I. Report Highlights

- There were 199,944 involuntary (Baker Act) examinations in Fiscal Year (FY) 16/17.
- Involuntary examinations increased 2.88% from FY15/16 to FY16/17 (one year), 22.03% from FY12/13 to FY16/17 (5 years), and 56.23% from FY07/08 to FY16/17 (10 years). In the 16 years from FY01/02 to FY16/17, involuntary examinations more than doubled (111.42% increase).
- From FY12/13 to FY16/17 (5 years) statewide involuntary examinations increased 21.18% for children and 14.61% for older adults.
- The average age of people having an involuntary examination in FY16/17 was 37.15 years. Three-quarters (75.27%) were for adults aged 18 through 64, with 16.39% for children and 7.18% for people 65 and older. [Age was unknown for 1.17%.]
- Slightly more than half (54.91%) of involuntary examinations in FY16/17 were for men. Slightly more than half were for people who were non-Hispanic Caucasian/White, with 22.54% non-Hispanic African-American/Black, 15.14% Hispanic, and less than one percent Asian or other races. [Race was not reported for 2.47% of involuntary examinations.]
- Half (50.32%) of involuntary examinations were initiated by law enforcement, with almost half initiated by health professionals (47.71%), and 1.97% initiated via ex-parte order of a judge.
- <u>Evidence Type</u>: Over half (59.96%) of involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *harm only*. Over one-quarter (28.46%) were based on *both harm and self-neglect*. Less than ten percent (9.24%) were based on evidence of *self-neglect only*. [Evidence type was not reported for 2.34%.] <u>Harm Type</u>: Harm can be further broken down into harm to self and/or harm to others. More than half (56.23%) of all involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *harm to self only*. One in five (21.69%) of all involuntary examinations were based on *both harm to self and harm to others*. Harm to others only was the evidence upon which 5.61% of all involuntary examinations were initiated. [Harm type was missing from 16.47% of forms with harm as an evidence type.]
- Almost three-quarters (60.14%) of involuntary examinations in FY16/17 were at publicly funded receiving facilities, with 39.86% at privately funded receiving facilities.
- Questions about location at the time of the involuntary examination initiation completed by Baker Act receiving facility staff on the Cover Sheet to the Department of Children and Families shows that for <u>children</u> 21.66% were at school, 1.42% were in Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) custody, and 4.37% were in DCF custody (out of home placements, such as foster care or group homes). Location information about <u>adults</u> shows less than one percent (0.52%) in nursing homes, 1.76% in assisted living facilities, and 1.36% in jail.
- Detailed information is provided for Florida's 67 counties, 6 DCF regions, 7 Managing Entities (MEs), and 20 judicial circuits.
- New to the annual report this year are additional details about older adults. The county specific pages at the end of this report now include a focus on change over time for a ten-year period.

II. Introduction

The Florida Mental Health Act, also known as the "Baker Act," includes several data reporting requirements. Starting in 1996 all Baker Act receiving facilities were required to send a copy of every involuntary examination initiation to the Florida Agency for Health Care Administration. As of July 1, 2016, the statute specifies that certain forms are to be sent to the Florida Department of Children & Families (DCF). Specifics of data submission requirements are described in <u>Florida Administrative Code 65E-5</u>, which includes directing providers to send forms to the Baker Act Reporting Center at the de la Parte Florida Mental Health Institute, College of Behavioral and Community Sciences at the University of South Florida. Forms must be mailed within one working day after the person arrives at the receiving facility (Section 394.463 F.S.).

Forms submitted to the Baker Act Reporting Center include:

- <u>CF-MH 3052a</u>: Report of Law Enforcement Officer Initiating Involuntary Examination
- <u>CF-MH 3052b</u>: Certificate of Professional Initiating Involuntary Examination
- <u>CF-MH 3001</u>: Ex Parte Order for Involuntary Examination

Forms CF-MH 3052a and CF-MH 3052b are mandatory and should not be changed. Form CF-MH 3001 is recommended, such that not all ex-parte orders are completed by using CF-MH 3001.

The Cover Sheet (<u>CF-MH 3118</u>) was implemented in 1999 in order to systematically report client demographic and provider information. Receiving facilities submit a Cover Sheet (CF-MH 3118) on top of each initiation form and ex-parte order for involuntary examination (CF-MH 3052a, CF-MH 3052b, and CF-MH 3001 or its equivalent). Links to the statute, administrative code, forms and other materials can be found on DCF's <u>Crisis Services – Baker Act</u> web page.

Section 394.463(2)(e) F.S. also requires DCF to submit an annual report to the President of the Florida Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the minority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives.

Staff at the Baker Act Reporting Center at the University of South Florida produced this report under contract LH292 with DCF. Although this is considered the statutorily required annual report for FY16/17, additional years of data were used for analyses. III. Involuntary Examinations

A. Technical Notes

Understanding what the data are <u>not</u> is as important as understanding what they are when considering related policy decisions. The Baker Act data analyzed for this report are from examination initiation forms received by the Baker Act Reporting Center. However, some individuals for whom forms were received were never admitted to the receiving facility because an examination by a physician or clinical psychologist performed prior to admission determined they did not meet admission criteria. The data also do not include information on what occurred after the initial examination. For example, the data do not reveal how long individuals stayed at the facility, whether they remained on an involuntary or voluntary basis, or whether the involuntary (Baker Act) examination was converted to a Marchman Act assessment. There is anecdotal evidence suggesting some people spend most or all of their 72-hour involuntary examination period at emergency rooms of non-receiving facilities subsequent to being medically cleared. This reportedly occurs despite the statutory requirement to transfer such persons to a designated receiving facility within 12 hours of medical clearance. Involuntary examination forms for people who never reach a Baker Act receiving facility are not received by the Baker Act Reporting Center, so these are not included in the data used for analyses in this report.

<u>Redaction</u>: Cell sizes smaller than 25 were redacted from this report. The purpose of this redaction is to prevent identification of people.

<u>Terminology</u>: Involuntary examinations occur at DCF-designated *receiving facilities*. Some receiving facilities are also called Crisis Stabilization Units (CSUs). These CSUs are usually inpatient units of community mental health centers and receive DCF funds for services provided under the authority of the Baker Act. CSUs designated for children are referred to as Children's Crisis Stabilization Units (CSUs). This means that while all CSUs/CCSUs are Baker Act receiving facilities, not all Baker Act receiving facilities are CSUs. The abbreviations CSU and CCSU are used throughout this report. Receiving facilities that receive DCF funds for services provided under the Baker Act are referred to later in this report as "public," while those not receiving such funds are referred to as "private."

In past reports we described involuntary examinations initiated using form CF-MH 3052b as being initiated by "mental health professionals." We recently changed to using the term "health professionals" instead, given that all people initiating involuntary examinations using this form are health professionals, but not necessarily mental health professionals (such as emergency department physicians).

<u>Formatting</u>: This report was formatted so that figures could be understood both in black and white and in color. County specific pages (one for each county) begin on page 27 of the report. These county specific pages and the three appendices constitute pages 26 through 99 (final page). Those wanting to print a shorter report may want to consider printing only through page 26.

Data for **199,944** involuntary examinations initiated between July 1, 2016 and June 30, 2017 were analyzed for this report. There were 4,146 (2.07%) involuntary examination forms from FY16/17 identified as duplicates. The initiation date for the involuntary examination was not in the data for 1.09% of forms received in FY16/17 either because the date was not completed on the initiation form/ex-parte order or the receiving facility did not submit the second page of the BA52b form, which contains a space to write the date of initiation. These duplicates and forms missing date of initiation were not included in analyses for this report. Some percentages in this report may not total 100% due to rounding. There are three county level data elements in the Baker Act Database:

- County of Initiation: County in which the Baker Act involuntary examination was initiated
- County of Facility: County in which the Baker Act receiving facility was located
- County of Residence: County in which the person examined resided

All analyses in this report used the County of Residence. The County of Facility is reported in certain tables.

The reasons are complex for why there are lower numbers of involuntary examinations in some areas and there are higher numbers in other areas. Readers of this report are urged to consider these factors when interpreting the results. For example, the distribution of Baker Act receiving facilities statewide is not uniform. About half of Florida's 67 counties have at least one Baker Act receiving facility, with about half of the counties not having a receiving facility. Areas of some counties are geographically distant from the nearest receiving facility. Additional factors may influence the use of involuntary examination, such as:

- number of people trained in Mental Health First Aid
- law enforcement training (including <u>CIT training</u>)
- availability of criminal justice system diversion programs at all <u>sequential intercepts</u>, including those funded by <u>DCF Criminal Justice</u>, <u>Mental Health</u>, and <u>Substance Abuse</u> (CJMHSA) Reinvestment Grants
- availability and quality of behavioral health services
- availability of a wide array of social services (such as housing assistance, and assistance with coverage for health care, including the existence of county health plans)

Population statistics are provided in some tables in order to put counts of involuntary examinations in context. Population estimates were obtained from the Florida <u>Office of</u> <u>Economic and Demographic Research</u>. County level characteristics were obtained from the Florida Department of Health, Division of Public Health Statistics and Performance Management, and the <u>Florida Health Charts</u>. While this report focuses on counts by fiscal years, estimates of population are available by calendar year. Logical calendar year spans were used to provide context.

B. Involuntary Examinations: State Level Analyses

There were **199,944** involuntary examinations in FY16/17. Three-quarters of involuntary examinations were for adults aged 18 through 64 (n = 150,492, 75.27%), with 16.39% (n = 32,763) for those less than 18, and 7.18% (n = 14,348) for people 65 and older. There were 2,341 (1.17%) forms where age was unknown because a valid date of birth was not included on the Cover Sheet.







Figure 1a: Involuntary Examinations for 16 Fiscal Years for All Ages, Children and Older Adults

Counts of involuntary examinations for the last 16 fiscal years are reported for all ages, children (<18) and older adults (65+) (see Table 1 and Figure 1).

The increase in the number of involuntary examinations was greater than the Florida population increase during this time. Because population estimates for fiscal years were not available, population increases were calculated for the calendar years closest to the fiscal years reported.

<u>All Ages</u>: From 2001 to 2016, Census estimates from the <u>Office of Economic and Demographic</u> <u>Research</u> show that the Florida population of people five and older increased 23.97%, while the number of involuntary examinations for all ages from FY01/02 to FY16/17 increased 111.42%. The Florida population of people five and older increased by 1.63% from 2016 to 2017, while involuntary examinations for all ages increased by 2.88% from FY15/16 to FY16/17, as shown in Figure 1a.

<u>Children</u>: From 2001 to 2016, the Florida population of people between ages 5 and 17 increased 9.72% while the number of involuntary examinations for children (< 18) increased 118.41% from FY01/02 to FY16/17. The Florida population of people under 18 years of age increased 1.23% from 2016 to 2017. There was a less than one percent increase in involuntary examinations for children from FY15/16 to FY16/17 as shown in Figure 1b.

<u>Older Adults</u>: From 2001 to 2016, the Florida population of people 65 and older increased 35.48%, while the number of involuntary examinations for people 65 and older increased 75.13% from FY01/02 to FY16/17. The Florida population of people 65 and older increased by 3.40% from 2016 to 2017, while involuntary examinations for people 65 and older increased by 3.75% from FY15/16 to FY16/17, as shown in Figure 1c.

The increase over time for all three age groups is shown in Figure 1a. Scales for the next two figures have different scales for their x-axis (vertical axis) in order to be able to see the change over time for children (Figure 1b) and older adults (Figure 1c) that cannot be seen in Figure 1a.


<u>Age</u>: The average age of people with involuntary examinations in FY16/17 was 37.15 years. There were 32,763 (16.39%) involuntary examinations for children (< 18), 150,492 (75.27%) for adults (18 through 64), and 14,348 (2.75%) for older adults (65 and older). Age was not known for 2,341 (1.17%) involuntary examinations.




Counts of involuntary examinations by age group are presented in Table 2. The percentage of total exams and the percentage within each age group are both included. For example, involuntary examinations for adults aged 65 to 74 accounted for 4.40% of all involuntary examinations during the fiscal year and 61.28% of involuntary examinations for older adults (65 and older).


<u>Gender</u>: The percentage of males and females with involuntary examinations by age groups is shown in Figure 2. Percentages of males and females do not sum to 100% because a small percentage of forms did not report gender.






<u>Race/Hispanic Origin</u>: Race is reported on the Cover Sheet (CF-MH3118) completed by Baker Act receiving facility staff. There is a separate section to report race and Hispanic Origin. This is because Hispanic is an ethnicity, not a race. However, many forms were completed in a way that treats Hispanic as a race, such as checking "other" for race and then "yes" for Hispanic Origin. The nature of the data led us to the categories used to describe race (see Figure 3). Slightly more than half (56.97%) of involuntary examinations in FY16/17 were for non-Hispanic Caucasian/White people. Almost one-quarter (22.54%) were for non-Hispanic African-American/Black people. One in seven (15.14%) involuntary examinations were for people of Hispanic origin.





<u>Initiator Type and Evidence Types</u>: Initiator type, evidence type, and harm type for involuntary examinations in FY16/17 are summarized in Figure 4.

Initiator Type: Half (50.32%) of the involuntary examinations in FY16/17 were initiated by law enforcement, with almost half initiated by health professionals (47.71%). The remaining 1.97% were initiated via ex-parte order of a judge.



Health Professional Type: Percentages of involuntary examinations by health professional type are shown in Table 3.

The percentages for health professional type (Table 3) were computed two ways, using the denominator of total involuntary examinations and the denominator of involuntary examinations initiated by health professionals. Both are included because they provide useful information. For example, licensed mental health counselors initiated 6.40% of involuntary examinations for children. On the other hand, licensed mental health counselors initiated by health professionals.

Evidence Type: Over half (59.96%) of involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *harm only*. One-quarter (28.46%) were based on *harm and self-neglect*. Less than ten percent (9.24%) of involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *self-neglect only*. Evidence type was not reported for 2.34% on forms.






Figure 5: Evidence Type for FY16/17

Harm Type: Evidence of harm can be further reported according to harm type. More than half (56.23%) of all involuntary examinations were based on evidence of *harm to self only*. Less than one-third (21.69%) of all involuntary examinations were based on *harm to self and harm to others*. *Harm to others only* was the evidence upon which 5.61% of all involuntary examinations were initiated.



Two-thirds (63.97%) of involuntary examinations were initiated because the person was "unable to determine for himself/herself whether examination [was] necessary," with 14.16% because the "person refused voluntary examination after conscientious explanation and disclosure of the purpose of the examination." Both of these criteria were selected for 8.76% of involuntary examinations. There were 13.11% involuntary examinations for which this data element was not entered because there was not a box checked to indicate information for this criteria.

<u>Location</u>: There are six yes/no questions on the Cover Sheet to the Department of Children and Families (<u>CF-MH 3118</u>) completed by Baker Act receiving facility staff. Three ask about the location of children at the time of their involuntary examination initiation (school, DCF custody, DJJ custody). DCF custody means out of home placement, such as foster care or a group home. Three ask about location of adults at the time of their involuntary examination initiation (nursing home, assisted living facility or jail). Note that for children the answer can be yes to more than one of these location questions. For example, a child could be in foster care (DCF custody) and have his or her involuntary examination initiated while at school. The answer can only be "yes" for one of the adult questions about location.

Percentages of involuntary examinations for children and adults with a "yes" chosen for the location questions are shown in Table 4.

Older adults (65+) had 3.44% of their involuntary examinations initiated while in a nursing home, and 6.37% while in an assisted living facility.

Between eight and ten percent of forms for involuntary examinations were missing a response to these location questions. These results should be interpreted with caution because "yes" repsonses to these questions may be under-reported. This is because receiving facility staff may not know the details of the location at the time of the involuntary examination initiation. Because of this concern, these yes/no location questions would ideally be moved to the law enforcement (<u>CF-MH 3052a</u>) and health professional (<u>CF-MH 3052b</u>) initiaiton forms because these professionals will know the location as they initiate the involuntary examination.

C. Involuntary Examinations: Provider Level Analyses

Counts of involuntary examinations in FY16/17 for each receiving facility are reported in Table 5. Facilities are listed by DCF region, then alphabetically by county within each DCF Region, then in descending order for number of involuntary examinations. Counts for CSU (Crisis Stabilization Units) and CCSUs (Children's Crisis Stabilization Units) are counted separately for providers that have both types of units.





Figure 8: Involuntary Examinations at Public and Private Baker Act Receiving Facilities

The distribution of involuntary examinations at public and private receiving facilities is shown in Figure 8. "Public" in this context means the receiving facility received funds from DCF for Baker Act examination services, while "private" receiving facilities did not receive DCF funds for these services. Children are more likely to have their involuntary examination at public (73.85%) receiving facilities as compared to adults (58.68%) and older adults (42.89%). The meaningful percentage of involuntary examinations at privately funded receiving facilities means that funding and policy as it relates to both privately funded and publicly funded receiving facilities are essential to understand in order to have a complete picture of the use of involuntary examinations.

Some Baker Act receiving facilities are owned/run by a larger corporate/organizational entity. For example, one in six (16.95%) involuntary examinations in FY16/17 were at Hospital Corporation of American (HCA) run facilities, with 7.79% at Universal Health Services (UHS) run receiving facilities, and 6.88% at Baycare Health Systems run receiving facilities.

D. Involuntary Examinations: Geographic Area Reporting

Data for FY16/17 were analyzed for each of Florida's 67 Counties, 20 judicial circuits, 7 DCF regions, and 6 Managing Entity areas (see Tables 6a, 6b and 6c).

County of residence as reported by Baker Act receiving facilities on the Cover Sheet was used to categorize by county. These geographic area analyses are based on 186,293 involuntary examinations because 13,651 (7.33%) did not have county of residence reported on the Cover Sheet. Percentages in Tables 6a, 6b and 6c were computed *horizontally* such that they indicate for residents of each area the percentage of age and initiator type. For example, Sarasota County residents had 3,363 involuntary examinations in FY16/17, with 48.14% initiated by law enforcement, 48.88% by health professionals, and 2.97% by ex-parte judicial order. Some percentages do not add up to 100 percent due to rounding.

Caution should be applied when interpreting changes for counties with smaller populations and fewer involuntary examinations. "Changes in small numbers can lead to large, but meaningless, increases or decreases to percent change."¹ This is because small changes in numbers of involuntary examinations can account for larger percentage changes because of the smaller total (denominator) than is seen in geographic areas with larger populations and more involuntary examinations.

For example, there were 69 involuntary examinations in FY11/12 for residents of Hendry County and 200 in FY16/17. While this is a large increase (289.86%) in percentage, it is a – relatively – small numerical change in involuntary examinations.

Some counties do not have a receiving facility, such that people are brought to receiving facilities in other counties. It is important to keep this in mind when reading results at the county level.

Population statistics were obtained from the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research to include estimates for 2011, 2016, and 2017 population projections.

Select community characteristics obtained from <u>Florida Health Charts</u> are provided for each county. These include county level indicators relating to factors surrounding poverty and income, mental health and suicide as well as local public health department expenditures (per person). More information regarding these indicators can be found in Appendix B.

The maps included on the County pages were created by the U.S. Geological Survey and are considered public domain. They were obtained from the county pages that are part of the <u>Wikipedia: Wiki Project U.S.</u> <u>Counties/County Lists.</u>
