### TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

This report is submitted to the Administrative Procedures Committee and to the Administration Commission in compliance with the requirements of Section 120.65(10), Florida Statutes, which provides:

Not later than February 1 of each year, the division shall issue a written report to the Administrative Procedures Committee and the Administration Commission, including at least the following information:

- (a) A summary of the extent and effect of agencies' utilization of administrative law judges, court reporters, and other personnel in proceedings under this chapter.
- (b) Recommendations for change or improvement in the Administrative Procedure Act or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto.

### GENERAL

Fiscal year 1995-96 saw an increase in the hours of hearings scheduled by the Division in comparison to the previous fiscal year. In FY 1995-96, the Division scheduled 31,238 hours of hearing in comparison to 29,817 in fiscal year 1994-95, an increase of 4.77 percent (Appendix 1). When coupled with the

decrease in number of cases filed, the trend in DOAH's caseload continues to show that while decreasing in raw number of cases filed, adminstrative cases continue to increase in complexity.

The chart attached to this report (Appendix 2) breaks out by agency the utilization rates of Division resources and demonstrates that in descending order the Agency for Health Care Administration, Department of Business and Professional Regulation, Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, Department of Community Affairs, Department of Insurance and Department of Revenue are the agencies that utilize more than 82 percent of the Division's docket. Additionally, the Water Management Districts have become a major user of the Division's services, although not reported on the State agency breakouts since the Districts are contract users of the Division's services.

The following agencies have notably increased their hearing requests. In 1996, a total of 251 cases were referred from the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, up from 82 cases filed the previous year, an increase of 206.10 percent. The Department of Business and Professional Regulation increased referrals by 204 cases, an increase of 43.31 percent, from 471 cases filed in 1995 to 675 cases filed in 1996. Similarly, Department of Environmental Protection increased its caseload to 277 cases filed in 1996, up 15.42 percent from the 240 cases filed in 1995. Also noteworthy to this past year's analysis is the governmental entities' use of contract hearings, which

increased by 177.78 percent with 25 cases referred by nine governmental entities compared to nine cases filed by four entities the previous year. Additionally, final authority rule challenge hearing requests increased by 35.48 percent, up 77 cases from 294 filed in 1996 compared with 217 cases filed in 1995.

### UTILIZATION OF PERSONNEL

The Division has 66 established positions comprised of the Director and Chief Judge, Deputy Chief Judge, 30 Administrative Law Judges, 3 Court Reporters, 1 Budget Director, 1 Executive Assistant, 1 Personnel Officer, 1 Division Clerk, 1 Deputy Clerk, 3 Administrative Assistants, 1 Accountant, 1 Purchasing Agent, 1 Fiscal Assistant, 1 Distributed Computer Systems Analyst, 1 Office Automation Specialist, 1 Computer Operator, 4 Staff Assistants, 11 Administrative Secretaries, and 2 Senior Clerks.

### In-House Court Reporters

Since FY 1994-95 the Division has employed three full time court reporters. The goal is for these reporters to cover 100 percent of the Division's hearings in Tallahassee. DOAH reporters covered 79 percent of Tallahassee hearings in FY 1995-96, up from 53 percent in FY 1994-95. The court reporters produced a total of 34,112 pages of transcription in FY 1995-96. This data was not capturable, however, for FY 1994-95, during the program's first year as a pilot project. See Appendix 3.

Statistics are collected on the cost avoidance to each state agency for their utilization of the Division's court reporters rather than private sector reporters for Tallahassee During FY 1995-96, the total cost avoidance to all hearings. state agencies utilizing DOAH's reporting services was The agencies with the greatest savings were the \$125,840.50. Agency for Health Care Administration (\$76,532.05), Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services (\$7,373.00), Department of of Environmental Protection (\$7,308.40) and Department Transportation (\$6,292.75). See Appendix 3.

The agencies realizing the greatest court reporting savings were the agencies that utilized the division's in-house reporters te most. The primary users were the Agency for Health Care Administration (542.25 hours), Department of Health and Department (74.25)hours), of Rehabilitative Services of Environmental Protection (61.25 hours) and Department Transportation (50.75 hours), as seen in Appendix 3.

The State's net savings totaled \$56,637.78 in FY 1995-96. Statistics were not available for the entire period in FY 1994-95 to make a comparison.

This year the Division has converted one of its Tallahassee hearing rooms to a video recording room, which will enable hearings to be video tape recorded for preservation of the record, as opposed to using a court reporter. This is expected to increase savings to the State by allowing DOAH to effectively cover more of the Tallahassee hearings with its own resources, at no cost to the State agencies, rather than having to occasionally

utilize contract (private sector) court reporters. Contract court reporter use does result in a cost to the agencies for the appearance fees and transcription services, all of which are provided at no cost by DOAH.

### **HEARING REQUESTS**

During calendar year 1996, the Division processed 6,144 hearing requests, a 2.29 percent decrease compared to the 6,288 cases filed in 1995. Of the 6,144 cases, 2,364 were Baker Act The remaining 3780 cases were filed pursuant to Sections cases. 120.535, 120.54, 120.56 and 120.57, Florida Statutes. The Baker Act caseload decreased in 1996 with 105 less cases filed when compared to the 2,469 referred in 1995. Significant to the hearing request decrease are the amendments to Chapter 415 providing that the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services no longer classify reports of child abuse. In 1995, 448 Child Abuse cases were referred to DOAH. When these cases are subtracted from the 1995 non-Baker Act referral totals, the 1996 non-Baker Act referrals increased by 409 cases, up 12.13 percent The cases opened are itemized by agency in the over 1995. attached Appendix 4.

In 1996 each Administrative Law Judge handled an average of 177 new cases, conducted an average of 109 hearings, and wrote an average of 91 recommended or final orders of varying length and complexity.

In 1996 the Division held a total of 3,898 hearings, 120 less than the 4,018 hearings held in 1995. The Division closed 6,359 cases, a 10.50 percent decrease under the 7,105 cases closed in 1995. This is an average of 176 closures per Judge, as compared to 197 closures per Judge the previous year.

### OFFICE AUTOMATION

The primary systems applications for the Division are its Case Tracking System (CTS), a full text retrieval and document indexing system for all DOAH recommended and final orders (ACCESS), and word processing. Secondary applications include electronic mail and computerized legal research (Florida Statutes, Florida Administrative Code, Southern Reporter and Federal Reporter). During 1996, the Division began transitioning its computer system to a Windows-based architecture and continued its utilization of realtime court reporting.

### OPERATING BUDGET

Division's actual summarizes the Appendix 5 1996-97. 1995-96 and FY expenditures for FY estimated In FY 1996-97, the Division is 100 percent trust respectively. funded and receives transfers from the agencies it serves. Appendix 5 also outlines funds requested in the Division's FY 1997-98 Legislative Budget Request.

Since FY 1987-88, the Division has conducted studies to determine a more equitable method of apportioning its operating

costs among all users. The Division is responsible for preparing annual reports which summarize the number of hours scheduled by agencies for prehearing conferences, motion hearings, cancelled/continued hearings, and final hearings.

In July 1996, the Division submitted the results of its tenth annual study to the Legislature and Executive Office of the Governor (see Appendix 2). In FY 1995-96, agencies scheduled a total of 31,238 hearing hours with the Division. Of this total, the Division's Administrative Law Judges actually spent 6,463 hours in administrative proceedings. In FY 1995-96, 24,775 hearing hours scheduled were cancelled or continued.

### RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE A.P.A.

Chapter 96-159, Laws of Florida, substantially reorganized the Administrative Procedure Act. The Division has no current recommendations concerning this Act.
