EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

This report is submitted to the Administrative Procedures Committee and to the Administration Commission in compliance with the requirements of Section 120.70, Florida Statutes, which provides:

Not later than February 1 of each year, the division shall issue a written report to the Administrative Procedures Committee and the Administration Commission, including at least the following information:

- (1) A summary of the extent and effect of agencies' utilization of hearing officers, court reporters, and other personnel in proceedings under this act.
- (2) Recommendations for change or improvement in the Administrative Procedure Act or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto.

GENERAL

The Department of General Services' total cases increased by 146 percent with 59 cases filed in 1991--up from 24 cases filed in 1990.

Significant case load increases for 1991 also include the Department of Environmental Regulation's total which increased from 309 in 1990 to 429 in 1991, an increase of 39 percent and the Department of Natural Resources with a 49 percent case load increase from 39 in 1990 to 58 in 1991.

The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services' referral of child abuse cases has steadily increased, up five percent from 714 cases filed in 1990 to 750 cases filed in 1991. The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services' Baker Act cases increased nine percent from 3,352 cases filed in 1990 to 3,648 cases filed in 1991. The Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services grand total increased four percent from 4,910 cases filed in 1990 to 5,122 cases filed in 1991.

New cases tracked during this past year include: citrus canker cases, referred from the Office of the Comptroller, with six cases being filed; 21 Ethics Commission cases; and 16 Vested Rights cases where the Division has final order authority and is on a contract basis with various governmental entities.

Requests for Hearing Officer services in 1991 totaled 8,403, which is a two percent increase over 1990's grand total of 8,202 cases filed.

UTILIZATION OF PERSONNEL

The Division has 62 established positions comprised of the Director, Assistant Director, 30 Hearing Officers, 1 Executive Assistant, 4 Administrative Assistants, 1 Personnel Technician, 1 Computer Programmer Analyst, 1 Accountant, 1 Senior Executive Secretary, 5 Staff Assistants, 13 Administrative Secretaries, 1 Senior Word Processing Systems Operator, and 2 Senior Clerks.

WORKLOAD INCREASES

During calendar year 1991, the Division processed 8,403 hearing requests, an increase of 201 cases (2 percent) from 1990. The cases opened are itemized by agency in the attached Appendix 1.

of the 8,403 cases, 3,648 were Baker Act cases. The remaining cases were filed pursuant to Section 120.54, 120.56, and 120.57, Florida Statutes. In 1991, each Hearing Officer handled an average of 280 new cases, conducted an average of 176 hearings, and wrote an average of 158 recommended or final orders of varying length and complexity.

In 1991, the Division held a total of 5,277 hearings, an increase of six percent over the 4,964 hearings held in 1990. During the year, the Division closed 8,110 cases, an average of 270 closures per Hearing Officer, an increase of 28 case closures (.34 percent) over 1990.

OFFICE AUTOMATION

The primary systems applications for the Division are word processing and a customized Case Tracking System (CTS), with secondary office automation applications including computerized Florida Statutes, electronic mail and an automated desk calendar. The Division is instituting a full text retrieval and indexing system for all recommended and final orders that will be available as a legal research tool for Hearing Officers and the public. During 1991, the Division continued to upgrade workstations, opting to trade in older-style processors on used 80286 or 80386 workstations.

OPERATING BUDGET

Appendix 2 summarizes the Division's actual and estimated expenditures for FY 1990-91 and FY 1991-92, respectively. Appendix 2 also outlines funds requested in the Division's FY 1992-93 Legislative Budget Request.

Since FY 1987-88, the Division has conducted studies to determine a more equitable method of apportioning its operating costs among all users. The Division is responsible for preparing annual reports which summarize the number of hours scheduled by agencies for prehearing conferences, motion hearings, cancelled/continued hearings, and final hearings.

In July, 1991, the Division submitted the results of its fifth annual study to the Legislature and Executive Office of the Governor (see Appendix 3). To coincide with the legislative budget process, the Division prepared its fifth annual report on a fiscal year basis (FY 1990-91), unlike prior annual reports, which covered the period November 1 through December 31 of each year.

In FY 1990-91, agencies scheduled a total of 29,419 hearing hours with the Division, an increase of 4.98 percent over 1990's 28,022 hearing hours scheduled. Of the 29,419 hours scheduled in FY 1990-91, the Division's Hearing Officers actually spent 9,197 hours in administrative proceedings, a decrease of 3.19 percent under the 9,501 hours expended in 1990. In FY 1990-91, 20,222 hearing hours scheduled were cancelled or continued, an increase of 9.18 percent over the 18,521 hours cancelled in 1990.

In FY 1991-92, the Division should receive 87 percent of its approved operating budget from the Departments of Business Environmental Regulation, Education, Health Regulation, Rehabilitative Services, Insurance, Professional Regulation and Transportation, and 13 percent from the General Revenue Fund. should be noted, however, that due to a lawsuit filed in early FY 1991-92 by school districts against the State Board of Education, the Legislature, and the Division challenging the constitutionality of the laws providing fund transfers from the school districts to the Division, the posture of the Division's Administrative Trust Fund is uncertain.

Based on the results of the fifth annual report, the Division recommended that all agencies and entities utilizing the Division's services contribute to the Division's Administrative Trust fund. This would result in funding 100 percent of the Division's FY 1992-93 operating budget from its Administrative Trust Fund.

RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE A.P.A.

The Division has no current recommendations concerning the Administrative Procedure Act.
