## TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

This report is submitted to the Administrative Procedures

Committee and to the Administration Commission in compliance with
the requirements of Section 120.65(10), Florida Statutes, which
provides:

Not later than February 1 of each year, the division shall issue a written report to the Administrative Procedures Committee and the Administration Commission, including at least the following information:

- (a) A summary of the extent and effect of agencies' utilization of administrative law judges, court reporters, and other personnel in proceedings under this chapter.
- (b) Recommendations for change or improvement in the Administrative Procedure Act or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto.

### GENERAL

Appendix 1 indicates that the Division scheduled 37,781 hours of hearing for state, local, and other agencies in FY 2000-01. This represents a 43 percent increase over the 26,482 hearing hours scheduled the preceding fiscal year. When coupled with the decrease in number of cases filed, the trend in DOAH's caseload continues to show that while decreasing in raw number of cases filed, administrative cases continue to increase in length and complexity.

Appendix 1 breaks out by agency the utilization rates of Division resources and demonstrates that, in descending order, eleven agencies utilized 92 percent of the Division's docket: the Department of Health, Agency for Health Care Administration, Department of Business and Professional Regulation, Department of Environmental Protection, Department of Insurance, Department of Management Services, Department of Education, Department of Children and Family Services, Department of Community Affairs, Department of Banking and Finance, and the Department of Transportation. Additionally, contract agencies such as Water Management Districts, cities, and counties have become major users of the Division's services, and are reported separately since they are covered by contractual agreements. School districts and other educational entities are also major users and are reported separately as well.

The following agencies have notably increased their hearing requests. The Department of Legal Affairs increased 157 percent from 7 cases filed in 2000 to 18 cases filed in 2001. Similarly, the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles filed 64 cases in 2001, up 37 cases or 137 percent from the 27 cases filed in 2000. The Department of Juvenile Justice increased with 16 cases filed in 2001, compared with 8 cases filed in 2000, or an increase of 100 percent. The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission filed 9 cases in 2001, an increase of 80 percent over the 5 cases filed in 2000. Total referrals from the State's Water Management Districts also increased with 73 cases filed in

2001, compared with the 41 cases filed in 2000, an increase of 78 percent. Filings by the Ethics Commission in 2001 increased by 75 percent over the previous fiscal year.

#### UTILIZATION OF PERSONNEL

The Division has 80 authorized positions comprised of the Director and Chief Judge, the Deputy Chief Judge, 1 Executive Assistant, 3 Court Reporters, 37 Administrative Law Judges, 5 Administrative Assistants, 7 Administrative Secretaries, 1 Budget Officer, 1 Personnel Officer, 1 Administrative Services Director, 1 Accountant, 1 Fiscal Assistant, 1 Purchasing Agent, 1 Data Base Administrator, 1 Office Automation Specialist, 1 Computer Operator, 1 Division Clerk, 2 Deputy Clerk Supervisors, 4 Deputy Clerks, 2 Staff Assistants, 2 Senior Clerks, 1 Clerk Specialist and 4 Clerks.

#### IN-HOUSE COURT REPORTERS

The Division continues to employ three full-time court reporters. These reporters produced a total of 22,500 pages of transcription in FY 2000-01, an increase of 33 percent over the previous fiscal year.

The combined cost avoidance to state agencies for their utilization of the Division's court reporters rather than private sector reporters for Tallahassee hearings during FY 2000-01 was approximately \$45,000.00. The agencies realizing the greatest court reporting savings were the agencies that utilized the Division's in-house reporters the most.

In addition to the cost avoidance realized by other state agencies the court reporting program generated revenue in excess of \$52,000.00.

## HEARING REQUESTS

During calendar year 2001, the Division processed 4,998 hearing requests, slightly under the 5,151 cases filed in 2000. Of the 4,998 cases, 1,938 were Baker Act cases. The remaining 3,060 cases were filed pursuant to Sections 120.535, 120.54, 120.56, and 120.57, Florida Statutes. The cases opened are itemized by agency in the attached Appendix 2.

Notable to the decrease in case filings is the number of referrals from the Department of Labor and Employment Security (DLES). In 2001, DLES referred only 26 cases, a decrease of 48 percent when compared with the 50 referrals in 2000. The 53 referrals by the Department of Transportation in 2001 also represent a decrease of 43 percent when compared with the 93 referrals in 2000. The Department of Health filed 433 cases in 2001, a decrease of 40 percent when compared with the 725 cases filed in 2000.

In 2001 the Division held a total of 3,211 hearings, 184 more than the 3,027 hearings held in 2000. The Division closed 5,180 cases, a slight decrease of 45 cases compared with the 5,225 cases closed in 2000. This is an average of 140 case closures per judge.

In 2001, each Administrative Law Judge handled an average of 135 new cases, conducted an average of 87 hearings, and wrote an average of 140 recommended or final orders of varying length and complexity.

#### OFFICE AUTOMATION

The primary systems applications for the Division are its

Case Management System (CMS) and a full-text retrieval and

document indexing application. Secondary applications include

word processing, electronic mail and online legal research via

the Florida Legal Resource Center, Westlaw and other Internet

resources. In October of 2001, the Office of the Judges of

Compensation Claims (JCC) was transferred to the Division from

the Department of Labor and Employment Security, and development

was begun of a JCC case management system and internet site.

## OPERATING BUDGET

The Division is 100 percent trust funded. Appendix 3 summarizes the actual and estimated expenditures for the Division's "Adjudication of Disputes" program for FY 2000-01 and FY 2001-02, respectively. Appendix 3 also outlines funds requested in the Division's FY 2002-03 Legislative Budget Request for this program.

Each year the Division reports to the Legislature and the Governor's Office the total number of hearing hours scheduled by all agencies. Based on this data, the Division's budget is prorated among those agencies utilizing its services, and the Legislature appropriates fund transfers to the Division from

those agencies. Hence, the amount each agency transfers to the Division is based on the number of hours it schedules for prehearing conferences, motion hearings, final hearings, and cancelled hearings in a given year. In August 2001, the Division submitted its fifteenth report (see Appendix 1). In FY 2000-01, 37,781 hearing hours were scheduled with the Division.

The Division is also authorized to enter into contracts with cities, counties, regional planning councils, water management districts, and other organizations for the provision of Administrative Law Judge services. These organizations, as well as school districts and other educational entities, reimburse the Division for the costs of these services at the current contract rate and in accordance with applicable laws.

## RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE A.P.A.

Chapter 96-159, Laws of Florida, substantially reorganized the Administrative Procedure Act. The Division has no current recommendations concerning this Act.
