TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

This report is submitted to the Administrative Procedures Committee and to the Administration Commission in compliance with the requirements of Section 120.70, Florida Statutes, which provides:

Not later than February 1 of each year, the division shall issue a written report to the Administrative Procedures Committee and the Administration Commission, including at least the following information:

- (1) A summary of the extent and effect of agencies' utilization of hearing officers, court reporters, and other personnel in proceedings under this act.
- (2) Recommendations for change or improvement in the Administrative Procedure Act or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto.

GENERAL

Significant case load decreases include the Department of Environmental Protection, which had 251 cases filed in 1994, down 50 percent from 501 cases filed in 1993.

The Florida Birth-Related Neurological Injury Compensation Association (NICA) filed 46 cases in 1994. This compares to 83 cases filed since the inception of the program.

These cases continue to require employees to devote a significant portion of their time to processing and appeals activities.

The number of Baker Act cases continued to decrease in 1994 by nine percent with 2,701 cases filed, down 269 cases from the 2,970 cases filed in 1993. This Baker Act decrease accounts for much of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services' overall agency decrease of nine percent with a total of 3,535 cases filed in 1994, down 356 cases from the 3,891 cases filed the previous year.

Cases filed by the Department of Community Affairs also decreased significantly, with a 33 percent decrease in the number of cases filed, from 109 cases filed in 1993 to 73 cases in 1994.

Effective July 1, 1994, pursuant to Chapter 93-129, Laws of Florida, and Section 20.42, Florida Statutes, the Division of Medical Quality Assurance was transferred from the Department of Business and Professional Regulation to the Agency for Health Care Administration, Division of Health Quality Assurance. In addition, pursuant to Chapter 93-129, Laws of Florida, the authority to regulate licensees and licensure previously vested in the Department of Business and Professional Regulation under Section 20.165, Florida Statutes, was also transferred to the Agency for Health Care Administration.

Referrals from the Division of Professions, DBPR, increased 36 percent from 78 cases filed in 1993 to 106 cases filed in 1994.

Referrals from the Agency for Health Care Administration, AHCA, had the most significant increase with 581

cases filed in 1994, an increase of 97 percent over the 295 cases filed in 1993. Much of this increase can be attributed to an increase in referrals from the Office of Community Medical Facilities, which handles disputes regarding Certificate of Need cases. This office referred a total of 428 cases in 1994, an increase of 82 percent over the 235 cases referred in 1993. The Division of Medical Quality Assurance was up 27 percent from 409 cases filed in 1993 to 518 cases filed in 1994.

Referrals from the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services showed a 196 percent increase; 169 cases were filed in 1994, up 112 cases from the 57 filed in 1993.

Referrals from the Department of Insurance and Treasurer also increased significantly, 85 percent, from 163 filed in 1993 to 301 filed in 1994.

Although the number of school Board cases only increased 24 percent, the number of requests for hearings regarding placement of exceptional students increased 76 percent from 42 filed in 1993 to 74 filed in 1994.

For the first time, 27 cases were filed in 1994 by the Commission on Minority Economic and Business Development.

\$231,018 and three positions for the Division to implement an inhouse court reporting pilot program to provide court reporting services to all state agencies for administrative hearing proceedings and other proceedings, including depositions. The Division shall, in cooperation with the Office of the Attorney General, compile and submit a report to the Speaker of the House,

President of the Senate and chairmen of the House and Senate Appropriations Committees by October 1, 1995, regarding the success of the program. Recommendations for expansion or deletion of the program shall accompany this report.

UTILIZATION OF PERSONNEL

The Division has 65 established positions comprised of the Director, Assistant Director, 30 Hearing Officers, 3 Hearing Reporters, 1 Division Clerk, 1 Administrative Services Director, 1 Executive Assistant, 1 Accountant, 1 Purchasing Agent, 1 Personnel Officer, 3 Administrative Assistants, 1 Computer Programmer Analyst, 1 Computer Operator, 5 Staff Assistants, 11 Administrative Secretaries, 1 Senior Word Processing Systems Operator, and 2 Senior Clerks.

WORKLOAD

During calendar year 1994, the Division processed 7,323 hearing requests, a slight increase over the 7,309 cases filed in 1993. The cases opened are itemized by agency in the attached Appendix 1.

Of the 7,323 cases, 2,701 were Baker Act cases. The remaining 4,622 cases were filed pursuant to Sections 120.535, 120.54, 120.56, and 120.57, Florida Statutes. In 1994 each Hearing Officer handled an average of 146 new cases, conducted an average of 78 hearings, and wrote an average of 70 recommended or final orders of varying length and complexity.

In 1994 the Division held a total of 4,136 hearings, 491 hearings less than the 4,627 hearings held in 1993. The

decrease in hearings reflects the continued decline in the number of Baker Act cases filed. The overall non-Baker Act case load increased seven percent with 4,622 cases filed in 1994, up 283 cases from the 4,339 non-Baker Act cases filed in 1993. A total of 1,050 non-Baker Act hearings were conducted in 1994, which is equal to the number of hearings conducted in 1993. During 1994, the Division closed 6,949 cases, an average of 131 closures per Hearing Officer.

OFFICE AUTOMATION

The primary systems applications for the Division are its Case Tracking System (CTS), word processing, and a full text retrieval and indexing system for all DOAH recommended and final orders and agency final orders (ACCESS). Secondary applications include electronic mail and phone messaging, an automated desk calendar, and computerized Florida Statutes and Florida Administrative Code.

The Division has continued to upgrade its computer hardware by replacing older-style 80286 workstations with 80386 and 80486 models that can operate both the CTOS and DOS operating systems concurrently. DOAH also upgraded its primary computer to a Pentium-based server. In addition, the Division purchased a Unisys U6000/75 UNIX system which will ultimately be the repository for the Division's database of recommended and final orders.

In conjunction with the Division's ongoing project to electronically index all recommended and final orders and

ultimately make those orders available for public access, the Division began work with the TRC Data Center to facilitate statewide access to its database.

OPERATING BUDGET

Appendix 2 summarizes the Division's actual and expenditures for $\mathbf{F}\mathbf{Y}$ 1993-94 and FY Appendix 2 also outlines funds requested in the respectively. Division's FY 1995-96 Legislative Budget Request.

Since FY 1987-88, the Division has conducted studies to determine a more equitable method of apportioning its operating costs among all users. The Division is responsible for preparing annual reports which summarize the number of hours scheduled by agencies for prehearing conferences, motion hearings, cancelled/continued hearings, and final hearings.

In August, 1994, the Division submitted the results of its eighth annual study to the Legislature and Executive Office of the Governor (see Appendix 3). In FY 1993-94, agencies scheduled a total of 25,445 hearing hours with the Division. Of the 25,445 hours scheduled in FY 1993-94, the Division's Hearing Officers actually spent 6,712 hours in administrative proceedings. In FY 1993-94, 18,733 hearing hours scheduled were cancelled or continued.

In FY 1994-95, it is estimated that the Division will receive 96 percent of its approved operating budget from the agencies it serves, and that it will receive four percent of its budget from the General Revenue Fund for the pilot program on court reporting services.

It should be noted that the lawsuit filed on July 8, 1991, by five school districts against the State Board of Education, the Legislature, and the Division, challenging the constitutionality of the laws providing fund transfers from the school districts to the Division, was appealed by the Division. On April 12, 1994, the First District Court of Appeal reversed the circuit judge's order of summary judgment declaring the statute unconstitutional and remanded with directions to enter summary judgment for DOAH.

RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE A.P.A.

The Division has no current recommendations concerning the Administrative Procedure Act.
