

#### DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY AFFAIRS

#### INTRODUCTION

The State of Florida Department of Military Affairs, is a State Agency, created by Chapter 250, Florida Statutes and composed of the military force provided for in the laws of the State of Florida. The Florida National Guard is provided for by Section 2, Article X of the Constitution and Chapter 250.08 of the Florida Statutes. The National Guard of the United States is provided for by Title 32, U.S. Code.

The Governor is Commander in Chief of the Florida National Guard. The Adjutant General is Chief of the Department of Military Affairs and Commanding General of the Florida Army and Air National Guard. There is an Assistant Adjutant General, an Assistant Adjutant General for Air, and a Directorate staff organization in the Headquarters, (Appendix I, Organization Chart).


The troop structure of the Florida National Guard is composed of the Florida Army National Guard and Florida Air National Guard. The Army National Guard consists of the State Headquarters (State Area Command) with its attached support type units; an Infantry Brigade (Separate); and nondivisional units grouped under a Troop Command Headquarters, FLARNG, and an Army Aviation Support Facility, (Appendix III, Organization - Florida Army National Guard). The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters Florida Air National Guard; the 125th Fighter Group, 290th Joint Communications Support Squadron, and the 202d Civil

Engineering Squadron (Appendix IV, Organization - Florida Air National Guard).

#### **MISSION**

As provided for under the provisions of the National Defense Act, units of the Florida National Guard, both Army and Air, have a dual mission.

(1) A State mission, to provide military organizations trained and equipped to function when necessary in the protection of life and property, and in the preservation of peace, order and the public safety, as directed by competent State Authority; and,



(2) A Federal mission, as Reserve Components of the Army and Air Force of

the United States, to provide trained and qualified individuals available for Federal Service in time of war or national emergency, or at such other times as the national security may require augmentation of the United States Armed Forces.

The Florida Air National Guard, in addition to their State and Federal mission, has an air sovereignty mission for the eastern seaboard of the United States. Mission involves the maintenance of F-106 fighters and crew on a twenty-four hour alert status, armed and ready for immediate commitment to intercept unidentified aircraft in or approaching the airspace of the United States.

The missions of the 202d Civil Engineering Squadron and the 290th Joint Communications Support Squadron are as follows:

- (1) 202d Civil Engineering Squadron One of only seven such units in the Air National Guard/Air Reserves System, known as RED HORSE, which stands for Rapid Engineer Deployable Heavy Operational Repair Squadron, Engineer. The 202d is tasked to provide a rapid deployable highly trained force to accomplish heavy damage repairs to runways, facilities and utilities of Air Force units, worldwide. The unit's wartime assignment is at predesignated European sites.
- (2) 290th Joint Communications Support Element The first Air National Guard assigned Combat Communications unit with jump status personnel assigned to report directly to a unified command. The 290th primary mission will be to augment the Joint Communications Support Element (JCSE) which provides communication support for the six unified commands of the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS).

The State Adjutant General and his Headquarters has an additional Federal

mission to direct and coordinate the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force) made available within the State, to support civil authorities engaged in providing for survival of people and continuity of government in a nuclear environment.

#### SUMMARY

A total of eighteen Army National Guard units were reorganized. Seven were classified major reorganizations as a result of the Department of Army's Reserve Component Initiative Program and eleven were classified as minor reorganizations as a result of the Department of Army implementing minor changes to equipment and personnel.

A detailed discussion of these actions may be found in the paragraph titled Organization.

In addition, Florida sent fifteen unit cells to Europe and seven cells to Korea for in-country orientation and planning tours with their CAPSTONE headquarters. All units, evaluated during Annual Training, met the training requirements and standards prescribed by FORSCOM and Second U.S. Army.

During fiscal year 1985, the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 986 personnel. As of 30 June 1985, Florida's strength of 10,948 assigned personnel reflects a fill of 98.2%, ranking Florida number 26 of all states in percentage of assigned strength as compared to authorized strength. During the coming year, it is expected that Florida will grow both in additional authorized units and assigned personnel.

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group continues to maintain its high level of combat readiness. This statement has been documented several times during the past year by USAF Inspection Teams. The Group is presently maintaining a personnel strength level of 96% while the 290th Joint Communications Support Squadron's strength is 65% and the 202d Civil Engineering Squadron is 63%.

#### ORGANIZATION

The Troop structure of the Florida Army National Guard was changed by the organization of Battery A, 1st Battalion, 116th Field Artillery, Sarasota; Battery C, 3rd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery, Arcadia; Service Battery, 3rd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery, Plant City; 2207th Medical Detachment, St. Petersburg; the relocation of the 253rd Medical Detachment from Miami to Camp Blanding and the major reorganizations of Company A (-), 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Company C, 53rd Support Battalion; 2nd and 3rd Rifle Platoons, Company A, 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Battery B, 2nd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery; Company C, 53rd Support Battalion to Headquarters and Headquarters Battery, 3rd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery; Battery A, 1st Battalion, 116th Field Artillery to Battery A, 3rd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery; Battery B, 2d Battalion, 116th Field Artillery to Battery B, 3rd Battalion, 116th Field Artillery; 2nd and 3rd Rifle Platoons, Company B, 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Company A, 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry and Company B (-) 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry to Company B, 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry. Other units experienced minor changes in equipment, Military Occupational Specialties (MOS) and personnel. These changes were brought about by the Department of Army Vertical Army Authorization Document System.

#### **EMPLOYEES**

There are 1,674 individuals, civilian and military, employed by or assigned to the Department of Military Affairs. These employees work either directly with the Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs or with National Guard units in the field, supporting approximately 12,618 Florida National Guard personnel. (Appendix II, Employee Allocation, Department of Military Affairs). There are 205 Career Service personnel of the State of Florida, employed under the State Personnel Rules and Regulations, 1,469 Federal technicians, authorized for employment under the rules and regulations of the U.S. Civil Service Commission by Public Law 90-486, and 12 active duty personnel assigned as Army and Air Force Advisors to the Florida National Guard. These employees specialize in the field of administration, finance, accounting, supply and maintenance. With the exception of a limited number of employees, personnel are required to be military members of the various organizations and units to which assigned. (Fiscal Data, Appendices VII and VIII).

#### ARMORY BOARD, STATE OF FLORIDA

The Armory Board, State of Florida, established as provided by Section 250.40, Florida Statutes, and comprised of the Governor, the Adjutant General, the State Quartermaster, the General Officers of the Line, Group Commanders, and the Senior Air Commander of the active Florida National Guard, provides general supervision and control of real properties utilized by the Florida National Guard. The Armory Board is responsible for and controls forest management, mineral removal, game and fish propagation programs and the maintenance and improvement of the former Federal lands at Camp Blanding, with the approval of the U.S. Government. (A detail of the organization of the Armory Board is shown in Appendix V).

#### FACILITIES

#### State Arsenal

The State Arsenal is one of the oldest and most historic buildings in St. Augustine. It houses Headquarters for the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard. This four hundred year old facility was formerly the site of a Franciscan Monastery constructed in 1588. It was converted to a military barracks by the British in 1763; from 1783 to 1821 it was a Spanish garrison; and from 1821 to 1900, it served as a U.S. Army Post. In 1907, the Headquarters of the Department of Military Affairs and the Florida National Guard was established here. Normal repairs and maintenance are performed in such a manner as to preserve the historic features of the facilities; insofar as is feasible.

When the main building was gutted by fire in December 1915, the original walls were unharmed and the building lay in dismal ruin until 1921, when Congress passed an act donating St. Francis Barracks to the State of Florida for military purposes. The State Legislature appropriated funds to restore the building, modeling it after the lines of the former structure. For four centuries, St. Francis Barracks (State Arsenal) has been a religious and military outpost.

#### Armories/Construction

There are fifty-five (55) National Guard armory installations, strategically located throughout the State, from Pensacola on the west, to Jacksonville on the northeast, to Fort Myers and Homestead on the south. (Locations and valuations are reflected in Appendix VI).

During FY 84-85 the major roof replacement program which started in FY 81-82 was continued with an appropriation of \$1,544,300. Currently, the roofs of forty-three (43) Florida National Guard armory facilities have been completed or are under design/construction. Ten (10) facilities are programmed for roof repairs/replacement in FY 85-86.

300-Person Armory and Post Headquarters Building - Camp Blanding: Construction of this facility, which began in October 1982, was completed in June 1984. This facility, which houses seven (7) units/detachments, and the Post Headquarters operation, consists of 35,441 SF at a cost of \$1,747,101. Included in this project was the renovation of the World War II era Post Hospital fountain, still in its original location, which is now the main entrance to this facility. Currently construction is being completed to provide this facility with a modern conference/briefing room, utilizing the most up-to-date audio/visual communications equipment available.

150-Person Armory - Ocala: Construction of this project was completed 8 November 1984 at a cost of \$1,010,469. This facility is designed to house two (2) National Guard units and consists of approximately 22,000 SF.

Armed Forces Reserve Center - Daytona Beach: This facility (formerly a Naval Reserve Training Center), was licensed to the Armory Board, State of Florida, by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers effective 1 January 1983. The facility is shared with the U.S. Army Reserve with the Florida Army National Guard serving as the "host" activity. Operation and financial responsibility is controlled by a "joint use agreement." The Center is a 23,980 SF masonry building situated on four (4) acres of land. A project for modification and expansion is programmed for FY 85/86 and is currently under design.

Ellyson Field Armory - Pensacola: In October 1982, the Armory Board, State of Florida, leased this facility from the Escambia Development Commission for use as a second National Guard Armory in the Pensacola area. The building is a two-story masonry structure of 8,900 SF situated on 3.21 acres of land. It was constructed in 1941 and served as the Operations Building for Ellyson Air Field (Navy) until the base was closed in 1979. A project of minor alterations and repair for approximately \$88,900 is underway and the facility is partially occupied and in use by Pensacola National Guard units. The Escambia Development Commission has agreed to make an additional fifteen (15) acres of land available for future National Guard Armory/OMS construction.

Plant City Armory: Construction of a new 200-Person Armory is approximately 85% complete. This project was advanced by National Guard Bureau into the Federal FY 84 Construction Program. The new 30,126 SF, two-unit armory will replace an old, inadequate 6,546 SF facility constructed in 1930 as a WPA project. The estimated cost of the new facility is \$1,351,052, of which \$862,807 was funded by the Federal government. Construction began in November 1984.

Orlando Armory Alteration/Expansion: Design has been completed to expand the existing 100-Person, 15,337 SF Orlando armory to a 200-Person 30,848 SF facility. The present armory was constructed in 1958 and is suitable for the planned expansion. Initial cost estimate is \$1,050,000 with Federal funding of \$741,000. Construction is anticipated for FY 85/86.

Lake Wales Armory Alteration/Expansion: A project to expand the existing 100-Person Lake Wales armory to a 200-Person armory is 95% designed. The

expanded facility will include 25,048 SF at a total cost of approximately \$681,000 with Federal funding of \$460,000. Federal funds for this project have been reprogrammed due to lack of State matching funds.

Forest Capital Armory Renovations - Perry: During 1982 the Department of Military Affairs leased the former Forest Capital Hall from the Taylor County Board of County Commissioners for use as a National Guard armory. The facility is in a good location and with the minor repairs/renovations project, which was completed in March at a cost of approximately \$80,000, will make an ideal National Guard armory.

#### Non-Armory Construction

Army Aviation Support Facility Expansion - Jacksonville: Construction of this project, which began in November 1982, was completed in May 1984. This project included doubling the size of the existing hangar, a new operations building, aircraft fuel storage, fuel dispensing facility, additional runways and aircraft parking aprons. Cost of this project was \$1,911,303 with 98% Federal funding support.

Helicopter Landing Lane - Camp Blanding: This project is for construction of a specially designed and remotely located 75' x 2,000' concrete Helicopter Landing Strip at Camp Blanding. The facility will be used for training helicopter pilots and crews in night vision and night auto-rotation landings. Design of this project is approximately 100% complete. Construction is scheduled to begin around 1 September 1985 and is estimated to cost \$700,000.

Range Construction - Camp Blanding: Three (3) projects for construction of new firing ranges at Camp Blanding are presently 75% designed. These ranges will be of the most modern design and constructed to meet the latest requirements in weapons qualification of the Army. Radio control of pop-up and moving targets will be a feature of all three (3) new ranges. The new ranges will be: Combat Pistol Range, Record Fire Range for M-16 Rifle, and a Crew Combat Firing Course for Crew Served Vehicular Mounted Weapons. The three (3) ranges will cost approximately \$1,000,000.

Ammunition Storage Area - Camp Blanding: A project for security and safety improvements of the Camp Blanding Ammunition Storage Area has been under development for several years. This project is quite detailed and has progressed slowly because of required coordination between National Guard Bureau, Department of the Army and the Department of Defense Explosive Safety Board. Design and necessary approvals are now 100% complete and it is expected that construction will begin late in 1985. Security lighting, lightning protection, intrusion detection systems, igloo ventilation, earthwork and road repaving will be included in the project.

Potable Water Supply System - Camp Blanding: This system has been in existence since the late 1930s and furnishes a sufficient supply of good quality water, however, the chlorination equipment installed during World War II has been inoperative for many years and is totally obsolete. This Department has been advised by the State of Florida, Department of Environmental Regulation that the water must be chlorinated in order to comply with Federal and State regulations. This project calls for construction of chlorination facilities and repair, renovation and replacement of existing wells, pumps, valves, electrical and emergency engine systems. Design is 100% complete and it is estimated that construction will commence around December 1985.

DAS 3/Class IX Facility - Starke: A new permanent facility is being designed to replace the temporary facility in use. This activity supports the repair parts requirements of all non-brigade units of the Florida Army National Guard. It will be located on State owned property adjacent to the Starke armory and will be constructed with 100% Federal funds. Design is 100% complete.

In addition to the above major projects, fencing, paving, repair and renovation projects were accomplished at numerous armories and non-armory facilities throughout the State.

The Florida Air National Guard Base, located at Jacksonville International Airport, is the home of the Florida Air National Guard. The 332-acre complex consists of 27 buildings arranged in an efficient campus setting. The buildings contain 221,155 square feet of floor space and over 133,235 square yards of pavement for a gross asset value of more than 7.6 million dollars. Recently real property actions to add on additional 170+ acres for a Munitions Maintenance Facility were completed. During FY 1985 over 2.0 million dollars were expended for the operation, maintenance, repairs, and new construction at this installation. Major construction and repair projects performed during the past year include; a 24,000 square foot addition to the squadron operations building and a 1,800 SF addition to the fire station. There are also projects in construction and under design for over 13 million dollars of construction to be constructed in FY 86, 87 and 88. The base also has an independent water supply, vehicle parking area, a 78,201 square foot aircraft maintenance hangar, a base operations building, con-

solidated maintenance facility, a dining hall and a medical clinic. The facilities were designed to incorporate functional management for nearly any mission.

#### CAMP BLANDING

General

The Armory Board maintains the Florida National Guard's 70,380 acre campsite located in Clay County. Included in this area are 40,000 acres, representing former Federal lands, deeded to the Armory Board by the Federal Government through Public Law 493, with stipulations that all the lands be maintained as a military reservation and that a Forest Management Program be conducted. The Armory Board realizes revenue from the forestry program and, also, from mineral removal occurring on these former Federal lands, all of which is utilized to defray operating expenses.

#### Utilization

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is used extensively by the Florida National Guard and by Active and Reserve Component branches of the military service. Additionally, training facilities on the reservation are used on a regular basis by various Federal, State, County, and local government agencies. Several civilian organizations, such as the Florida High Power Rifle Association, utilize the various facilities available at the Camp Blanding Military Reservation throughout the year.

A total of 348,125 mandays were used for training at the installation during the fiscal year. The Florida Army National Guard compiled 179,284 mandays of training while other states' National Guard compiled 98,647. Elements of the Reserve Components utilized 38,445 mandays, Air National Guard units used 3,898 and the Active Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force totaled 25,892 mandays at the installation. Various other government agencies and civilian organizations had 1,959 mandays of training.

The Camp Blanding Military Reservation is noted for its ranges, training facilities and dedicated support capability. Military training is the top priority for the installation and the using organization has many training facilities to select from. Fifty-five live fire ranges are now available at the installation which can support all weapon systems organic to a separate infantry brigade. Twenty-two Infantry Tactical Live Fire Movement Ranges are operational to facilitate realistic small unit training. Additionally, the largest caliber artillery weapons can fire at Camp Blanding with fifty-four surveyed artillery firing positions available. An Aerial Gunnery Range, for rotary winged gunships, and an Air Defense Artillery Range, for tracked and towed weapon systems, are unique to the southeastern United States and draw these specific units to the installation.

Camp Blanding is the home of the Florida National Guard Military Academy, consisting of the Officer Candidate School, the basic source of newly commissioned second lieutenants required for filling junior officer vacancies and the Non-Commissioned Officer Academy which provides advanced leadership training for non-commissioned officers of the Florida Army National Guard. The camp is the home training site of the Special Forces elements of the Florida Army National Guard, with its jungle type training areas, drop zone and rappelling tower facility. The Camp Blanding Army Airfield is located on the installation and can support C-7A Caribou-class aircraft.

Warehouse storage facilities continue to be occupied by the Directorate of Supply and Services (USPFO) for receipt, storage and issue of Federal property and supplies, which are utilized by the units of the Florida National Guard. The Florida National Guard Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS) continued to perform its important mission of maintenance of Federal equipment in support of units throughout the State. The Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES) facility, adjacent to the CSMS, maintains vehicles and weapons used by units in training at Camp Blanding. Equipment consists of self-propelled, tracked, twin 40MM guns, various types of engineer heavy equipment, infantry recoilless rifles, mortars and wheeled vehicles.

The regular establishment, Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps, as well as elements of their respective reserve forces, continue to utilize training areas and small arms ranges at Camp Blanding as part of their yearly programs.

The U.S. Atlantic Fleet, Fleet Air, Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, continues to maintain its leased portion of the Reservation which they and the Air Force utilize for the training of pilots, to include carrier based personnel, in air-to-ground bombing and strafing and for the operation of their Radar Scoring Station.

#### Game Management

The agreement between the Armory Board and the Department of Natural Resources, whereby portions of Camp Blanding are opened to controlled public hunting and fishing, remains in effect. Controlled burning and grain planting has been most favorable in the production of game. Lake samplings indicated that fish stocked in certain lakes have done well in most instances.

#### Forest Management

The Armory Board continues to conduct a Forest Management Program at Camp Blanding. During the year, normal road maintenance throughout the Reservation was accomplished and additionally, new roads, with drainage structures, were constructed. Harvesting and replanting of timber continues in a balanced program under the supervision of a professional forester.

#### Mining Operations

E. I. duPont deNemours and Company continues to mine in a restricted area on the western edge of Camp Blanding, Ilmenite being the principle mineral removed from the soil. DuPont, at their own expense, as an ecological project, has instituted a procedure whereby the topsoil is stripped and stockpiled, prior to the mining operation. After mining, this topsoil is redistributed, on the subsequent spoil area, thereby successfully stabilizing the spoil and improving the return of vegetation. Pine trees are now flourishing on this area.

## STATE FUNDS

#### Appropriated Funds

Disbursement of General Revenue Funds are based on appropriations made by the Florida State Legislature and are reflected in Appendix VII.

#### Armory Board Trust Fund

This fund is utilized primarily as a revolving fund from which expenditures related to Intrusion Detection Systems supervision and inspections of Air National Guard Base security costs are reimbursed with Federal Funds by the Army and Air Service Contracts.

Camp Blanding Management Trust Fund

This fund consists of revenues realized at Camp Blanding, principally from the sale of timber products and royalties received from the mining operation, and by law, is expended exclusively for the operation and maintenance of Camp Blanding.

Community Funds

Florida law provides that counties and municipalities may provide financial or material support to the National Guard. A portion of the Military Code (250.40(6), Florida Statutes) dealing with this subject is quoted below and Appendix X details that support received during fiscal year 1984-85.

Armory Board; Armories, How obtained -

In order to provide for the cooperative support of the National Guard, and that armories may be provided which will furnish suitable training facilities and adequate storage accommodations for all arms, equipment and other military property, the armory board shall have authority to receive from counties, municipalities and other sources, donations of land and contributions of money to aid in providing, improving and maintaining an arsenal, armories, camp site, target ranges, and other facilities, throughout the State, and any property so donated, shall be held as other property for the use of the State and such counties and municipalities are hereby authorized and empowered to make such donations of lands by deed or long term leases and contributions of moneys for the purposes herein set forth, and to issue bonds or certificates of indebtedness to provide funds for such purposes.

The Armory Board reemphasized its policy, during the year, that National Guard armories be utilized by the citizenry of the community, to the fullest extent possible, where such use is not to the detriment of public interest and does not interfere with the primary use of armories for the housing and training of military units stationed therein.

Service Agreements

The Federal Government and the Armory Board have cost-sharing contracts for the maintenance and operation of the physical plant of certain facilities of the Florida National Guard. The Army Service Funding Agreement, which supports the Arsenal Annex, portions of Camp Blanding, the Army Aviation Maintenance Shop and fifteen (15) Organizational Maintenance Shops, provides for a Federal share of 75% and Armory Board share of 25%. The Air Operation and Maintenance Agreement, which supports the Air National Guard Base at Jacksonville, provides for a Federal share of 80% and Armory Board share of 20%. The Air National Guard Security Agreement, annual training and weekend training activities of the Florida National Guard are 100% Federally funded.

Budgets

A recapitulation of budgeted State funds for the previous, current and next

fiscal years is displayed in Appendix VII.

#### DATA PROCESSING

The Department of Military Affairs utilizes electronic data processing, to aid in the accomplishment of its mission for the State of Florida. Due to the creation of the Information Resource Commission by the 1982-83 Legislature, plans have been broadened considerably. Expanded programs have being developed and approved for the benefit of the Military Personnel Division and our two (2) major commands. A five-year growth plan has been approved, however, the plan has not been funded.

The Data Processing Center Activity of the United States Property and Fiscal Office for Florida is the servicing facility for all Federal Automated Data Programs required by the Florida Army National Guard. These programs consist of Military Pay, Civilian Technician Payrolls, and Financial Accounting for Federal activities as they pertain to Logistics. This Center also processes on-line updating, maintains data and prepares reports for Equal Employment Officer; Maintenance Directorate; Military Personnel Directorate; Plans, Operations, Training, and Military Support Directorate; Recruiting and Retention Office; State Aviation, and Support Personnel Management Office.

The Burroughs 1955 Computer has now allowed the Army National Guard to enter the world of telecommunications with remote sites at Camp Blanding and at Craig Field, Jacksonville, Florida. This system is disk oriented and enables this Center to service activities of the Florida National Guard with programs that are responsive to their needs and to provide timely and concise information for improved control and utilization of Federal funds and equipment.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

Administrative and staff services were provided to the Headquarters and the units of the Florida National Guard. These services included public affairs, records administration, mail management, distribution of Department of the Army publications, reproductions, awards and trophies, and communications.

#### RECORDS MANAGEMENT

The Department's Archives and Records Administration Program ensures uniform procedures governing maintenance and disposition of records and the preserving of historical documents. Permanent records are microfilmed to reduce storage space.

# COMMUNICATIONS

This Headquarters maintains a reliable communication system using the following means:

SUNCOM. A dedicated State of Florida long distance telephone network for governmental agencies which provides a nationwide direct dialing capability.

Commercial Telephone. The solid state, highly versatile touch tone telephone system installed throughout the State Arsenal complex by Western Electric and Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, with its many automatic features has materially improved communications efficiency within the Headquarters. This system also has a radio telephone patch capability that expands this versatility

Statewide. The equipment and installation costs were supported jointly by Federal and State funds and will result in a 30% savings on monthly recurring costs.

Defense Communications Automatic Voice Switching Network (AUTOVON). A military worldwide general purpose dialing system providing the capability of immediate communication with other military installations.

Facsimile Communications. Facsimile is a telecommunications system for the transmission of fixed images with a view to their reception in recorded form; these images include typewritten and handwritten documents, fingerprint records, maps, charts, operation overlays, sketches, and photographs. Facsimile communications are provided for the Florida Army National Guard by a "Burroughs DEX 4100" located in the United States Property and Fiscal Office, and an OMNIFAX G35 located in the POT&MS Directorate.

National Weather Service Teletype. A teletype network providing the capability to receive written messages on all weather conditions (Severe, Hurricane Advisories) and local weather conditions throughout the State of Florida.

National Warning System (NAWAS). A voice circuit emanating from North American Air Defense Command (NORAD), Colorado Springs, Colorado, the objective of which is to establish, operate and maintain an effective nationwide warning system to alert governments and the public to the threat of extraordinary dangers. This system can also be used within the State for emergency operations and consists of over one hundred (100) extensions including the Governor's office, Division of Emergency Management, local civil preparedness agencies, police, sheriffs and weather stations.

Command State Emergency Radio Net (COMSERN). A Florida National Guard radio net providing radio communication with Florida National Guard Task Force Headquarters strategically located throughout the State.

Commercial FM. A commercial FM (line-of-sight) VHF-Hi system consisting of two (2) base stations and nineteen (19) handi-talkie radios. This system is used during emergencies for direct communications between the Adjutant General and key staff officers assigned as liaison to civil authorities and/or coordinating National Guard assistance throughout the emergency area.

Radio Amateur Civil Emergency System (RACES). A high frequency single sideband radio system. This system gives this Headquarters a long range communication link with amateur radio operators during times of emergency.

State Operations Secure Radio System. A high frequency single sideband radio voice and teletypewriter system. This system gives this Headquarters a direct link to the Department of Community Affairs, Division of Emergency Management in Tallahassee used primarily during emergencies.

Local Government Radio System (LGR). A low frequency communications system that links this Headquarters during emergencies to local civil preparedness agencies.

Automatic Digital Network (AUTODIN) has been upgraded to a secure system. It gives the Department of Military Affairs the ability to transmit and receive narrative and data traffic from world-wide subscribers. This system is located in the United States Property and Fiscal Office.

#### PUBLIC AFFAIRS

An illustrated narrative briefing of the Florida National Guard is used throughout the State to further the understanding of civic organizations, civil authorities and other groups, of the organization, responsibilities and mission of the Department of Military Affairs.

Participation in and support of various community events provides an excellent method of displaying the various military equipment the Florida National Guard is equipped with. Participation ranges from "flyovers" by our Air National Guards F-106's to band concerts and parades by our own Florida Army National Guard Band.

The history of the State Arsenal and the Military Reservation dates back to the 16th century when it was the site of a Franciscan Monastery. In order to preserve and record this unique history a museum and archives is maintained. The museum is aptly located in the former monastery cells and endeavors to tell the story of the Florida National Guard and the militia from territorial days to the present. Historical documents and artifact contributed by Guardsmen, former Guardsmen and citizens have resulted in a collection of many historical items that would have otherwise become lost to posterity.

#### COMMUNITY SERVICES

The role the National Guard plays to the State and Nation during times of

disaster and emergencies, both natural and man made and the service rendered by the Guardsmen to the citizens during these devastating occurrences are well known, little, however is said of community oriented activities of a non-military nature performed by the Guard. The armory facilities of the Florida National Guard are available for community functions and are extensively utilized by other governmental agencies; State, County and City. It is through this type of governmental cooperation that full utilization of facilities is accomplished. The armories' facilities; classrooms, drill hall, indoor rifle ranges and parking area, etc., provide excellent accommodations for conducting various activities. The armories are also available to civic and fraternal organizations for their activities. In addition a ninety-acre (90) tract at Camp Blanding, "Camp Neyati", has been made available to the Gateway Girl Scout Council, Incorporated, for camping and other activities of youth groups. The Florida National Guard units are receptive to the needs of the local scout troops, assisting with major equipment needs such as water trailers at large camp outs.

#### DECORATIONS

The Florida Cross - Awarded in the name of the Governor to the officer, warrant officer, or enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard who distinguish themselves conspicuously by extraordinary heroism at the risk of his life, or by exceptionally outstanding meritorious service to the State or Federal government.

The Florida Service Medal was established by General Orders No. 10, 1929 and is awarded to members of the Florida National Guard who have served the Florida National Guard honorably, loyally and faithfully for a period of twenty or more years in an active status. The medal will normally be awarded upon retirement as a token of gratitude and as an expression of appreciation for faithful and self-sacrificing service to the Florida National Guard, State and Nation.

Sixty-nine (69) medals were awarded during this period.

The Florida Commendation Medal was established by General Orders No. 1, 1973 and may be awarded to any member of the Florida National Guard who shall have distinguished himself by heroism, meritorious achievement or meritorious service. Award may be made to individuals not members of the Florida National Guard who distinguish themselves by an act of heroism, extraordinary achievement, or meritorious service which has been of benefit to the Florida National Guard.

Two hundred and forty-one (241) medals were awarded during this period.

#### Federal

Meritorious Service Medal, authorized by the President of the United States by Executive Order, 16 January 1969, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded for outstanding meritorious achievement or service.

The Meritorious Service Medal was awarded for meritorious service during this period to the following individuals:

Army Achievement Medal, authorized by Department of the Army and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard, under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, except general officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel, who while serving in any capacity in a noncombat area after 1 August 1981, distinguishes himself by meritorious service or achievement of a lesser degree than required for award of the Army Commendation Medal.

Armed Forces Reserve Medal, authorized by Department of the Army, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to active members of the Florida National Guard under the provisions of AR 672-5-1. This medal is awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who honorably and satisfactorily complete ten years service as a member of one or more of the Reserve Components of the Armed Forces of the United States. A ten-year device is authorized for each additional ten-year period.

Army Reserve Components Achievement Medal, established by Department of the Army General Orders No. 30, 29 June 1971. This medal is awarded for four years of honest and faithful service in a troop program unit of the Army National Guard.

NCO Professional Development Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. Awarded to all officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel for successful completion of a NCO professional development course.

Army Service Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April

1981. This ribbon is awarded to officer personnel upon successful completion of their resident basic/orientation course. Enlisted personnel will be awarded this ribbon upon successful completion of their initial MOS producing course, or upon honorable completion of four months active service, whichever is applicable.

Overseas Service Ribbon, established by the Secretary of the Army on 10 April 1981. Awarded to active members of the Florida National Guard for successful completion of an overseas tour. The Overseas Service Ribbon will not be awarded for overseas service recognized with another service medal.

Air Reserve Forces Meritorious Service Ribbon, authorized by Department of the Air Force, and awarded by the Adjutant General, State of Florida to enlisted personnel of the Florida Air National Guard under the provisions of AFM 900-3. This medal is awarded for four years of exemplary behavior, efficiency and fidelity.

#### AWARDS

The Active State Service Ribbon - Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel of the Florida National Guard who participate in a major tour of active state service in the aid of civil authorities.

The Florida Service Ribbon - Awarded to officers, warrant officers and enlisted personnel who complete five years of service in the Florida National Guard. A bronze cluster is authorized upon completion of each additional five-year period.

RIFLE AND PISTOL MARKSMANSHIP MATCHES

A limited number of National Guard rifle and pistol competitors representing the best shooters from all states are selected annually by the National Guard Marksmanship Training Unit to compete in matches not normally supported at the State Team level. Selection for participation on this U.S. National Guard Shooting Team is an honor comparable to attaining All American status in other shooting sports.

The All Guard Team represents the National Guard at such competition as National Championship Matches, International Olympic Tryouts, and Interservice Matches, as well as numerous other matches at regional level.

The Florida National Guard was afforded the honor of having MSGT Stanley F. Ferreira, 125th Resource Management Squad, selected as a member of the All National Guard Pistol Team for 1985, who participated in these matches. The National Guard teams participating at this level of competition were awarded a major portion of all individual and team awards in competition.

All National Guard Machine Gun, Pistol and Rifle Matches

All National Guard Rifle and Pistol Matches are conducted annually by the National Guard Bureau to promote marksmanship and provide a significant year-end goal of high level competition among the states. The first such match was conducted at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas in September 1973. These matches are held in honor of Major General Winston P. Wilson who accomplished so much for the marksmanship program of the National Guard during his tenure as Chief of the National Guard Bureau.

Army Area (FORSCOM Commanders) Matches

Second U.S. Army Rifle (7.62mm and 5.56mm) (Pistol Cal .22, Cal .38 and Cal .45) and Light Machine Gun (7.62 M-60) Championship Matches conducted by Commanding General, Second U.S. Army were held at Fort Benning, GA, in March 1985. Participation in this competition is limited to those teams placing in the upper fifty percent nationally during that marksmanship year.

The Florida National Guard was represented in the Light Machine Gun, Composite Rifle, and Combat Pistol Competition. The Combat Rifle Team was invited, but unable to attend due to unit annual training requirements. The final results were: Light Machine Gun won a Third place individual winner and Composite Rifle Team placed second overall.

State Marksmanship Matches (Machine Gun, Pistol, Rifle)



The Department has custody of available records of the soldiers of Florida. These records include Muster Rolls of the Indian Wars of 1835, Muster Rolls of the Florida Militia and Florida National Guard since 1835, and Rolls of the Florida troops mustered into the Confederate Forces and Union Forces in the War Between the States (Civil War), the Spanish American War, the Mexican Border Incident, World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, and the Berlin Crises. A card record is maintained for each individual who entered World War I from the State of Florida, whether by enlistment, induction through Selective Service, or induction with the Florida National Guard. In addition, an individual file folder, containing copies of all pertinent orders and personnel documents, has been retained for each individual who has been a member of the Florida National Guard (Army and Air). The individual folders for current members are separated from the folders of former members and are maintained current at all times.

A project to convert all files of former members to microfiche was begun in August 1979. The project will be accomplished by a civilian contractor in four phases. Phases I and II were completed in March of 1980. Phase III was begun in June of 1982 and it was planned for Phase IV to start immediately upon completion of Phase III. This was not accomplished due to funding cutback. Phase IV has now been funded and should be completed prior to the end of calendar year 1985. This should finalize the transition of all former members' files to microfiche. This project will have eliminated a critical records storage problem in the vault storage area and will also ensure positive record security inasmuch as duplicate rolls of film are forwarded for storage in the State Archives in Tallahassee, Florida. A microfiche camera and film/jacket inserter have been purchased to permit ongoing filming of files on members as they are separated from the Florida National Guard. This procedure eliminates any future build-up of paper files in the vault storage area.

Requests for Statements of Service and information are received continually on a day to day basis throughout the year and generally fall into two broad categories. The majority of requests in the first category are for documentary evidence to establish eligibility for some type of benefit such as Federal or State military retirement benefits; birth date and/or active Federal service for Social Security benefits; increased military longevity pay for former service; burial in a National Cemetery or government furnished grave marker; or hospitalization or other

financial benefits through the Veterans Administration. The second category pertains to requests in the interest of genealogy or history and, for the most part, are applicable to records prior to 1900. The number of Statements of Service furnished during the period of this report was 362 of which 109 were for advance certification of completion of 20 years of active service which would entitle the individual to Federal retired pay for military service upon attaining age 60. This requirement was instituted to eliminate errors and misinformation which previously would not appear until individual reached age 60, at which time he would discover that some of his service did not meet this criteria and it was too late to perform additional service to meet the requirements for Federal retired pay.

#### MILITARY SUPPORT TO CIVIL AUTHORITY

#### General

The Adjutant General has both State and Federal responsibilities in providing support to civil authorities. The State responsibility involves providing troops (National Guard) to assist civil authorities in major emergencies when authorized by the Governor. On the Federal side the Adjutant General is responsible for the preattack planning and postattack operations of all military forces (Army, Navy, Air Force and their reserve components) to support civil defense (civil authority) within the State of Florida in event of a nuclear attack against this nation.

#### Planning and Coordination

The responsibility for planning, coordination and conduct of operations in support of civil authorities is centered in the Directorate of Plans, Operations, Training and Military Support. Liaison is maintained with law enforcement agencies and the Division of Emergency Management within the State and with Federal agencies and military commands as appropriate. National Guard troop units are organized into task forces to provide a rapid response to locations within a specific area in proximity to the unit's home station. Liaison is maintained with civil authorities in their area of responsibility by these task forces.

#### Operations

The Department of Military Affairs goes into an increased readiness status immediately upon threat of civil disturbance, natural disaster, or similar emergency that may require use of National Guard troops. Measures taken include a telephone alert of key personnel, contact with local authorities and appropriate State Agencies, and review of capabilities of troop units in the emergency area. As the situation develops to a more serious threat additional actions are taken to man the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), dispatch liaison officers to the area, alert troop units and send additional equipment and communications as deemed necessary.

#### Active State Duty

Under the provisions of Chapter 250, Florida Statues, troops of the Florida National Guard were called to Active State Duty to assist civil authorities during Fiscal Year 1985 as follows:

# 31 January - 4 February 1985 - Collier County (Forest Fires)

The mission was to support the State of Florida Department of Forestry in fighting forest fires. Twelve (12) officers and ten (10) enlisted personnel were

activated.

8 - 11 March 1985 - Hamilton County (Forest Fires)

The mission was to support the Department of Forestry in fighting fires. Six (6) officers and six (6) enlisted personnel were activated.

17 - 24 May 1985 - Volusia, Flagler, Lake and Collier Counties (Forest Fires)

7 - 14 June 1985 - Madison County (Forest Fires)

During a long drought, fires broke out in the above mentioned counties. Fifty (50) officers and two hundred thirty-six (236) enlisted personnel were activated to assist the Department of Forestry and other State Agencies in controlling these fires.

#### FLORIDA NATIONAL GUARD MILITARY ACADEMY (FNGMA)

On 1 September 1975 the Florida National Guard Officer Candidate School was reorganized and redesignated as Florida National Guard Military Academy and assigned the mission of conducting both an Officer Candidate School and Non-commissioned Officer School.

The Academy is operated by a thirty-three person section consisting of eleven officers and twenty-two enlisted personnel. During the Annual Training period, the section is augmented with additional instructor and support personnel, to a desired strength of forty officer/warrant officers and one hundred fifty enlisted personnel. The Academy is accredited by the Department of the Army and is evaluated yearly by representatives of the Commanding General, Second United States Army, to determine manner of performance. The Academy has received very high ratings on each evaluation and is considered one of the best in the nation.

Officer Candidate School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School was

originally established in March 1961 by the Adjutant General of Florida. The mission of the school is to provide effective instruction requirements for appointment as second lieutenants, and to develop maximum leadership and command ability in the candidates.

Class No. 24, currently in progress, will complete their twelve months of training and will graduate and be commissioned 24 August 1985.

Class No. 25 began their training on 13 July 1985. They will continue into an Annual Training period, twelve (12) weekend training assemblies during the fall, winter and spring (Phase II), an additional fifteen (15) day Annual Training period in August 1986 (Phase III) and a minimum eight-week branch resident qualification course (Phase IV). Class No. 25 will graduate and be commissioned at completion of Phase III and attend Phase IV in an officer status within twelve months of commissioning. The program consists of a minimum of 576 hours.

The Program of Instruction taught is developed and monitored by the United States Army Infantry School Fort Benning, Georgia, in coordination with Chief, National Guard Bureau, and closely parallels the resident Infantry Officer Candidate School. All examinations are graded by the Infantry School. Methods of leadership development include rigid discipline, high standards of deportment and conduct, and exacting manner of performance, frequent and effective counseling and continuous observation, correction and evaluation. The Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School is the primary source of junior officer procurement for the Florida Army National Guard. At present 50% of all company grade officers in the Florida Army National Guard are graduates of the school. In recent years personnel of the United States Army Reserve have been admitted to the school and upon graduation are appointed second lieutenants in that component. Numbers of candidates attending the Florida National Guard Military Academy Officer Candidate School and graduates by year are shown below:

# Noncommissioned Officer School

The Florida National Guard Military Academy Noncommissioned Officer School was established 1 September 1975. The mission of the school is to develop leadership and professional military skills in selected personnel in grades E-4 through E-9 to qualify them as noncommissioned officers.

Enlisted personnel are required to complete the following courses for promotion to the next higher grade; Basic NCO Course for promotion to E-6 consisting of 113 hours; Advanced NCO Course for promotion to E-7, consisting of 66 hours; and a Senior NCO Course for promotion to E-8 and E-9, consisting of 56 hours. Through 30 July 1985, twenty-nine (29) classes have been conducted with graduates shown below:

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY (EO), SOCIAL ACTIONS (SL) AND EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY (EEO)

The Florida National Guard has several Equal Opportunity Programs: Equal Opportunity Program (EO) for Florida Army National Guard (ARNG) and Social Actions Program (SL) for Florida Air National Guard (ANG) military members. There is also an Equal Employment Opportunity Program for Federal employees and one for State of Florida Military Department career service employees. Each of these programs received continued emphasis during the year. Emphasis in the military program continues to be on upward mobility for enlisted personnel and increasing the number of minority officers in both the Army and Air National Guard. Equal Employment Opportunity Program emphasis continues to be in the area of recruitment of minorities for full-time support positions and upward mobility to higher graded positions where minorities and women continue to be underrepresented.

Twenty-one (21) EEO Counselors are appointed (additional duty) and trained in basic/advanced counseling techniques using Office of Personnel Management (OPM) courses. These personnel work in both the Military Technician and State Career Service Employee programs.

# RESERVE OFFICER PERSONNEL ACT (ROPA) 1954

The Reserve Officer Personnel Act (ROPA) continues to prescribe policy, guidance, and procedures for consideration, selection, and promotion of Army National Guard commissioned officers not otherwise selected for unit vacancy promotion.

During fiscal year 1985, 89 officers were considered for mandatory promotion by Department of Army Selection Boards with 69 being selected. This represents an overall selection rate of 77%. The statistical analysis of selection by grade is as follows:

A majority of the officers selected by the boards for mandatory promotion elect to decline promotion for the authorized period. This year, as in the past, some officers were discharged from the Florida National Guard and transferred to the non-unit USAR for promotion because no unit position vacancy existed to allow them to be promoted within the Florida Army National Guard.

The Defense Officer Personnel Modernization Act (DOPMA) was passed into law effective 15 September 1981. Although DOPMA primarily affects active component officers, there are certain residual effects relative to creditable service and grade determination upon appointment for National Guard and Army Reserve officers. The Reserve Officer Personnel Modernization Act (ROPMA), which will present the Reserve Component aspects of DOPMA, is currently under study and review. When implemented, ROPMA will replace ROPA (1954).

#### FLORIDA ARMY NATIONAL GUARD OFFICER SELECTION BOARDS

State Selection Boards were established in Florida in 1963 as a positive method of implementing a career development program for officer personnel. The Boards convene as necessary to fill Major, Lieutenant Colonel, Colonel, and certain General Officer position vacancies. It is also charged with the responsibility of recommending to the Adjutant General, reassignment of battalion commanders, changes in field grade staff assignments, and acceptance of declination of ROPA promotions to Colonels.

The Senior Officer Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General and the two General Officer Commanders, met 3 times during fiscal year 1985 recommending promotion of 0 Colonels to Brigadier General, 6 Lieutenant Colonels to Colonel, reassignment of 2 Colonels and 4 Lieutenant Colonels, transfer of 5 Colonels, and 12 Lieutenant Colonels and acceptance of 0 declinations of promotion to Colonel under ROPA provisions.

The Field Grade Selection Board, composed of the Assistant Adjutant General, General Officer Commanders, Commanders of 227th Field Artillery Brigade, 50th Area Support Group, 53rd Signal Group and 202nd Medical Group recommended

promotion of 9 Majors to Lieutenant Colonel, 17 Captains to Major, and reassignment and transfer of 38 Field Grade Officers.

#### SELECTIVE RETENTION

A Selective Retention Program was implemented by the National Guard on 1 July 1969. NGR 635-102 prescribes the procedures and policies for conduct of the Selective Retention Board. The Selective Retention Board, conducted during the first quarter of each calendar year considers officers and warrant officers with 20 or more qualifying years of service for retired pay. Originally, the regulation required individuals to be considered every year following completion of the 20 qualifying years of service. However, beginning with the Board in 1974, the regulation was changed to provide that the Board would be convened annually but individuals would be considered every other year instead of every year. This substantially reduced the number of individuals reviewed by the Board each year. Factors considered by the Board include demonstrated performance, physical fitness, civilian and military education, previous assignments, and potential for future staff and command assignments.

Since inception of the Selective Retention Board in July 1969, sixteen Boards have been held. Results of these boards since 1977 are as follows:

# ENLISTED QUALITATIVE RETENTION BOARD

The Enlisted Oualitative Retention Board, as required by AR 135-205, is convened during the period January-March each year for the previous calendar year. The records of all enlisted personnel who have 20 qualifying years of service, without regard to Expiration of Term of Service or grade, are reviewed every two years except when the convening authority or the unit commander determines that an annual review is necessary.

The Board, consisting of two officers, the State Command Sergeant Major and 2 other Command Sergeants Major, recommends to the Adjutant General of Florida those individuals who have future potential benefits to the Army National Guard based on demonstrated performance as attested to by Efficiency Reports, a review of all Military Personnel Records, and physical fitness.

Since inception of the Qualitative Retention Board in June of 1974, eleven Boards have been held. Results of these boards since 1976 are as follows:

A reconsideration procedure was provided for by the regulation beginning with the 1984 Board. Of the 17 not recommended for retention by the 1984 Board, 6 requested reconsideration and 3 were sustained by The Adjutant General of

Florida.

#### ARMY NATIONAL GUARD TRAINING

Training of the Florida Army National Guard is based on standards established by the Department of the Army, in coordination with the National Guard Bureau. The Commanding General, Second United States Army is charged with the responsibility of evaluation, coordination, support and supervision of training. There are three phases of training:

Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training for development of basic soldiering skills and techniques, culminating with the assignment of a Military Occupational Specialty (MOS). Soldiers are awarded a MOS commensurate with the type of training received which denotes their qualification to perform the duties of a particular job assignment.

Collective Unit Training is conducted by units of the Florida Army National Guard. This collective training is designed to produce mission capable units qualified to perform their assigned wartime mission. The Army fights with combat battalions and supports with combat support/service support companies. The objective of the Army National Guard is to attain the highest readiness level of individual and collective unit proficiency that is achievable in a premobilization status. The Army CAPSTONE Program aligns units into wartime organizations. This program identifies a wartime mission for all organizations. Collective ARTEP training focuses on actual wartime missions rather than striving for peacetime proficiency in all ARTEP tasks assigned to a unit. The refinement of training objectives allows commanders to focus their training efforts on the most important tasks required to satisfactorily perform their wartime mission.

Emphasis is placed on the performance of training in a field environment. Field exercises are conducted in the field under simulated combat conditions (in which personnel and equipment of one force are actually present, while those of the opposing force may be real or imaginary). Field exercises are training vehicles that may be squad through brigade size operations. They are tactically oriented and designed to prepare participating units for their wartime mission.

Evaluation of training is a leadership responsibility within the Florida Army National Guard. Evaluations produce information commanders at all echelons can use to account for training and hold subordinate leaders responsible for training and training management actions. The culmination of the training cycle is the completion of an External ARTEP Evaluation. During Training Year 1984-1985, all units administered External ARTEP Evaluations, accomplished the task in a most professional manner.

#### FULL TIME SUPPORT PERSONNEL

GENERAL: Congress provided substantial growth to the Army National Guard in full-time support personnel. The Active Guard/Reserve (AGR) program provides National Guard on full-time Title 32 active duty. This program was expanded in FY 85, nation-wide, and specifically provided Florida with 187 additionally supported Army National Guard AGR positions. While some were a result of new unit additions, most were added to field organizations to provide no less than four full-time support personnel at all armories in Florida. The Air National Guard also grew in both numbers of support personnel and units. They increased in full-time support by 39 positions.

NEW UNITS: The Air National Guard activated the 202nd Civil Engineer Squadron (Red Horse) at Camp Blanding on 1 January 1985. The unit has employed

over 50% of their full-time support personnel, attained greater than 50% military membership, and deployed during the fiscal year. The Army National Guard activated a new field artillery battalion; a new Unit Training Equipment Site at Avon Park authorized 20 full-time support personnel; a new organizational maintenance shop at St. Petersburg authorized 5 full-time support personnel; and relocated several units because of the new battalion organization requirements.

FULL TIME SUPPORT CAREER PROBLEMS: Once again, Congress continued the prohibition against movement of military technician (Civil Service) support from field units into support elements. Even though the expressed long-range goal is for all mobilization entities in the Army structure to become Active Guard/Reserve support, the micromanagement by Congress continues to prevent the Guard from moving effectively in that direction. The current Congress has agreed to some relief in FY 86. While the Army Guard enjoys the highest level of full-time support in history, the increased reliance as a ready force and an immediate fighting team is also a challenge to the full-time force. The training for both the full-time force and M-Day soldiers in leadership, management, and military job skills is now competing for work production time. The Army Guard is now supported in Florida with 1018 full-time support personnel as compared to 567 in FY 80. The increase to 7 1/2% of the military strength is reflecting favorably on a daily basis in improved readiness of all units in Florida. Additional supervisory training needs were identified last year, and two Florida Guard officers developed a course that graduated 155 supervisors this summer. The lower graded positions continue to provide recruiting problems in the personnel system. Competitive hiring (persons not required to be Guard members) has been increased at these levels to stabilize the workforce and provide more experienced and mature applicants.

FULL TIME SUPPORT LEGISLATION: Many bills were filed to change Civil Service benefits, especially retirement benefits; but no significant changes were achieved. The challenge by the unions in a uniform-wearing issue was heard during August in the Eleventh Circuit Court of Appeals. In union negotiations (1973), the Florida National Guard refused to negotiate the right of the technician to wear civilian clothing. Through many courts and briefs, the case has proceeded to this level. A similar case in New York was adjudicated in favor of the National Guard. We expect a favorable decision.

ECONOMIC IMPACT: The growth of both Army and Air National Guard full-time support in FY 85 was evenly spread throughout Florida. The Army Guard grew from 904 to 1018 and the Air National Guard from 358 to 397 - a grand total of 1415 full-time support personnel (Federally funded positions). Growth of the full-time workforce has produced an increase of 10 million over FY 84. The Federal payroll impact for the Florida Army and Air National Guard is estimated to be 41 million dollars for FY 85.

RESERVE OFFICER TRAINING CORP (ROTC) PROGRAMS

Reserve Forces Duty Program (RFD)

This program was designed to place ROTC RFD graduates in Army National Guard or U.S. Army Reserve units rather than allowing them to become members of the Individual Ready Reserve (IRR).

ROTC Early Commission Program (ECP)

This program is available to ROTC Cadets who have completed all ROTC

requirements but have not completed baccalaureate degree requirements. These cadets may now be commissioned provided they have been accepted for appointment as Second Lieutenants in the Army National Guard. The policy is designed to authorize cadets, who want to join an ARNG unit upon commissioning to serve as Second Lieutenants while continuing their education. The program provides benefits to the individual and the military. The individual receives valuable training and experience, pay and allowances, and retirement points while pursuing the balance of his college education. The ARNG benefits by an increase in assigned officer strength and participation.

ROTC Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP)

Authorizes ROTC cadets enrolled in Military Science (MS) III and Military Science (MS) IV to be active members of both ROTC and Army National Guard/USAR units. ROTC cadets are now authorized to receive the monthly pay plus all drill pay and allowances from participation with the Army National Guard.

ROTC Delayed Entry Program (DEP)

Allows ROTC graduates who have received their baccalaureate degree and commission to become members of the Army National Guard and delay their active duty requirements for up to 36 months while pursuing an advanced degree.

ROTC Scholarship Program

The purpose of this program is to identify outstanding students on campus or in the ARNG and offer them the opportunity for a scholarship with service in the ARNG after graduation. This is a two-year scholarship. Two scholarships were available for each state in CY 84, however, the necessary information was received too late to effectively solicit applicants by the deadline.

## INITIAL ACTIVE DUTY FOR TRAINING PROGRAM

The Reserve Enlisted Program of 1963 (REP-63) (Requirement of Initial Active Duty Training for Non-prior Service Personnel) continued during the period of the report.

The Split Training Option, which was initiated in June 1978 on a pilot program basis, has continued through the period of this report. As of 30 June 1985, 107 enlisted members are undergoing Phase II of the program. An additional 85 were enlisted for and are participating in Phase I of the program. This is a total of 192 individuals.

The nationwide time-sharing computer service, using a national tele-communications network with remote terminals capable of simultaneously accessing a common data bank containing the annual Basic Training and Advanced Individual Training base, continues to be utilized in securing training spaces for non-prior service individuals.

Sufficient quotas have been obtained from the Department of the Army to preclude any backlog from occurring during the year. Except for unusual circumstances, non-prior enlistees enter their initial active duty for training within 30 to 180 days after enlistment. Bona fide high school seniors can be delayed from training for up to 270 days to provide input quotas following graduation from high school.

A total of 880 trainees entered initial active duty for training during this period with 809 completing their training and returning to their National Guard units.

#### SCHOOL PROGRAM

The Army National Guard Schools Program provides the main vehicle for the branch and technical training of Officer and Enlisted personnel to the Florida Army National Guard, whereby they are afforded the opportunity to qualify themselves to fill their unit MTOE/MTDA assignments and receive advanced training in critical Military Occupational Specialties. It is through the media of the Schools Program, which is supported by Federal funds, that Officer and Enlisted personnel complete their training in their chosen fields and are able to maintain proficiency in the areas of Combat Arms, Technical and Administrative fields.

#### RECRUITING AND RETENTION

During fiscal year 1985 the Florida Army National Guard reflected a net gain of 986 personnel. During the period, 2,677 new enlistments were produced of which 32% were non-prior service and 68% were prior service personnel.

Florida's retention rate was 68% which exceeds the national average. Florida's attrition rate was approximately 18% during this period ranking number 8 nationally.

Florida reflects a current strength of 10,948 personnel for a 98.2% fill rate and ranks number 26 of all states nationally in percentage of assigned strength compared with authorized strength.

Recruiting and Retention must continue to receive command emphasis during the coming year to ensure a continued growth for the Florida Army National Guard.

#### FEDERAL FUNDS AND EQUIPMENT

The United States Property and Fiscal Officer (USPFO) for Florida is charged with the responsibility as pertains to comptroller matters, purchasing and contracting, transportation, supply and logistics, and maintenance of Federal property. He is assisted by a technician work force to maintain these accountable records. The USPFO mission is to assist, those units of the Florida Army and Air National Guard with the necessary administrative and logistical support when they are mobilized for Federal active duty.

The Florida Army National Guard continues to be better equipped than in previous years. This is due primarily to the receipt of more modern equipment, and additional funding being made available to the State of Florida by the Federal

#### Government.

The National Guard now fills a major role in future national crises. This policy by the Secretary of Defense ensures that additional modernized equipment and funding will be made available to the National Guard for the support of this increased national defense role. In keeping with this policy, the Federal Government has furnished the following new items of major equipment during the period 1 July 1984, through 30 June 1985.

There were 541 full-time Federal employees paid from Federal funds during the period 1 July 1984 to 10 June 1985. Federal funds, during the period 1 July 1984 to 30 June 1985, expended in direct support of the Florida Army National Guard, totaled \$72,762,281. At the close of 30 June 1985, the value of Army equipment on hand in the state totaled approximately \$208,000,000.

#### INTER-SERVICE AGREEMENT

All Active and Reserve Forces, which include the National Guard, currently operate under a policy whereby one service may support another on a reimbursable basis. This policy reduces duplication of effort, gives a faster response to requirements and effects an overall savings to the Federal Government and ultimately to the taxpayer. The Florida National Guard receives supplies and services from the active installations throughout the State of Florida, and we are thereby able to support our troops in a better manner at a cost savings to the Government. Conversely, the Florida National Guard supports the active and other reserve forces by furnishing supplies and services on a reimbursable basis.

#### SURFACE MAINTENANCE FOR FEDERAL PROPERTY

The program providing technical guidance and expected quality standards for maintenance of Federal Property (Surface), assigned to Florida Army National Guard units, is published in Florida National Guard Circular 750-1, Maintenance of Supplies and Equipment - Maintenance Support Plan. The program is administered under the supervision of the State Maintenance Officer through 15 Organizational Maintenance Shops (OMS), one Combined Support Maintenance Shop (CSMS), a Satellite Combined Support Maintenance Shop, a Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES), and a Unit Training Equipment Site (UTES).

Responsibility for maintenance is assigned at the lowest echelon possible. Unit organizational maintenance capabilities are utilized to the maximum and are augmented, by the Organizational Maintenance Shops, the Unit Training Equipment

Site, and the Mobilization and Training Equipment Site. Support maintenance, that echelon of maintenance requiring a higher level of expertise, tools and test equipment than found at organizational maintenance, is accomplished by four Direct Support Maintenance Companies, a General Support Heavy Equipment Maintenance Company, and a General Support Light Equipment Maintenance Company during Inactive Duty and Annual Training. These companies are augmented by the Combined Support Maintenance Shop and the Satellite Combined Support Maintenance Shop. The fifteen Organizational Maintenance Shops, the Combined Support Maintenance Shop(s), Unit Training Equipment Shop and Mobilization and Training Equipment Site are staffed with 210 highly skilled National Guard technicians.

Two Service Companies, a Collection and Classification Company and a Test Measurement Diagnostic Equipment (TMDE) Company, provide specialized, technically oriented, support to the Florida Army National Guard's Federal equipment. The Collection and Classification Company obtains battle damaged, or salvageable equipment items and through reclamation procedures returns the items to operational condition or recovers serviceable parts for use in the repair of other equipment. The TMDE Company performs calibration services on Federal equipment to ensure that technical standards and operational efficiency is maintained.

#### ARMY AVIATION

The Army Aviation Support Facility Command (AASFC) is located at Craig Airport, Jacksonville, Florida. The aviation units are: Aviation Section, 53rd Infantry Brigade (Separate); Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion (Combat Support); Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion (Attack Helicopter); and the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon (Forward). The aviation elements continue to operate under the September 1978 reorganization structure with the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon being added in March 1979.

The Aviation Support Facility Commander is directly responsible to the Adjutant General of Florida for the command, supervision and training of Companies C and D, 26th Aviation Battalion and the 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon. The 53rd Infantry Brigade Aviation element is attached to the Aviation Support Facility for supervision of technical aviation training and coordination of administration and logistics with the Brigade Commander. In order to accomplish the desired level of training and proficiency, the AASFC employs 84 technicians in various positions within the command structure. Eleven of these individuals are employed under the Active Guard Reserve (AGR) program.

Aviation assets assigned and supported by the Army Aviation Support Facility, Craig Field, Jacksonville at the end of the fiscal year were: 21 OH-58A's, 30 UH-1H's, 15 AH-1S (Modernized Cobra's), and 1 U-21A. Florida transferred 2 TH-1G's and 7 AH-1S (MOD's) to other states during the year as we received the new AH-1S's from the factory.

Army Aviation has a dual mission. That mission is: Federal or State - to provide units organized, equipped, and trained to function efficiently at existing strength in the protection of life and property and the preservation of peace, order, and public safety under competent order of Federal or State authorities. Federal - to provide trained units and qualified individuals available for active duty in time of war or national emergency in support of the Army's war plans and at such time as the national security may require augmentation of the Active Forces.

Operations and Training

The Operations and Training section of the AASFC is staffed by an Operations Officer, Aviation Safety Officer, five Flight Instructors and two Flight Operations Specialists. The Operations and Training section is responsible for coordinating, scheduling and conducting all phases of individual aviator training until the aviator is considered operational ready to perform all unit mission tasks in the various flight modes required. The Operations and Training section is also responsible for coordinating and scheduling all aviation mission support requested by ground elements throughout the state. Active state duty missions are also coordinated and supported by consolidation of aviation elements by the Operations and Training section.

The Operations and Training section conducts Unit Schools (formal courses of instruction approved and funded by the National Guard Bureau) throughout the fiscal year. These schools provide aircraft refresher or qualification training, instrument flight training and qualification, terrain flight training and qualification and night vision goggle training and qualification for all assigned aviators.

Army National Guard aviators are required to meet the same training requirements, performance standards and flight hour requirements as the Active Army Aviator. These requirements are accomplished during the training year at unit schools, during weekend Multiple Unit Training Assemblies (MUTA's), at Additional Flight Training Periods (AFTP's) conducted during the weekday evenings and limited weekends by the AASFC, during Annual Training (AT) periods, and during the training year in the 2B24 Synthetic Flight Training Simulator (SFTS) located at Hunter Army Airfield, Savannah, Georgia; and the 2B33 AH-1 Flight and Weapons Simulator located at Fort Rucker, Alabama.

Annual Training for Company D, 26th Aviation Battalion was conducted at

Camp Blanding this year during the period 23 Mar - 6 Apr 85. Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion and Aviation Section, 53rd Infantry Brigade also attended Annual Training at Camp Blanding during the period 27 Apr - 11 May 1985. The 11th Air Traffic Control Platoon trained at Fort Chaffee, Arkansas, from 1 Jun - 15 Jun 1985 for their Annual Training period. Ratings received this year from the Active Army Evaluator teams again reflected the high state of readiness maintained by the aviation elements. Company C, 26th Aviation Battalion was given an external Army Readiness Training Evaluation and received an excellent rating during the evaluation.

Florida National Guard aviation units also supported several additional Annual Training periods during the year by providing mission and medevac support to ground elements of the National Guard. These were Medevac support for the Training Site, Camp Blanding, in support of the Alabama National Guard Annual Training during the period 7 - 21 Jul 1984; medevac support 28 Jul - 12 Aug 1984 for the Florida National Guard Military Academy; medevac support for Co D, 26th Aviation Battalion, Camp Blanding, 20 Mar - 6 Apr 1985; medevac support for 3/116th Artillery Battalion, Camp Blanding, 6 - 20 Apr 1985; medevac support for the 202nd Medical Group, Camp Blanding, 15 May - 1 Jun 1985; mission and medevac support for the 227th Field Artillery Brigade, Camp Blanding, 5 - 22 Jun 1985; mission support for the 53rd Signal Group and 146th Signal Battalion, Fort Gordon, Georgia, 8 - 22 Jun 1985.

State missions were also supported during the fiscal year by aviation elements of the Florida Army National Guard. Members of the state legislature were taken on an aerial tour of the east coast to check erosion of the beaches on 20 December 1984. Forest fires again struck our state and aviation elements were called to Active State Duty to assist the Forestry Department in combating these fires. Elements were on duty 31 Jan - 4 Feb 1985 in Naples; 8 -11 Mar 1985 in the Lake City area; 18 - 23 May 1985 in Flagler county and in Volusia county; 7 - 14 Jun 1985 in Madison.

A high state of operational readiness to meet the Federal and State mission is maintained throughout the aviation units by skilled crewmembers and support personnel. Aviation flying hour experience averages 2,300 hours per aviator.

Mission ready aircraft were available and utilized to accomplish the 1985 flying hour program as follows: UH-1, 4393 hours; OH-58, 1890 hours; AH-1, 2066 hours; U-21, 298 hours; for a total yearly program of 8647 hours.

Community Relations and Civil Assistance

Army Aviation units regularly participate in community programs, static displays, etc., and the Support Facility continues to provide an excellent attraction for local groups on educational field trips.

The Aviation Support Facility continues to provide the Emergency Medical Evacuation for the transport of neonatal patients from the surrounding counties to Jacksonville hospitals. These and other humanitarian efforts are published throughout the community and continue to enhance public relations and awareness of the Florida Army National Guard.

#### Maintenance

The Army Aviation Maintenance Shop (AAMS) is tasked with providing aviation unit maintenance (AVUM) and limited aviation intermediate maintenance

(AVIM) for 67 aircraft assigned to the Florida Army National Guard.

Sixty-five Federally funded military technicians are employed at the AAMS on a daily basis in direct support of the maintenance program. Each full-time employee is also a member of one of the subordinate TO&E aviation units assigned to the AASFC. Fifteen aviation career field maintenance occupational specialties are performed on a full-time basis at the AAMS. These specialities include aircraft mechanic, technical inspector, engine mechanic, technical supply, avionics, sheet metal, electronics, prop and rotor repair, armament and airfield fuel handlers, fireman and ground support maintenance.

The 43,500 sq ft AAMS hangar is the hub for maintenance training for over 230 enlisted guardsmen assigned to Companies C and D, 26th Aviation Battalion and the Flight Section, 53rd Infantry Brigade. Just as each aviator directly benefits from realistic and challenging flight training, each crewchief, aircraft mechanic and other aviation MOS soldiers have equally responsible and critical maintenance skills to perform. During MUTAs and weekdays, guardsmen are heavily evolved in the scheduled and unscheduled by-the-book maintenance of aircraft.

With the assignment of the AH-1S Modernized Cobra, the Florida Guard has stepped further into the computer age maintaining on-board equipment such as the Doppler Navigation System, which gives grid coordinates down to 10 digits for any location in the world and the fire control computer, which takes into account the flight and atmosphere variables that effect "steel on target" reliability.

The state active duty fire mission saw the workhorse of the Florida fleet, the UH-1H Huey, at its best, working daylight to dusk saving lives and property with 230 gallon water filled buckets suspended from cargo hooks. The Huey's logged over 300 flight hours during the fire fighting operation; a tribute to the machines and the professionalism of the crews and maintenance personnel - all keys to the state's outstanding aviation program.

#### AIR NATIONAL GUARD

The Florida Air National Guard consists of the Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard, located at the State Arsenal, St. Augustine, Florida, the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group located at Jacksonville International Airport; the 290th Joint Communications Support Squadron, located at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa; the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron at Camp Blanding; and an Alert Detachment, (125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA) located at Homestead Air Force Base, Florida. The Florida Air National Guard has an authorization of 136 officers and 1324 airmen, 1460 total.

The Florida Air National Guard is commanded by Brigadier General Otha R. Smith, Jr., Assistant Adjutant General for Air, and Brigadier General Homer H. Humphries, Jr., Chief of Staff.

The role of Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard includes the command, control and supervision of Air National Guard units in Florida, the employment of ANG resources during state emergencies and the interpretation, coordination and implementation of Air Force and National Guard Bureau policies within Florida. Headquarters, Florida Air National Guard has significantly expanded its dual State-Federal role during the last few years, having established the 290th Joint Communications Support Squadron during FY 84 and the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron in FY 85. Appendix IV indicates the organizational structure of the Florida Air National Guard.

125th Fighter Interceptor Group

The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group consists of nine subordinate units; the 125th Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, 125th Combat Support Squadron, 125th Resource Management Squadron, 125th Civil Engineering Flight, 125th Security Police Flight, 125th USAF Clinic, 159th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, 125th Communications Flight (Support) and the 8125th Student Flight. The 125th Fighter Interceptor Group has an authorization of 107 officers, with 95 assigned, and 877 airmen.

#### Personnel

Most of this reporting period was devoted to obtaining military authorization and enlisting/assigning personnel to the newly activated 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (Red Horse Unit) at Camp Blanding, Starke, Florida and the continuing enlisting/assignment for the 290th Combat Communications Squadron at MacDill Air Force Base, Florida. The 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron was authorized effective 1 January 1985. We are continuing personnel support to these two organizations and the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group OLAA (Alert Detachment) at Homestead Air Force Base, Florida.

Recruiting and retention was again a big personnel factor. Enlistment averaged at least 20 members per month and caused a great deal of personnel paperwork and coordination. Several personnel policies concerning enlistment processing were relaxed due to a nation-wide recruiting effort.

Inspections/Evaluations

The NORAD Inspector General conducted a No-notice Alert Force Evaluation (NAFE) against the unit's alert force on 14 September 1984. An overall rating of Excellent was received.

# Deployments/Exercises

A Checkered Flag Deployment was conducted during the period 22-27 April 1985 in conjunction with a 23rd NORAD Region sponsored Southeast Brave Exercise. Seventy-five personnel and six F-106 aircraft deployed to Glynco Jetport, Brunswick, Georgia. The purpose of the exercise was to evaluate the unit's capability to mobilize, deploy, regenerate and employ forces from a dispersed location while continuing wartime operations at home station.

From 11-25 May 1985, sixty-eight personnel and six F-106 aircraft deployed to Tyndall AFB, Florida, in support of a Commander, Tactical Air Command (TAC) sponsored Copper Flag Exercise. This exercise is designed to provide realistic training for dedicated and augmentation Air Defense Forces. Intercepts are flown against a formidable target force employing chaff and electronic counter-measures (ECM) at low altitude and supersonic speeds.

On 28 May 1985, fifty-six personnel and five F-106 aircraft deployed out of CONUS to Goosebay, Canada in support of a JCS sponsored Amalgam Brave Exercise. Personnel and equipment were airlifted to the deployment site via C-141 aircraft while the F-106's flew direct with an inflight aerial refueling by KC-135 aircraft. Intercepts were flown against a variety of NATO aircraft, mostly at very low altitudes. All personnel and aircraft redeployed on 9 June 1985.

In addition to the above deployments, the 125th FIG also participated in two 9AF sponsored Quick Thrust Exercises, a JCS sponsored Solid Shield Exercise, a SAC Global Shield Exercise and seven NORAD Air Defense Exercises. All were flown out of Jacksonville Air National Guard Base, Florida.

#### Operations

NORAD Alert continues as our primary mission. A total of 23 scrambles were flown from Jacksonville, with approximately one-half involving the intercept of Soviet TU-95 Bear aircraft on round-robin surveillance flights out of Cuba.

Weekly Performance Analysis by Continuous Evaluation (PACE) flights which verify radar and radio equipment operation within 23rd NORAD Region's area of responsibility, continue to be flown. This year several new routes have been added including an evaluation of the Aerostat at Cudjoe Key, Florida.

The 125th FIG also continues to support other NORAD Regions with deployed target support for their exercises, missile prelaunch weather verification flights for the Eastern Missile Test Range and Airborne Warning and Control System (AWACS) controller and battle staff training.

This year we became responsible for all of the F-106 qualification training for newly assigned Undergraduate Pilot Trainees. This training includes initial and mission qualification in the F-106 and consists of approximately forty-three sorties. So far we have completed training one individual and are about to complete the second.

After being relieved of our nuclear capability earlier this year, the unit was given the go-ahead to acquire the M61A1 20mm Gatling gun for the F-106. In less than three months, all guns were procured and mated to the aircraft, scopes and gunsights installed, and aircrews trained. Operational date was 15 April 1985.

A total of 3664 sorties and 6368 hours of flying time were accumulated in the F-106 aircraft. T-33 aircraft flew 826 hours and the C-131 flew 353 hours. There were no major accidents during this period.

#### Maintenance

For the period 1 July 1984 - 30 June 1985, the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group had approximately 188 Air Technicians employed in the maintenance complex for support of the F106 aircraft and its mission. This unit also has an Alert Detachment located at Homestead AFB, Florida. By utilizing the part-time personnel throughout the year on a staggered field training program allows this unit the capability and technical skills to support 22 F-106 aircraft plus five support aircraft. The 125th FIG has flown 3,655 sorties and 5,870.7 hours for this period with the F-106 aircraft. In addition to the present armament system we received the M61A1 (20mm) gun in February and installed in March 1985 which allows this aircraft greater fire power.

During the past six months the maintenance activity supported three major deployments. From 22-27 April 1985 (Checkered Flag Deployment) at Brunswick, Georgia; 11-25 May 1985 (Copper Flag 85-2) at Tyndall AFB, Florida; and 28 May - 9 June 1985 (Amalgam Brave) at Goosebay, Canada. Each deployment evaluated this unit's capability to support the various missions in weapons, aircrew, loading crews and maintenance capabilities.

# Federal Funds and Equipment

The Assistant USP&FO for Air (Property), during this reporting period, continued to provide effective support for all 125th Fighter Interceptor Group units, 290th Combat Communications Squadron and 125th Fighter Interceptor Group (OLAA), Homestead AFB, Florida and 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (Red Horse). Supplies and equipment budget for FY 86 is projected at \$2,520,312. The average warehouse inventory managed by Base Supply was 15,802 line items valued at \$5,010,030. Through computer accounting, Supply recorded an average of 23,542 transactions per month. Equipment in use by all organizations is valued at \$15,531,487. With this amount of supplies and equipment, supply has consistently maintained an inventory accuracy of 99% for the year.

#### Accounting and Finance

During this reporting period, the Assistant USPFO for Air (Fiscal) continued to manage all funds in a professional manner while providing efficient customer service in the Military and Civilian Pay function to all members of the Florida Air National Guard.

This period was especially challenging with the addition of the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR) which is located at Camp Blanding, Starke, Florida. In addition, budgetary cut-backs in vital programs have required extensive funds re-programming and additional emphasis on ensuring prudent utilization of existing resources.

The Military Pay and Travel Functions have successfully supported eleven deployments. This involved three full mobility processing lines in which all deploying personnel were provided advance travel pay. These actions reflect an increase of 300% over the number of deployments processed during the prior reporting period.

In conjunction with the above actions, this unit has maintained an obligation rate of 99.9% for all allocated funds. This encompassed 33,432 accounting transactions, 27,732 Military Pay transactions, pay support for 276 Civilian Technician personnel and 93 Full Time Active Guard/Reserve (AGR) Technicians, and approximately 1,517 Travel Vouchers.

# Data Processing

Equipment has been received that provide the ability for the Standard Base Supply System to read Bar Coded Labels. This will facilitate handling of bench stock, clothing and tool issue, and receiving transactions.

A Zenith Z-100 mini computer has been installed for the Military Pay Section and for the 290th JCSS. Another Z-100 has been ordered for the Mobility Section (LGX).

The Phase IV equipment to replace existing Burroughs terminals has been received. They will be installed in December 1985, when Moody AFB replaces their Burroughs B3700 with the Sperry S1100-60 X2 computer.

### Vehicle Operations and Maintenance

The Vehicle Maintenance section performed both scheduled and unscheduled maintenance on 164 vehicle equivalents. Average cost to operate the total fleet for the year was \$184.00 per unit per month. The vehicle out of commission rate for the total fleet was 2.68% which was well below the Air Force standards of 10%. The vehicle deadlined for parts rate was 1.3%, and the vehicle deadlined for maintenance rate was 1.4%, both well below accepted Air Force standards. The total fleet average cost was 41 cents per mile. Vehicle Operations administered 264 vehicle operators tests with a passing rate of 90%. The vehicle fleet averaged 31,000 miles driving and 1,158 hours operated per month with two reportable accidents.

With the responsibility of three additional units within the state, our vehicle ground fuel consumption showed no reduced rate for the year.

#### Base Contracting

The Base Contracting Office is responsible for purchasing supplies, services and equipment for the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group, HO, FANG at St. Augustine, the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron at MacDill AFB, Florida, and 125th FIG Detachment 1 located at Homestead AFB, Florida. Also, several minor construction projects have been completed or are in work at this time. In addition, assistance was rendered to the USPFO at St. Augustine in administration of major construction projects.

Three thousand nine hundred and sixty-one transactions were processed by our office during the past year with a total expenditure of \$689,704.

Logistics Plans and they brooms a need

The Logistics Plans area is responsible for the unit deployment planning and Support Agreement for the Florida Air National Guard.

There has been three deployments this year:

- 1. Glynco Jetport, Brunswick, Georgia (Checkered Flag Exercise)
- 2. Tyndall AFB, Florida (Copper Flag Exercise)
- 3. Goosebay, Canada (Amalgam Brave 85 Exercise)

There has been two support agreements completed this year; one for the 290 Combat Communications Squadron and one with the Eastern Space and Missile Center, Patrick AFB, Florida. Two support agreements have been started for 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron at Camp Blanding. One support agreement rewrite for the 125th FIG with Moody AFB, Georgia. There is one change in process for the 290th Combat Communication Squadron support agreement.

#### 125th USAF Clinic

The mission of the 125th USAF Clinic is to provide medical support for the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group including limited medical and dental care and processing physical examinations. The following workload was generated providing these services:

Seven officers and eighteen airmen performed annual training atMoody AFB, Georgia.

The unit experienced several noteworthy items during the year:

Colonel Charles E. King, Jr., Commander, and Captain John C. Whitchurch attended the NGB sponsored Health Services Executive Management at I.G. Brown Professional Military Education Center.

Major John G. Camblin responded to a call from the regular Air Force and performed eighteen days duty at USAF Hospital, Kusan Air Base, Korea, and twenty days with the PAANG in Honduras in support of AHUA TARA III.

Colonel Joe C. Ebbinghouse (attached from HO FLANG) and SMSgt Duane G. Bunk performed a short tour in the NGB Surgeon's office at the Air National Guard Support Center.

TSgt Roger A. MacEwen provided medical support to exercise Checkered Flag for six days.

2LT Gwendolyn C. Murphy deployed to Holloman Air Force Base, New Mexico for twenty-one days in response to a personnel shortage.

Training

Fiscal Year 1985 has been a record year for Base Training with more

personnel attending Basic Training, Technical Schools, Special Courses, and more Career Development Courses, than any previous year in our history. This is due in part to intensified efforts to train and qualify personnel of the new units to full combat ready status.

The Group also had more personnel on OJT than ever before with an average of 194 personnel on some level of on-the-job training during the period of this report. One hundred and twenty-one personnel were upgraded in their specialty this period, which again was a new all time high.

Annual Training is conducted on a year round basis except for certain deployments the units participated in. These deployments included:

Checkered Flag (Glynco Jetport, Georgia)
Copper Flag (Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida)
Amalgam Brave (Goosebay, Canada)
Prime Beef Deployment (Torrejon Air Base, Spain)
Fire Protection Deployment (Volk Field, Wisconsin)
125th USAF Clinic Deployment (Moody Air Force Base, Georgia)

In the area of Professional Military Education (PME), three officers graduated from the Academy of Military Science, four airmen from Leadership School Course I, three from Course II, four NCO's from NCO Academy Course I, four from Course II and two from the 6 weeks course.

290th Joint Communications Support Squadron

#### Personnel

The 290th Combat Communications Squadron, Florida Air National Guard, was officially notified and redesignated on 15 June 1985 as the 290th Joint Communications Support Squadron (JCSS) by the National Guard Bureau. Along with this redesignation came a change in our mission and strength authorizations. At the present time, the squadron has an authorization of nine (9) officers and one hundred and eighty-two (182) airmen. This includes twenty (20) full-time personnel. To date, there are one hundred and twenty-six (126) personnel assigned, fifteen of these being full-time. Our current manning level is 67% officers, 67% airmen and 75% technicians for a combined total strength of 68%. A new manning document is being staffed which will result in a significant increase in manning.

# Inspections/Evaluations

Although no formal inspections/evaluations were conducted this fiscal year, Staff Assistance Visits were conducted in both the Personnel and Training Sections by the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Personnel and Training representatives. Although some discrepancies were noted, a strong foundation for these sections has been established and we feel confident that the squadron will do well in future major inspections/evaluations.

#### Deployments

290th support of JCS Readiness Exercises continued throughout FY 85. Two members participated in Bold Venture 85 held at Ft. Lewis, Washington during October 1984. Brim Frost 85, the first of the JCSE augmented exercises, was held in January 1985. Nineteen personnel deployed to Ft. Wainwright, Alaska and were

tasked to run the System Control function at the Joint Exercise Control Group Headquarters. The 290th also had individual members participate in exercises Border Star 85 held in Texas and FLINTLOCK 85 held in England. Fifteen personnel also participated in the CINCLANT Exercise Solid Shield 85 held at Camp LeJeune, North Carolina. Twenty-eight personnel participated in two JCS Readiness Exercises held in the Middle East, Shadow Hawk 85 and Bright Star, during the July and August 1985 time frame. Continued support of JCS Readiness Exercises is anticipated throughout the remainder of 1985.

#### Operations

Aside from continued ancillary training throughout FY 85, satellite and high frequency radio communication networks have been set-up and used to pass voice and data communications between the 224th JCSS, St. Simons Island, Georgia and the 290th. During March and June 1985 Unit Training Assemblies (UTAs), 32 hour operations commenced, where voice and data communications were transmitted between the two squadrons.

### Resource Management

During this fiscal year, the squadron was allocated \$134,714 in Operations and Maintenance Funds. During this reporting period, approximately 75% of our authorized A and B mobility bags were obtained. All required office equipment and supplies are on hand. The squadron has obtained the following communications equipment and vehicles during this reporting period.

The squadron is presently undergoing a reorganization which will result in additional equipment and personnel being authorized. A new equipment authorization and manning document is being staffed and will be forwarded to higher Headquarters during August 1985.

Each squadron member has been encouraged to participate in one of the several JCS Readiness Exercises held this year. To date, only a few individuals have performed their Annual Training at MacDill AFB. Those that have performed Annual Training at MacDill were assigned to work at JCSE and have been trained in their speciality field.

## Facilities

The squadron is presently in the 20% Design Phase on plans for our permanent facility with construction tentatively scheduled for early FY 87. Our Supply Division was moved from Building 233 to Building 1149 during early July 1985. Presently, plans are being submitted for a temporary office space to be constructed in Building 1149 to house our full-time Supply technicians and traditional guard-persons.

202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR)

The 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron, Heavy Repair, was activated and Federally recognized 5 January 1985 at Camp Blanding, Florida. Major General Robert F. Ensslin, Jr., presented the Squadron Guidon to Lieutenant Colonel Frank W. Kozdras, the first commander of the newly formed unit. Approximately 43 charter members, their families, guests and friends attended the ceremonies in near freezing weather.

The 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR) represents a major element in the Air Force "Red Horse" program, tasked with a mission to provide a highly mobile, rapidly deployable civil engineering response force that is self-sufficient for world-wide deployment. The 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR) represents one of only seven such units in the Air Force whose primary capability consists of recovery, repair and maintenance of bombed or otherwise damaged military air bases and facilities. The unit possesses a sixteen man RH-1 team on call to deploy within 12 hours to provide site layout and bed down action for follow-on teams and combat units. Other specialized capabilities include well drilling, operation of a mobile concrete plant and quarry work to provide construction aggregate when required. The team is also prepared to employ an explosive demolition team to blow up sections of runways to deny enemy forces use of a base, roads, bridges or facilities.

The "Red Horse" Squadron is presently operating out of six temporary facilities provided by the Quartermaster at Camp Blanding which consists of approximately 27,000 square feet of administrative, shop and warehouse space. This temporary situation is programmed to change in approximately five years when six new facilities consisting of approximately 72,000 square feet will be completed on a 140 acre parcel leased from the State on Camp Blanding. These permanent facilities will not only provide a training and staging area for the 217 man unit but will serve as a training center in the southeast for deploying "Prime BEEF" teams requiring heavy equipment and other specialized training.

Since activation in January 1985 the unit has grown to 62% strength as of 30 July 1985, approximately 53 of the assigned 132 personnel have completed specialized training schools and 28 others are scheduled to follow prior to the end of the year. Specialized training is being accelerated for the 202nd with formal schools being held at Tyndall AFB, Florida (Red Horse Demolition Training), Nellis AFB, Nevada (Red Horse Quarry School), Enid, Oklahoma (Speedstar Well Drilling School) and Tyndall AFB, Florida (M-60 Machine Gun Training).

This past year the 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR) has participated in a deployment (21 man) to Torrejon Air Base, Spain, has renovated approximately 6,000 square feet of assigned temporary facilities at Camp Blanding and initiated community action project at the Keystone Heights Airport clearing taxiways and runways of overgrowth. Several projects have been programmed and engineered by the 202nd with the Camp Blanding Training Site to include a new competition pistol range, expansion of the recreation area, various mechanical projects involving heating and air conditioning and a new road to MATES.

The 202nd Civil Engineering Squadron (HR) has distinguished itself this year

with four honor graduates, 34 awards and decorations and the winning of the coveted I. Thord-Gray Trophy for best overall scores (.45 caliber) in the state.

Plans for next year pursuant to a recent survey trip to several staging areas in Europe will include more deployments and increased emphasis on training. Preparation for an initial Management Effectiveness Inspection (MEI) and Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) will take precedence over all projects due to the fast approaching vulnerability period occurring this time next year. The "Red Horse" objectives will be to continue to provide a combat ready engineering force for immediate world-wide deployment and to conduct a quality training center for ourselves and other engineering units requiring specialized training at Camp Blanding.

The Senior Army Advisory Group assists the Florida Army National Guard by providing advice and assistance on current Army policy, procedures and resources in all appropriate matters. Its mission is to represent and act as spokesmen for the Active Component in Reserve Component matters; render professional military advice and assistance to the Florida Army National Guard commanders and their units on matters including organization, operations, training, mobilization deployment, combat readiness, administration, personnel, financial resources and force modernization; coordinate, as needed, assistance activities between the assisting agency and the Florida Army National Guard; observe the quality of assistance provided to the Florida Army National Guard and report any incidents of unsatisfactory or exceptional performance to the appropriate agency or commander.

The Senior Army Advisor, Colonel Delbert F. Shouse, operates out of Headquarters, Department of Military Affairs, St. Augustine. Four additional advisory detachments are collocated with the following major headquarters: 53rd Infantry Brigade (Separate) in Tampa; 53rd Signal Group in Tallahassee; 227th Field Artillery Brigade in Miami; and the 50th Area Support Group in Jacksonville. The authorized strength of the Senior Army Advisory Group is six officers, five noncommissioned officers and one civilian.

The Senior Air Force Advisor, Major Fred C. Korker, is the liaison officer between the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Commander and the 23rd NORAD/-ADTAC Region Director of Operations at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida.

The Tactical Air Command (TAC) is the gaining major air command of the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group.

The Air Force Advisor's office is located at the 125th Fighter Interceptor Group Headquarters, Jacksonville International Airport, Jacksonville, Florida.

TSgt Gerald W. DeLoach is the Air Force Advisor to the 125th Information Systems Flight. The gaining command for the Flight is the Air Force Communications Command.




