Executive Summary

Since January 1, 1994, the Florida Department of Corrections has collected over 400,000 scoresheets on felony offenders sentenced in Florida courts under the state's sentencing guidelines. This second annual report examines the 113,547 scoresheets for fiscal year 1996-97 (July 1, 1996 through June 30, 1997) sentence dates, under either the 1994 or 1995 guidelines structure. This report also includes an examination of 221,351 1994 and 1995 offender scoresheets to determine if racial disparity exists in sentencing. Since the 1995 sentencing structure is effective for all felony offenses committed on or after October 1, 1995, most scoresheets (82.3%) reflect this policy.

In 1993, the Florida legislature created a new sentencing structure, with seven goals intended to improve the sentencing behavior of Florida's courts. The main body of this report (Part II: Impact) examines the extent to which the guidelines have had the desired and expected effects in each of these goal areas by analyzing scoresheets with sentence dates in FY 1996-97. These stated goals, as listed in Chapter 921 of the Florida Statutes are:

Goal 1: Prison beds are to be utilized for the more serious offenders and repeat offenders.

Fact: Serious offenders and non-violent offenders with long prior records represented a larger proportion of state prison admissions under the 1994 and 1995 versions of the guidelines compared to pre-1994 guidelines.

Goal 2: Sentencing is to be neutral with respect to race.

Fact: This study found that an offender's race has **NO** meaningful effect on the sentencing decisions made by Florida courts under the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines structure.

Goal 3: The penalty imposed is commensurate with the severity of the primary offense.

Fact: As the severity of the primary offense increases, the proportion of offenders sentenced to state prison increases, and the length of the prison sentence increases.

Goal 4: The severity of the sentence increases with the length and nature of the offender's prior record.

Fact: The average length of a state prison sentence increases as the number of prior felony convictions of offenders increases.

Goal 5: The sentence imposed represents the actual time to be served.

Fact: Although the prison sentence lengths imposed by courts have not changed dramatically from FY 1992-93 to FY 1996-97, the repeal of basic gain-time and elimination of the early prison release program has significantly increased actual time served in prison.

Goal 6: Departures from the recommended sentence are to be articulated in writing and justified.

Fact: Of the 113,547 scoresheets received with sentence dates in FY 1996-97, the courts deviated from the guidelines structure in 13.6% of the cases (14,561 mitigated and 870 aggravated, 15,431 total deviations).

Goal 7: The primary purpose of sentencing is to punish the offender.

An introductory section (Part I: Introduction) provides basic information on the different sentencing structures developed and utilized in Florida from 1983 - present and the department's responsibilities in regards to the sentencing guidelines. The tables and charts in this section describe the scoresheets with sentence dates in FY 1996-97 that are

examined throughout this report. More detailed information relates the "practice" of sentencing to the "policy" intended to be implemented through the guidelines (Part III: Sentencing Guidelines Practice).

Part I Introduction

Section 1. Overview of Florida Sentencing Guidelines

What are Sentencing Guidelines?

The Florida Sentencing Guidelines represent the state's structured policy with respect to the sentencing of non-capital felony offenders. There are three distinct versions of the guidelines currently in operation in Florida. They all:

- Provide for a uniform set of standards to guide the sentencing court in sentencing decisions.
- Evaluate relevant factors present at sentencing relating to the offense or offenses and the defendant's prior criminal behavior.
- Attempt to provide for "truth in sentencing" and eliminate unwarranted disparity in sentencing decisions.
- Focus on ensuring that the punishment is commensurate with the offenses before the court for sentencing.
- Are mathematically based and provide a means to address several policy areas including severity of the crime, victim injury, prior record, legal status, and other specific considerations. Every assessment of points in each system reflects a policy statement regarding the relative severity of a criminal's behavior.
- Are represented by a respective scoresheet which must be completed for each felony defendant prior to sentencing.

History of Sentencing Guidelines

Before Sentencing Guidelines

Florida Sentencing Guidelines first became effective on October 1, 1983. Prior to that time, courts sentenced in accordance with provisions of law that permitted a wide range of judicial discretion in the sentencing decision. Sanctions ranged from a minimum of a fine, up to state prison incarceration. The statutory maximum penalties of incarceration in state prison were:

- Five years for a felony of the third degree.
- Fifteen years for a felony of the second degree.
- Thirty years for a felony of the first degree.
- Life for a life felony.

This was a form of indeterminate sentencing policy because most offenders sentenced to prison were, by law, parole eligible. Parole was a discretionary early release policy which obviously had a significant impact upon both the percentage and the actual amount of time served.

The 1983 Sentencing Guidelines

Due to concerns regarding actual and percent of time served as well as concerns regarding a lack of uniformity in sentencing, the 1983 Florida Sentencing Guidelines were enacted October 1, 1983 and parole eligibility was abolished for almost all offenses committed after that date. These guidelines are currently in effect for:

- All non-capital felony offenses committed on or after October 1, 1983 and before January 1, 1994.
- All non-capital and non-life felonies committed before October 1, 1983 but sentenced after October 1, 1983, when the defendant elects to be sentenced under these guidelines.

The 1983 guidelines structure was comprised of nine separate worksheets for specified offense categories. All offenses were contained in one of these categories:

- 1. Murder/Manslaughter
- 2. Sexual Offenses
- 3. Robbery
- 4. Violent Personal Crimes
- 5. Burglary
- 6. Thefts, Forgery, Fraud
- 7. Drugs
- 8. Weapons and Escape
- 9. Other Felony Offenses

Within each worksheet, points were assessed for offenses to be sentenced and prior record offenses based on the number of offenses and each offense's felony degree. Assessments were also made for legal status and victim injury. Total scores fell into sentencing ranges or cells, for each worksheet. The least severe cell provided for a non-state prison sanction and the most severe cell provided for 27 years to life in prison. Departure sentences were permissible as long as written reasons were provided.

Several factors eventually eroded the integrity of the "truth in sentencing" aspect of the 1983 sentencing guidelines. Some of these factors included:

- An epidemic of "crack" cocaine-related offense activity. This resulted in an unanticipated impact upon correctional resources.
- The passage of unfunded mandatory minimum sentence legislation.
- Significant growth in the population of the state of Florida.

As a result of these and other factors, the percentage of time served and actual time served declined. By 1989, the average percent of time served was 34%. This lack of system integrity was the impetus for the creation of a new sentencing guidelines structure.

The 1994 Sentencing Guidelines

The 1994 sentencing guidelines were enacted through the passage of the "Safe Streets Act". These sentencing guidelines are in effect for all non-capital felony offenses committed on or after January 1, 1994 and before October 1, 1995. The focus of these guidelines is to:

- Incarcerate violent and repetitive offenders.
- Ensure a greater percentage of time served by providing that the policy created matched the resources that would be available.
- Eliminate certain gain time provisions.

Continue to attempt to eliminate unwarranted disparity in sentencing.

• Provide a flexible sentencing structure.

The structure of the 1994 sentencing guidelines has little similarity to the 1983 structure. The 1994 structure attempted to resolve some of the problems inherent in the preceding structure, such as the nine separate worksheets, the lack of offense-specific detail, and the issue of grouping crimes by category. The structure of the 1994 guidelines:

- Ranks all non-capital felonies in one of ten offense severity levels. Level one is the least severe ranking and ten reflects the most serious felonies.
- Associates each of the rankings with a point value in each of three elements: primary offense, additional offense(s), and prior record. Point values escalate as the rank increases. Every offense scored is provided its corresponding point value in these areas, with the emphasis on the primary offense.
- Provides for victim injury points to be assessed for physical injury or death suffered as a direct result of any offense pending sentence. Victim injury points are also scored for sexual penetration or sexual contact sustained.

Other policy levels of the guidelines include an assessment of points for:

- Legal status existing at the time of the offense, pending sentencing.
- Offenses returned to the court due to a violation of community supervision.
- Offenses involving the possession of specified firearms when *NO* mandatory minimum applies.
- Violations of the Law Enforcement Protection Act, which includes specified violent offenses committed against law enforcement officers.
- Drug trafficking offenses when **NO** mandatory minimum penalty applies.

Under the 1994 structure, the total guidelines score determines the guidelines sanction and a range of state prison months, if applicable. There are basically three categories of sanction based upon total scores. The scores may:

- 1. mandate a non-state prison sanction.
- 2. provide for discretionary prison or non-state prison sanction.
- 3. mandate a state prison sanction.

The sentencing parameters point values operate as follows:

- If total or increased sentence points are under 40, the offender must receive a non-state prison sanction, which includes options of county jail, probation (with or without residential programs), or community control.
- If total sentence points are less than 40, but could be increased by 15% to reach over 40, the court may, in its discretion, do so. This means that in actuality, scores of less than 34.8 must receive a non-state prison sanction under the guidelines.
- If total or increased sentence points are over 40 and less than 52 the court has the discretion to provide a non-state prison sanction or a prison sanction.
- If the total sentence points exceed 52, a state prison sanction is mandated under the guidelines.
- The length of prison is determined by subtracting 28 from the total sentence points to derive the total prison months.

• The court has the discretion to increase or decrease the sanction by 25%, unless the total sentence points were increased initially by 15% to obtain an increased point value of over 40.

The 1995 Sentencing Guidelines

The 1994 sentencing guidelines were significantly amended in 1995 through the passage of the Crime Control Act of 1995. The basic structure and intent of the 1994 sentencing guidelines remained intact, however point values were increased in a variety of areas and additional policy levers were created to provide for greater sanctions. Generally, increases in point values loosely equal an increase of approximately 1 month of prison sanction for each point increased. The 1995 version of the sentencing guidelines are effective for all offenses committed on or after October 1, 1995. The significant changes included the following:

- The point value for level 7 primary offenses increased from 42 to 56 points. This was significant, as 42 points results in a discretionary state prison or non-state prison sanction, whereas 56 points mandates a prison sanction under the guidelines. Examples of frequently committed level 7 offenses include burglary of a dwelling, lewd and lascivious act upon a child under the age of 16, and aggravated battery.
- The point value for victim injury points for second degree murder doubled from 120 to 240. Sexual penetration victim injury points doubled from 40 to 80 and sexual contact points increased from 18 to 40 points.
- Additional and prior record point values for offenses in severity levels 6 through 10 were increased significantly.
- Point values for violations of court-ordered supervision programs were enhanced.
- A mechanism was created to increase the sanction for offenders who commit serious offenses and have a recent history of serious felony behavior. A 30 point enhancement was created to provide additional punishment for those offenders who are convicted of level 8, 9, or 10 offenses and who have in their recent prior record a level 8, 9, or 10 offense.
- A mechanism was created to significantly increase the sanction for repeated convictions of Grand Theft Auto.

There were slight modifications to the guidelines in 1996, including a provision for increased sanction for crimes committed by street gang members. In 1997 modifications were added providing for a domestic violence multiplier and allowing for incarceration in state prison for up to 22 months for any defendant who had one prior felony conviction.

THE CRIMINAL PUNISHMENT CODE

The Florida legislature abolished the sentencing guidelines and the Florida Sentencing Commission during the 1997 legislative session. The guidelines were replaced by the Criminal Punishment Code to become effective October 1, 1998. During the 1998 legislative session the code was refined and will become effective October of this year. Compared to the guidelines, the code allows for greater upward discretion in sentencing, provides for increased penalties and lower mandatory prison thresholds.

- The Code is effective for all non-capital felony offenses committed on or after October 1, 1998. The guidelines are repealed for all offenses committed on or after October 1, 1998 but remain in effect for offenses committed prior to this date.
- The Code significantly alters the sentencing policy in a variety of respects. One of the most notable changes is the significant broadening of upward discretion in the sentencing policy. Under the sentencing guidelines the upward discretion was 25 percent above the state prison months determined by the calculation. Under the code, the maximum sentence for any felony offense is determined by the statutory maximums as provided in 775.082.

Felony Degree	Years in Prison
Life Felony	Up to Life
1 st	Up to 30
2 nd	Up to 15
3 rd	Up to 5

This has two effects that are divergent from the preceding guidelines. First, all felony offenders have the potential to receive a prison sentence whereas many under the guidelines were by policy excluded from such a possibility. Second, the maximums of 775.082 usually will provide for far greater sentence lengths than were permissible under the guidelines.

- Another significant change is the determination when a prison sentence becomes mandatory under the new sentencing policy. The basic structure of the sentencing policy has not changed with respect to point determinations. Sentencing point thresholds for sentence calculations have however undergone significant revisions.
 - 1. If total points are equal to or less than 44, the lowest permissible sentence is a non state prison sanction (however state prison up to the statutory maximum can be imposed).
 - 2. If total points exceed 44, the minimum sentence is established by taking the total point value subtracting 28 and decreasing the remaining value by 25%. This end result value is the lowest permissible prison sentence in months.

This means that only those offenders scoring 44 or less points may receive a non state prison sanction under the code. All others must receive a state prison sanction, absent downward departure from this structure. The threshold under the guidelines for mandatory prison incarceration was 52 points.

The Department of Corrections Responsibilities

The department was provided a variety of responsibilities regarding the sentencing guidelines with respect to the 1994 and subsequent versions of the law. Florida statute 921 requires the department:

- Develop the scoresheet and any revisions of the scoresheet for approval by the Supreme Court and supply sentencing guidelines scoresheets to the appropriate criminal justice entities in the state.
- Prepare scoresheets. This agency currently has coequal responsibility of scoresheet with state attorneys. The department is the primary scoresheet preparer in 10 of the 20 judicial circuits, though we are not the primary preparer in any of the 4 largest circuits. We prepare 25% of the scoresheets statewide.
- Collect and evaluate data on sentencing practices in the state for the purpose of assisting the commission in recommending modifications to the guidelines. When the Criminal Punishment Code becomes effective, the department will be required to assist the Criminal Justice Estimating Conference in estimating correctional impact

of proposed changes to the code.

- Provide the commission by October 1 of each year a report detailing the rate of compliance of each judicial circuit in providing scoresheets to the department. When the Criminal Punishment Code becomes effective this report must be submitted to the legislature.
- To assist the sentencing commission in estimating rates of incarceration and make funding recommendations to the legislature. When the Criminal Punishment Code becomes effective and the commission is abolished, the department will be required to provide the legislature an annual report detailing trends in sentencing and an analysis thereof by October 1 of each year.

The SAGES (Sentencing Analysis and Guidelines Entry Systems) database

The department developed a database in 1994 to be used as a mechanism to:

- Store sentencing guidelines scoresheets received from the clerks of the courts after sentencing statewide and
- Provide for more accurate, legible and time efficient scoresheet preparation.

This report is derived primarily from the information upon sentencing scoresheets received by the department from the clerks of the courts and entered into SAGES with sentence dates in fiscal year 96-97.

The following should be considered when evaluating this and other information derived from this database:

- The information is compiled from a database containing sentencing guidelines scoresheets received by the Department of Corrections for offenses with dates of commission on or after January 1, 1994. The information is based upon the scoresheets in the database with dates of sentence in fiscal year 96-97 as of October 31, 1997.
- As the compliance rate for scoresheet submissions is not 100%, there is missing information that would have potentially affected the outcome of the analysis. The current statewide compliance rate is 85.8%.
- Though the department retrieves and includes in the guidelines database omitted information from scoresheet that is critical, no effort is made to correct preparation error or errors recorded on scoresheets regarding the sentence imposed. The department does not have the authority to amend an official court document. Conversely, there is a responsibility to record the information as received.
- There is data entry error on the part of department staff. Recent analyses indicate that the rate of data entry error in the fields analyzed in the report is not significant.

Part I Introduction

Section 2. Introductory Statistics

FACT: There were 113,547 scoresheets with sentence dates in FY 1996-97 entered into the sentencing guidelines database. Of these, 17.3% indicated a sentence to state prison, with the remaining indicating one of the following: Community Control, a form of house arrest (11.1%); Probation (46.5%); or County Jail/Other (25.5%).

FINDINGS:

- Nearly 83% of the 113,547 scoresheets with sentence dates in FY 1996-97 were sentenced under the 1995 sentencing guidelines. However, by June, 1997, less than 11% (10.8%) were scored under the 1994 guidelines policy (Table 1).
- Due to varying time lags in the processing of cases, counties and circuits differed substantially in the proportion of FY 1996-97 cases processed under the two guidelines policies (Tables 2 and 3).
- Of all offenders admitted to community supervision (probation, community control, drug offender probation, or administrative probation) in FY 1996-97, the majority of offenders were sentenced under the 1995 guidelines policy (82.0%), with only 4.1% sentenced on the basis of pre-1994 (1983 guidelines) policy, and nearly 14% under the 1995 guidelines policy (Figure 2).
- Among those admitted to prison in FY 1996-97, the majority were sentenced under the 1995 guidelines policy (59.2%), less than 13% were sentenced under pre-1994 (1983 guidelines) policy, while slightly over a quarter (28.1%) were subject to the 1994 guidelines policy (Figure 2).
- Nearly eighty-three percent (82.6%) of all scoresheets were for male offenders (Table 4), and 53.7% were for white offenders (Table 5). Almost half (49.8%) of all offenders were under age 30 (Table 6).









Part II Impact

Section 1. Use of Incarcerative Sanctions

GOAL: Use of incarcerative sanctions is prioritized toward offenders convicted of serious offenses and certain offenders who have long prior records, in order to maximize the finite capacities of state and local correctional facilities. F.S. 921.001(4)(a)7.

FACT: Serious offenders and non-violent offenders with long prior records represented a larger proportion of state prison admissions under the 1994 and 1995 versions of the guidelines compared to pre-1994 guidelines.

FINDINGS:


- Overall, the proportion of violent offenses has dramatically increased, from 30.0% of prison admissions in FY 1992-93 to 39.2% in FY 1996-97 (Figure 1).
- In line with the goals of the sentencing guidelines, the proportion of prison admissions for less serious drug offenses have decreased from 31.0% in FY 1992-93 to 23.8% in FY 1996-97 (Table 1).
- Murder/Manslaughter offenses represented 4.5% of all state prison admissions in FY 1996-97, up from 3.9% in FY 1992-93 (Table 1).
- Sexual/Lewd Assault offenses increased by 0.6% among those admitted to state prison, from 4.4% in FY 1992-93 to 5.0% in FY 1996-97 (Table 1).
- Prison admissions of nonviolent, 3rd degree felony offenders have become more heavily focused on those with long prior prison records. For example, drug offenders with two or more prior prison sentences represented 42.2% of all 3rd degree felony convictions in FY 1996-97, up from 28.7% in FY 1992-93 (Table 2).

NOTE: The admissions from FY 1992-93 utilized for these analyses, include only cases with offense dates on or after

1/1/90. This restriction allows comparability to the 1994 guidelines structure which was in effect for offenses committed on or after January 1, 1994.

Part II Impact

Section 2. Sentencing Neutrality

GOAL: Sentencing is neutral with respect to race, gender, and social and economic status. F.S. 921.001(4)(a)1.

FACT: This study found that an offender's race has **NO** meaningful effect on the sentencing decisions made by Florida courts under the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines structure.

FINDINGS:

- Before examining any other factors, black offenders were more likely than white offenders to be sentenced to prison (Table 1). Within many offense groups, black offenders received longer prison sentences than white offenders (Table 2).
- However, black offenders had higher rates of characteristics generally considered appropriate for higher rates of imprisonment and longer prison sentences. Black offenders had 14.3% higher total sentence points, were 27% more likely to have a prior record, and were 40.4% more likely to have a prior prison sentence (Table 3).
- When taking into account relevant sentencing factors, race was not found to be an influential factor in determining either the decision to sentence an offender to prison or the length of prison sentences. Of the 32 factors studied which affect the in/out prison decision, 28 were **more** influential in determining the sentence than the race of the offender (Table 4). Of the 31 factors used to study the length of prison sentence, race was the **least** influential factor in determining the sentence (Table 5).
- * The database used for this section of analysis includes scoresheets with sentence dates outside the FY 1996-97 that is analyzed in the rest of the report.

Does An Offender's Race Affect Sentencing in Florida?

Introduction:

The question addressed in this section is: Does an offender's race affect the sentencing decisions made by Florida courts when punishing felony offenders under the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines structure. FS 921.001(a)(4) states that sentencing guidelines embody the principles that **sentencing is to be "neutral with respect to race..".** This study will determine whether this racial equity principle is followed when offenders are punished under Florida's sentencing guidelines mechanism.

Two major changes in Florida's sentencing policy have occurred in the past two decades. In 1983, the indeterminate sentencing policy, also known as parole, was eliminated and replaced with sentencing guidelines. In 1994, the 1983 sentencing guidelines structure was replaced with the 1994 sentencing guidelines. Modifications to the 1994 guidelines were made in 1995 for crimes committed on or after October 1, 1995. This study does not examine whether race affected sentencing decisions under the pre-1983 indeterminate sentencing system or during the 1983 guidelines period. It focuses on whether racial disparity exists within the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines system.

Prior Research:

Some evidence suggests that racial disparity in sentencing did exist in Florida prior to the 1983 sentencing guidelines. The Sentencing Study Committee, which was responsible for recommending that Florida implement sentencing

guidelines in 1983, conducted an in-depth study of 1,000 felony cases in 1979. The committee examined the decision whether to sentence an offender to jail or prison and, if a prison sentence was imposed, the length of incarceration. The committee found that, after holding legally relevant factors constant, non-white offenders were significantly more likely to receive a jail or prison sentence than white offenders.

Methodology:

For this analysis, all felony offenders sentenced in Florida courts from July 1, 1994 to December 31, 1996 who were sentenced under the 1994 or 1995 sentencing guidelines were examined for racial disparity. Statistical models were constructed based on variables contained in the sentencing guidelines database maintained by the Florida Department of Corrections. This database contains information on 221,351 offenders sentenced under the guidelines over the period specified.

These statistical models examine the effect of all variables simultaneously, to measure the unique effect of each on the sentencing outcome while holding all other variables constant. This method enables one to determine whether an offender's race influences judicial sentencing when other characteristics about the offender are held constant (seriousness of the current offense, prior criminal record, offenses other than the primary offense, ³ and victim injury).

Sentencing is analyzed as a two part decision: first, whether or not the offender is sentenced to prison, and second, if a prison sentence is administered, the length of the prison sentence. Prior sentencing research has conclusively demonstrated that the judiciary utilizes different factors, or the same factors to different degrees, when making the in/out prison decision versus the length of prison sentence decision.

The following factors were included in the models. Details on how these factors were measured are located at the end of this section.

- 1. Race (black/white)⁴
- 2. Gender (male/female)
- 3. Age at Time of Sentencing
- 4. Most Serious Offense ("Primary Offense")
- 5. Statutory Felony Class of the Primary Offense
- 6. Type of Primary Offense (Murder, Sexual/Lewd Assault, Robbery, Other Violent, Burglary, Property, Drugs, Weapons, and Other)
- 7. Seriousness of Additional Offenses
- 8. Types of Additional Offenses
- 9. Seriousness of Offender's Prior Criminal Record
- 10. Types of Prior Crimes in Offender's Prior Criminal Record
- 11. Prior Florida Prison Sentences
- 12. Victim Injury
- 13. Prior Community Supervision Violations
- 14. Law Enforcement Enhancement Guidelines Points
- 15. Case Disposition (Plea/Trial)

Many of these factors are measured in multiple ways to model the sentencing decisions. For example, the types of prior criminal convictions are measured by the number of prior robbery convictions, the number of prior drug convictions, etc. This approach was taken to develop models which explain as much of the sentencing decisions as possible. A total of 32 factors were used to predict the sentencing decisions. 5

Details on the methodology of the current study can be obtained from the author. 6

Findings:

This study failed to find evidence that an offender's race has any meaningful effect on decisions made by Florida courts

under the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines structure. This leads to the conclusion that the goal of racial equity explicit in the sentencing guidelines law has been met when examining the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines structure.

Overall, the empirical evidence presented in detail in this section documents three primary conclusions:

- 1. Before examining any other factors, black offenders were more likely than white offenders to be sentenced to prison (Table 1). Within many offense groups, black offenders received longer prison sentences than white offenders (Table 2).
- 2. However, black offenders had higher rates of characteristics generally considered appropriate for higher rates of imprisonment and longer prison sentences (e.g., more serious crimes and more serious prior criminal records) (Table 3).
- 3. After taking into account relevant sentencing factors, race was not found to be an influential factor in determining either the decision to sentence an offender to prison (Table 4) or the length of prison sentences for those receiving a prison term (Table 5).

It should be noted that this report addresses only disparity at the final stage in the judicial process of sentencing for felony offenders. The question of whether racial disparity exists at earlier stages in the criminal justice process, such as arrest, prosecution, plea bargaining, or conviction is not within the scope of this report.

Is there racial equity is specific sentencing guidelines factors? Below are the answers to this question.

Question: Are black offenders more likely than white offenders to be sentenced to state prison following a felony conviction when one does *not* examine any of the factors which are intended to affect sentencing (e.g., seriousness of the current crime, prior criminal record and victim injury)?

Answer: Yes. Table 1 shows that black offenders were more likely to be sentenced to prison than white offenders: black 20.8% versus white 14.1 %. When examining the likelihood of black and white offenders receiving a prison sentence for general crime types (violent, property, drug, and other), black offenders were more likely to be sentenced to prison than white offenders when the primary offenses was one of the following: Violent (+11.4%), Property (+3.4%), Drug (+9.4%), and Other (+3.7%). Within the nine more specific offense types (murder/manslaughter, sexual/lewd assault, etc.) black offenders were more likely to be sentenced to prison than white offenders. Examining 49 specific offense types in Table 1 reveals that black offenders were more likely to be sentenced to prison than white offenders within 39 offense types, while white offenders were more likely in 10 offense types.

Question: If the judge decided a prison sentence is appropriate for a

convicted felon, were black and white offenders given different lengths of prison sentences under the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines when no legally relevant factors are considered?

Answer: Yes, but only for some offense types. Table 2 shows that the average sentence lengths for black and white offenders were identical (4.6 years) when all 38,031 offenders sentenced to prison are considered. However, while the numerical differences are not significant, when examining differences in average sentence lengths within the four broad offense types, black offenders received longer sentences in three of the four groups (Violent: black = +0.3 years, or + 4.7% longer prison sentences; Property: black +0.3 years, + 8.1%; Other: black +0.4 years, +13.6%). White offenders received an average of 0.6 years, or 17.2% longer prison sentences than black offenders for drug convictions.

When examining racial differences within nine specific offense types, black offenders received longer sentences in seven of the groups. Black offenders sentences averaged 20.4% (2.7 years) greater than white offenders for those convicted of murder or manslaughter. Black offenders convicted of robbery received 18.8% (1.2 years) longer sentences, on average, than white offenders convicted of robbery. Overall, white drug offenders received 17.2% (0.6 years) longer sentences than black offenders. However, when examining those convicted of selling drugs, black offenders received 25.5% (0.6 years) longer sentences than white offenders. White drug offenders received longer

sentences for possession and trafficking of drugs compared to black offenders convicted of the same crimes.

Question: Are black offenders and white offenders different relative to sentencing factors considered relevant to the in/out prison decision and the length of prison sentence?

Answer: Yes. Table 3 shows that, for most factors, black offenders consistently exhibited higher rates of characteristics generally associated with judicial decisions towards more punitive sanctions. The figures in Table 3 reveal the following differences:

- Black offenders had higher overall sentencing guidelines points, which are a composite of the seriousness of the current primary crime, additional current crimes, prior criminal record, victim injury, supervision violation points, drug trafficking enhancements, and law enforcement protection enhancements. The average for total points was 30.7 for black offenders compared to 26.3 for white offenders -- a difference of 4.4 points, or 14.3%.
- Black offenders had higher average primary offense points than white offenders. The average for primary offense points was 26.2 for black offenders compared to 24.9 for white offenders -- a difference of 1.3 points or 5.0%. For drug crimes, black offenders had 15.5% higher average primary offense points than white offenders.
- Black offenders had more serious prior criminal records than white offenders using four different measures. First, black offenders were 27.0% more likely to have a prior criminal record than white offenders (black offenders = 66.2%, white offenders = 48.3%). Second, the average prior record guidelines points for black offenders was 8.2 compared to 4.8 for white offenders, a difference of 3.4 points or 41.5%. Third, black offenders had an average of 5.8 prior criminal convictions compared to 4.3 for white offenders. Fourth, black offenders were much more likely to have prior Florida prison commitments. Black offenders were 40.4% more likely to have a prior prison sentence than white offenders (black offenders: 9.2%; white offenders: 5.5%). These differences continued within the four broad offense groups. For example, among drug offenders, black offenders were 31.9% more likely to have prior criminal record, had 51.6% higher average prior record points, had 18.3% higher average number of prior record convictions, and were 58.5% more likely to have prior prison sentences than white offenders.
- Black offenders were slightly more likely (0.3%) to be convicted of multiple crimes (i.e., "additional offenses" beyond the primary crime) than white offenders. For all offense types, white offenders who had additional crimes had higher average guidelines points for these offenses than black offenders (5.4 versus 5.1). Examining additional point differences across the racial groups revealed that black offenders had higher point levels than white offenders for violent offenses (+1.7, 16.5%), drug offenses (+0.8, 25.0%), and other offenses (+0.6, 17.6%). Only within property offenses did white offenders have higher additional points than black offenders (+1.9, 42.2%).
- Black offenders and white offenders did not differ appreciably in terms of the likelihood that their crimes involved victim injury. White offenders had committed crimes involving some level of victim injury 10.0% of the time compared to 9.6% for black offenders.
- Black offenders were more likely to have previously been violated for failure to abide by the conditions of community supervision (22.1%) than white offenders (19.1%). For violent offenses, black offenders were 17.8% more likely than white offenders to have violated conditions of supervision.

Question: Was race a factor used by judges to any meaningful degree when deciding whether to sentence an offender to prison when **all** other measured factors are held constant?

Answer: No. Table 4 shows that when considering the 32 factors measured in the in/out prison decision model, race was of no meaningful importance. Out of the 32 factors in the model, 28 affected the prison decision to a greater degree than whether the offender was white or black. Only three factors out of 32 were less influential in determining the sentence imposed than the race of the offenders. This leads to the conclusion that the race of the convicted felon had no meaningful impact on the judge's decision whether a prison sentence is warranted. Instead, the number of times the offenders had been sentenced to prison in the past, the seriousness of the current crime, the extent and severity of prior criminal record, the number of prior prison sentences, and the injury inflicted upon the victim are the factors that

primarily determined the imprisonment decision.

The statistical models utilized in this study are able to explain just over half (52.2%) of the judicial decision of whether to sentence a criminal to prison. There are obviously a significant number of factors taken into consideration by judges to decide whether to administer a prison sentence that are not accounted for in the models constructed for this study. Without the ability to measure all the factors considered in the prison decision, the true effect of race cannot be quantified.

Question: Once a judge decided to sentence an offender to prison, was race a meaningful factor in deciding the length of the prison sentence?

Answer: No. Table 5 clearly demonstrates that, under the sentencing guidelines, race has no meaningful effect on the length of prison sentences. Of the 31 factors in the model, 28 affected the length of the prison sentence to a greater degree than race. There were only 2 other factors less influential than race is determining the length of the prison sentence. The seriousness of the current offense, extent of victim injury, and the severity of the offender's prior criminal record, are factors which judges apparently consider most when determining the length of the prison sentence.

Conclusion:

This study of 221,351 felons sentenced under Florida's sentencing guidelines policy from July 1994 to December 1996 clearly demonstrates that the goal of ensuring equity in sentences across racial groups has been realized. There is no meaningful empirical evidence to suggest that black offenders and white offenders are treated unequally by the judicial system under these sentencing guidelines. The race of the offender does not have any meaningful bearing on the decision by Florida judges to sentence a felon to prison or how long imprisoned offenders will be incarcerated. What were influential in determining these punishment decisions were factors such as the severity of the crime(s) for which the offender is being sentenced, the extent and seriousness of the offender's prior criminal record, the number of prior prison sentences, and the amount of injury inflicted upon the victim.

Future Research:

Although sentencing guidelines have directed how over one million felons have been punished in Florida since 1983, this study is the first attempt to address the important question of whether there is racial equity in criminal sentencing under sentencing guidelines. There is much more research that will be done to further study the sentencing racial equity issue. Specifically, the following types of analyses will be conducted and reported in the future.

- 1. Analysis within specific offense types will be conducted to determine if there is any evidence of meaningful racial disparity. The analysis reported here utilized statistical controls to account for differences in the types of crimes. While this method is generally considered valid, studying this issue within specific offense types may educate us further about this issue.
- 2. Research will be conducted to determine if any meaningful levels of racial disparity occurred during different time periods since the 1994 and 1995 sentencing guidelines have been in place. It is particularly relevant to examine the racial disparity issue examining the 1994 compared to the 1995 sentencing guidelines.
- 3. The sentencing guidelines structure and resulting data enable periodic reviews of the racial disparity in sentencing issue to be conducted. Such reviews can be completed annually or on a specialized basis when policy changes require them.
- 4. While judicial circuit was considered in the statistical models developed in this study, further analysis of the racial disparity issue conducted for individual judicial circuits would tell us more about this issue.
- 5. If possible, comparative analysis with other states with and without sentencing guidelines structures will be made to identify how Florida compares to other states in terms of the issue of sentencing equity.
- 6. Further enhancements to the sentencing models will be made to increase the extent to which sentencing decisions

are predicted with available data. This will involve including additional data when available and more refinements to the data already accessible.

7. Examinations will be made of whether disparity across geographical areas of the state exists. In addition, the issue of gender and socio-economic equity will be addressed since these factors are also included in the guidelines' equity goal.

Details on Measurement of Sentencing Factors:

Age at Time of Sentencing: Measured in years. The age of the offender when the offense occurred was also used in the preliminary analyses. The influence of age at sentencing and age at offense produced identical results in the statistical models.

Most Serious Offense ("Primary Offense"): This was measured using the guideline point value associated with the primary offense.

Statutory Felony Class of the Primary Offense: There are five felony class levels defined by Florida law which are sentenced under the guidelines: life, first degree punishable by life, first degree, second degree, and third degree. Capital crimes are not sentenced under the sentencing guidelines and are therefore not considered here. Four separate factors were created for the models indicating whether the primary offense was or was not each of the felony class levels. These variables were included in the model to determine their unique effect on the sentencing decisions. One could create one continuous factor from the felony class level. However, that would assume that the seriousness of the crime increases to the same degree with each increase in the felony class. For example, it would assume that a second degree felony is twice as serious as a third degree felony. There is no basis for making this assumption.

Type of Primary Offense: The specific primary offenses were categorized into nine groups (murder/manslaughter, sexual/lewd assault, robbery, other violent, burglary, property, drugs, weapons/escape, and other). Nine dichotomous variables (no=0, yes=1) were created for each of the offense groups. Eight of these variables were part of the model (for statistical models you exclude one category to form a comparison point). These variables were treated as control variables and are not reported in the in/out prison decision or length of prison decision tables.

Seriousness of Additional Offenses: Measured as the number of guidelines points assessed for all additional crimes for which the offender was sentenced. This was used as an overall seriousness measure. A measure of the number of additional offenses was created, however, the guidelines points were found to have more explanatory power than the number of crimes. These two measures were highly correlated. Only the point total was used in the model.

Types of Additional Offenses: A measure of the nature of additional offenses was created by developing indicators of the number of additional crimes for each of the nine offense groups detailed above. These nine variables were then used in the statistical models.

Seriousness of Prior Offenses: Measured as the number of guidelines points assessed for all prior crime convictions. This was used as an overall seriousness measure of the offender's prior criminal record. A measures of the number of prior felony convictions was created, however, the guidelines points were found to have more explanatory power than the number of crimes. These two measures were highly correlated. Only the point total was used in the model.

Types of Prior Offenses: The same types of measure explained above for additional offenses was developed for prior record crimes.

Prior Florida Prison Sentences: The number of times an offender has been sentenced to Florida's prison system in the past. This variable only includes new sentences to prison and does not include admissions to prison which resulted from a technical violation of supervision. In these latter cases, the offender is returned to prison to complete a prior commitment. This information is not part of the guidelines scoresheet. It was obtained from the Department of Correction's data system.

Victim Injury: This is measured by the total number of victim injury points assessed on the guidelines scoresheet.

Several other measures, such as number of victims involved and number of various types of victim injury, were developed. However, the total victim injury points explained more of the sentence decisions and was used in the final models.

Prior Community Supervision Violations: This was measured by the number of release program violation points assessed on the guidelines scoresheet.

Law Enforcement Enhancement Guidelines Points: If the primary offense on the sentencing guidelines scoresheet is a violation of the Law Enforcement Protection Act, the subtotal sentence points are multiplied by either 1.5, 2.0, or 2.5, depending upon which provision of the law was violated. The measure used for this analysis is the number of additional guidelines points assessed if the multiplier was used.

NOTE: Due to time constraints, this study has not been replicated or expanded. It has been reprinted from the FY1996-97 annual report.

- ¹ "A Report on the Analysis of Sentencing Procedures in Florida's Circuit Courts," Sentencing Study Committee, February 29, 1979.
- ² Capital felony cases are not sentenced under the sentencing guidelines and are therefore not a part of this study. The 1994 sentencing guidelines took effect for any crimes committed on or after January 1, 1994. Therefore, offenders sentenced between July 1, 1994 and December 31, 1996 who committed crimes prior to January 1, 1994 are not a part of this study. Offenders sentenced between January 1, 1994 and June 30, 1994 under the 1994 sentencing guidelines were excluded from this analysis. The quality of the guidelines data for this time period is questionable. Data quality improvements as a result of additional training, feedback to judicial circuits, and the implementation of data quality auditing procedures resulted in more accurate and complete guidelines scoresheets after the first six months of implementation.
- ³ "Primary Offense" is the most serious crime for which the offender is sentenced under the sentencing guidelines. The determination of which offense is primary, if multiple offenses are involved, is based on which crime results in the highest number of total sentencing guidelines points. For almost all sentencing scoresheets, the primary offense will be the one which falls in the highest guidelines level.
- ⁴ The sentencing guidelines scoresheet allows for the entry of three race categories: white, black, and other. There were 1,889 (0.8%) cases with the "other" race category in the database studied for this report. The relatively low number of cases in "other" and the inability to identify the specific racial group led to the decision not to include these cases in this analysis.
- ⁵ The judicial circuit which sentenced the offenders was used as a control variable in models not presented in this report. These models produced virtually identical results to those reported in this report in terms of racial effects and the relative importance of the factors in the models. To examine this issue further, analysis will be conducted in the future within specific judicial circuits to further study the racial disparity issue.

Section 3. Penalties and Primary Offense Severity

GOAL: The penalty imposed is commensurate with the severity of the primary offense and the circumstances surrounding the primary offense. F.S. 921.001(4)(a)3.

FACT: As the severity of the primary offense increases, the proportion of offenders sentenced to state prison increases, and the length of the prison sentence increases.

NOTE: As a result of scoresheet preparation error or data entry error, there were a minimal number of cases in which the sentencing guidelines level is in error (see page 11 of this report for reasons why errors are not changed). See the Appendix in this report for the Severity Ranking Chart.

FINDINGS:

- The proportion of those sentenced to state prison increased steadily from 3.3% at sentencing guidelines severity level 1, the offense level representing the least severe offenses, to 90.9% at sentencing guidelines severity level 10, the offense level representing the most serious offenses (Table 1).
- Community Control sanctions were imposed progressively more from sentencing guidelines level 1 (8.8%) to sentencing guidelines level 7 (17.7%). Probation sanctions represented a decreasing proportion of cases as sentencing guidelines level moves from level 2 to level 10 (Table 1).
- Over 60% of the offenders with a primary offense at sentencing guidelines severity level 8 received a state prison sentence of four or more years. Over 73% of level 10 offenders received a sentence of more than 10 years in state prison (Table 2).

FACT: The scoresheet total points are a sum of several component scores: the primary offense, additional offenses, prior offenses, victim injury, legal status violations, community sanction violations, firearm and weapons violations, and specific enhancements.

FINDINGS:

- In most cases, the nature of the primary offense made the greatest contribution to total sentencing guidelines points -- as expected given the design of the guidelines. However, offenders scoring to state prison had, on average, a larger percentage of points associated with the nature and number of their additional offenses, as well as other scoring components, compared to those receiving less severe sanctions (Table 3).
- Overall, the primary offense contributed about 65% of total points. This varied from nearly 76% for those with total points are in the non-prison category to 56% for those with total points in the recommended state prison category (see definitions of point categories in the Notes portion of Impact Section 6). In the higher point ranges, prior record, additional offenses, and the other components made great contributions while legal status/community sanction violation points made a great impact at the lower ranges. (Table 3).
- Over half of all scoresheets included points from additional offenses. About 74% had points related to prior record of the offender. Over 21% gained points from community sanction violations, and nearly 9% from victim injury. Of the victim injury points, most came from the slight or moderate categories (Table 4).

• Most offenders have no additional offenses, or only misdemeanors (table 5).





SECTION 4. Sentence Severity and Prior Record

GOAL: The severity of the sentence increases with the length and nature of the offender's prior record. F.S. 921.001(4)(a)4.

FACT: As the number of prior felony convictions increases, the percentage of offenders sentenced to state prison increases.

FINDINGS:

- Nearly 52% of offenders had no prior offense records or misdemeanors only (Table 1).
- Only 8.6% of the offenders with no prior felonies were sentenced to state prison. More than 62% of offenders with six or more prior felony convictions were sentenced to state prison, regardless of the severity of the current offense (Table 2).
- 61% of all offenders with no prior felony convictions were sentenced to probation (Table 2).

FACT: The average length of a state prison sentence increases as the number of prior felony convictions of offenders increases.

FINDINGS:

• For offenders convicted of offenses with sentencing guidelines severity levels between 1 and 4, the average increase in state prison sentence length for each prior felony was 4.7 months. For levels 5 to 7, the increase for each prior felony resulted in an average increase of 9.2 months. And for levels 8 to 10, each prior felony added an average of 12.7 months to the state prison sentence (Table 3).

SECTION 5. Length of Time Served

GOAL: The sentence imposed by the sentencing judge reflects the length of actual time to be served, shortened only by the application of incentive and meritorious gain-time. F.S. 921.001(4)(a)5.

FACT: Although the prison sentence lengths imposed by courts have not changed dramatically from FY 1992-93 to FY 1996-97, the repeal of basic gain-time and elimination of the early prison release program has significantly increased actual time served in prison.

FINDINGS:

- The average percentage of sentence served has increased from less than 31% in 1990 to 71.2% in 1997 for all released offenders. Similar increases are seen for violent offenders (Figure 1).
- Using estimates of the number of years that will be served under the pre-1994 and the 1994-95 guidelines policies, sentences for murder, manslaughter and sexual battery will increase dramatically. For example, the average number of years served for second degree murder will rise by 4.0 years, and that for first degree sexual battery will increase by 5.8 years (Table 1).

Average Percentage of Time Served Over Seven Years



Section 6. Departures From Recommended Sentences

GOAL: Departures from the recommended sentences established in the guidelines are articulated in writing and made only when circumstances or factors reasonably justify the aggravation or mitigation of the sentence. F.S. 921.001(4) (a)6.

FACT: Of the 113,547 scoresheets received with sentence dates in FY 1996-97, the courts deviated from the guidelines structure in 13.6% of the cases (14,561 mitigated and 870 aggravated, 15,431 total deviations).

NOTES: An offender's score determines from which of three categories he will be sentenced.

- Category 1 Offenders scoring less than 34.8 total points fall in the non-state prison category. In this category, a prison sanction is not permitted within the guidelines structure.
- Category 2 Offenders scoring between 34.8 and 52.0 total points fall in the discretionary range. As the name implies, the courts have flexibility in administering either a prison or a non-prison sanction without the requirement of a reason for their decision.
- Category 3 In this category, offenders who score more than 52.0 total points are mandated by the guidelines to receive a state prison sanction.

However, the courts may depart from the guidelines structure if a written reason justifying the departure is provided (see sample of scoresheet with attached departure list in the Appendix). A deviation may occur in the non-state prison category (aggravation) or the state prison category (mitigation). Departure information may be recorded on the scoresheet or may be filed in writing in some other manner within 7 days of sentencing.

A true mitigation occurs when an offender scores more than 52.0 total points and either receives a non-state prison sanction or a state prison sentence length less than the 25% permissible downward discretion existing within the guidelines. A sanction mitigation occurs when an offender scores more than 52.0 total points, but receives a non-state prison sanction.

FINDINGS:

- The *true* mitigation rate for those offenders who scored more than 52.0 total points was 58.9%. The *sanction* mitigation rate (those cases that scored to state prison but received a non-state prison sanction) was 43.8% (Table 1).
- For the 9,729 offenders who received a mitigated state prison sentence length, the average reduction in sentence was 25.4 months (Table 1).
- The aggravation rate for those offenders who scored in the non-state prison category was 1.4% (Table 5).

NOTE: The number of cases in many areas is extremely small. Percentages are given, but the may be misleading if numbers are less than 20.

Fiscal Year 1996-97






n=113,547



Part II Impact

Section 7. Primary Purpose of Sentencing is Punishment

GOAL: The primary purpose of sentencing is to punish the offender. Rehabilitation is a desired goal of the criminal justice system but is subordinate to the goal of punishment. F.S. 921.001(4)(a)2.

FACT: The scoring of an offender on a guidelines scoresheet for purposes of sentencing is based solely on the primary and additional offenses, circumstances surrounding the primary and additional offenses (such as the extent of victim injury), the offender's prior criminal history, and other legal factors pertaining to the offender's criminal behavior. Information on the needs of the offender may be taken into consideration at the time of sentencing, but are not a part of the offender's score and are not the primary focus of the court's attention. This goal is more subjective in nature, and therefore, cannot be measured by the data collected in the guidelines database.

Section 1. Recommended Sanction and Sanction Imposed

NOTES: This section examines three categories of sentences:

- Category 1- Those in which total points on the scoresheet are less than 34.8. The sentencing guidelines mandate a non-state prison sanction for offenders in this range, unless the sentence is aggravated.
- Category 2- Those in which total points are between 34.8 and 52.0. Within this range, the guidelines provide judges with discretion in sentencing to state prison or non-state prison sanctions.
- Category 3- Those in which total points exceed 52.0, for which the guidelines mandate state prison as the sanction, unless the sentence is mitigated.

Actual sanctions imposed, including state prison, community control, probation, county jail/time served, and other sanctions are presented and compared to the categories listed above.

FINDINGS:

- Across the state, over 17% of offenders were sentenced to state prison as the most severe sanction. An additional 24.8% were sentenced to incarceration in county jail, or to time already served in jail. More than 11% were sentenced to community control, and nearly 47% to probation, including drug offender probation, administrative probation, and regular probation. Less than a half of a percent of offenders were sentenced to "other" sanctions. Circuits and counties varied moderately in the types of sanction imposed (Table 4).
- Of offenders scoring in the recommended state prison category, nearly 56.2% were sentenced to state prison, with another 7.7% sentenced to county jail or time served. Of those in the discretionary range, over 17% were sentenced to state prison, and another 29% to county jail/time served. Less than 1.5% of offenders in the non-state prison range were sentenced to state prison (Table 1).



Appendices

Definition of "Violent Offender"

There are hundreds of criminal offenses in Florida statutes. There are any number of ways one can define what a "violent" crime is and categorize all the crimes accordingly. No one way of determining what specific crimes should be considered violent is correct. The Florida Department of Corrections has developed the following definition of violent crimes to guide the way in which it categorizes crimes as violent or non-violent.

A crime is defined as violent if the crime involves actual or the threat of physical harm to a person or the crime has a reasonable probability of causing unintended physical harm or physical threat of harm to a person.

One of the following conditions must occur for a crime to be defined as violent under this definition:

- 1. Actual physical harm.
- 1. Actual threat of physical harm.
- 2. A reasonable probability existed that individual criminal acts could have resulted in unintended physical harm.
- 3. A reasonable probability existed that individual criminal acts could have resulted in the threat of physical harm.

Note: Crimes are defined as violent from the statutory reference only. Therefore, a judgment has to be made based on this sometimes limited information whether any of these four conditions existed in the actual crime. For example, if the crime is "shooting into a vehicle," it is not known if actual or the threat of physical harm occurred. However, in this case, we assume there is a reasonable probability that violence could have resulted. "Burglary of a dwelling" is not defined as violent under this definition because, while actual or the threat of physical harm could have occurred, it is assumed there is not a reasonable probability that it occurred.
