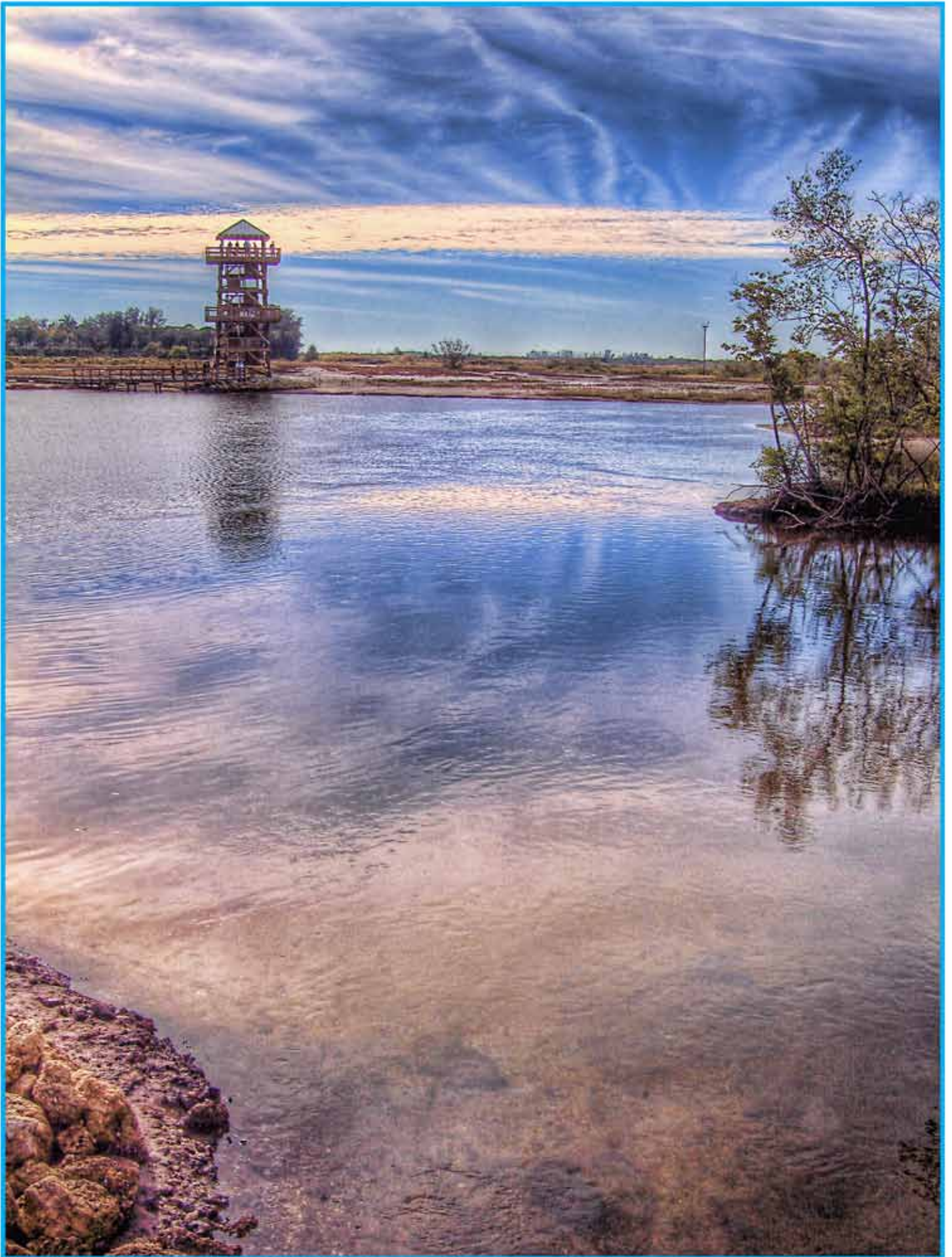

The 2011-2012 fiscal year was an important one for Florida Communities Trust (FCT). FCT became part of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Division of State Lands. FCT's Parks and Open Space Program held its first *Florida Forever* grant application cycle since 2008. It awarded more than \$17 million in *Florida Forever* funds to assist eight communities with their land acquisition efforts to conserve Florida's most precious natural resources.

Florida Communities Trust has left an enduring legacy in communities throughout the state. These partnerships improve the quality of life in Florida by providing recreational opportunities, boosting economic growth and revitalization, preserving historical and cultural resources, and protecting valuable natural resources.

FLORIDA COMMUNITIES TRUST MISSION AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

What is the Florida Communities Trust?

Florida Communities Trust (FCT) is a multi-faceted grant program housed within the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Division of State Lands. FCT began in 1991 under Preservation 2000 as a funding resource for local communities to buy land for the protection of natural and cultural resources and the provision of recreational opportunities. Over the last five years FCT has been given a second grant program dedicated to the protection of Florida's traditional working waterfronts and has placed greater emphasis on stewardship and management oversight of a diverse collection of local and regional parks and working waterfronts. Today, FCT administers the Parks and Open Space and Stan Mayfield Working Waterfronts Programs, two competitive grant programs that have provided funding to local governments and non-profit organizations to assist them with their local land conservation efforts. Projects funded by FCT have fostered cultural and historical preservation, trail system development, and public access to water. They have also furthered the outdoor recreation, natural resource protection and working waterfront needs identified in local government comprehensive plans. Florida Communities Trust is governed by a five-member board that includes the Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection (who serves as permanent chair) and four members of the public appointed by the Governor. Appointees to the Board include a former elected official of a metropolitan municipality, a former elected official of a county, a representative of an environmental non-profit organization, and a representative of the development industry.



Meeting Community Challenges

Florida Communities Trust helps communities further the goals of their local government land use plans through land acquisition and innovative non-regulatory solutions to the challenges inherent in the land planning process. FCT continues to offer assistance after a project has been acquired and provides guidance with park development and management oversight through annual stewardship reporting and site visits.

The Spirit of Partnership

FCT is dedicated to working with communities across the state to acquire lands for recreation, open spaces and working waterfronts and helping them to be responsible stewards of those lands once they have been purchased. While the land acquisition grant funds are the result of partnerships between FCT and the local communities, the projects often encourage local governments to work together during the acquisition process and for management of the properties as well. These joint efforts make it possible for communities to stretch state and local dollars further than they could on their own, distribute project management responsibilities and preserve locally significant lands.

Funding for the Trust

Florida Communities Trust is funded through the *Florida Forever* program and it is the only state land acquisition program available exclusively for locally selected projects. Once a project has been purchased, the grant recipient, not the state, holds title to the lands. Each recipient is then responsible for land stewardship and implementing a formal management plan which must be approved by FCT.



Promoting Economic Revitalization

Projects funded by Florida Communities Trust boost ecotourism opportunities and often help spur economic revitalization in their communities. The grant application gives consideration to projects located in areas with special economic needs, including Florida Main Street Districts, designated low-income communities, Rural Areas of Critical Economic Concern, or designated urban infill areas.

MISSION AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Preserving Florida's Cultural Gems

The majority of FCT's projects protect precious natural resources but many of them also have historical and cultural value. Special emphasis is placed on preserving historical resources and has helped Florida's communities save dozens of sites with significance at the local, state and national levels. Some of the historical treasures that have been preserved throughout the years with the assistance of FCT grant funds include the recently acquired Live Oak Heritage Park and Gardens in the City of Live Oak, which features a historic house that will be converted into a cultural center, and Camp Matecumbe in Miami-Dade County, where many Cuban boys spent their first nights in America during Operation Pedro Pan in 1961.



Promoting Education

Education is an important part of conserving our resources, and with that in mind, FCT places a priority on projects with educational aspects, awarding points to those projects that provide for interpretative signs, educational classes, and even environmental education centers. Among the local and regional parks showcasing FCT's commitment to education are the Florida Maritime Heritage Museum in Manatee County, which is located in a brick schoolhouse built in 1912 that showcases exhibits on fishing, boat building, and the history of one of the oldest fishing villages in Florida, and Sandoway House Nature Center in the City of Delray Beach, which is located in a historic 1936 home and features a world class shell collection, native plants and a coral reef pool with daily shark feedings.

FCT Joins the Department of Environmental Protection's Division of State Lands

From 1991 until 2011, the Florida Communities Trust program was located in the Florida Department of Community Affairs (DCA). During the 2011 legislative session, the passage of Senate Bill 2156 transferred the functions of DCA to other agencies. As a result, FCT was moved to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Division of State Lands (DSL).

Land Management and Stewardship

Florida Communities Trust continues to place a priority on land management and park development, which complements DSL's role as Florida's lead agency for environmental management and stewardship. Over the last 21 years FCT has helped to acquire approximately 571 local and regional parks in various stages of development and while title is held by the local communities that receive funding, the deeds contain restrictions giving FCT management oversight. FCT grant recipients are also required to follow the management plans and park development timelines approved by FCT staff as part of the acquisition process. As part of the ongoing effort to confirm proper stewardship and management at FCT parks, staff conducted 265 site visits this last year. These visits reinforce awareness of the land management and park development requirements and reward grant recipients who have fully developed their parks and who have a good track record by offering them a relaxed stewardship reporting requirement, from annual reporting to a five-year interval.



2011 Florida Forever Grant Application Cycle

For the third straight year, there was little or no appropriation of *Florida Forever* funds. However, because of funded projects from the 2008 Parks and Open Space Program's grant application cycle being acquired at less-than-anticipated costs, Florida

Communities Trust had an available \$17 million to award for new local land acquisition projects and opened a funding cycle in spring 2011. FCT received 57 grant applications from communities across the State during the application period. At the Project Selection Meeting in August, the Governing Board voted to approve funding for eight local acquisition efforts, while six additional projects were placed on the contingency list.

Conclusion

As Florida Communities Trust begins this new chapter as part of the Department of Environmental Protection, staff and Governing Board members will continue working with Florida's communities to strengthen relationships, encourage good land management practices, assure all community responsibilities are met at each FCT-funded park, and help preserve more lands for Florida's future.

INDIAN RIVERSIDE PARK

Martin County

Located along the Indian River Lagoon at Sewall's Point near Jensen Beach is a 63-acre waterfront paradise teeming with history. Martin County's Indian RiverSide Park hosts a variety of special events and summer camps that attract more than 100,000 visitors per year. The centerpiece of the park is a historical Mediterranean-style mansion sitting on top of an ancient Indian midden known to the locals as Mount Elizabeth.



Around 4,000 years ago, Indian RiverSide Park and the Indian River Lagoon were home to the Ais Indians. The tribe used the Indian River for recreation and fishing. Some details of what their daily lives might have been like can be found in middens like Mount Elizabeth. Middens are large mounds containing shell ornaments, fish bones, broken pottery tools and other discarded items. Mount Elizabeth and the surrounding property were purchased during the late 1850s by explorer William Henry Racey and in 1891, his son Charles built a three-story wood-frame house on the mound for his family and started a pineapple and citrus plantation. The Racey family named the midden after the family's two grandmothers, both of whom were named "Elizabeth."



The property saw new life in 1936 when it was purchased by Willaford Leach and his wife AnneBates Leach, a Coca-Cola heiress. They believed Mount Elizabeth was the perfect location for a mansion and they built the home that still sits there today. Named "Tuckahoe" after what is believed to be an ancient Native American word for "welcome," the mansion was the hub of social life in Martin County during the 1940s, hosting countless parties attended by the local social set and soldiers from Camp Murphy.



INDIAN RIVERSIDE PARK

After the Leach family sold the property in 1950, the Tuckahoe Mansion at Indian RiverSide Park was used for educational purposes by the Catholic church and the Florida Institute of Technology. It sat vacant for more than a decade before Martin County saw an opportunity to purchase the land from the Florida Institute of Technology in 1996. Community leaders envisioned a place that would once again host a variety of special events and provide recreational opportunities for residents and visitors. They successfully applied for a Preservation 2000 grant from Florida Communities Trust to purchase the property. In addition, residents approved a half-cent sales tax referendum to raise funds for the acquisition.



Indian RiverSide Park officially opened to the public in 2001 and is the gem of Martin County's park system. Visitors can stroll down the walking path, throw a line off the fishing pier to catch a fish from the lagoon, cool off in the interactive play fountain or enjoy the natural beauty of the butterfly garden. The Frances Langford Dockside Pavilion and the newly restored and re-opened Tuckahoe Mansion both host a variety of special events. The Pavilion can host 250 guests and features a catering kitchen, while the mansion has an 800-seat amphitheater and spectacular terrazzo terrace that overlooks the Indian River Lagoon. It is an ideal location for weddings, anniversary parties, corporate events, family reunions and fundraisers.



The county has also leased the property and formed partnerships that have created the Children's Museum of the Treasure Coast, the U.S. Sailing Center and the Maritime History Museum at the park. These partnerships provide added value to the community by attracting visitors from around the world to these venues.

Through the vision of community leaders, the support of local residents and the assistance of Florida Communities Trust, Indian RiverSide Park is preserved in perpetuity for all to enjoy, ensuring that visitors can write a little history of their own at this very special place!

Little Orange Creek

Recipient: City of Hawthorne/Putnam Land Conservancy

Project Number: 08-085-FF8

FCT Grant: \$43,215.21

Local Match: \$5,118.54

Total Acres: 7.46

Little Orange Creek is located on the outskirts of Hawthorne and stretches across eastern Alachua County and western Putnam County. Acquisition of this property will add to more than 1,300 acres previously acquired for the preserve as well as protect wading bird and gopher tortoise habitat and cultural resources found on site including Morrison's Mill (circa 1850). The property contains predominantly natural communities, including floodplain forest, floodplain marsh, baygall, depression marsh, upland mixed forest and blackwater and seepage streams. Managed as a sustainable forest, 430 acres of sandhill and flatwood communities will provide funds for management

and help restore natural communities. Proposed recreational amenities include a picnic pavilion, volleyball court, wildlife observation pier, horseshoe pit and interpretive nature trail. The existing house on the property will be converted into a nature center that will provide educational programs to the community.

Becker Preserve

Recipient: St. Lucie County

Acres: 12.36

Becker Preserve is located on Ten Mile Creek in Fort Pierce. Acquisition of this property will add to a large mosaic of public lands along the North Fork of the St. Lucie River and serve as part of a plan initiated by St. Lucie County to improve the water quality of the river and the Indian

River Lagoon. In addition, the property will help create a wilderness canoe trail in an urban area. The county will convert an existing structure into a nature center. Once development is complete, the recreational amenities will include a nature trail, canoe/kayak launch, open air amphitheater, and wildlife observation platform.



Nine Mile Swamp Park and Trail

Recipient: Putnam County/Putnam Land Conservancy

Nine Mile Swamp Park and Trail is located west of Palatka on State Road 20. The Rice Creek and Caravelle Ranch Wildlife

Management Areas border the project site to the east. Acquisition of the park enhances the Florida National Scenic Trail and an ecological corridor running from the Ocala National Forest to Camp Blanding. The property consists of sandhill, pine flatwoods, wet flatwoods, baygall and marsh lake communities. A nature trail, fishing pier, primitive campground, canoe launch, picnic pavilion, volleyball court and observation platforms will be constructed for public recreation and enjoyment.

Cora C. Harrison Preserve

Recipient: Town of Hastings

Project Number: 08-044-FF8

FCT Grant: \$60,643.80

Local Match: \$6,738.20

Acres: 5.69

Cora C. Harrison Preserve is the first park for the Town of Hastings and will improve quality of life in this economically distressed community. The preserve will serve as an ecotourism draw by providing a trailhead that will enhance access to the 19-mile Palatka to St. Augustine State Trail. It also will protect Cracker Branch Swamp, which flows into Deep Creek and eventually the St. Johns River, with buffers on both sides of the creek beds. Proposed recreational amenities include a playground, nature trails, boardwalks, wildlife observation platforms and trailhead facilities for the adjacent State Rail Trail.

Live Oak Heritage Park

Live Oak Heritage Park and Gardens is located in Live Oak in Suwannee County. Acquisition of the property will allow for the creation of a neighborhood recreational and cultural center accessible from downtown Live Oak. Recreational opportunities will be provided through a playground, picnic pavilion, sand volleyball court, frisbee golf course and looped walking trail through the gardens. In addition, the historic Crapps Mansion will be converted into a cultural center.

St. Mary's Shoals Phase II

Recipient: Baker County

Project Number: 08-069-FF8

FCT Grant: \$119,228.00

Acres: 72.02

The property will enhance public access to the St. Mary's River and expand northeast Florida's only public off-highway vehicle (OHV) trail, creating a unique regional ecotourism destination for the county and nearby areas. In addition, the acquisition will expand the existing St. Mary's Shoals Park, which was previously acquired with *Florida Forever* funds provided by FCT, by extending hiking, equestrian and multi-use trails and expanding the ecological corridor connections to other state and federal conservation lands in the area. The site is located within a designated Strategic Habitat Conservation Area for the Florida black

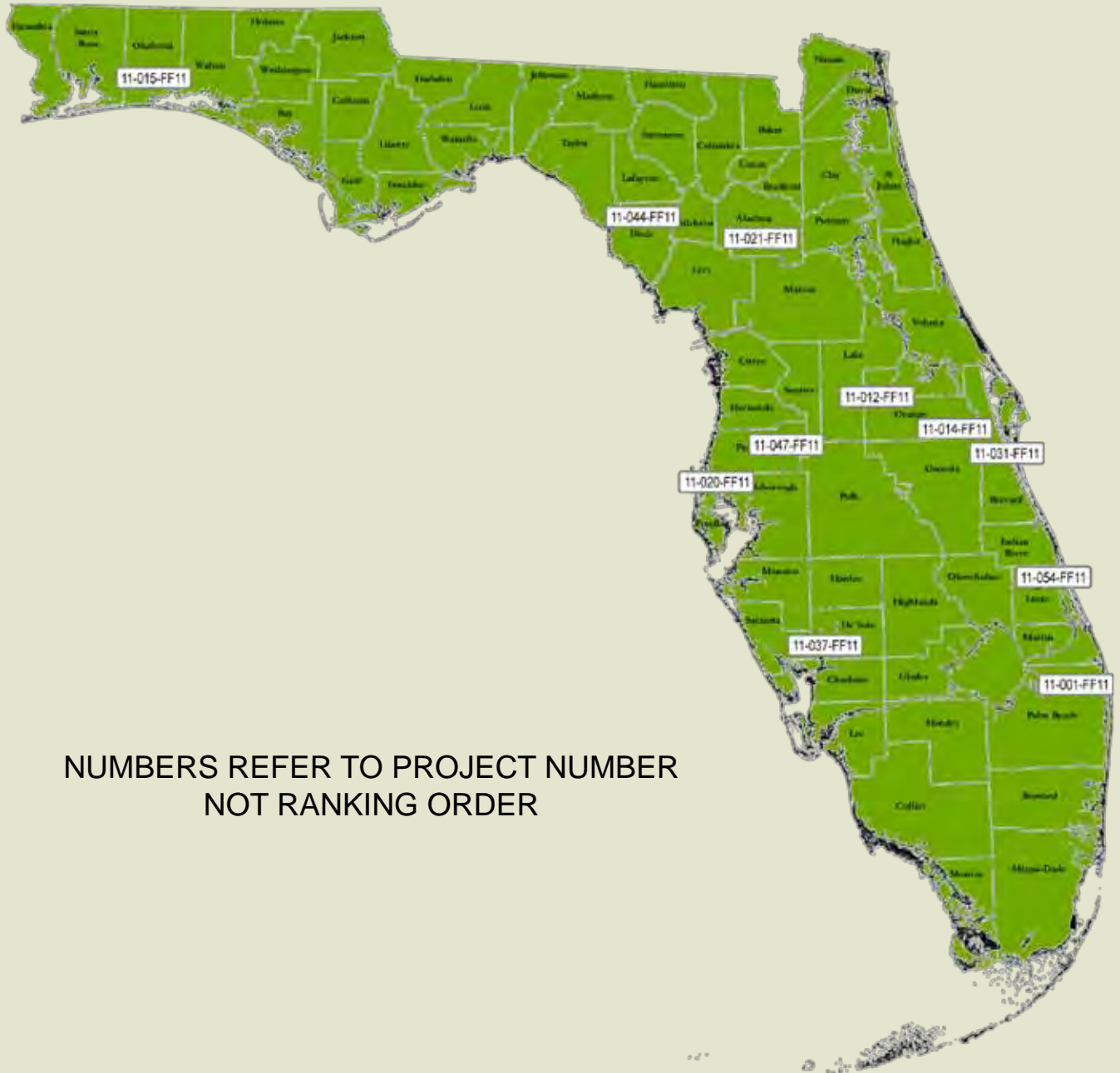
bear and the natural features include floodplain forest and a blackwater stream. With road access off of Odis Yarborough Road, the proposed Regional Park will offer athletic fields for baseball, softball and soccer, basketball and volleyball courts, restrooms, picnic areas, and a field house for public recreation and enjoyment.

“Baker County was proud to open the St. Mary’s Shoals off-highway vehicle (OHV) trail system to the public in October 2011. This is the start of an exciting new phase in the development of the park. St. Mary’s Shoals Park’s new trails are the only new OHV trails that have been opened on public land in Florida within the past few years. The park’s 2,600 acres also currently offer a multitude of other recreational activities. On any given day of the week, you will find numerous equestrian enthusiasts utilizing the trails through our pine forest uplands. The pristine St. Mary’s River shoals beach at the northern tip of the park provides families with one of only two public access points in the county to the historic river. Baker County welcomes everyone to visit and play at our pride and joy!” – Maurice Postal, Baker County Grants Coordinator.

- (5) Identification of additional funding, legislation, or other resources required to carry out the objectives of this part more effectively.
- (6) An account of any other trust or department duties established by this part.



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
