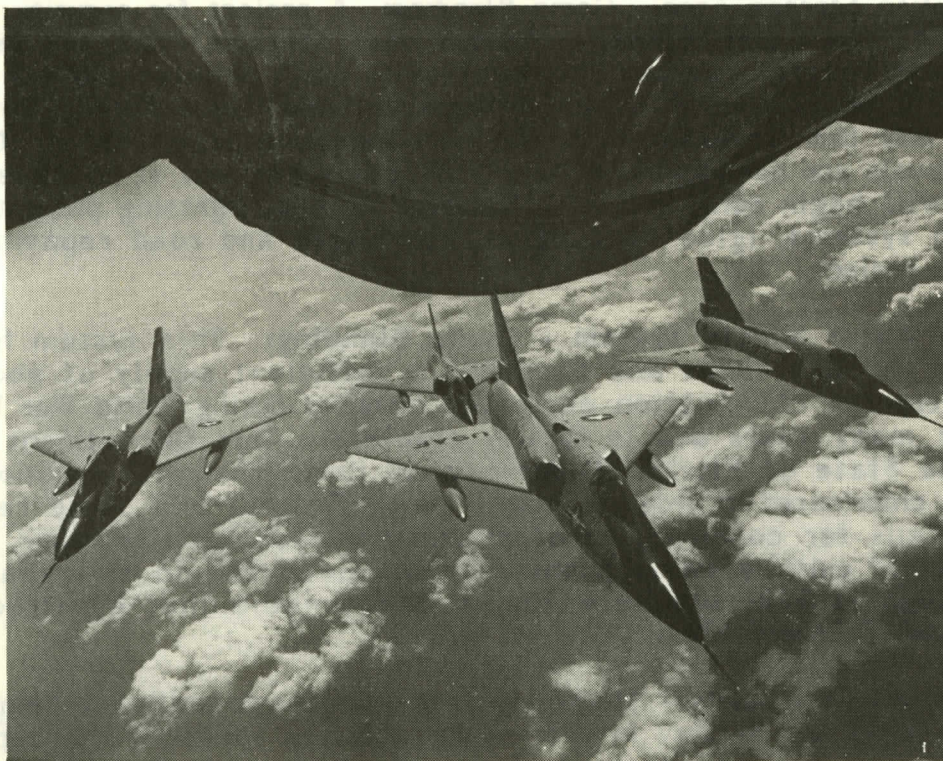
DAS 3/Class IX Facility - Starke: A new permanent facility is being designed to replace the temporary facility in use. This activity supports the repair parts requirements of all non-brigade units of the Florida Army National Guard. It will

be located on State owned property adjacent to the Starke armory and will be constructed with 100% Federal funds. Design is 50% complete.

United States Property and Fiscal Office - St. Augustine: This new facility, constructed with 95% Federal funds is now 99% complete. It has passed "substantial completion" inspection and is now occupied and in use by the USPFO section of the Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs. It is located near the Arsenal Complex in St. Augustine and consists of approximately 12,406 SF. The facility was constructed to relieve severe overcrowding at this Department's State Headquarters.

In addition to the above major projects, fencing, paving, repair and renovation projects were accomplished at numerous armories and non-armory facilities throughout the State.

The Florida Air National Guard Base, located at the Jacksonville International Airport, is the home of the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group. The 158-acre complex consists of 27 buildings arranged in an efficient campus setting. The buildings contain 221,155 square feet of floor space and over 133,235 square yards of pavement for a gross asset value of more than 7.6 million dollars. The real property actions to add on additional 170+ acres for a Munitions Maintenance Facility are nearing completion. During FY 1984 over 1.5 million dollars were expended for the operation, maintenance, repairs, and new construction at this installation. Major construction and repair projects performed during the past year include; repairs to 24,000 square foot hangar roof and a 3,000 square foot expansion of the dining facility. There are also projects on the drawing boards for over 12 million dollars of construction to be accomplished in FY 85, 86 and 87. The Base also has an independent water supply, vehicle parking area, a 78,201 square foot aircraft maintenance hangar, a base operations building, consolidated maintenance facility, a newly expanded 400-person dining hall and a medical clinic. The facilities were designed to incorporate functional management for nearly any mission.

CAMP BLANDING

General

The Armory Board maintains the Florida National Guard's 70,380 acre campsite located in Clay County. Included in this area are 40,000 acres, representing former Federal lands, deeded to the Armory Board by the Federal Government through Public Law 493, with stipulations that all the lands be maintained as a military reservation and that a Forest Management Program be conducted. The Armory Board realizes revenue from the forestry program and, also, from mineral removal occurring on these former Federal lands, all of which is utilized to defray operating expenses.

Utilization

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is used extensively by the units of the Florida National Guard and by Active and Reserve Component branches of the military service. Additionally, training facilities on the reservation are used on a regular basis by various Federal, State, County, and local government agencies. Several civilian organizations, such as the Florida High Power Rifle Association, utilize the various facilities available at the Camp Blanding Military Reservation throughout the year.

A total of 218,275 mandays were used for training at the installation during the fiscal year. The Florida Army National Guard compiled 131,665 mandays of training while other states' National Guard compiled 41,111. Elements of the Reserve Components utilized 23,171 mandays, Air National Guard units used 5,253 and the Active Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force totaled 12,580 mandays at the installation. Various other government agencies and civilian organizations had 4,495 mandays of training.

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is noted for its ranges, training facilities and dedicated support capability. Military training is the top priority for the installation and the using organization has many training facilities to select from. Fifty-five live fire ranges are now available at the installation which can support all weapon systems organic to a separate infantry brigade. Twenty-two Infantry Tactical Live Fire Movement Ranges are operational to facilitate realistic small unit training. Additionally, the largest caliber artillery weapons can fire at Camp Blanding with fifty-four surveyed artillery firing positions available. An Aerial Gunnery Range, for rotary winged gunships, and an Air Defense Artillery Range, for tracked and towed weapon systems, are unique to the southeastern United States and draw these specific units to the installation.

Camp Blanding is the home of the Florida National Guard Military Academy, consisting of the Officer Candidate School, the basic source of newly commissioned second lieutenants required for filling junior officer vacancies and the Non-Commissioned Officer Academy which provides advanced leadership training for non-commissioned officers of the Florida Army National Guard. The camp is the home training site of the Special Forces elements of the Florida Army National Guard, with its fine jungle type training areas, drop zone and rappelling tower facility. The Camp Blanding Army Airfield is located on the installation and can support C-7A Caribou-class aircraft.

Warehouse storage facilities continue to be occupied by the Directorate of Supply and Services (USPFO) for receipt, storage and issue of Federal property and

supplies, which are utilized by the units of the Florida National Guard. The Florida National Guard Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS) continued to perform its important mission of maintenance of Federal equipment in support of units throughout the State. The Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES) facility, adjacent to the CSMS, maintains vehicles and weapons used by units in training at Camp Blanding. Equipment consists of self-propelled, tracked, twin 40MM guns, various types of engineer heavy equipment, infantry recoilless rifles, mortars and wheeled vehicles.

The regular establishment, Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps, as well as elements of their respective reserve forces, continue to utilize training areas and small arms ranges at Camp Blanding as part of their yearly programs.

The U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Fleet Air, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, continues to maintain its leased portion of the Reservation which they and the Air Force utilize for the training of pilots, to include carrier based personnel, in air-to-ground bombing and strafing and for the operation of their Radar Scoring Station.

Game Management

The agreement between the Armory Board and the Department of Natural Resources, whereby portions of Camp Blanding are opened to controlled public hunting and fishing, remains in effect. Controlled burning and grain planting has been most favorable in the production of game. Lake samplings indicated that fish stocked in certain lakes have done well in most instances.

Forest Management

The Armory Board continues to conduct a Forest Management Program at Camp Blanding. During the year, normal road maintenance throughout the Reservation was accomplished and additionally, new roads, with drainage structures, were constructed. Harvesting and replanting of timber continues in a balanced program under the supervision of a professional forester.

Mining Operations

E. I. duPont deNemours and Company continues to mine in a restricted area on the western edge of Camp Blanding, Ilmenite being the principle mineral removed from the soil. DuPont, at their own expense, as an ecological project, has instituted a procedure whereby the topsoil is stripped and stockpiled, prior to the mining operation. After mining, this topsoil is redistributed, on the subsequent spoil area, thereby successfully stabilizing the spoil and improving the return of vegetation. Pine trees are now flourishing on this area.

STATE FUNDS

Appropriated Funds

Disbursement of General Revenue Funds are based on appropriations made by the Florida State Legislature and are reflected in Appendix VII.

Armory Board Trust Fund

This fund is utilized primarily as a revolving fund from which expenditures related to Intrusion Detection Systems supervision and inspections of Air National

Guard Base security costs are reimbursed with Federal Funds by the Army and Air Service Contracts.

Camp Blanding Management Trust Fund

This fund consists of revenues realized at Camp Blanding, principally from the sale of timber products and royalties received from the mining operation, and by law, is expended exclusively for the operation and maintenance of Camp Blanding.

Community Funds

Florida law provides that counties and municipalities may provide financial or material support to the National Guard. A portion of the Military Code (250.40(6), Florida Statutes) dealing with this subject is quoted below and Appendix X details that support received during fiscal year 1983-84.

Armory Board; Armories, How obtained -

In order to provide for the cooperative support of the National Guard, and that armories may be provided which will furnish suitable training facilities and adequate storage accommodations for all arms, equipment and other military property, the armory board shall have authority to receive from counties, municipalities and other sources, donations of land and contributions of money to aid in providing, improving and maintaining an arsenal, armories, camp site, target ranges, and other facilities, throughout the State, and any property so donated, shall be held as other property for the use of the State and such counties and municipalities are hereby authorized and empowered to make such donations of lands by deed or long term leases and contributions of moneys for the purposes herein set forth, and to issue bonds or certificates of indebtedness to provide funds for such purposes.

The Armory Board reemphasized its policy, during the year, that National Guard armories be utilized by the citizenry of the community, to the fullest extent possible, where such use is not to the detriment of public interest and does not interfere with the primary use of armories for the housing and training of military units stationed therein.

Service Agreements

The Federal Government and the Armory Board have cost-sharing contracts for the maintenance and operation of the physical plant of certain facilities of the Florida National Guard. The Army Service Funding Agreement, which supports the Arsenal Annex, portions of Camp Blanding, the Army Aviation Maintenance Shop and thirteen (13) Organizational Maintenance Shops, provides for a Federal share of 75% and Armory Board share of 25%. The Air Operation and Maintenance Agreement, which supports the Air National Guard Base at Jacksonville, provides for a Federal share of 80% and Armory Board share of 20%. The Air National Guard Security Agreement, annual training and weekend training activities of the Florida National Guard are 100% Federally funded.

Budgets

A recapitulation of budgeted State funds for the previous, current and next fiscal years is displayed in Appendix VII.

DATA PROCESSING

The Department of Military Affairs utilizes electronic data processing, to aid in the accomplishment of its mission for the State of Florida. This fiscal year has seen an upgrade from the IBM System/34 to an IBM System/36. Due to the creation of the Information Resource Commission by the 1982-83 Legislature, the scope of work assigned to this system has been broadened considerably. A five-year growth plan has been established. Expanded programs are also being developed for the benefit of the Military Personnel Division and our two (2) major commands.

The Data Processing Center Activity of the United States Property and Fiscal Office for Florida is the servicing facility for all Federal Automated data programs required by the Florida Army National Guard. These programs consist of accounting functions for Federal activities of logistics, financial accounting, military pay (JUMPS), and civilian technician payrolls. This Center also maintains data and prepares reports for Military Personnel Directorate; Plans, Operations, Training and Military Support Directorate; Support Personnel Management Office; Recruiting and Retention Office; Equal Employment Officer and Maintenance Directorate.

The Burroughs 1955 Computer has brought the Army National Guard up-to-date in computer hardware. This system is disk oriented and enables this Center to service activities of the Florida Army National Guard with programs that are more responsive to their needs and provide Commanders with timely and concise information for improved control and utilization of Federal funds and equipment.

ADMINISTRATION

Administrative and staff services were provided to the Headquarters and the units of the Florida National Guard. These services included public affairs, records administration, mail management, distribution of Department of the Army publications, reproductions, awards and trophies, and communications.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

The Department's Archives and Records Administration Program ensures uniform procedures governing maintenance and disposition of records and the preserving of historical documents. Permanent records are microfilmed to reduce storage space.

COMMUNICATIONS

This Headquarters maintains a reliable communication system using the following means:

SUNCOM. A dedicated State of Florida long distance telephone network for governmental agencies which provides a nationwide direct dialing capability.

Commercial Telephone. The solid state, highly versatile touch tone telephone system installed throughout the State Arsenal complex by Western Electric and Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, with its many automatic features has materially improved communications efficiency within the Headquarters. This system also has a radio telephone patch capability that expands this versatility Statewide. The equipment and installation costs were supported jointly by Federal and State funds and will result in a 30% savings on monthly recurring costs.

Defense Communications Automatic Voice Switching Network (AUTOVON). A military worldwide general purpose dialing system providing the capability of immediate communication with other military installations.

The Telecommunications Center has been upgraded to a Standard Remote Terminal (SRT) which gives the Department of Military Affairs the ability to transmit and receive narrative and data traffic from world-wide subscribers. This capability can now be in a secure mode.

Facsimile Communications. Facsimile is a telecommunications system for the transmission of fixed images with a view to their reception in recorded form; these images include typewritten and handwritten documents, fingerprint records, maps, charts, operation overlays, sketches, and photographs. Facsimile communications are provided for the Florida Army National Guard by a "Burroughs DEX 4100" located in the Telecommunications Center at the United States Property and Fiscal Office, and a 3M located in the POT&MS Directorate.

National Weather Service Teletype. A teletype network providing the capability to receive written messages on all weather conditions (Severe, Hurricane Advisories) and local weather conditions throughout the State of Florida.

National Warning System (NAWAS). A voice circuit emanating from North American Air Defense Command (NORAD), Colorado Springs, Colorado, the objective of which is to establish, operate and maintain an effective nationwide warning system to alert governments and the public to the threat of extraordinary dangers. This system can also be used within the State for emergency operations and consists of over one hundred (100) extensions including the Governor's office, Division of Emergency Management, local civil preparedness agencies, police, sheriffs and weather stations.

Command State Emergency Radio Net (COMSERN). A Florida National Guard radio net providing radio communication with Florida National Guard Task Force Headquarters strategically located throughout the State.

Commercial FM. A commercial FM (line-of-sight) system consisting of two (2) base stations and nineteen (19) handi-talkie radios. This system is used during emergencies for direct communications between the Adjutant General and key staff officers assigned as liaison to civil authorities and/or coordinating National Guard assistance throughout the emergency area.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

An illustrated narrative briefing of the Florida National Guard is used throughout the State to further the understanding of civic organizations, civil authorities and other groups, of the organization, responsibilities and mission of the Department of Military Affairs.

Participation in and support of various community events provides an excellent method of displaying the various military equipment the Florida National Guard is equipped with. Participation ranges from "flyovers" by our Air National Guards F-106's to band concerts and parades by our own Florida Army National Guard Band.

The history of the State Arsenal and the Military Reservation dates back to the 16th century when it was the site of a Franciscan Monastery. In order to

preserve and record this unique history a museum and archives is maintained. The museum is aptly located in the former monastery cells and endeavors to tell the story of the Florida National Guard and the militia from territorial days to the present. Historical documents and artifact contributed by Guardsmen, former Guardsmen and citizens have resulted in a collection of many historical items that would have otherwise become lost to posterity.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

The role the National Guard plays to the State and Nation during times of disaster and emergencies, both natural and man made and the service rendered by the Guardsmen to the citizens during these devastating occurrences are well known, little, however is said of community oriented activities of a non-military nature performed by the Guard. The armory facilities of the Florida National Guard are available for community functions and are extensively utilized by other governmental agencies; State, County and City. It is through this type of governmental cooperation that full utilization of facilities is accomplished. The armories' facilities; classrooms, drill hall, indoor rifle ranges and parking area, etc., provide excellent accommodations for conducting various activities. The armories are also available to civic and fraternal organizations for their activities. In addition a ninety-acre (90) tract at Camp Blanding, "Camp Neyati", has been made available to the Gateway Girl Scout Council, Incorporated, for camping and other activities of youth groups. The Florida National Guard units are receptive to the needs of the local scout troops, assisting with major equipment needs such as water trailers at large camp outs.

DECORATIONS

The Florida Cross - Awarded in the name of the Governor to the officer, warrant officer, or enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard who distinguish themselves conspicuously by extraordinary heroism at the risk of his life, or by exceptionally outstanding meritorious service to the State or Federal government.

Army Achievement Medal, authorized by Department of the Army and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard, under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, except general officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel, who while serving in any capacity in a noncombat area after 1 August 1981, distinguishes himself by meritorious service or achievement of a lesser degree than required for award of the Army Commendation Medal.

Armed Forces Reserve Medal, authorized by Department of the Army, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who honorably and satisfactorily complete ten years service as a member of one or more of the Reserve Components of the Armed Forces of the United States. A ten-year device is authorized for each additional ten-year period.

Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, established by Department of the Army General Orders No. 30, 29 June 1971. This medal is awarded for four years of honest and faithful service in a troop program unit of the Army National Guard.

NCO Professional Development Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. Awarded to all officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel for successful completion of a NCO professional development course.

Army Service Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. This ribbon is awarded to officer personnel upon successful completion of their resident basic/orientation course. Enlisted personnel will be awarded this ribbon upon successful completion of their initial MOS producing course, or upon honorable completion of four months active service, whichever is applicable.

Overseas Service Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. Awarded to active members of the Florida National Guard for successful completion of an overseas tour. The Overseas Service Ribbon will not be awarded for overseas service recognized with another service medal.

Air Reserve Forces Meritorious Service Ribbon, authorized by Department of the Air Force, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to enlisted personnel of the Florida Air National Guard under the provisions of AFM 900-3. This medal is awarded for four years of exemplary behavior, efficiency and fidelity.

AWARDS

The Active State Service Ribbon - Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard who participate in a major tour of active state service in the aid of civil authorities.

The Florida Service Ribbon - Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who complete five years of service in the Florida National Guard. A bronze cluster is authorized upon completion of each additional five-year period.

The Florida National Guard Recruiting Ribbon - The Florida National Guard Recruiting Ribbon was established by Permanent Orders 53-2, 1977, and may be awarded to officers, warrant officers, and enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard (Army and Air) who excel in the field of recruiting by securing five enlistments or appointments in the Florida National Guard.

The Meritorious Service Ribbon (formerly the Attendance Ribbon) was established by General Orders No. 1, 1973, and may be awarded to any member of the Florida National Guard who shall distinguish himself by meritorious achievement or meritorious service or to individuals not members of the Florida National Guard for meritorious service of benefit to the Florida National Guard.

UNIT CITATION

The Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation - The Florida Governor's Meritorious Unit Citation was established by Permanent Orders 53-1, 1977, and will be awarded by the Adjutant General to all officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel that are members of the unit adjudged the winner of the Governor's Trophy. Once awarded the unit citation, it may be worn by individuals upon reassignment to other units of the Florida National Guard. Personnel becoming members of the unit after the date the unit is adjudged the winner of the Governor's Trophy are not authorized to wear the unit citation.

Selection for participation on this U.S. National Guard Shooting Team is an honor comparable to attaining All American status in other shooting sports.

The All Guard Team represents the National Guard at such competition as National Championship Matches, International Olympic Tryouts, and Interservice Matches, as well as numerous other matches at regional level.

The Florida National Guard was afforded the honor of having MSGT Stanley F. Ferreira, 125th Resource Management Squad, selected as a member of the All National Guard Pistol Team for 1984, who participated in these matches. The National Guard teams participating at this level of competition were awarded a major portion of all individual and team awards in competition.

All National Guard Machine Gun, Pistol and Rifle Matches

All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Matches are conducted annually by the National Guard Bureau to promote marksmanship and provide a significant year-end

goal of high level competition among the states. The first such match was conducted at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas in September 1973. These matches are held in honor of Major General Winston P. Wilson who accomplished so much for the marksmanship program of the National Guard during his tenure as Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

SERVICE RECORDS

The Department has custody of available records of the soldiers of Florida. These records include Muster Rolls of the Indian Wars of 1835, Muster Rolls of the Florida Militia and Florida National Guard since 1835, and Rolls of the Florida troops mustered into the Confederate Forces and Union Forces in the War Between the States (Civil War), the Spanish American War, the Mexican Border Incident, World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, and the Berlin Crises. A card record is maintained for each individual who entered World War I from the State of Florida, whether by enlistment, induction through Selective Service, or induction with the Florida National Guard. In addition, an individual file folder, containing copies of all pertinent orders and personnel documents, has been retained for each individual who has been a member of the Florida National Guard (Army and Air). The individual folders for current members are separated from the folders of former members and are maintained current at all times.

A project to convert all files of former members to microfiche was begun in August of 1979. The project will be accomplished by a civilian contractor in four phases. Phases I and II were completed in March of 1980. Phase III was begun in June of 1982 and it was planned for Phase IV to start immediately upon completion of Phase III. This was not accomplished due to funding cutback. Phase IV has now been funded and should be completed prior to the end of calendar year 1984. This should finalize the transition of all former members' files to microfiche. This project will have eliminated a critical records storage problem in the vault storage area and will also ensure positive record security inasmuch as duplicate rolls of film are forwarded for storage in the State Archives in Tallahassee, Florida. A microfiche camera and film/jacket inserter have been purchased to permit ongoing filming of files on members as they are separated from the Florida National Guard. This procedure eliminates any future build-up of paper files in the vault storage area.

Requests for Statements of Service and information are received continually on a day to day basis throughout the year and generally fall into two broad categories. The majority of requests in the first category are for documentary evidence to establish eligibility for some type of benefit such as Federal or State military retirement benefits; birth date and/or active Federal service for Social Security benefits; increased military longevity pay for former service; burial in a National Cemetery or government furnished grave marker; or hospitalization or other financial benefits through the Veterans Administration. The second category pertains to requests in the interest of genealogy or history and, for the most part, are applicable to records prior to 1900. The number of Statements of Service furnished during the period of this report was 371 of which 98 were for advance certification of completion of 20 years of active service which would entitle the individual to Federal retired pay for military service upon attaining age 60. This requirement was instituted to eliminate errors and misinformation which previously would not appear until individual reached age 60, at which time he would discover

that some of his service did not meet this criteria and it was too late to perform additional service to meet the requirements for Federal retired pay.

MILITARY SUPPORT TO CIVIL AUTHORITY

General

The Adjutant General has both State and Federal responsibilities in providing support to civil authorities. The State responsibility involves providing troops (National Guard) to assist civil authorities in major emergencies when authorized by the Governor. On the Federal side the Adjutant General is responsible for the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force and their reserve components) to support civil defense (civil authority) within the State of Florida in event of a nuclear attack against this nation.

Planning and Coordination

The responsibility for planning, coordination and conduct of operations in support of civil authorities is centered in the Directorate of Plans, Operations, Training and Military Support. Liaison is maintained with law enforcement agencies and the Division of Emergency Management within the State and with Federal agencies and military commands as appropriate. National Guard troop units are organized into task forces to provide a rapid response to locations within a specific area in proximity to the unit's home station. Liaison is maintained with civil authorities in their area of responsibility by these task forces.

Operations

The Department of Military Affairs goes into an increased readiness status immediately upon threat of civil disturbance, natural disaster, or similar emergency that may require use of National Guard troops. Measures taken include a telephone alert of key personnel, contact with local authorities and appropriate State Agencies, and review of capabilities of troop units in the emergency area. As the situation develops to a more serious threat additional actions are taken to man the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), dispatch liaison officers to the area, alert troop units and send additional equipment and communications as deemed necessary.

Active State Duty

Under the provisions of Chapter 250, Florida Statutes, troops of the Florida National Guard were called to Active State Duty to assist civil authorities during Fiscal Year 1984 as follows:

24 - 25 January 1984 - St. Lucie Nuclear Power Plant

An exercise was conducted at the St. Lucie Nuclear Power Plant simulating a nuclear radiation release and the role the Florida National Guard would assume in the event of this type of disaster.

28 February - 5 March 1984 - Miami

A well published trial involving a Miami police officer that was involved in a shooting in the Overtown section of Miami was scheduled to commence 1 March 1984. Nineteen (19) officers and seven (7) enlisted personnel were activated to develop contingency plans to support Dade County/Miami civil authorities in the

event of a civil disturbance.

13 - 18 March 1984 - Miami

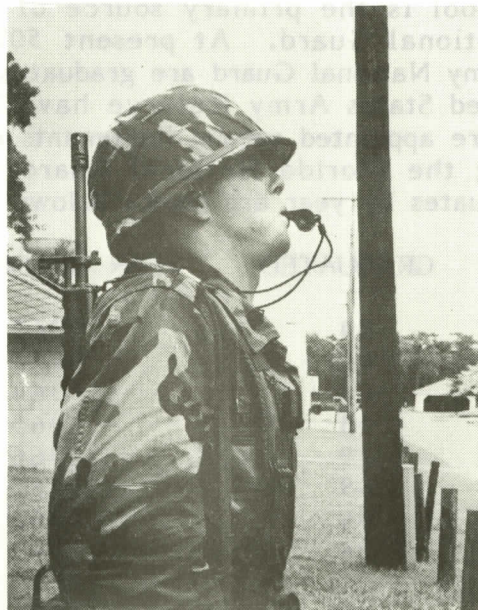

FLORIDA NATIONAL GUARD MILITARY ACADEMY (FNGMA)

On 1 September 1975 the Florida National Guard Officer Candidate School was reorganized and redesignated as Florida National Guard Military Academy and assigned the mission of conducting both an Officer Candidate School and Non-commissioned Officer School.

The Academy is operated by a twenty-eight person section consisting of eleven officers and seventeen enlisted personnel. During the Annual Training period, the section is augmented with additional instructor and support personnel, to a desired strength of forty officer/warrant officers and one hundred fifty enlisted personnel. The Academy is accredited by the Department of the Army and is evaluated yearly by representatives of the Commanding General, First United States

Army, to determine manner of performance. The Academy has received very high ratings on each evaluation and is considered one of the best in the nation.

Officer Candidate School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School was originally established in March 1961 by the Adjutant General of Florida. The mission of the school is to provide effective instruction requirements for appointment as second lieutenants, and to develop maximum leadership and command ability in the candidates.

Class No. 23, currently in progress, will complete their twelve months of training and will graduate and be commissioned 11 August 1984.

Class No. 24 began their training on 30 June 1984. They will continue into an Annual Training period, twelve (12) weekend training assemblies during the fall, winter and spring (Phase II), an additional fifteen (15) day Annual Training period in August 1985 (Phase III) and a minimum eight-week branch resident qualification course (Phase IV). Class No. 24 will graduate and be commissioned at completion of Phase III and attend Phase IV in an officer status within twelve months of commissioning. The program consists of a minimum of 576 hours.

The Program of Instruction taught is developed and monitored by the United States Army Infantry School Fort Benning, Georgia, in coordination with Chief, National Guard Bureau, and closely parallels the resident Infantry Officer Candidate School. All examinations are graded by the Infantry School. Methods of leadership development include rigid discipline, high standards of deportment and conduct, and exacting manner of performance, frequent and effective counseling and continuous observation, correction and evaluation. The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School is the primary source of junior officer procurement for the Florida Army National Guard. At present 50% of all company grade officers in the Florida Army National Guard are graduates of the school. In recent years personnel of the United States Army Reserve have been admitted to the school and upon graduation are appointed second lieutenants in that component. Numbers of candidates attending the Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School and graduates by year are shown below:

Noncommissioned Officer School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Noncommissioned Officer School was established 1 September 1975. The mission of the school is to develop leadership and professional military skills in selected personnel in grades E-4 through E-9 to qualify them as noncommissioned officers.

Three programs of instruction for noncommissioned officers are conducted. Basic Course for grades E-4 and E-5, consisting of 113 hours; Advanced Course for grades E-6, consisting of 66 hours; and a Senior Course for grades E-7, E-8 and E-9, consisting of 56 hours. Through 30 April 1984, nineteen classes have been conducted with graduates as shown below:

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY (EO), EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY (EEO), AND SOCIAL ACTIONS (SL)

The Florida National Guard has several Equal Opportunity Programs: Equal Opportunity Program (EO) for the Florida Army National Guard (ARNG) and Social Actions Program (SL) for Florida Air National Guard (ANG) military members. There is also an Equal Employment Opportunity Program for Federal employees and one for State of Florida Military Department career service employees. Each of these programs received continued emphasis during the year. Emphasis in the military

program continues to be on upward mobility for enlisted personnel and increasing the number of minority officers in both the Army and Air National Guard. Equal Employment Opportunity Program emphasis continues to be in the area of recruitment of minorities for fulltime support positions and upward mobility to higher graded positions where minorities and women continue to be underrepresented.

Current status in the various programs is as follows:

During this year, percentage of minorities increased by 2.5% and women remained the same in the ARNG while overall strength increased 35. In the ANG minority percentage increased by 5.6% and women increased by 6.2%. The ANG increased by 59 individuals this fiscal year.

There are six MTOE/MTDA EO sections authorized throughout the State in the ARNG. The ANG is authorized one Social Actions section. Twenty-one (21) of the twenty-four (24) personnel occupying EO and SL duty positions have received formal training in their assigned duties. This represents an increase of 1 individual authorized and 1 additional person having received formal training. Ninety-seven (97) trained Unit Discussion Leaders (UDL) are designated (additional duty) throughout the State in the ARNG for utilization at unit level. This constitutes an

increase of thirty-four (34) individuals who completed an eighty (80) hour UDL Course this year. In addition, there are twelve (12) individuals assigned as Battalion EO Officer (additional duty) in the ARNG; one SL Officer and one SL NCO designated as an additional duty in the ANG.

Six (6) EO complaints were received during the fiscal year with five (5) resolved at the informal level. One remains active at the informal level, and attempts at resolution continue. One complaint from the previous year that was forwarded to the National Guard Bureau when our attempts failed to accomplish resolution, remains at that level.

Full-Time Support Personnel EEO Program

Full-time support personnel are employed to provide support to the Florida National Guard. Representation attained in the various support categories is as follows:

The percentage of minority military technicians in the ARNG increased by 6.5%; and women technicians decreased by 2.2% during the fiscal year. In the ANG, minority technicians increased by 1.7% and women technicians decreased by 1.9% during the fiscal year. The total number of military technicians decreased by eighty-four (84) in the ARNG and twenty-six (26) in the ANG.

Total Department of Military Affairs career service employees increased by twenty-six (26) during this reporting period, while minority employees decreased by 1.9%, and women employees decreased by 2.4%.

Twenty-one (21) EEO Counselors are appointed (additional duty) and trained in basic and advanced counseling techniques. These counselors work in both the Military Technician and State Career Service Employee EEO Program.

Two (2) EEO complaints were received during this reporting period. One (1) was resolved at the counselor level (informal). At this writing, the other remains active with counselor to attempt resolution.

The Reserve Officer Personnel Act (ROPA) continues to prescribe policy, guidance, and procedures for consideration, selection, and promotion of Army National Guard commissioned officers not otherwise selected for unit vacancy promotion.

During fiscal year 1984, 91 officers were considered for mandatory promotion by Department of Army Selection Boards with 71 being selected. This represents an overall selection rate of 78%. The statistical analysis of selection by grade is as follows:

A majority of the officers selected by the boards for mandatory promotion elect to decline promotion for the authorized period. This year, as in the past, some officers were discharged from the Florida National Guard and transferred to the non-unit, USAR for promotion because no unit position vacancy existed to allow them to be promoted within the Florida Army National Guard.

The Defense Officer Personnel Modernization Act (DOPMA) was passed into law effective 15 September 1981. Although DOPMA primarily affects active component officers, there are certain residual effects relative to creditable service and grade determination upon appointment for National Guard and Army Reserve officers. The Reserve Officer Personnel Modernization Act (ROPMA), which will present the Reserve Component aspects of DOPMA, is currently under study and review. When implemented, ROPMA will replace ROPA (1954).

FLORIDA ARMY NATIONAL GUARD OFFICER SELECTION BOARDS

State Selection Boards were established in Florida in 1963 as a positive method of implementing a career development program for officer personnel. The Boards convene as necessary to fill Major, Lieutenant Colonel, Colonel, and certain General Officer position vacancies. It is also charged with the responsibility of recommending to the Adjutant General, reassignment of battalion commanders, changes in field grade staff assignments, and acceptance of declination of ROPA promotions to Colonels.

The Senior Officer Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General and the two General Officer Commanders, met 5 times during fiscal year 1984 recommending promotion of 1 Colonel to Brigadier General, 4 Lieutenant Colonels to Colonel, reassignment of 1 Lieutenant Colonel, transfer of 1 Colonel, and 7 Lieutenant Colonels and acceptance of 6 declinations of promotion to Colonel under ROPA provisions.

The Field Grade Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General, General Officer Commanders, Commanders of 227th Field Artillery Brigade, 50th Area Support Group, 53rd Signal Group and 202nd Medical Group met 2 times during

this period. The Board recommended to the Adjutant General promotion of 8 Majors to Lieutenant Colonel, 15 Captains to Major, and reassignment and transfer of 22 Field Grade Officers.

SELECTIVE RETENTION

A Selective Retention Program was implemented by the National Guard on 1 July 1969. NGR 635-102 prescribes the procedures and policies for conduct of the Selective Retention Board. The Selective Retention Board, conducted during the first half of each calendar year considers officers and warrant officers with 20 or more qualifying years of service for retired pay. Originally, the regulation required individuals to be considered every year following completion of the 20 qualifying years of service. However, beginning with the Board in 1974, the regulation was changed to provide that the Board would be convened annually but individuals would be considered every other year instead of every year. This substantially reduced the number of individuals reviewed by the Board each year. Factors considered by the Board include demonstrated performance, physical fitness, civilian and military education, previous assignments, and potential for future staff and command assignments.

Since inception of the Selective Retention Board in July 1969, fifteen Boards have been held. Results of these boards since 1976 are as follows:

ENLISTED QUALITATIVE RETENTION BOARD

The Enlisted Qualitative Retention Board, as required by AR 135-205, previously convened during the period October-December each year. A recent change to the regulation will require all future boards to convene during the January-March time frame each year. The records of all enlisted personnel who have 20 qualifying years of service, without regard to Expiration of Term of Service or grade, are reviewed every two years except when the convening authority determines that an annual review is necessary.

The Board, composed of 3 Field Grade Officers and 2 Command Sergeants Major, recommends to the Adjutant General of Florida those individuals who have future potential benefits to the Army National Guard based on demonstrated performance as attested to by Efficiency Reports, a review of all Military Personnel Records, and physical fitness.

Since inception of the Qualitative Retention Board in June of 1974, ten Boards have been held. Results of these boards since 1975 are as follows:

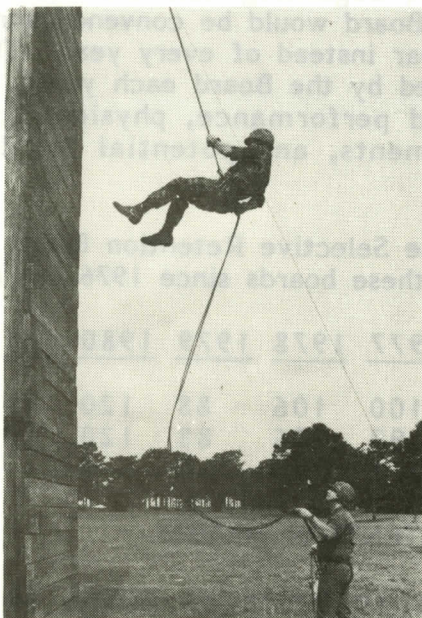

An appeal procedure was provided for by the regulation beginning with the

1976 Board. Of the 23 not recommended for retention by the 1983 Board, 6 appealed and 4 were sustained by The Adjutant General of Florida.

ARMY NATIONAL GUARD TRAINING

Training of the Florida Army National Guard is based on criteria prescribed by the Department of the Army, in coordination with the National Guard Bureau. The Commanding General, Second United States Army is charged with the responsibility of evaluation, coordination, support and supervision of prescribed training. Standards for training are established by Department of the Army and unit performance is evaluated on a continual basis by active Army personnel. There are three phases of training:

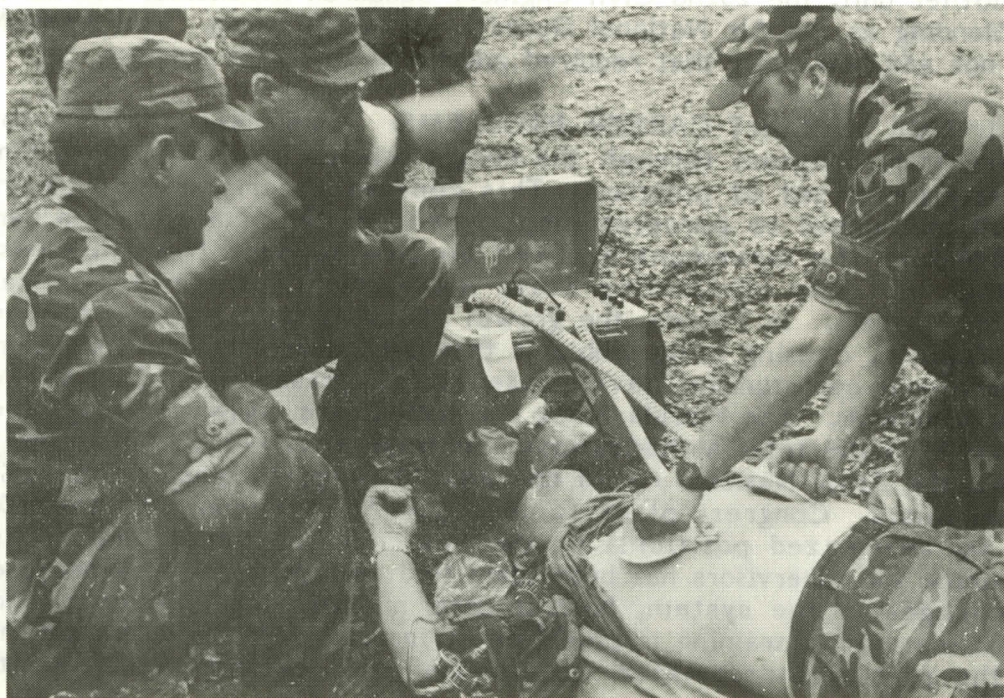
Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training for development of basic skills and techniques, culminating in the assignment of Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) to individuals commensurate with the type of training received and which denotes qualification to perform the duties of a particular job assignment.

Unit Training is conducted by units of the Florida Army National Guard. This training is designed to produce units qualified to perform assigned missions prescribed in applicable organizational authorization documents and to maintain the level of readiness required to support operational or contingency missions. Unit Training consists of the following: Formal unit training which prepares a unit to perform its mission as stated in applicable organizational authorization documents. Various levels of formal unit training are culminated by the administration of an Army Evaluation as soon after completion of the levels as possible. Formal unit training consists of training of skilled individuals designed to develop squads, crews, sections, detachments, platoons, or companies capable of successfully accomplishing the unit mission, conducted in a progressive manner, culminated at the level prescribed by the appropriate unit Army Training and Evaluation Program (ARTEP). Upon completion of the various levels of training, proficiency tests are administered to evaluate individual and unit performance. Upon successful completion of all levels of training, the unit should have demonstrated satisfactory standards of performance and be fully capable of undertaking combat operations.

Field exercises are conducted in the field under simulated combat conditions (in which personnel and equipment of one force are actually present, while those of the opposing force may be real or imaginary). Field exercises are training vehicles that may be squad through brigade in size. They are mission oriented and designed to prepare participating units for identifiable missions. Field exercises are conducted, as appropriate, during all levels of unit training.

The objective of Army National Guard training is to attain the highest levels of individual and unit proficiency that are achievable in a premobilization status. Individuals in the National Guard receive the training necessary to teach them basic military skills and the special skills required to perform effectively the duties of their assigned positions. Operational readiness is the primary requirement of the individual and units of the National Guard. Units and individuals must be ready to mobilize and undertake accomplishment of the mission specified by the TOE/TDA. The minimum standard for Army National Guard units is the attainment and maintenance of company or comparable level proficiency. This is defined as completion of the appropriate unit training program and proficiency verified by successful completion of an applicable Army Training Evaluation with 85 percent or more of unit members participating. During Training Year 1983-1984 all units having assigned Army Training Evaluations accomplished same in a most satisfactory manner; resulting in Active Army Evaluators evaluating the units as being in a training readiness condition equal to most Active Army units.

FULL TIME SUPPORT PERSONNEL

GENERAL: The full time support for the National Guard of Florida continued to grow in FY 84. Congress has agreed that a goal of approximately 10% of the Army National Guard of the United States will be full time support. FY 84 provided Florida Army Guard units with 104 additional supported positions in Active Guard/Reserve (AGR) status. These added positions will provide a level of Army National Guard support for Florida at 6 1/2%.

NEW UNITS: The Air National Guard grew in full time support because of added missions at Homestead Air Force Base and McDill Air Force Base. Detachment 1, Homestead Air Force Base is an extension of the alert by the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group. Detachment 1 at Homestead is authorized 16 Title 32 (AGR) military duty personnel for full time support. The Air National Guard also organized and received Federal recognition for a high-priority Joint Chiefs of Staff support organization - the 290th Combat Communications Squadron. The 290th is authorized 19 Title 32 (AGR) military duty personnel for full time support. During FY 85, another unit, the 202nd Civil Engineer Squadron (Redhorse) will be activated at Camp Blanding as the Air National Guard continues to grow. The Army National Guard did not add new units that required additional full time support.

FULL TIME SUPPORT CAREER PROBLEMS: Congress continues to micro-manage the AGR program through the budget process instead of developing a long term, career-oriented set of policies. This constant yearly change of the rules causes AGR personnel to perceive employment in that status as non permanent. Congress prohibits the movement of Civil Service support from one position to another, thus virtually eliminating State management. These problems are being addressed in Congress. In Florida, the growth of our support level to the units has increased rapidly, causing some problems that only time and good management can cure. Promotional opportunities have caused large personnel shifts, but will pay long-range dividends. The Florida Army National Guard currently enjoys the ability to support 87% of the total authorizations. In troop strength vs full time support equivalents, the Army National Guard now has 7% support compared to 25% for the Air National Guard. Congress plans to increase Army support to the 10% level (100% of all authorized positions) in the next several fiscal years. Full time support training for supervisors has been identified as a problem area because of the extreme changes in the system, both in total numbers and movement. Additional management/supervisory training is programmed for early FY 85 to fill the need. In spite of the problems associated with mixing two extremely different career

employment status programs, AGR support has shown a marked improvement in readiness of all units. The improved economy and Civil Service retirement changes have created new challenges for the personnel system to meet the needs of the Florida National Guard. In FY 83, the average response to position vacancy advertisements was 8; in FY 84 the average decreased to 5, with a significant lack of specialized training or experience by the average applicant.

FULL TIME SUPPORT LEGISLATION: Several significant legislative actions that have a major impact on employment were taken during the year: 1) Congress placed language in the Appropriations Act that provides clarification for the control of Title 32 (AGR) status personnel. State control intent was spelled out and must now become enacted into law beyond the life of the budget process; 2) The Civil Service Reform Act provided that new employees hired on or after 1 January 1984 must become part of a new retirement system (yet to be determined by Congress), coupled with Social Security.

ECONOMIC IMPACT: The growth of the Air National Guard has been in the Tampa and Homestead area with 19 and 16 personnel each, respectively. Their total impact on the State immediately will approximate .75 million annually. Army National Guard added 104 newly supported positions and a slight increase in support of previously unsupported positions for a net gain of 187 over FY 83. The total added State impact of the 187 will approximate 4.6 million annually. FY 84 will close with total employment (both military technician and AGR) for Army National Guard at 904; Air National Guard at 358. The concentration of full time support in Northeast Florida has decreased from 60% to 55%. The added support for Army and Air National Guard went to areas across the State other than the northeast corner. Total payroll impact for the Florida Army and Air National Guard is estimated to be 31 million dollars for FY 84.

RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING CORP (ROTC) PROGRAMS

Reserve Forces Duty Program (RFD)

This program was designed to place ROTC RFD graduates in Army National Guard or U.S. Army Reserve units rather than allowing them to become members of the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR).

ROTC Early Commission Program (ECP)

This program is available to ROTC Cadets who have completed all ROTC requirements but have not completed baccalaureate degree requirements. These cadets may now be commissioned provided they have been accepted for appointment as Second Lieutenants in the Army National Guard. The policy is designed to authorize cadets, who want to join an ARNG unit upon commissioning to serve as Second Lieutenants while continuing their education. The program provides benefits to the individual and the military. The individual receives valuable training and experience, pay and allowances, and retirement points while pursuing the balance of his college education. The ARNG benefits by an increase in assigned officer strength and participation.

ROTC Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP)

Authorizes ROTC cadets enrolled in Military Science (MS) III and Military Science (MS) IV to be active members of both ROTC and Army National Guard/USAR units. ROTC cadets are now authorized to receive the ROTC monthly

pay plus all **drill** pay and allowances from participation with the Army National Guard.

ROTC Delayed Entry Program (DEP)

Allows ROTC graduates who have received their baccalaureate degree and commission to become members of the Army National Guard and delay their active duty requirements for up to 36 months while pursuing an advanced degree.

ROTC Scholarship Program

The purpose of this program is to identify outstanding students on campus or in the ARNG and offer them the opportunity for a scholarship with service in the ARNG after graduation. This is a two-year scholarship. One scholarship was available for each state in CY 83.

INITIAL ACTIVE DUTY FOR TRAINING PROGRAM

The Reserve Enlisted Program of 1963 (REP-63) (Requirement for Initial Active Duty Training for Non-prior Service Personnel) continued during the period of the report.

The Split Training Option, which was initiated in June 1978 on a pilot program basis, has continued through the period of this report. As of 30 June 1984, 56 enlisted members are undergoing Phase II of the program. An additional 78 were enlisted for and are participating in Phase I of the program. This is a total of 134 individuals.

The nationwide time-sharing computer service, using a national telecommunications network with remote terminals capable of simultaneously accessing a common data bank containing the annual Basic Training and Advanced Individual Training base, continues to be utilized in securing training spaces for non-prior service individuals.

Sufficient quotas have been obtained from the Department of the Army to preclude any backlog from occurring during the year. Except for unusual circumstances, non-prior enlistees enter their initial active duty for training within 30 to 180 days after enlistment. Bona fide high school seniors can be delayed from training for up to 270 days to provide input quotas following graduation from high school.

A total of 425 trainees entered initial active duty for training during this period with 402 completing their training and returning to their National Guard units.

SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Army National Guard Schools Program provides the main vehicle for the branch and technical training of Officer and Enlisted personnel to the Florida Army National Guard, whereby they are afforded the opportunity to qualify themselves to fill their unit MTOE/MTDA assignments and receive advanced training in critical Military Occupational Specialties. It is through the media of the Schools Program, which is supported by Federal funds, that Officer and Enlisted personnel complete their training in their chosen fields and are able to maintain proficiency in the areas of Combat Arms, Technical and Administrative fields.

During the fiscal year, Officers and Enlisted personnel participated in the Schools Program as outlined below:

RECRUITING AND RETENTION

During fiscal year 1984 the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 35 personnel. During the period 1,792 new enlistments were produced of which 30% were non-prior service and 70% were prior service personnel.

Florida's retention rate was 71.6% which exceeds the national average. The non-ETS loss rate remains as the number one problem in retaining personnel.

There are 2,477 black personnel and 540 women on board as of 30 June 1984. The percentage of black strength is 24.86% of the total state strength.

Florida reflects a current strength of 9,962 personnel for a 94.6% fill rate and ranks number 35 of all states nationally in percentage of assigned strength compared with authorized strength.

Recruiting and Retention must continue to receive command emphasis during the coming year to ensure a steady growth for the Florida Army National Guard.

FEDERAL FUNDS AND EQUIPMENT

The United States Property and Fiscal Officer (USPFO) for Florida is charged with the responsibility as pertains to comptroller matters, purchasing and contracting, transportation, supply and logistics, and maintenance of Federal property. He is assisted by a technician work force to maintain these accountable records. The USPFO mission is to assist, with the necessary administrative and logistical support, those units of the Florida Army and Air National Guard when they are mobilized for Federal active duty.

The Florida Army National Guard continues to be better equipped than in previous years. This is due primarily to the receipt of more modern equipment and the additional funding being made available to the State of Florida by the Federal Government.

The National Guard now fills a major role in future national crises. This policy by the Secretary of Defense ensures that additional equipment, more modernized equipment and additional funds will be made available to the National Guard for the support of this increased national defense role. In keeping with this policy, the Federal Government has furnished the following new items of major equipment during the period 1 July 1983, through 30 June 1984.

There were 441 full-time Federal employees paid from Federal funds during the period 1 July 1983 to 10 June 1984. Federal funds, during the period 1 July 1983 to 30 June 1984, expended in direct support of the Florida Army National Guard, totaled \$68,604,694. At the close of 30 June 1984, the value of Army equipment on hand in the State totaled \$192,697,989.76.

INTER-SERVICE AGREEMENT

All Active and Reserve Forces, which include the National Guard, currently operate under a policy whereby one service may support another on a reimbursable basis. This policy reduces duplication of effort, gives a faster response to requirements and effects an overall savings to the Federal Government and ultimately to the taxpayer. The Florida National Guard receives supplies and services from the active installations throughout the State of Florida, and we are thereby able to support our troops in a better manner at a cost savings to the Government. Conversely, the Florida National Guard supports the active and other reserve forces by furnishing supplies and services on a reimbursable basis.

SURFACE MAINTENANCE FOR FEDERAL PROPERTY

The program providing technical guidance and expected quality standards for maintenance of Federal Property (Surface), assigned to Florida Army National Guard units, is published in Florida National Guard Circular 750-1, Maintenance of Supplies and Equipment - Maintenance Support Plan. The program is administered under the supervision of the State Maintenance Officer through 13 Organizational Maintenance Shops (OMS), a Sub-Organizational Maintenance Shop, one Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS), a Satellite Combined Support Maintenance Shop, and a Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES).

Responsibility for maintenance is assigned at the lowest echelon possible. Unit organizational maintenance capabilities are utilized to the maximum and are augmented, by the Organizational Maintenance Shops and the Mobilization and Training Equipment Site. Support maintenance, that echelon of maintenance requiring a higher level of expertise, tools and test equipment than found at organizational maintenance, is accomplished by four Direct Support Maintenance Companies, a General Support Heavy Equipment Maintenance Company, and a General Support Light Equipment Maintenance Company during Inactive Duty and Annual Training. These companies are augmented by the Combined Support Maintenance Shop and the Satellite Combined Support Maintenance Shop. The thirteen Organizational Maintenance Shops, Combined Support Maintenance Shop(s) and Mobilization and Training Equipment Site are staffed with 181 highly skilled National Guard technicians.

Two Service Companies, a Collection and Classification Company and a Test Measurement Diagnostic Equipment (TMDE) Company, provide specialized, technically oriented, support to the Florida Army National Guard's Federal Equipment. The

Collection and Classification Company obtains battle damaged, or salvageable equipment items and through reclamation procedures returns the items to operational condition or recovers serviceable parts for use in the repair of other equipment. The TMDE Company performs calibration services on Federal equipment to ensure that technical standards and operational efficiency is maintained.

Approval for additional organizational maintenance organizations has been received for execution in FY 85. The addition of an Organizational Maintenance Shop in Plant City, an Organizational Maintenance Shop in St. Petersburg, and a Unit Training Equipment Site in Avon Park, will serve to sharpen our deployment capability in support of potential State and Federal emergency requirements.

ARMY AVIATION

Mission: Federal or State. To provide units organized, equipped, and trained to function efficiently at existing strength in the protection of life and property and the preservation of peace, order, and public safety under competent orders of Federal or State authorities. **Federal:** To provide trained units and qualified individuals available for active duty in time of war or national emergency in support of the Army's war plans and at such time as the national security may require augmentation of the Active Forces.

Florida Army National Guard aviation elements continue to operate under the September 1978 reorganization structure with three major aviation elements and an Air Traffic Control Platoon added in March 1979. The units are: Aviation Section, 53rd Infantry Brigade (Sep); Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion (Combat Support); Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion (Attack Helicopter); and the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon (Forward).

The Army Aviation Support Facility Command (AASFC) is located at Craig Airport, Jacksonville, Florida. The Aviation Support Facility Commander is directly responsible to the Adjutant General of Florida for the command, supervision and training of Companies C and D, 26th Aviation Battalion and the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon. The 53rd Infantry Brigade Aviation element is attached to the Army Aviation Support Facility for supervision of technical aviation training and coordination of administration and logistics with the Brigade Commander. In order to accomplish the desired level of training and proficiency, the AASFC employs 80 technicians in various positions within the command structure. Nine of these individuals are employed under the Active Guard Reserve (AGR) program.

Aviation assets assigned and supported by the Army Aviation Support Facility, Craig Field, Jacksonville, at the end of the fiscal year are: 21 OH-58's, 29 UH-1H's, 5 UH-1M's, 2 TH-1G's, 7 AH-1S (Mod)'s, 9 AH-1S (Modernized Cobra)'s, and 1 U-21A. Florida started receiving the newest production-line Cobra, the AH-1S Modernized Cobra, in December 1983. As more AH-1S (MC)'s are received during FY 85, Florida will transfer the 2 TH-1G's and the 7 AH-1S (Mod)'s to other National Guard states. By the end of FY 85, Florida should have 17 AH-1S (MC)'s. The nondeployable UH-1M's now on hand have been declared excess in place and will be sent to Davis Monthan AFB, Tucson, Arizona, in the near future, and placed in storage.

Operations and Training

The Operations and Training section of the AASFC is staffed by an Operations Officer, Aviation Safety Officer, five Flight Instructors and two Flight

Operations Specialists. The Operations and Training section is responsible for coordinating, scheduling and conducting all phases of individual aviator training until the aviator is considered operational ready to perform all unit mission tasks. The Operations and Training section is also responsible for coordinating and scheduling all aviation mission support required by ground elements throughout the state.

Unit schools (formal courses of instruction approved and funded by the National Guard Bureau) are conducted during the fiscal year by the Operations and Training section. These schools provide aircraft refresher training, aircraft qualification training, instrument flight training and qualification, terrain flight qualification, and night vision goggle qualification for all assigned aviators. Florida is well ahead of the National Guard Bureau's mandated program for aviator qualification in NVG. Since beginning the NVG program in the fall of 1982, the Operations and Training section has qualified 69 of the assigned aviators.

Army National Guard aviators are required to meet the same training requirements and performance standards and flight hour requirements as the Active Army Aviator. The requirements are accomplished during the year at weekend Multiple Unit Training Assemblies (MUTA's), Additional Flight Training Periods (AFTPs) conducted during the weekday evenings by the AASFC, Annual Training (AT) periods, and during the training year in the 2B24 Synthetic Flight Training Simulator (SFTS) located at Hunter Army Airfield, Savannah, Georgia; and the 2B33 AH-1 Flight and Weapons Simulator located at Fort Rucker, Alabama.

Annual Training for Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion was conducted at Camp Blanding this year during the period 19 May-2 June. Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion, performed its Annual Training with the Battalion at Fort Drum, New York, during the period 9-23 June. Ten of the organic aircraft were flown from Craig Field to Fort Drum, while the remainder of the Company and 9 AH-1S aircraft and a few vehicles were airlifted to the training site by Air Force C-5A and C-141 aircraft as part of a mobilization exercise in conjunction with the Annual Training period. The 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon is scheduled to attend AT at Fort Rucker, Alabama, in mid-September. Ratings received this year from Active Army evaluator teams reflect the high state of readiness maintained by the aviation assets.

Army National Guard aviation also supported several additional Annual Training periods during the year: mission support for the 227th Field Artillery Brigade, Fort Stewart, Georgia, 2-16 July 1983; medevac support for the Training Site, Camp Blanding, 7-23 July 1983; medevac support for the Training Site, Camp Blanding, 5-21 August 1983; medevac support for the 1203 Engineer Battalion from Alabama at Camp Blanding, 31 March-14 April 1984; medevac support for 1st Battalion, 265th Air Defense Artillery Battalion, Camp Blanding, 28 April-12 May 1984; mission support for the 53rd Signal Brigade and 146th Signal Battalion at Fort Bliss, Texas, 2-17 June 1984; mission/medevac support for the 227th Field Artillery Brigade, Camp Blanding, 6-23 June 1984.

Florida Army National Guard aviation provided support to NASA in a Federal status for the launching of Space Transport Shuttle (STS) 8, 27 August-5 September 1983, and 9, 26 November-8 December 1983. This support was a helicopter and crew to provide a photography platform for the NASA photographers and a rapid transport for security if needed.

Florida Army National Guard aviation elements also provided support for the State mission during the fiscal year in Miami 28 February-5 March 1984 and again 16-18 March 1984 during the Alvarez trial. In March 1984, aviation elements supported the Nuclear Reactor Emergency Exercise at the St. Lucie Nuclear Power Plant, Stuart, Florida.

A high state of operational readiness to meet the Federal and State mission is maintained throughout the aviation units by skilled crewmembers and support personnel. Aviation flying hour experience averages 2,400 hours per aviator.

Mission ready aircraft were available and utilized to accomplish the 1984 fiscal year flying hour program as follows: UH-1, 4346 hours; OH-58, 1814 hours; AH-1, 1959 hours; U-21, 336 hours; for a total yearly program of 8455 hours.

Community Relations and Civil Assistance

Army Aviation units regularly participate in community programs and the Support Facility continues to provide an excellent attraction for local groups on educational field trips.

The Aviation Support Facility continues to provide the Emergency Medical Evacuation for the transport of neonatal patients from the surrounding counties to Jacksonville hospitals. These and other humanitarian efforts are published throughout the community and have resulted in improved public relations and awareness of the Florida Army National Guard.

Maintenance

The Army Aviation Maintenance Shop is tasked with providing aviation unit maintenance (AVUM) and limited intermediate maintenance (AVIM) for 74 aircraft assigned to the Florida Army National Guard.

Fifty-eight Federally funded technician personnel presently are employed on a daily basis in direct support of the maintenance program. Each full-time employee is also a member of one of the subordinate TO&E aviation units assigned to the AASFC. Various maintenance occupational specialties performed on a full-time basis include aircraft mechanic, inspector, engine mechanic, technical supply, avionics, sheet metal, electronics, prop and rotor repair, armament and airfield services.

With the completion of construction at the AASF, hangar floor space has been enlarged to 23,500 square feet, almost twice that previously available. Aircraft systems repair shops (i.e., engine, prop and rotor, welding repair, etc.) also have been constructed to provide the necessary work areas for maintenance support. Twenty-four helicopter parking pads were added in the construction project, bringing the total fly on/off parking pads to 53.

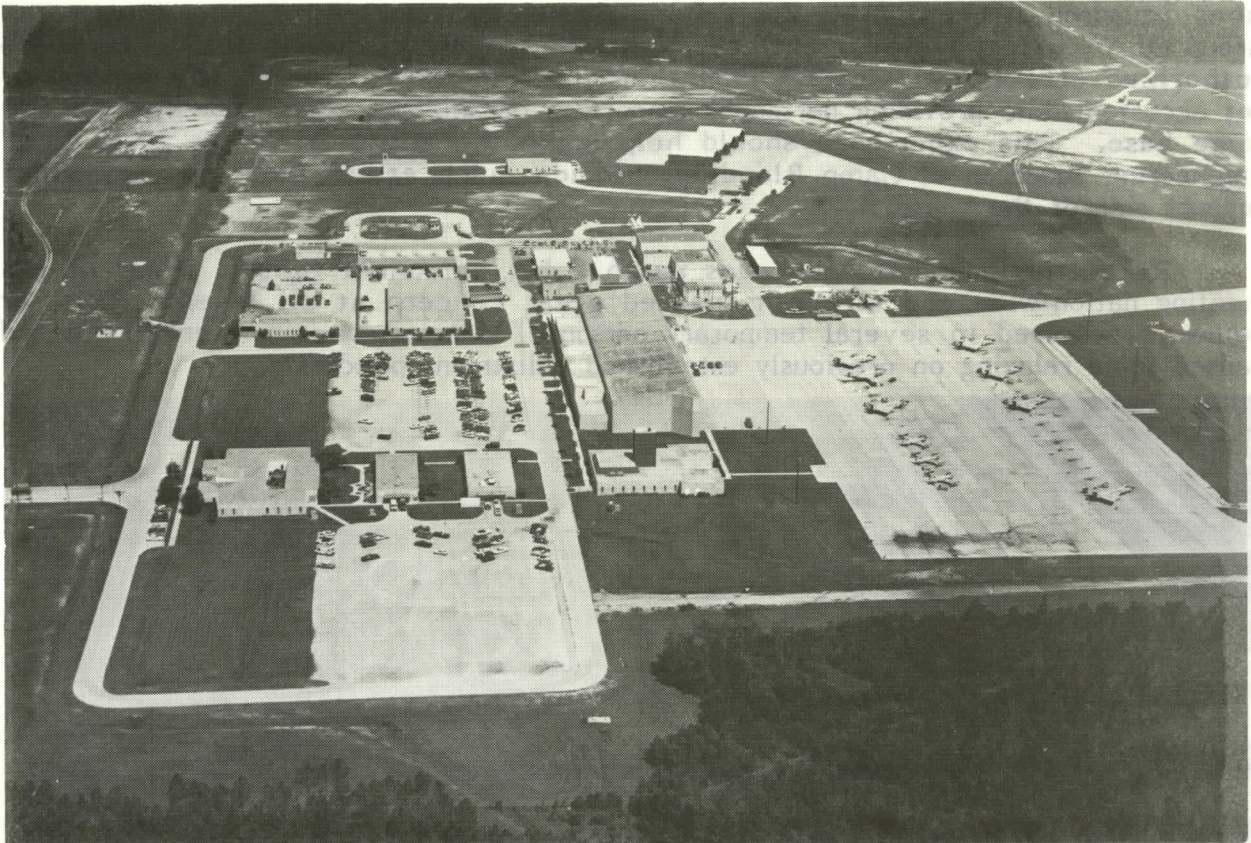
With the assignment of the AH-1S Modernized Cobra, the present state-of-the-art attack helicopter, a close working relationship with our active component counterpart, the 24th Combat Aviation Battalion at Hunter Army Airfield, is being made stronger.

During fiscal year 1984, the aviation maintenance program of the Florida Army National Guard recorded an operational readiness rate in excess of 87 percent for all aircraft assigned, well above the Department of the Army standard of 70 percent. The Army aviation maintenance program of the Florida Army National Guard continues to be recognized as one of the best, not only in the Army National Guard, but in the Total Force.

AIR NATIONAL GUARD

The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard, located at the State Arsenal, St. Augustine, Florida, the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group located at Jacksonville International Airport; the 290th Combat Communications Squadron, located at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa; and an Alert Detachment, located at Homestead Air Force Base, Florida. In addition, approval has been received to establish the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron at Camp Blanding. Upon activation of the 202nd, the Florida Air National Guard will have an authorization of 136 officers and 1324 airmen, 1460 Total.

On 10 June 1983, Brigadier General Otha R. Smith, Jr. was appointed Assistant Adjutant General for Air, replacing Brigadier General William M. Whittaker upon his retirement. On 28 June 1984, Homer H. Humphries, Jr, Chief of Staff of the Florida Air National Guard was promoted to Brigadier General.

The role of Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard includes the command, control and supervision of Air National Guard units in Florida, the employment of ANG resources during state emergencies and the interpretation, coordination and implementation of Air Force and National Guard Bureau policies within Florida. Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard has significantly expanded its dual state-federal role during the last few years, having established the 290th Combat Communications Squadron during FY 84 and taken the initial steps for establishment of the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron. Appendix IV indicates the organizational structure of the Florida Air National Guard.

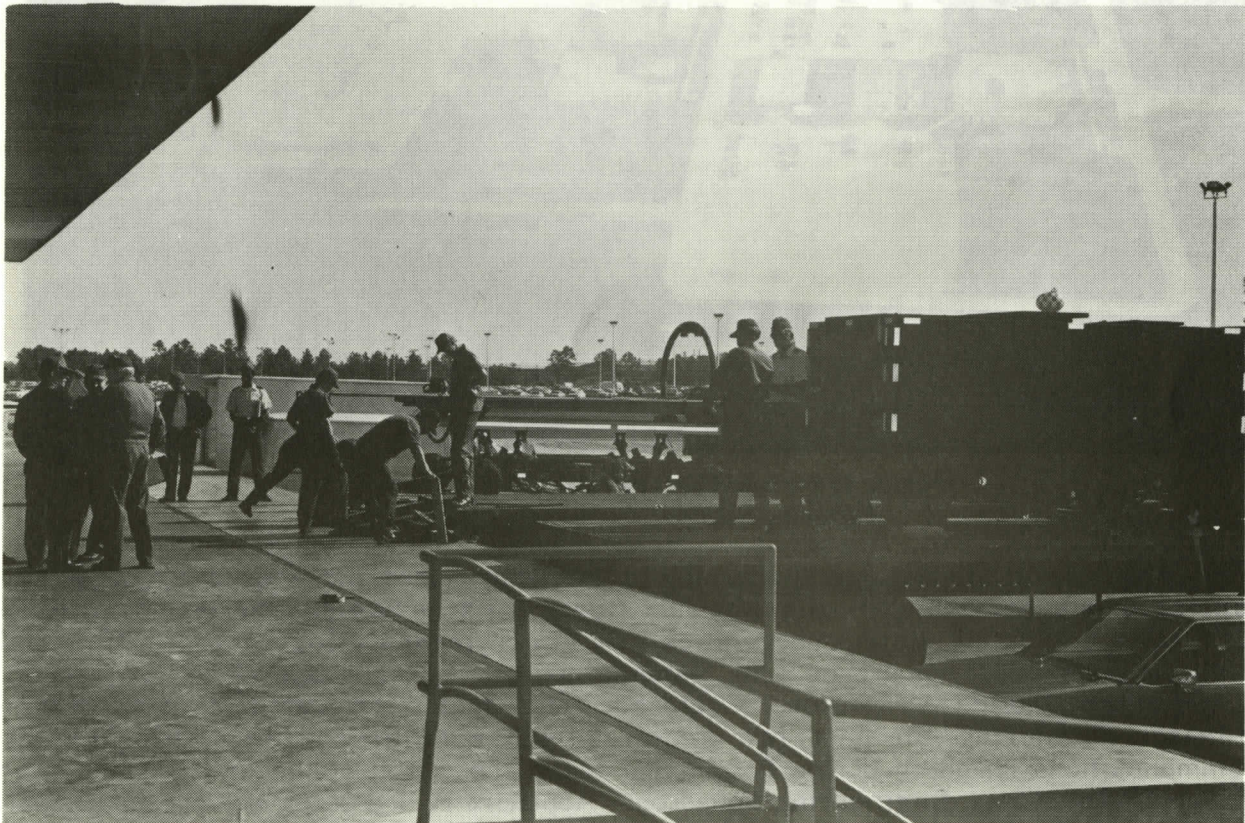
125th Fighter Interceptor Group

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group consists of nine subordinate units; the 125th Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, 125th Combat Support Squadron, 125th Resource Management Squadron, 125th Civil Engineering Flight, 125th Security Police Flight, 125th USAF Clinic, 159th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, the 125th Communications Flight (Support) and the 8125th Student Flight. The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group has an authorization of 102 officers, with 94 assigned, and 893 airmen, with 834 assigned. This is a manning level of 92% officers and 93% airmen.

Personnel

Most of this reporting period was devoted to obtaining military authorization and enlisting/assigning personnel to the newly activated 290th Combat Communications Squadron at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida and the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group OLAA (Alert Detachment) at Homestead AFB, Florida. Both units were authorized effective 1 October 1983. For the first time in our history, we had to get accustomed to providing personnel support to organizations not collocated on the same base. This experience should help make the activation of the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron at Camp Blanding, Florida much easier from the personnel support side of the house.

Recruiting and retention was again a big personnel factor. Fear of not meeting nation-wide end strengths caused great concern at all levels. This, or course, resulted in several temporary personnel changes concerning enlistment and caused some relaxing on previously established enlistment policies.



Mobility Exercise Evaluation of the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group

Inspections/Evaluations

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group underwent four major inspections/evaluations conducted by the Air Defense Tactical Air Command Inspector General during this fiscal year. A synopsis of each follows:

The first phase of a Phased Operational Readiness Inspection (PORI) was conducted from 2-7 February 1984. Included was the unit's ability to transition from a peacetime to wartime operations and, for the first time, mobility. Overall rating was Excellent.

A formal Standardization/Evaluation Visit took place from 31 March 1984 - 8 April 1984. This inspection evaluates unit conformance with the TAC Stan/Eval Program, and it was rated satisfactory.

The second phase of the PORI was conducted from 3-9 May 1984 in conjunction with a Nuclear Surety Inspection (NSI). Both of these evaluate the unit's ability to employ their weapon system safely and effectively. Both inspections were rated Satisfactory.

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA) received a Management Effectiveness Inspection during the period 7-13 February 1984. This inspection evaluates the unit's management effectiveness and was rated Excellent. On 16 February 1984, the unit underwent a no-notice Alert Force Evaluation conducted by the NORAD Inspector General and received an Excellent rating.

Deployments/Exercises

A Checkered Flag Deployment was conducted during the period 24-30 October 1983 in conjunction with a Ninth Air Force sponsored Quick Thrust Exercise. Sixty-three personnel and six F-106 aircraft deployed to Glyco Jetport, Brunswick, Georgia. The purpose of the deployment was to evaluate the unit's capability to mobilize, deploy, regenerate and employ forces from a dispersed location with minimal support facilities.

During 3-17 March 1984, 78 personnel and 18 aircraft deployed to Tyndall AFB, Florida in support of the TAC Combat Archer Program. This program allows aircrews to conduct live armament firing and validates F-106 aircraft for nuclear surety.

In addition to the above deployments, the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group also participated in two Ninth Air Force Quick Thrust Exercises, a SAC sponsored Global Shield Exercise, and ten NORAD Air Defense Exercises. All were flown from Jacksonville IAP, Florida.

Operations

As in the past, NORAD Alert continues as the primary unit mission. This year our alert commitment increased significantly with the addition of 125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA) at Homestead AFB, Florida. A total of 48 scrambles were flown from Jacksonville IAP and 57 flown from Homestead AFB since October.

We continue to support the 23d NORAD Region with weekly Performance Analysis by Continuous Evaluation (PACE) flights which verify radar and radio equipment operation within the region's area of responsibility, deployed target forces

in support of other NORAD units, Eastern Missile Test Range prelaunch weather verification flights, Airborne Warning and Control System (AWACS) training, and various NORAD and Air Division exercise.

A total of 2902 sorties and 5029.6 hours of flying time were accumulated in the F-106A/B. T-33 aircraft flew 732 hours and the C-131 flew 340.4 hours. There were no accidents or incidents during this period.

Maintenance

During the past fiscal year approximately 185 Air Technicians were employed in maintenance to support the F106 aircraft. These personnel perform various functions from minor repairs through major overhaul, up to depot level maintenance on all assigned aircraft and engines.

In October 1983, the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group was assigned an Alert Detachment at Homestead AFB, Florida. Currently there are 15 maintenance technicians assigned to maintain the aircraft on alert there. A Management Effectiveness Inspection (MEI) was conducted 7-13 February 1984 at the detachment with an overall rating of Excellent.

The unit also participated in two deployments during the past twelve months. A mobility deployment to evaluate the unit's ability to move its resources to a different operating base, and our annual deployment to Tyndall AFB, Florida for aircraft live weapons firing.

Federal Funds and Equipment

The Assistant USP&FO for Air (Property), during this reporting period, continued to provide effective support for all 125th Fighter Interceptor Group units, 290th Combat Communications Squadron and 125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA), Homestead AFB, Florida. Supplies and equipment budget for FY 85 is projected at \$2,012,300. The average warehouse inventory managed by Base Supply was 11,902 line items valued at \$3,217,131. Through computer accounting, Supply recorded an average of 23,013 transactions per month. Equipment in use by all organizations of the Group is valued at \$14,980,776.36. With this amount of supplies and equipment, supply has consistently maintained an inventory accuracy of 99% for the year.

Accounting and Finance

During this reporting period, the Assistant USPFO for Air (Fiscal) continued to manage all funds in a professional manner while providing efficient customer service to all members of the Florida Air National Guard.

This period was especially challenging with the addition of two new units, and the implementation of the Resource Management System. The new units were 125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA) located at Homestead AFB, Florida and the 290th Combat Communications Squadron located at MacDill AFB, Florida. The Resource Management System is designed to relate the cost of consumption of resources to military outputs. Through the use of Program Elements, (PE) Responsibility Center/Cost Center Codes (RC/CC), and elements of expense, we are able to track costs by commodity down to the lowest level throughout the base.

While implementing a new accounting system and supporting the organizing of

the two Geographically Separated Units (GSU's), this unit has maintained an obligation rate of 99.9 percent for all allocated funds. This encompassed 32,363 accounting transactions, 23,964 ARPAS transactions, pay support for 262 civilian personnel and approximately, 1,351 travel vouchers.

Data Processing

A Beehive Terminal was installed in the Consolidated Base Personnel Office in January 1984. Its memory capability makes it a significant enhancement to the system of maintaining and using personnel records. A Zenith Z100 Mini-Computer was installed in Operations in January 1984.

The first part of Phase IV has been completed. Remote terminals in supply were replaced by Sperry UTS40 Terminals. RJETS equipment and the Univac 1050 computer at Moody AFB, Georgia were replaced by a Sperry U1100-60 Computer.

The second part of Phase IV is still working. Equipment to replace all existing Burroughs terminals should be arriving in late September 1984. High speed communication lines will be installed at that time.

RJETS replacement is also still working. A decision has been made to replace existing Honeywell equipment with a Sperry System 11. ANG-wide conversion will start in April 1985 and should be completed in approximately eighteen (18) months.

Vehicle Operations and Maintenance

The Vehicle Maintenance section performed both scheduled and unscheduled maintenance on 168.7 vehicle equivalents. Allied Traders accomplished 20 re-paint jobs and 16 spot paint repairs on all assigned vehicles. The vehicle out of commission rate for the total fleet was 3%, well below the Air Force standards of 10%. The vehicle deadlined for parts rate was 1.8%, and the vehicle deadlined for maintenance rate was 1.93%, both well below accepted Air Force standards. The total fleet average cost was 30 cents per mile. Vehicle Operations administered 66 vehicle operators tests with a passing rate of 87%. The vehicle fleet averaged 26,000 miles driving and 600 hours operated per month with one reportable accident.

5,575 vehicle transactions have been input into the RJET computer with an error rate of 3%.

Vehicle ground fuel consumption was well below the established zero growth rate standards with a total reduced rate of 3.2%.

Base Contracting

The Base Contracting Office has the responsibility of purchasing supplies, services and equipment for the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group and two newly formed units, the 290th Combat Communications Squadron at MacDill AFB, Florida and 125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA) at Homestead AFB, Florida. In addition to this, assistance was rendered to the USPFO at St. Augustine in administration of major construction projects.

Three thousand transactions were processed by our office during the past year with a total expenditure of \$634,577.

Logistics Plans

The Logistics Plans area is responsible for the unit deployment planning. Two Checkered Flag deployments were conducted during the last year. The first was a six aircraft deployment on October 1983 UTA. This exercise consisted of 67 tons of equipment and 217 personnel which deployed to Glynco Airport Brunswick, Georgia to support the JCS exercise Quick Thrust. Our second exercise was a mobility exercise conducted in conjunction with the ADTAC Operational Readiness Inspection. This was the first time an ADTAC Guard unit has been required to demonstrate this capability.

The Logistics plans area is also the support agreement monitor.

The support agreement for the Alert Detachment at Homestead AFB, Florida and the 290th Combat Communications Squadron at MacDill AFB, Florida were initiated during this past year.

125th USAF Clinic

The mission of the 125th USAF Clinic is to provide medical support for the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group including limited medical and dental care and processing physical examinations. The following workload was generated providing these services:

Eight officers and sixteen airmen performed annual training at the USAF Hospital, Shaw Air Force Base, South Carolina.

The unit experienced several noteworthy items during the year:

Three physicians completed Medical Red Flag training involving mass casualties in a field environment and using mobile medical treatment equipment.

TSGT Vernon Hayes was selected as the Outstanding ANG Medical Service Airman by the Surgeon General, National Guard Bureau for the year 1983.

Training

Training opportunities afforded to Florida Air National Guard personnel at various Air Force and Air National Guard professional military and technical training facilities plays a vital role in the readiness posture of these units. All nonprior service enlistees are required by law to attend an initial active duty training tour of a minimum of eighty-four (84) days subsequent to their enlistment. This Initial Active Duty Training (IADT) consists of six weeks basic military training and the Air Force resident technical training school for the career field into which the individual is assigned. Most IADT tours are considerably longer than the minimum eighty-four days, especially if the trainee is assigned into the avionics maintenance functional area. In some cases, where there is no technical school available for the member's career field, he/she is returned to the unit following basic military training for a period of on-the-job training (OJT) in order to be initially qualified. Throughout the member's career with the Florida Air National Guard, various

professional, advanced, lateral and/or refresher type courses are available to the member. With the activation of the 290th Combat Communications Squadron at MacDill AFB, Florida during the year, new challenges in the training area were presented. Space Communications Equipment Maintenance and Operations and Parachutists were two areas new to the Air National Guard. The National Guard Bureau Training Branch has worked closely with our training office to provide the required training in these two areas. During the past year, personnel of the Florida Air National Guard attended the following courses: Flying Training Courses - 9; Technical, Advanced, Lateral Training Courses, etc. - 94; Academy of Military Science - 4; Noncommissioned Officer Academy (long course 5 1/2 weeks) - 3; Noncommissioned Officer Academy Course I - 2; Noncommissioned Officers Academy Course II - 2; ANG Leadership Course I - 4; ANG Leadership Course II - 5; and, USAF Senior Noncommissioned Officer Academy - 1.

Effective 1 July 1983, all follow-on training courses in F-106 aircraft maintenance and avionics were discontinued by the Field Training Detachment at Tyndall AFB, Florida. The last F-106 flying training course for pilots was begun in August 1983 and graduated in April 1984. Future UPT graduates scheduled to fly F-106 aircraft, will receive ground school training (academics) at the 120th Fighter Interceptor Group, Great Falls, Montana, then return to this unit for flying training. The National Guard Bureau will authorize sufficient mandays for necessary instructor pilots to train the student pilot to combat ready status. Maintenance and avionics trainees will be authorized from thirty to ninety days seasoning/proficiency training at home station following completion of the basic resident training course.

The unit's on-the-job training (OJT) program continued to progress at a very satisfactory rate during the past year. There are three specific requirements that an individual must satisfy for skill level upgrading through the OJT program. These requirements are career knowledge, job proficiency and job experience. Career knowledge is gained by the individual enrolling in and completing correspondence courses known as Career Development Courses (CDCs) and/or study references (i.e., regulations, manuals, etc.). Job proficiency and job experience is satisfied when trainees satisfactorily perform duty in their Air Force specialty for the minimum time required. An average of 110 personnel were on some level of OJT during the period of this report. Ninety-nine (99) personnel were upgraded to the various levels of their specialty. None of these trainees were in excessive training time and only a minimal number entered overtime training status.

Most personnel of the Florida Air National Guard are scheduled for their annual training tour on a year-round basis at home station. Scheduling is handled in a practical and efficient manner with a limited number of Guardsmen on training at any one time. This results in excellent manday utilization and a nearly one-on-one ratio of supervisor to worker situation for training purposes. Exceptions to the year round home station training were:

The COMBAT PIKE deployment to Tyndall AFB, Florida in March 1984 for testing of the weapons system.

Personnel from the 125th USAF Clinic performed annual training at Shaw AFB, South Carolina and Moody AFB, Georgia.

Fire protection personnel from the 125th Civil Engineering Flight performed annual training at Travis Field, Savannah, Georgia and at MacDill AFB, Florida.

The PRIME BEEF Team from the 125th Civil Engineering Flight deployed to Hahn AB, Germany to participate in various construction projects for their training.

290th Combat Communications Squadron

The 290th Combat Communications Squadron, Florida Air National Guard, was formally designated and activated on Saturday, 7 January 1984, by order of the Honorable Robert E. Graham, Governor of the State of Florida. A formal ceremony was conducted on that date at MacDill AFB, Florida. Major General Robert F. Ensslin, Jr, Adjutant General of Florida, passed the Squadron Guidon to Major Robert E. Smith, Commander of the 290th Combat Communications Squadron. The squadron has an authorization of nine (9) officers and one hundred and eighty-six (186) airmen. This includes twenty (20) full-time personnel. To date, there are sixty-four (64) personnel assigned, eight of these are full-time. This is a manning level of 67% officers, 31% airmen and 40% technicians.

Inspections/Evaluations

On 17 May 1984, the 1928th Communications Group, representing Air Force Communications Command, conducted an inspection of the 290th Combat Communications Squadron. This inspection was required in order for the National Guard Bureau to extend Federal Recognition to this unit. The squadron successfully passed the inspection and formally received its Federal Recognition on 14 July 1984.

Deployments

Several members of the 290th Combat Communications Squadron working in conjunction with the Joint Communications Support Elements (JCSE) will be supporting Gallant Eagle in California this August. Also, the squadron will be supporting Joint Readiness exercises bold Venture at Ft. Lewis, Washington and Brim Frost at Ft. Wainwright, Alaska later this year.

Operations

The squadron conducted its first radio operations with the 224th Combat Communications Squadron during the March UTA. These operations will be expanded with the 224th as equipment becomes available.

Resource Management

Upon activation, this unit was allocated approximately \$228,000. These funds have been used to purchase office furniture and equipment, mobility supplies, uniforms and several other items to insure the unit was functional.

Training

This year's Annual Training was held 16-30 June 1984. Joint training with the 224th Combat Communications Squadron from St. Simons Island, Georgia turned out to be very successful. Some areas of training include M-16 and .38 caliber qualification, mobility training, driver training, social actions training, OJT supervisors course and initial chemical warfare training.

Facilities

The move to our temporary facility, Building #1884, took place the beginning of June. Plans and blueprints for our permanent facility were submitted to the National Guard Bureau in April of this year. Construction is tentatively scheduled for FY 86.

202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR)

The 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron has been designated and allocated to the State of Florida. This squadron will be based at Camp Blanding and will have an authorized strength of 10 officers and 207 airmen, 217 total. LTC Frank W. Kozdras has been selected as the Commander.

ADVISORS

ARMY

The mission of the Office of the Senior Army Advisor is to provide advice and assistance to the units of the Florida Army National Guard on all aspects of mobilization, training, administration, supply and maintenance in order to assist the National Guard in accomplishing its mission. The Senior Army Advisor, Colonel Jackie E. Schmidt, is the liaison officer between the Adjutant General and the Commander, Second United States Army.

The office of the Senior Army Advisor is located with Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs, St. Augustine. Four additional advisory elements are collocated with the following major headquarters: 53rd Infantry Brigade (Separate) in Tampa; 53rd Signal Group in Tallahassee; 227th Field Artillery Brigade in Miami; and the 50th Area Support Group in Jacksonville. The authorized strength of the Office of the Senior Army Advisor, including the advisor detachments, is six officers, five noncommissioned officers and one civilian. Technical assistance and training support are provided by the U.S. Army Readiness Group at Patrick Air Force Base. Readiness Group Patrick supports both Army National Guard and Army Reserve units in Florida and is staffed with 29 officers, one warrant officer, 30 enlisted and 7 civilians.

AIR

The mission of the Air Force Advisor is to advise the Air National Guard in achieving and maintaining the highest possible state of combat readiness.

The Senior Air Force Advisor, Major Fred C. Korcker, is the liaison officer between the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Commander and the 23rd NORAD/-ADTAC Region Director of Operations at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida.

The Tactical Air Command is the gaining organization of the Florida Air National Guard.

The Air Force Advisor's office is located at the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Headquarters, Jacksonville International Airport, Jacksonville, Florida.

NATIONAL GUARD OFFICERS ASSOCIATION OF FLORIDA

The National Guard Officers Association of Florida has been in existence since 1902. It consists of all officers and warrant officers of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. The organization is run on a democratic basis, with the officers elected by the membership. Committee meetings are held periodically during the year, and a general conference is convened annually at some location within the State. The annual conferences consist of business sessions during the day with the social functions in the evening.

The purposes of the Association are to promote and improve adequate national security; to provide a medium by which all officers of the Florida National Guard may become better acquainted; to establish a foundation for promoting esprit de corps in the Florida National Guard; to promulgate and support legislation in furtherance of the best interests of the Florida National Guard; and, to maintain an Association complementing and in harmony with the National Guard Association of the United States.

This Association has 100% membership of all active National Guard officers and warrant officers. Even though members attend the annual conferences at their own expense, attendance continues to average in excess of 50% at these conferences. The 82nd Annual Conference was held at the PGA Sheraton Resort, Palm Beach Gardens, Florida, on 17-18 August 1984.

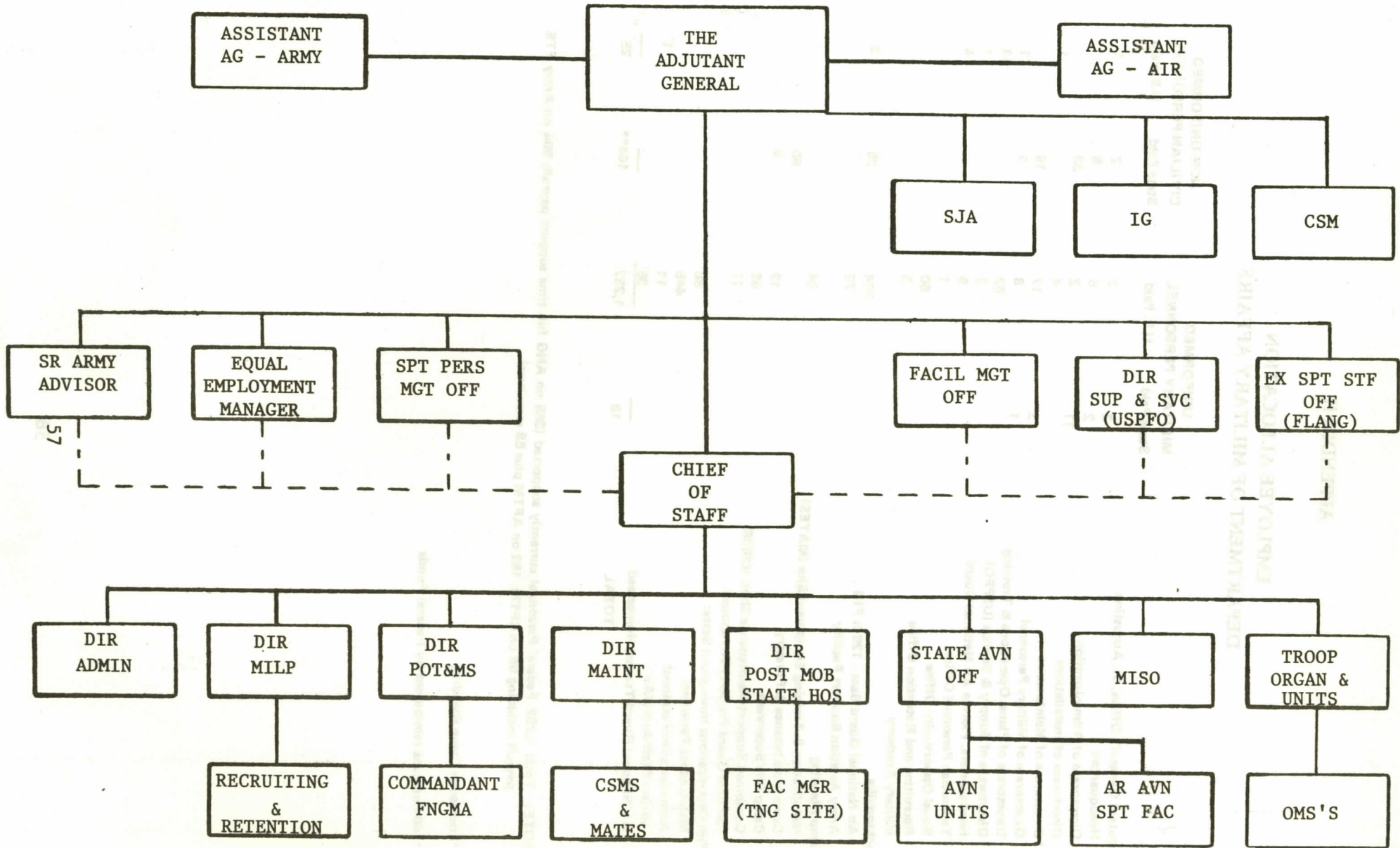

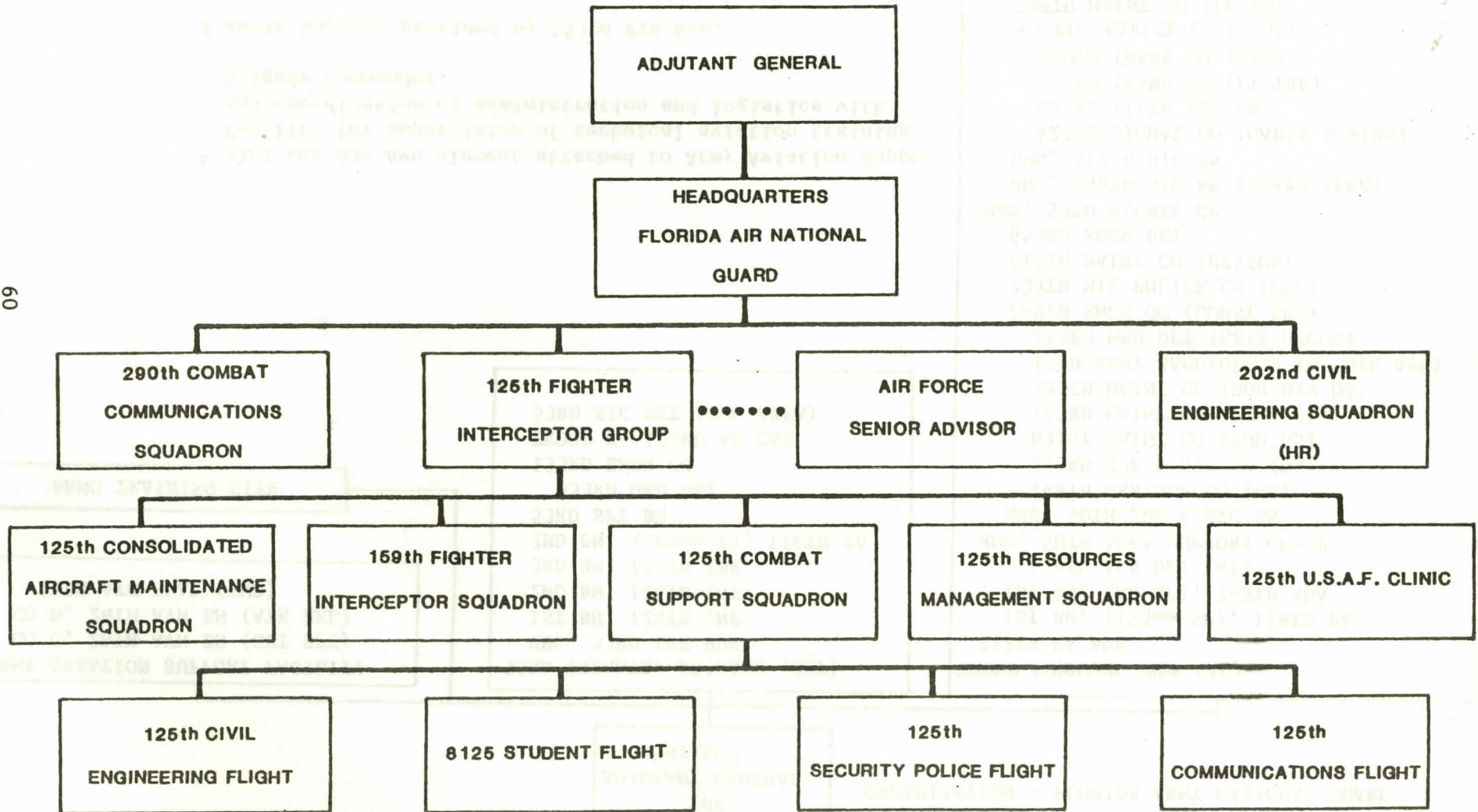
