SUMMARY

The Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Program (BSCIP) administers a statewide coordinated system of care to serve persons who have sustained moderate-to-severe traumatic brain and/or spinal cord injuries. The BSCIP is mandated by Chapter 381, Florida Statutes, to provide eligible persons the opportunity to obtain the necessary rehabilitative services enabling them to be referred to a vocational rehabilitation program or to return to their community.

To be eligible for program services, an individual must:

- Be referred to the BSCIP Central Registry pursuant to section 381.74, Florida Statutes.
- Be a legal resident of the state of Florida as defined in Florida Administrative Code rule 64I-1.001.
- Have sustained a traumatic brain or spinal cord injury as defined by section 381.745, Florida Statutes.
- Be medically stable as defined by the BSCIP.
- Be reasonably able to achieve reintegration into the community through services provided by the BSCIP.

Section 381.79, Florida Statutes, mandates the BSCIP provide a report to the Florida Legislature each year summarizing the activities supported by the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Trust Fund. This report summarizes the BSCIP's budget, revenue, expenditures and statistical data for July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

GENERAL PROGRAM

The BSCIP General Program provides community reintegration services to individuals determined to be eligible. These services include assistive devices, community reentry/transitional living, comprehensive inpatient rehabilitation, diagnostics, home modifications, medical follow-up, medications/medical supplies, occupational therapy, physical therapy, psychological/neuropsychological evaluations, rehabilitation engineer evaluations, speech/cognitive therapy, and transportation services.

Eligible Individuals Served by the General Program in FY 2021-22	1,122
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During Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22, 68 percent of clients served and closed from the General Program were community reintegrated and/or accepted for services by the Florida Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. This calculation does not include individuals who decline program services, fail to cooperate, relocate from Florida, or those determined to be program ineligible.

BUDGET ALLOCATIONS, REVENUE, AND EXPENDITURES

The following revenue and expenditure information was obtained from the Florida Department of Financial Services information system and reflects the BSCIP's budget allocations, trust fund revenues, and the overall expenditures by each program and fund for FY 2021-22 for the entire BSCIP.

BUDGET ALLOCATIONS

Total budget allocations in FY 2021-22 were \$16,898,963. **Table 1** reflects the spending authority allocated to the BSCIP.

REVENUE

Revenue made available to the BSCIP Trust Fund through traffic-related civil penalties, boating citations, transfers, and temporary license tags was \$10,549,839. Total revenue increased by \$1,415,052 (13%) as compared to the previous fiscal year. **Table 2** reflects the BSCIP Trust Fund revenue sources.

³ Section 381.79 (3), Florida Statutes, requires that: “Annually, 5 percent of the revenues deposited monthly in the fund pursuant to s. 318.21(2)(d), Florida Statutes, shall be appropriated to the University of Florida and 5 percent to the University of Miami for spinal cord injury and brain injury research. The amount to be distributed to the universities shall be calculated based on the deposits into the fund for each quarter in the fiscal year but may not exceed \$500,000 per university per year. Funds distributed under this subsection shall be made in quarterly payments at the end of each quarter during the fiscal year.”

⁴ Section 316.0083 (3) (a), Florida Statutes, requires that: “3. Penalties to be assessed and collected by the department, county, or municipality are as follows: a. One hundred fifty-eight dollars for a violation of s. 316.074 (1) or s. 316.075(1)(c)(1), Florida Statutes, when a driver failed to stop at a traffic signal if enforcement is by the department’s traffic infraction enforcement officer. One hundred dollars shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the General Revenue Fund, \$10 shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Department of Health Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund, \$3 shall be remitted to the Department of Revenue for deposit into the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Trust Fund, and \$45 shall be distributed to the municipality in which the violation occurred, or, if the violation occurred in an unincorporated area, to the county in which the violation occurred. Funds deposited into the Department of Health Emergency Medical Services Trust Fund under this sub-subparagraph shall be distributed as provided in s. 395.4036(1), Florida Statutes. Proceeds of the infractions in the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Trust Fund shall be distributed quarterly to the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis and used for brain and spinal cord research.”

⁵ Section 215.20 (1), Florida Statutes, requires that, “A service charge of 8 percent, representing the estimated pro rata share of the cost of general government paid from the General Revenue Fund, is hereby appropriated from all income of a revenue nature deposited in all trust funds.” In Fiscal Year 2021-22, the service charge incurred by the BSCIP Trust Fund was \$796,894.

EXPENDITURES

Total BSCIP expenditures in FY 2021-22 were \$11,979,136. Of the total BSCIP expenditures, \$6,597,264 (55%) were expended from the BSCIP Trust Fund. The remaining \$5,381,872 (45%) of expended funds were from the state General Revenue Fund. Individuals were provided with the services needed to be safely reintegrated into the community utilizing federal, state, and community resources. The BSCIP was the payor of last resort for clients with unmet needs. The tables below break down the BSCIP's expenses in two different ways: **Table 3** shows the expenses by BSCIP (General Program or Pass Through/Direct Appropriations) and **Table 4** shows expenses by funding source (BSCIP Trust Fund or General Revenue).

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The BSCIP is the only publicly funded state program devoted entirely to the rehabilitation of individuals who have sustained a traumatic brain and/or spinal cord injury. In addition to providing services to 1,122 individuals through its general program, the BSCIP also supports research through funding distributed to the University of Florida’s McKnight Brain Institute and the Miami Project to Cure Paralysis. These funds, as outlined in the revenue section on page 3, are distributed pursuant to section 381.79 (3), Florida Statutes, and section 316.0083 (3)(a), Florida Statutes. The BSCIP is staffed with dedicated and trained professionals who seek to transform the lives of the people they serve daily.
