

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Violent Crime arrests among juveniles nationally dropped 9% last year, for a second straight annual drop. In Florida alone, serious juvenile crime decreased across the state. Many factors contributed to this drop including prevention programs and tougher penalties for wrongdoers.

Over the past year the Council heard numerous presentations regarding approaches to combating juvenile crime. These examples include: *Priority Issues and Needs for Florida's Juvenile Justice System, Drug Education and Awareness Programs, School Intervention Programs, Placement Centers for Juveniles and Character Education.* The Council will continue to pay close adherence to juvenile crime in the upcoming year under the leadership of Honorable Lawson Lamar.

The Florida Violent Crime Council is looking forward to continuing its work in 1998, and to working with the Legislature to fulfill its obligations to the citizens of the state.

PROGRESS MADE TOWARD 1996 RECOMMENDATIONS

- An Appropriation of \$925,000 to Establish a Grants Program for Criminal Justice Agencies that Develop and Implement Violent Crime Prevention and Investigative Programs. This amount was not funded.
- An Appropriation of \$1 Million to Replenish the Violent Crime Emergency Account. \$500,000 was funded to the General Revenue Funds.
- An Appropriation of \$500,000 to Establish a Witness Protection Program. \$500,000 was funded and the Victim/Witness Protection Review Committee was created.
- An Appropriation of \$75,000 to Establish a Criminal Profiling Program. \$75,000 was funded.
- The Continuation of Local Law Enforcement Agencies and Criminal Justice Agencies Cooperative Efforts with FDLE Toward Establishing Regional Investigative Support Centers (RISC). The South Florida and Jacksonville Regional Investigative Support Centers continue to serve as models of cooperative efforts among law enforcement agencies.

- The Continuation of the Council's Endorsement in the Development of a Youth and Street Gang Database or Participation of Agencies in the NCIC Violent Gang and Terrorist Organization File. The Council continues to endorse the development of a Youth and Street Gang Database. FDLE continues to work with local law enforcement and will be responsible for the coordination and support of the statewide system.
- The Council's continued Support and Participation with Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice Agencies in Regional Violent Crime Investigation Coordinating Teams (RCTs). The Council continues it's efforts in supporting the RCTs and receives status reports from each RCT at every Council meeting.

THE FLORIDA VIOLENT CRIME ACT

In response to the critical statewide issues of violent crime in Florida, the 1993 Legislature passed the Florida Violent Crime Act of 1993. This legislation provides for the implementation of eight major initiatives intended to produce meaningful and effective results in Florida's effort to curtail violent crime.

Status of Eight Basic Components of the Violent Crime Act of 1993

1. Florida Violent Crime Council:

The creation of a twelve-member Florida Violent Crime Council, including local and state representation, to advise the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) Commissioner and make recommendations regarding the development and implementation of violent crime initiatives. Six members of the Violent Crime Council are standing members by virtue of their positions and six members are appointed by the Governor. The standing members are:

The Governor's appointments to the Council include two sheriffs, two police chiefs, one state attorney and one medical examiner. They are:

The Council members receive no compensation but are reimbursed for per diem and travel expenses. Members appointed by the Governor will serve for two years, and standing members will serve as long as they hold office or employment which was the basis for their appointment to the Council. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement provides the Council with the staff necessary to assist in the performance of its duties.

2. Regional Violent Crime Investigation Coordinating Teams (RCTs):

Regional Violent Crime Investigation Coordinating Teams are used to respond to violent crimes as requested by a sheriff, police chief or other law enforcement. These teams provide forensic, investigative and technical expertise and facilitate communication and cooperation among law enforcement entities.

RCT's report to the Council on increasing trends in each region, training provided to law enforcement agencies and summaries of the Violent Crime Emergency Account funding requests at every quarterly meeting. The RCT Leaders are:

3. Violent Crime Emergency Account:

The Violent Crime Emergency Account provides funding to state and local law enforcement agencies involved in complex violent crime investigations and trials. Since its inception, the Council has awarded in excess of \$2.4 Million to local criminal justice agencies. Funding requests have risen dramatically since 1994, however the budget for the funding continues to remain the same. Without additional funding, the Council is having to award partial funding and may be forced to deny legitimate requests in the near future.

4. Implementation of the Violent Crime Information System (ViCIS):

The Violent Crime Information System was established as a pilot project to integrate an automated crime information system. Initiation of this pilot project permitted, for the first time, a network of agencies in the Tampa area to share valuable information related to offender modus operandi (MO) and other data related to violent crime incidents. Following the success of the initial program, efforts were expended in enhancing the program and re-writing the software to facilitate statewide implementation. ViCIS

software will be made available nation-wide following implementation in Florida to enable searches of other states databases to help identify crimes committed by criminals who have become increasingly more mobile.

5. Submission of Fingerprint Cards for Felony Juvenile Arrests:

Fingerprint cards for juveniles arrested on felony charges are submitted to FDLE as required by section 943.051 of the Florida Statutes. FDLE maintains the information on file until 5 years after the offender has reached 21 years of age (age 26) for Serious Habitual Juvenile Offenders and until 5 years after the offender has reached 19 years of age (age 24) for other juvenile offenders. If the offender commits a forcible felony as an adult prior to his juvenile record being destroyed, the juvenile criminal history will be retained with the adult record.

6. Creation of Juvenile Criminal Histories:

A criminal history database was created to serve as a valuable tool in the fight against violent crime. With more juveniles committing violent crimes, the criminal justice system must have information concerning the criminal activities of these offenders.

This legislation requires juveniles who are charged with a felony or one of the listed misdemeanors to be fingerprinted and the fingerprints sent to FDLE. Assault, battery, carrying a concealed weapon, unlawful use of a destructive device, child abuse, negligent treatment of children, assault or battery on a law enforcement officer, open carrying of a weapon, exposure of sexual organs, unlawful possession of a firearm, petit theft, cruelty to animals and arson.

7. Basic and Advanced Violent Crime Training:

In compliance with the requirement to establish standards for basic and advanced training programs for law enforcement officers in investigation of violent crime and prevention, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's Division of Criminal Justice Standards and Training put together a work group to develop a job task analysis (JTA) describing how law enforcement officers investigate violent crimes.

The following five courses were designed to train experienced investigators in the particulars of violent crimes investigation: Crime Scene Procedures, Forensics, Legal/Prosecution Aspects, Investigative Procedures and Information Management.

8. Submission of DNA Specimens:

This provision requires persons convicted of murder or attempted murder, sexual battery, aggravated battery, carjacking, home invasion or lewd and lascivious behavior, to submit blood specimens to FDLE for DNA testing for future identification purposes.

As of November 1, 1997, 45,403 blood samples have been collected. Of these, FDLE has completed 18,124 samples and has contracted with a private vendor to analyze an additional 22,000. This was done to assist in the increasing of the number of samples to be entered into the DNA Database. As of November, 2,822 of these samples have been completed by vendor. Through the combined efforts of FDLE and the private vendor, it is anticipated that by January 1999, all of the samples will have been analyzed utilizing the current technology and will have been entered into the State and Local DNA Database.

The database has had a total of 98 hits statewide. As a result of these hits, 167 investigations have been aided.

DUTIES OF THE FLORIDA VIOLENT CRIME COUNCIL

The statutory duties of the Council include the following responsibilities:

The Council may advise the executive director on the feasibility of undertaking initiatives, which include, but are not limited to the following:

- Establishing a program which provides grants to criminal justice agencies for violent crime prevention and investigative programs. This includes enhanced community-oriented policing; and additional undercover officers and other investigative officers to assist with violent crime investigations in emergency situations.
- Creating a criminal justice research and behavioral science center.
- Expanding the use of automated fingerprint identification systems at the state and local level.
- Identifying methods to prevent violent crime.
- Enhancing criminal justice training programs which address violent crime.
- Developing and promoting crime prevention services and educational programs, including enhanced victim and witness counseling services; and a rewards program for the apprehension and conviction of violent criminals.
- Enhancing information sharing and assistance by expansion of community partnerships and community policing, including the use of civilian employees or volunteers.

In addition, the Council shall:

- ◆ Advise the executive director on the creation of regional violent crime investigation coordinating teams.
- Develop criteria for the disbursement of funds from the Violent Crime Investigative Emergency Account.
- Review and approve all requests for disbursement of funds from the Emergency Account. In addition, establish an expedited approval procedure for rapid disbursement of funds in emergency situations.
- Advise the executive director on the development of a statewide violent crime information system.

The statewide gang intelligence system is now in the final segment of the testing phase.

- The Council's continued Support and Participation with Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice Agencies in Regional Violent Crime Investigation Coordinating Teams (RCTs).
- The Council continues it's efforts in supporting the RCTs and receives status reports from each RCT at every Council meeting. At the discretion of the Council, awards of up to \$100,000 for an investigation or trial are available to qualified agencies/counties who meet the established criteria for funding.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1998

♦ An Appropriation of \$1 Million to Replenish the Violent Crime Emergency Account.

The Council will request an appropriation of \$1 Million to replenish the Violent Crime Emergency Account.

During the past four years, many high profile investigations and trials were partially or totally funded through the Violent Crime Emergency Account. Examples include the Gainesville student murders committed by career criminal Danny Rolling awarding Alachua County \$100,000.00 for trial expenses; the Jimmy Ryce investigation which involved the abduction, sexual assault and murder of a nine year old child awarding Metro-Dade Police Department \$100,000.00; the double murder committed by Paul Hill at a Pensacola abortion clinic awarding Pensacola Police Department \$22,356.98, the trial following the murder of a British tourist at an Interstate rest stop, awarding Jefferson County \$116,654.27 for trial expenses; and the Miami Beach Police Department was awarded \$45,437.69 for the Gianni Versace investigation. Over the past four years the Violent Crime Council has awarded a total of \$2,432,939.40 from the Violent Crime Emergency Account to local criminal justice agencies to support their investigations or trials.(see attached form)

♦ An Appropriation of \$500,000 to Replenish the Witness Protection Program.

The Council will request an appropriation of \$500,000 to replenish the Witness Protection Program.

The Victim/Witness Protection Program authorizes law enforcement agencies to provide protective services, including temporary relocation services, under specified circumstances. The law enables the lead law enforcement agency to seek reimbursement from the Florida Violent Crime Council for expenses incurred in providing protective services for victims/witnesses certified by the prosecuting State Attorney or Statewide Prosecutor on or after July 1, 1997. A Victim and Witness Review Committee has been established within the Florida Violent Crime Council and is responsible for developing the criteria for disbursing the reimbursement and reviewing and approving or denying, in whole or part, all reimbursement requests. ♦ An Appropriation of \$75,000 to Replenish the Criminal Profiling Program.

The Council will request an appropriation of \$75,000 to replenish the Criminal Profiling Program.

During July and August of 1997, while continuing to assist in ongoing investigations, FDLE Profilers have been involved in six new and additional profiling cases, five homicide investigations, forty-nine assists to local law enforcement agency's and have provided over 140 hours of specialized training to law enforcement agency's.

- An Appropriation of \$500,00 to Establish a Grants Program to focus on juveniles to include: technical upgrades to better address juvenile crime, juvenile preventative strategies & juvenile gang efforts.


 The Council will request an appropriation of \$500,00 to establish a grants program to juveniles

VIOLENT CRIME EMERGENCY ACCOUNT

Purpose of the Account

The Violent Crime Emergency Account provides emergency supplemental funds to:

- State and local law enforcement agencies involved in complex and lengthy violent crime investigations;
- State and local law enforcement agencies involved in violent crime investigations which constitute a significant emergency within the state; or
- Counties which demonstrate a significant hardship or an inability to cover extraordinary expenses associated with a violent crime trial.

Definitions

A "criminal event" means a violent crime or series of violent crimes interrelated to one another in such a way that the crime constitutes a single criminal transaction or related transactional series of crimes, regardless of the number of criminal acts that may have been committed during the event or the number of perpetrators involved in the event.

"Beyond the resources" means that the expenses claimed by the requester are so extraordinary that they currently and significantly limit the requester's ability to provide the services or duties required by law. The requester has to demonstrate to the Council that all reasonable alternatives for funding these expenses have been exhausted. Requests for emergency supplemental funds for extraordinary expenses associated with a violent crime *trial* must be accompanied by documentation from the county's chief financial officer demonstrating the significant hardship or inability to cover extraordinary trial expenses.

Funding cannot be used to *supplant*, *take the place of*, *or substitute for* existing appropriations of state and local law enforcement agencies and counties.

How to Make a Funding Request

Agencies seeking funding must submit a detailed and itemized written request to the Florida Violent Crime Council, along with the accompanying *Violent Crime Emergency Account Application Cover Sheet*. Describe the violent crime case, stating details and specifics. Demonstrate that the resources of your agency are insufficient to meet the investigative or trial expenses.

The funding request will include a written endorsement from the Regional Violent Crime Investigation Coordinating Team in your service area. To allow appropriate staff review and analysis, written requests, including that endorsement, have to be submitted at least fifteen days prior to the next scheduled Violent Crime Council meeting. Please indicate who will be making the presentation to the Council.

Contributions

Local law enforcement agencies may *contribute* to the Violent Crime Emergency Account by submitting funds to the executive director of the Department of Law Enforcement. Contributions should be accompanied by a written statement designating the funds to the Violent Crime Emergency Account.
