This report is submitted to the Administrative Procedures Committee and to the Administration Commission in compliance with the requirements of Section 120.65(10), Florida Statutes, which provides:

Not later than February 1 of each year, the division shall issue a written report to the Administrative Procedures Committee and the Administration Commission, including at least the following information:

- (a) A summary of the extent and effect of agencies' utilization of administrative law judges, court reporters, and other personnel in proceedings under this chapter.
- (b) Recommendations for change or improvement in the Administrative Procedure Act or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto.

GENERAL

The Division of Administrative Hearings administers two programs. One, which is the subject of this report, is the Adjudication of Disputes program that operates pursuant to Chapter 120, Florida Statutes. The other is the Workers' Compensation Appeals program, Office of Judges of Compensation Claims (OJCC), that operates pursuant to Chapter 440, Florida Statutes. Section 440.45(5), Florida Statutes, requires the OJCC to issue an annual report to the Governor, the House of Representatives, the Senate, the Florida Bar, and the statewide nominating commission. This report was submitted on December 23, 2004. Accordingly, the present report will focus

primarily on the Adjudication of Disputes program. However, because the headquarters element of the Division must support both programs, this report necessarily must include some information addressing the OJCC.

UTILIZATION RATES

Appendix I breaks out by agency the utilization rates of Division resources and demonstrates, in descending order, that 12 agencies utilized 95 percent of the Division's docket: the Department of Management Services, the Agency for Health Care Administration, the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Community Affairs, the Department of Health, the Department of Education, the Department of Business and Professional Regulation, the Department of Revenue, the Department of Financial Services, the Department of Children and Family Services, the Department of Law Enforcement, and the Commission on Ethics. Additionally, entities such as water management districts, cities, counties, school districts, and other educational entities are significant users of the Division's services and are reported separately since they are covered by contractual agreements.

During FY 2003-04, State agencies and governmental entities referrals increased by 8 percent with 4,637 requests for assignment of Administrative Law Judges, compared to 4,305 requests filed the previous fiscal year. Requests for

assignment of Administrative Law Judges from the following six agencies constitute 69 percent of our fiscal year caseload: The Florida Commission on Human Relations (248 cases compared to 233 cases filed FY 2002-03), Department of Business and Professional Regulation (265 cases compared to 396 cases filed FY 2002-03), Department of Financial Services (278 cases compared to 246 cases filed FY 2002-03), County School Boards (310 cases compared to 315 cases filed FY 2002-03), Department of Revenue (329 cases, a 165 percent increase over the 124 cases filed FY 2002-03), and the Department of Children and Family Services (1,777 total cases which includes an increase in Baker Act referrals to 1,599 cases in FY 2003-04 compared to 1,236 reported last year, an increase of 29 percent). These are cases where a patient's continued involuntary confinement in a mental institution is decided and a Final Order is issued, which is appealable to the District Court.

UTILIZATION OF PERSONNEL

As of June 30, 2004, the Adjudication of Disputes program had 78 established positions comprised of the Director and Chief Judge, the Deputy Chief Judge, 35 Administrative Law Judges, seven Administrative Secretaries, six Administrative Assistants, one Budget Officer, one Executive Assistant, two Staff Assistants, three Court Reporters (see page 6), one Administrative Services Director, one Personnel Officer, one

Purchasing Agent, one Accountant, one Data Base Administrator, one Office Automation Specialist, one Distributed Computer Systems Specialist, one Secretary Specialist, one Clerk of the Commission, one Commission Deputy Clerk, one Deputy Clerk Supervisor, three Deputy Clerks, one Fiscal Assistant, one Clerk Specialist, and five Clerks.

The Workers' Compensation Appeals program has 197
established positions comprised of one Deputy Chief Judge of
Compensation Claims, 31 Judges of Compensation Claims, 31
General Masters (mediators), 31 Executive Secretaries, 37 Deputy
Clerks (31 in field offices and six in Clerk's Office), two
Deputy Clerk Supervisors, six Deputy Commission Clerks, four
Administrative Assistants, one Staff Assistant, 35
Administrative Secretaries, nine Secretary Specialists, two
Senior Clerks, one Senior Management Analyst, two Accountants,
one Distributed Computer Systems Administrator, two Distributed
Computer Systems Analysts, and one Attorney.

IN-HOUSE COURT REPORTERS

The Division employed three full-time court reporters in an In-House Court Reporting Program. This Program provided court reporters to state agencies for hearings held in Tallahassee.

Appendix 2 indicates that these reporters produced a total of 4,663 pages of transcription for FY 2003-04 and provided a cost savings to state agencies in the amount of \$16,709.75.

After an in-depth review and analysis, it was determined that the cost of the program, over both the short-run and the long-run, exceeded the benefits. Accordingly, the In-House Court Reporter Program was terminated effective January 1, 2004. The three positions were eliminated along with the corresponding expense effective July 1, 2004.

HEARING REQUESTS

During FY 2003-04, the Division processed 4,637 hearing requests compared to 4,305 cases filed the previous fiscal year. Of the total cases filed, 1,599 were Baker Act cases. The remaining 3,038 cases were filed pursuant to Sections 120.56, 120.569, and 120.57(1), Florida Statutes. Most notable were the referrals from the Department of Revenue, Child Support Enforcement Program, which increased its referrals by 404 percent with 242 cases filed this fiscal year as compared to 48 cases previously reported. Other agency referrals are contained in Appendix 3. The Division of Administrative Hearings will soon have electronic filing of new cases available. This will be especially helpful where there are time constraints for rendering a Recommended or Final Order. The cases opened are itemized by agency in the attached Appendix 3.

In FY 2003-04, each Administrative Law Judge conducted an average of 39 hearings and wrote an average of 82 recommended or

final orders of varying length and complexity. In addition, each Judge closed an average of 64 cases, which were settled or otherwise dismissed without a final hearing.

OFFICE AUTOMATION

The Division maintains two mission-critical databases and applications: the DOAH Case Management System (CMS) and the OJCC Case Management System (JCC). Associated applications include full-text retrieval and document indexing of orders issued by the Division's Administrative Law Judges. Both databases are accessible via the Division's two websites, www.doah.state.fl.us and www.jcc.state.fl.us. Secondary applications include word processing, electronic mail, and online legal research via Westlaw and other Internet resources.

In May of 2004, the Division began registering participants for its electronic filing (e-filing) application, and accepting electronically filed pleadings from Florida Bar members who are parties to administrative law cases. A total of 1,345 pleadings were filed via the e-filing application through the end of 2004. A total of 581 attorneys have registered to participate in the e-filing program.

In 2005, the Division will enhance its administrative law e-filing application to include the issuance of subpoenas and the acceptance of initial case filings to establish new cases.

For the Office of Judges of Compensation Claims, development of an electronic filing application was begun. The OJCC e-filing application will be introduced to the public via its website during the first quarter of 2005.

OPERATING BUDGET

The Division is 100 percent trust funded. Appendix 4 summarizes the actual, estimated, and requested expenditures for the Division's programs for FY 2003-04, FY 2004-05, and FY 2005-06, respectively.

For the Adjudication of Disputes program, each year the Division reports to the Legislature and the Governor's Office the total number of hearing hours conducted by its judges for all agencies. Based on this data, the Division's budget is prorated among the state agencies utilizing its services, and the Legislature appropriates fund transfers to the Division from those agencies. Hence, the amount each agency transfers to the Division is based on the amount of time the judges spend in prehearing conferences, motion hearings, and final hearings for each agency in a given year. Beginning in FY 2003-04, data on cancelled and continued hearings were excluded from the report, as were the agency transfer calculations under the theory that the agencies should not be penalized for encouraging the resolution of disputes short of proceeding to hearing. In

September 2004, the Division submitted its eighteenth report (see Appendix 1). In FY 2003-04, 6,313 hearing hours were held.

The Division is also authorized to enter into contracts with non-state entities such as cities, counties, regional planning councils, water management districts, school districts, and other educational entities for the provision of Administrative Law Judge services. These organizations reimburse the Division for the costs of its services at a contract rate that is based on a total-cost-recovery methodology.

The Division has implemented the Office of Program Policy
Analysis and Government Accountability's (OPPAGA's)
recommendation to shift the burden of the cost of the
Adjudication of Disputes program from state agencies to nonstate entities. This has been accomplished by increasing the
hourly rate that is paid by the non-state entities for
Administrative Law Judge services, by marketing the Division's
services to attract new non-state entities, and by backing out
these revenues before the budget is prorated among the state
agencies. The assessment for administrative support that is
paid by the Workers' Compensation Appeals program is also backed
out before the budget is prorated. Hence, state agency
transfers have been reduced by over \$1 million in the Division's
FY 2005-06 Legislative Budget Request.

The Workers' Compensation Appeals program is supported by cash transfers from the Workers' Compensation Administration

Trust Fund that is administered by the Department of Financial Services.

RECOMMENDATIONS CONCERNING THE A.P.A.

The Division closely follows judicial decisions concerning the application and interpretation of the Administrative Procedure Act. The Division clearly recognizes that it must remain fair and impartial in all matters affecting the agencies and private parties that come before it for adjudication of their disputes. However, pursuant to its statutory mandate in Section 120.65(10)(b), Florida Statutes, the Division is required to make recommendations for changes or improvements in the APA "or any agency's practice or policy with respect thereto."

The Division has previously recommended that the

Legislature address the doctrine of excusable neglect and make

it applicable to administrative proceedings once again as it was

prior to 1998. Both the Joint Administrative Procedures

Committee and the Florida Bar Administrative Law Section are

developing statutory language concerning this issue, and the

Division will closely monitor their progress and, where

appropriate, make suggestions or offer testimony.

Several bills have been filed in the Florida Senate and House of Representatives which relate to providing administrative hearing rights at the Division to individuals who are aggrieved by certain agency action. The Division will continue to closely monitor such legislation and will be available to testify before legislative committees, or meet with individual legislators, concerning any matters related to administrative procedure and newly-created hearing rights.

CONCLUSION

The Division continues to supply high-quality adjudication of disputes pursuant to Chapter 120, the Administrative Procedure Act. The Division constantly seeks ways to make the process more affordable to state agencies and citizens and continues to expand its base to counties, cities, and other users of its program in order to reduce the cost of providing services. Through the elimination of programs that prove not to be cost-effective, the elimination of personnel no longer needed in the face of improved technology, and through promoting alternative dispute resolution short of hearing, the Division

contributes to the goal of efficient government. We accomplish this without sacrificing quality and fairness in the Adjudication of Disputes program.
